Serious Time in Near East as Conference Date Is Postponed

London Anxious Over the Question of Maintaining Peace

People in Constantinople are Alarmed and Allied Troops in Position of Danger—Feeling That Allied Representatives Must Agree on Common Policy Before Going to Conference.

(Canadian Press Cable) London, Nov. 13.—The Lausanne conference has been postponed to Nov. 20, and the question most urgently asked here is whether it will be possible to maintain peace in Constantinople in the interim.

Complete agreement among the Allies and a display of unity in the nature of granting full authority to their commanders in Constantinople until complete repairs had been made.

TURK DEMANDS WILL BE GRANTED

Lausanne, Nov. 13.—The delegates of the Turkish Nationalist government have come to Lausanne as victors, and their mood is wholly different than that of the crushed representatives of Sultan who begged for mercy when the treaty of Sevres was granted three years ago.

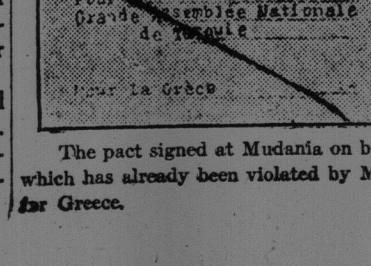
ORDER ISSUED RE EXPORT FROM SASKATCHEWAN

Great Toll in Lives And Property by Quake And Monster Tidal Wave

Thousands Lives Believed to Have Been Lost in Chile

Millions the Measure of the Destruction of Property—Giant Waves Beat One City Almost Flat—People Flee to Hills for Safety.

(Canadian Press) Santiago, Nov. 13.—Thousands were made homeless by earthquakes throughout Chile early on Saturday morning and by flooding waves which followed the shocks. Relief forces were being mobilized today. The death toll probably be at least 1,000, it is estimated, and the property loss will run into millions, as several towns were almost entirely wiped out and heavy damage to buildings and communication lines and particularly to ships along the 1,400 miles of coast affected by the huge waves has resulted from the violent upheavals of nature.

PROTESTANT WOMEN MEET

Enumerate Anew Principles of Christian Faith

Convention is Opened in Toronto—Objects of the Gathering Set Out—Rev. Archdeacon Cody Presides at Opening Session.

(Canadian Press) Toronto, Nov. 13.—With the object of "enumerating anew the fundamental principles of the Christian faith," a four day conference of the Canadian National Evangelical Association was opened here today under the auspices of the Protestant Federation of Patriotic Women of Canada, with Mrs. A. G. Goodham, as general convenor and Mrs. George H. Smith, assisting. Rev. Archdeacon Cody, (Anglican) presided at the opening sessions today.

FIVE MEN ADMIT MURDER OF 108 IN ROBBERIES IN RUSSIA

Moscow, Nov. 13.—Five men arrested by the Moscow police had admitted murdering 108 men, women and children, their motive being robbery. In one instance eighteen persons attending a birthday party were all killed. Another time an entire family of eight were murdered, and in other cases the robbers took the lives of four or five persons at one time, so that no witnesses were left to tell the tale of horror.

OCEAN GIANT GOING TO DRY DOCK AT BOSTON

Only Place in World Capable of Holding the Monster Majestic.

(Canadian Press) New York, Nov. 13.—Arrangements have been completed by the International Mercantile Marine Co. of New York for drying out the world's largest ship, the Majestic, of the White Star Line, at Boston on Nov. 16.

GOING TO DRY DOCK AT BOSTON

The naval graving dock at South Boston, in which the Majestic will be placed, is the only one of its type capable of holding the monster ship, which is 586 feet long and weighs 64,000 tons. There is a floating dock of the post-war type at Hamburg, which lifted the Majestic last winter, but its employment for the forthcoming docking of the ship, which is under repair, is too shallow for the Majestic to navigate safely. This left only one dock available, that of the White Star Line management.

HUNGER RIOTS IN GERMANY

Berlin, Nov. 13.—Advises from Cologne report that rioting which began on Friday in a suburb of Kalk spread on Saturday and Sunday to the suburbs of Kuelheim and Elberfeld. Many shop windows were smashed and the mob stoned the police, shouting "hunger, hunger." A large number of arrests were made.

LADDER FALLS; CARPENTER PLUNGES TO HIS DEATH

Barrie, Ont., Nov. 13.—Fred Glyn, a carpenter employed by the Bait Planning Mill Co., was instantly killed on Saturday when a ladder on which he was working fell. His neck was broken. Glyn leaves a wife and large family.

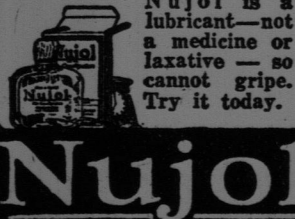

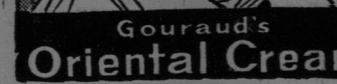

ISOLATED FLOCK OF BIRDS CHANGES COLOR

Chicago, Nov. 13.—The leopard may not change his spots, but the feathers on the ground finch of Chimbo Valley in Western Ecuador, have changed color, according to a paper read at the meeting of the American Ornithologists' Union here by Dr. Frank M. Chapman, curator of birds of the American Museum of Natural History.

The ground-inhabiting finch ranges from Mexico to Southern Peru, Dr. Chapman said. In all this 5,000 mile stretch of country these birds uniformly have a conspicuous black throat band and underparts of gray and

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UNCLE SAM'S TROUBLES.

The New York Tribune finds in last week's elections a lesson for the Republican party which it urges the leaders to take seriously to heart. The Tribune refers especially to the Fordney tariff and the manner of its enactment as one of the great blunders which contributed to the party reverse of last week.

Only leaders deaf, dumb and blind to criticism could have expected anything else. Scidmore has been a party more notable for its blunders than for its successes.

The Tribune declares that President Harding showed weakness in not vetoing the tariff measure, and that the whole country will watch with interest not only the developments within the party but the future career of Mr. Crerar.

Today's despatches announce that Mr. Robert Forke, M.P. for Brandon, has been chosen to succeed Mr. Crerar as Progressive leader.

There is much speculation in the United States as to the effect the recent elections will have on the Volstead Act. Volstead himself has been defeated, but by a man who has declared himself to be "drier than Volstead."

Both sides are preparing for a fight in the new Congress, and a proposal for the sale of light wines and beer is likely to be put forward by the wets.

At a meeting of the Campbellton Board of Trade last week, Mr. John Harquail spoke strongly in support of vocational training.

The resignation of Hon. Mr. Crerar as leader of the Progressive party is an event of so much interest throughout Canada that it has been the subject of much discussion in the press.

The Progressives are an eminently strong man who never goes to extremes. In tendering his resignation he said the Progressive movement was greater than any one man in it and "should become the greatest power for good that Canada has ever had."

Lesson No. 153.
MEASUREMENT OF ANTENNA WAVELENGTH.
(All Rights Reserved by United Feature Syndicate. Reproduction Prohibited.)

Ordinarily, the amateur who desires to merely receive radio signals erects one or more wires as high as possible above the earth's surface and 75 or 100 feet or more in length. There are times when it is desirable to know the exact fundamental wave length of the antenna system, as in the case of the amateur who wishes to install a transmitter to operate on the legal wave length of 300 meters.

The fundamental wave length of the antenna is understood to mean the wavelength at which the grounded antenna oscillates freely, that is, in its own period, without any inductance coils or condensers in the circuit. The wavelength is thus dependent upon the distributed inductance and capacity of the antenna conductors themselves.

In order to measure the fundamental wave length a wave meter must be used, preferably one having detector and telephones rather than thermommeter. A buzzer may be inserted in the antenna circuit so that the spark occurs in the antenna circuit, thus setting up oscillations at the fundamental frequency of the antenna which may be tuned in on the wave meter by means of the detector and telephones. An alternative method is to excite the antenna with a small spark coil or transformer with the spark gap directly in the antenna. The wave length measured may be read directly from the wave meter scale or chart provided for that purpose. Figure 1 in the diagram shows the arrangement of the wave meter and buzzer or spark coil for measuring the fundamental wavelength by this method.

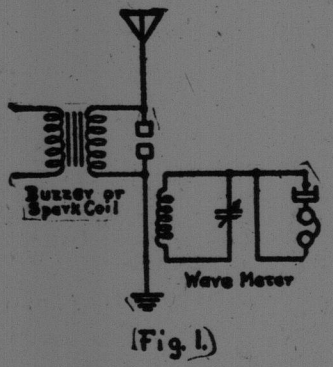

If a wave meter fitted with a buzzer instead of detector and telephones is available the arrangement shown in Figure 2 may be employed for measuring the fundamental wave length. In this case the wave meter is employed as a generator of electromagnetic waves and is coupled to the antenna circuit by means of a single loop of wire. The detector and telephones are unilaterally connected to the antenna circuit and the buzzer placed in operation. The wave meter is adjusted until maximum signal is heard in the telephones, which means that a condition of resonance exists between the wavelength of the wave meter and the wave length of the antenna circuit. The wave meter is therefore adjusted to the fundamental wave length of the antenna circuit read directly from the scale or chart and the desired wavelength may be determined.

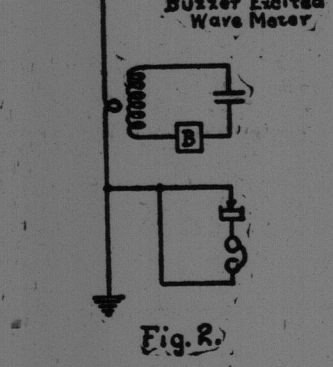

BEATEN AT POLLS, NOW ASKS DIVORCE

Woman Candidate Blames Defeat on Husband's Election Speech

Westchester, Pa., Nov. 13.—Surprise was expressed in this section of Chester county when Kane Foulke Browne had filed an application in the office of the Prothonotary of Chester county asking for an absolute divorce from Captain Herbert Jarvis Browne, late of the United States army. During the campaign, in which Mrs. Browne made a hard fight and gave her opponents much worry for a time, her husband conducted her

campaign and made speeches in her favor. It is hinted that the final episode which had weight on the divorce application occurred during the last days of the campaign. Mrs. Browne had been assured of the support of a large number of Republican voters, but it is asserted by her friends that she lost a large number of these by reason of a speech made by her husband at a meeting held at Honeybrook, which resulted in the Republicans voting for her opponents. A family clash over this is said to have had much weight in the divorce proceedings.

WOMAN USES KNIFE WITH LASTING EFFECT

Two Men Charged With Assault and Robbery—Bear Marks of Fray

Welland, Nov. 11.—Sara Kallalak and Steve Gaudar, two foreigners of Crowland, were charged in the police court before Magistrate Goodwin with robbing with violence Mrs. Eudocher Gleghin, and stealing \$50 from her. 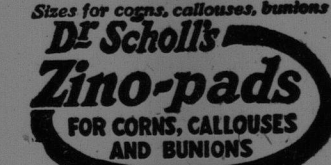

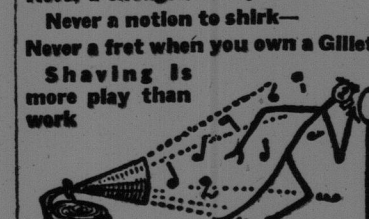

MIRACLE WORKER ENTERS POLITICS

Maori Farmer Famous for Cures Wrought by Simple Faith

Wellington, N. Z., Sept. 21.—(By Mail.)—Wiremu Ratana, the Maori miracle man of New Zealand, is reported to be about to enter politics. Ratana came under notice about two years ago as a worker of miracles. He did not seek the limelight. Rather he sought to avoid it. He was a Maori farmer, and he continued to farm his land and to teach his people industry and temperance. He preached a simple, Christian doctrine and denounced the revival of "tohungism," the ancient Maori wizardry, which in latter-day revivals had sinister aspects. He was ascribed solely to faith in Divine power.

The Anglican Synod, after hearing the testimony of clergy well acquainted with Ratana's work, went so far as to place on record its approval of the good that was being wrought spiritually for the Maori. Now it is reliably reported that followers of Ratana will contest the four Maori seats at the general election in December. This has come as a disquieting news to white people, who, from doubting, have come to regard Ratana as a Maori of remarkable power, who used his gifts with the greatest wisdom. It is not felt that the disabilities of the Maori race have their root in politics or can be remedied by political activity. The four Maori members now in Parliament, though sitting on different sides of the House, are in all that touches their own race, non-party representatives.

It is not known how far Ratana himself is responsible for the new political movement. Though his own name is among the prospective candidates he has not stated publicly that it is his desire to make his influence felt in politics. In some quarters it is felt that the movement is due rather to followers, who, seeing the many adherents drawn to the miracle man, have counted them as votes and temporal power. Well-wishers of Ratana who are not of his race fear that he will wreck his own power for good if he seeks this to extend that power unwisely.

COLONISTS BUILD MUD-BRICK HOUSES IN THE UKRAINE

Khar'kov, Oct. 1.—(By Mail.)—Lack of wood in the Ukraine has led French and German colonists to build houses of mud bricks held together by straw. These bricks are carefully plastered over with mud, and when dry the mud is tinted in water colors. One house will be a bright blue, another yellow, the next one pink or green, and the village as a whole makes a colorful picture. Plots on which the houses stand are surrounded by low walls made of the same material. Gardens are well kept in summer, and there is an abundance of fruit trees. Harold H. Fisher, historian of the American Relief Administration, recently visited both the German and French colonies in the Ukraine. The German villages near the mouth of the Dniester, across from Besarabia, he described as exceedingly picturesque and as spick and span as any along the Rhine. "Protestants settle in one village, the Catholics in another," said Mr. Fisher. "One can recognize the prevailing religion of the village by the shape of the church spires. I also visited the French colonies in the Nikolayev district. These people were brought to the Ukraine years ago to establish vineyards, and to promote the wine industry. They made a success of their vinticulture, but this year their crop has been very small and they are hard hit by the famine. The French and German colonists have been in Russia several generations, but have not yet adopted the language or customs of the country."

AIDED TO DRIVE FENIANS FROM HER FARM HOUSE

Windsor, Nov. 11.—Mrs. Rose Marcotte, ninety-one years old, a lifelong resident, died this week, after a short illness, at her home on the Huron line, Sandwich. Mrs. Marcotte, who spent her girlhood on a farm in Windsor, had a vivid recollection of the Fenian raids. On one occasion when Fenians were being routed three attempted to take refuge at her farm home, and at the point of a musket she drove them from the house. She was the widow of Henry Marcotte, for years a carriage maker in Sandwich. During the war she knitted more than 100 pairs of socks for soldiers, and was active until her illness, which began three days ago. She leaves seven children, forty grandchildren, and twenty-one great-grandchildren.

DAUGHTER OF PEER WEDS CIGAR CLERK

Hon. Alexandra Knollys' Romance Began in War-time

(Special Cable to the New York Times and Montreal Gazette.) London, Nov. 9.—The Daily Express announces a peevish romance in a quiet wedding in Fortobello, near Edinburgh, of the Hon. Alexandra Louisa Knollys to Richard Henry Checkley. The bride is the widow of Captain Allan Keith MacKenzie Knollys, formerly private secretary to King George and lord-in-waiting to Queen

Alexandra. She spent most of her life in the inner circles of the court since the day when Queen Alexandra, after whom she is named, became her godmother. The bridegroom, says the Daily Express is the son of a mason, or usher, in the court of session at Edinburgh. 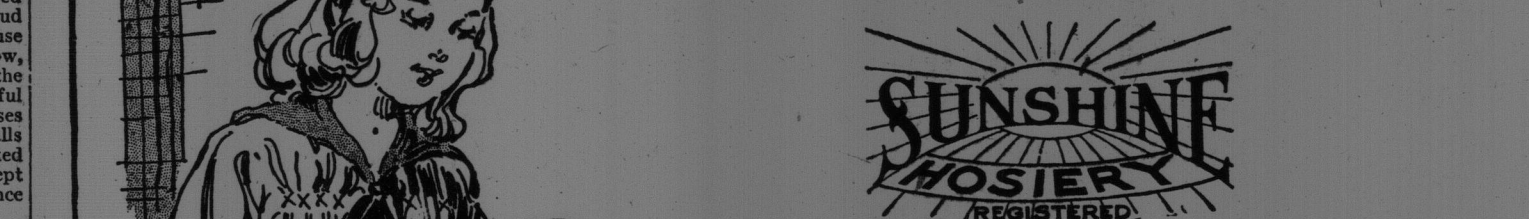

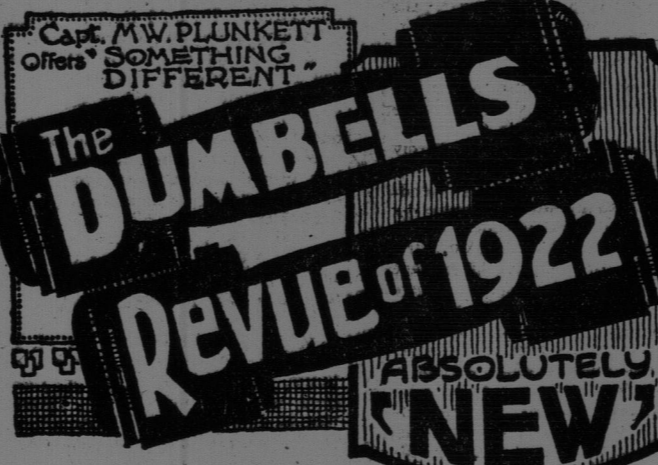

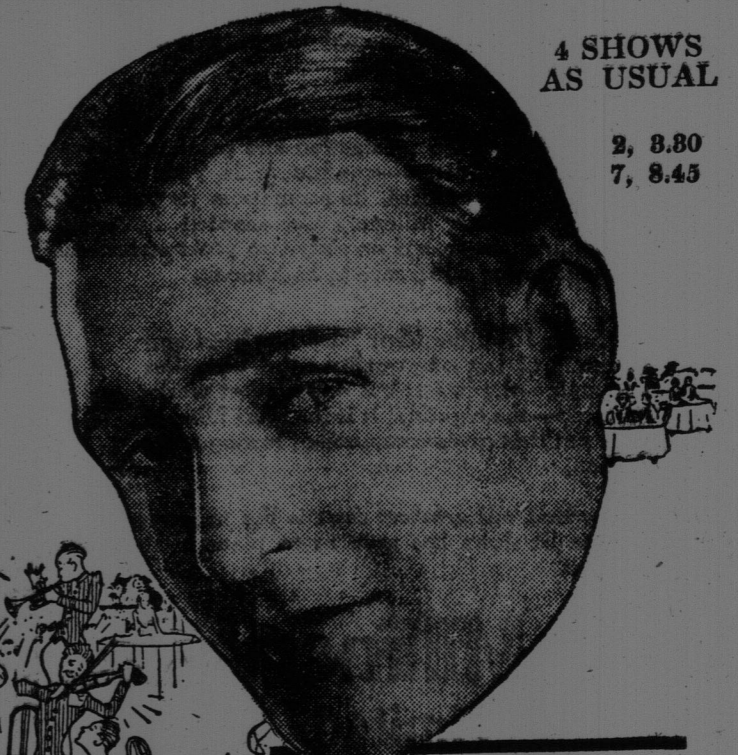

PHOTOS OF VOICE ON MOVIE FILM

New York, Nov. 13.—More particulars of the new device invented by C. A. Hoxie of the General Electric Company, which the inventor hopes will make possible the "talking" moving picture as well as a vast improvement in radio broadcasting, are at hand, following the visit recently of Thomas A. Edison to inspect the machine.

L. T. Robinson, engineer in charge of the laboratory in which the machine was designed, thus explains its operation:

"This is a device for the purpose of recording sounds upon a photographic film so that the sound may afterwards be reproduced in ordinary telephones, loud speakers, etc.

"The record is made by causing the sound waves to produce vibrations on an exceedingly minute and very delicate mirror. A beam of light reflected by this mirror strikes a photographic film which is kept in continuous motion.

"The film when developed shows a hands of white with delicate markings on the edges, which correspond to the sound which has been reproduced. On

account of the exceedingly small size of the mirror, its low inertia, it is possible by this means to produce a sound record which includes the very delicate 'overtones' which give quality to speech and musical sounds. This has not been so successfully accomplished by any other method of recording sound waves.

"The reproduction of the sound from the film is accomplished by moving the film in front of an exceedingly delicate electrical device which produces an electromotive force which varies with the amount of light which falls upon it. In the past attempts have been made to produce these results by means of selenium cells, but a selenium cell, though it responds to the changes in the amount of light

COMPENSATION BOARD CASE

TEAMS WILL NOT COMPETE AGAIN

U. N. B. Football Players Return from Amherst—Title Not to be Awarded.

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 13.—U. N. B.'s football team returned this morning from Amherst. There was no official reception, due, it was said, to there being no suspension of lectures. It was said there was no possibility of a play-off with Dalhousie and that the intercollegiate title would not be awarded to either team, but the Halifax Herald's trophy would not be officially in possession of any team for this year's play. Financial considerations, it was said, would prevent U. N. B. from engaging in a play-off with Dalhousie. It is said it would mean almost \$300 to send the team away for another title game.

It appears that Dalhousie would have won the title, had the team from Amherst, U. N. B., they said, should have scored in the first half, but were lucky to hold Dalhousie in the second, especially towards the end.

SIGNS OF GOOD SIZED VOTE IN ELECTION TODAY

Indications at the time of going to press were that a fairly heavy vote was being polled today in the majority election. The day was clear but with a raw, biting wind. Party workers were active and a large number of automobiles were in use conveying voters to and from the polls. The polling booths were visited by the two candidates this morning and about noon they met in Wellington ward at the booth in the shop of J. A. Gibbs, 23½ Waterloo street, and greeted the workers.
