

HAIL DAMAGES **GRAIN IN WEST**

Half Million Loss in Saskatchewan—Lightning Kills Bather.

Regina, Sask., Aug. 6—Hail claims received at the local and provincial headquarters of the private, municipal and farmers' mutual companies indicate that Saturday's storm extended over one of the widest areas ever known in Saskatchewan. It is estimated the loss will aggregate around \$500.000.
