



The tidal waves which followed the earthquakes indicated a gigantic disturbance beneath the Pacific. The waters first were drawn away from shore, far below tide mark, and then they came rushing back in a great wave which some observes said was fifty, metres in height.



Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 13—The beaver has been granted a complete respite from the depredations of hunters and trappers in New Brunswick until Nov. 1, 1924. This announcement was made this morning by Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon in connection with the cancellation of the permit system in vogue for the taking of beaver. There has been a closed season in New Brunswick for the last ten years although hunters and trappers were allewed to take beaver from certain sections during that period under special permits, where the beaver colonies were large and not endangered of becoming extinct. This permit system has not been satisfactory to the game officials who say that as a rule more beaver were usually taken than allowed under the permits.



ISOLATED FLOCK OF BIRDS CHANGES COLOR

Chicago, Nov. 18.—The leopard may not change his spots, but the feathers on the ground finch of Chimbo Valley, in Western Ecuador, have changed color, according to a paper read at the meeting of the American Ornithologists' Union here by Dr. Frank M. Chapman, curator of birds of the American Museum of Natural History.

"After 51 months of suffering caused by the iniquitious, the pitiless and insolent occupation of the German Army, the City of Mons is at length delivered by the heroism of the British Army, which, at the hour of the Armistice, completes its series of victories in the identical place, where, on Aug. 23, 1914, it first engaged the enemy.

"The 3rd Canadian Division, at cost of heavy sacrifices, entered the city at three o'clock this morning, thus avenge ing by a striking success the retreat of 1914. Honor and thanks be to it!

"The Armistice is signed. The German Army has capitulated; brutal force is destroyed; justice and right triumph; Belgium is strengthened and fortified by the terrible ordeal she has passed through."

Mons was en fete that day, but our men took it very calmly. Fighting had been hard; gaps in the ranks were many; there was a sense of relief no doubt, but there was no Mafficking spirit abroad.
