BOXES NOW HAVE BEEN STOLEN

Remarkable Development in \$50,000,000 Bank Of England Robbery

ON THE WAY HOME TO EXPERTS

Cases From Which Sovereigns Were Taken Probably Intercepted by Same Gang Which Carried Out Original Robbery

(Canadian Press) London, Dec. 6.—There was a remarkable development yesterday in the investigation in the robbery of \$50,000,000 worth of sovereigns contained in two cases of a consignment of \$1,000,000 shipped by the Bank of England to the Credit Lyonnais in Alexandria, Egypt, about three weeks ago.

The two cases of the consignment, which were found to contain lead instead of gold on their arrival at Alexandria, were sent back to England for expert examination. Extra precautions were taken to guard these two cases on their way back, but they have been lost or stolen, as no trace of them can be discovered.

PLAN RISING IN RUSSIAN POLAND

ROVERA ADRIFT IN BAY OF FUNDY

Schooner Started to Fill When Being Towed Here—Experiences of The Stadium

The schooner Rovera, 100 tons, owned in St. John, was lost last morning while bound here from Alma with a cargo of coal. She was in tow of the steamer Stadium which brought the survivors of the wrecked schooner Ethel B. Sumner to port at the time. There was a very heavy sea and the stress of the waves and the strain of the towing is supposed to have caused her to drift.

DAY ABSENCE OF LIGHT WAS CAUSE OF STEAMER SINKING

Quebec, Dec. 6.—The investigation into the cause of the stranding of the steamer Royal George was concluded last night before the wreck commission. Mr. Holden of Montreal spoke for some time for the owners of the ship, contending that the absence of light on St. Lawrence Point was the primary cause of the accident. Messrs. Penland and A. H. Cook of Quebec, on behalf of the Pilot Board, followed, taking a similar line of argument.

HANDSOME WIFE OF MANUFACTURER DROWNED; ADMIRER A SUICIDE

New Quay, Wales, Dec. 6.—Authorities here declare that events have gone far towards clearing up the mystery surrounding the death of Mrs. Sidney Nowill, 34, the handsome wife of a Sheffield manufacturer, who disappeared from the Atlantic Hotel here on November 23. ### Daily Hints For the Cook

**FAVORITE ONE-EGG CAKE.**  
One quarter of a cup of butter, and half cup of sugar creamed together, then add the yolk of one egg. Beat up very light, then add half cup of lukewarm milk. Stir in a cup of flour which has been sifted several times with a teaspoon of baking powder and a pinch of salt. Beat the white of the egg to a stiff froth and stir well in. This also is baked in three layers and put together with filling.


**CURRY OF LOBSTER.**  
Between two and three pounds of lobster meat, one real small onion, three tablespoonsful of butter, two of flour, a scant teaspoon of curry powder, a spoonful of cayenne, a little salt, a scant pint of water or stock. Let butter get hot, then add onion cut very fine and fry brown. When the onion is cooked add the flour and curry powder and stir all together for two minutes. Add stock, cook for two more minutes and strain. Add meat of lobster cut into disks and simmer five minutes. Serve with border of boiled rice around the dish.

**MUFFINS.**  
Mix one and a half cups of flour, half cup of cornmeal, one teaspoon of sugar, half of salt and a heaping one of baking powder. Mix well and then rub in a tablespoonful of butter, or other shortening would do. Rub this well in with fingers. Then add a cup of milk, two well-beaten eggs and a pinch of cinnamon if liked. Have a well-greased pan and on it put muffin rings, also well greased. Fill half full with the batter, and as soon as it rises to the top of the rings put a cake turner under muffin, ring and all, and turn them over and bake on the other side. Serve hot. Break open and butter while hot.

### Boys and Firearms

During the last three or four years we have had at least a half a dozen deaths in Cumberland through the indiscriminate handling of firearms by untrained boys and it strikes us that it is time for our authorities to pass stringent legislation to prevent such a tragedy from being repeated.





### MEDICAL SCHOOL FOR McMASTER UNIVERSITY

John D. Rockefeller May Contribute Handsomely For New Building in Toronto

(Toronto World). Toronto is to have another school of medicine. It will be established in connection with the new McMaster Hall. Influential McMaster men have been quietly pushing forward the project. It is provided for in the McMaster University charter. Some of the most representative members of the medical profession in Toronto, are looking forward hopefully to its establishment and co-operating in the movement.

The advocates of the establishment of a school of medicine, on the McMaster campus, are gathering their friends that it would "round off" and add lustre to the magnificent new university. A prominent McMaster man expressed the opinion to The World yesterday that it was "very fortunate that McMaster had a clause in its charter authorizing a school of medicine," as it was "very unlikely" that the university would be given it by the government now. It is regarded as significant in connection with the great things now planned for McMaster that Rev. Dr. Eaton, pastor of the Methodist church, was recently here. His close association with the Rockefeller family, father and son, respectively, first in Cleveland and now in New York, is connected with the talk that John D., the richest Baptist on earth, will not be backward in relation to McMaster's new endowment, especially as Dr. Eaton takes an intense personal interest in the future of McMaster.

### ORGANIZE "AD" CLUB

Edmonton Business Men Unite To Stamp Out "Fake" Advertising

Edmonton, Alta., Dec. 6.—An Edmonton Ad Club has been organized with a membership of thirty representative business men to stamp out all forms of "fake" advertising. The officers for the coming year are: President, F. G. McDermid, president, McDermid Engraving Company. Vice-president, F. C. Byron, president, Byron-May Engraving Company. Secretary, J. V. Holland, advertising manager, Johnstone-Walker company. Treasurer, A. L. Salisbury, advertising manager, Hickson & Co. Executive committee, August Wolf, secretary of Citizens' League; F. G. McDermid, F. C. Byron, J. V. Holland and A. L. Salisbury.

The club will meet at a mid-day luncheon once a week to discuss matters of interest to the advertising profession, and it is expected to enroll 200 active members before the close of the year. "The plan is to give support and encouragement to legitimate publications," Mr. McDermid said, "and to discourage promoters of schemes, designed principally to take money from advertisers without giving adequate returns. We shall have a board of censors, composed of experienced advertising men, whose duty it will be to pass upon the merits of every proposition submitted to space-buyers."

"It is not the purpose of this club to designate the means to be used by its members. That is the business of the advertising managers, but we expect to exercise our best efforts to protect space-buyers against grafters and solicitors for media which are recognized by publishers or members of the profession. We have adopted the best ideas of the active advertising clubs throughout the United States and Canada and worked in some of our own to advantage in making our constitution and by-laws say what we mean, and we firmly believe that every member will abide by the rulings of the board of censors."

(Montreal Witness Cable)

LONDON, Dec. 4.-The prospects of tariff reform are more gloomy now than ever. The movement has received another severe setback by the astounding prosperity of the country. There is a wonderful trade revival throughout Great Britain-so much so that even the Protectionist press is now reluctantly admitting that trade is booming to an unprecedented extent.

On the top of this, it is now apparent to all the tariff-reformers that the tariff is carrying out the purpose for which it was designed, namely, to foster greater health in the homes of the people, through its provisions for general, medical attendance.

The outlook for Great Britain is most optimistic, and there is a significant rise in consols, annuities, Irish land stock issues, and local loan stock.

NAVAL AID

NOT ENOUGH

Toronto Globe Says Canada Should Man and Maintain Ships

BORDEN PLAN UNWORTHY

Dominion Should Not Saddle Expense of Upkeep on British Tax-payers-Tribute, Not Partnership

Toronto, Dec. 5.-The Globe in an editorial under the heading of "A half century of tribute" says well in part tomorrow.

"Mr. Borden has dealt a deadly blow at the principle of a Canadian naval defence of March, 1906, in favour of a Canadian navy, forgotten are his expressions of national pride, as he joined Mr. Foster upon that occasion urging that Canadian manhood as well as Canadian money should be devoted to the safeguarding of the empire at sea.

"Today he offers Britain the price of three dreadnaughts, but not a sailor-to man them. So long as the Borden dreadnaughts remain in British waters every Canadian taxpayer who pays for the maintenance of ships that in the premier's grandiloquent words are to bear 'historic names associated with this country.'

"Side by side with the ships built by Canada and maintained by Britain will float Australia's great fighting ships built, owned and maintained by the overseas commonwealth that has resolved to fly its own flag, at its own cost over her own ships.

Hiring Defence.

"Mr. Borden's argument carried to its logical conclusion would destroy Canadian autonomy and carry us back to the days when the colonies paid the shot and the man in Downing street managed the overseas defences as it pleased them.

If Canada is to forgo active participation in her own naval defence and 'hire' her defence by a stipulated gift of money at fifteen cents per ton, she will be trained to keep a small amount of money constantly in his possession.

"Why labor to build up a national service when Britain has experts who have been for centuries building up her splendid public services at our command if we will but put ourselves in their harness?"

"Mr. Borden takes too mean a view of Canada's destiny. If an emergency is said to exist-which as Sir Wilfrid Laurier indicated, is still a matter of doubt-and if Canada is to contribute at once \$50,000,000 for the construction of three dreadnaughts, the ships should be built in Canada, they should fly the flag of the Canadian naval service, and they should be maintained, whether in the North Sea or on this side of the Atlantic, by the people of Canada. Only in that way can the dominion do her duty to the empire and to herself.

Only in that way can Canadians show themselves worthy of the great traditions of the Anglo-Saxon and Norman ancestors.

"Mr. Borden and his supporters stand for a vote of \$50,000,000 for the building of dreadnaughts to be maintained by the British taxpayers. Let Liberals show their devotion to the empire and to Canadian autonomy by demanding that Canada shall maintain as well as build the ships, and by declaring that when they are built they will be kept by Canada in the North Sea or the Atlantic, or wherever the admiralty may direct, and that they shall be most effectively aid in upholding the flag of the united empire.

"Mr. Borden proposes tribute, not a partnership. Liberalism can have no part or lot in a policy that Australia long ago found inconsistent with the self-respect of a great free-sovereigning state.

"Dreadnaughts, if you will Mr. Borden, but dreadnaughts the maintenance of which will not add to the great burden on the shoulders of the British taxpayer."

## AMES HOLDEN MCCREADY LIMITED

The past six months business ending October 30 shows an increase of sales of over \$700,000 in excess of the same period last year and very largely increased profits. The joint output of these three factories is now about 9,000 pairs per day.

The advance sales for the spring trade are considerably ahead of last year and reports from their branches from the Atlantic to the Pacific all indicate a heavy business for the coming spring.

The company have had to make two additions to their St. Hyacinthe factory, and notwithstanding this are crowded, with orders which will keep them driving at full capacity until next March without any additional orders which are coming in daily.

I met a woman a few days ago who, with a small family, arrived here intending to remain, but she told me that she found it impossible to get a house, except a few rooms in a very poor part of the city; also another nice family who came out from England the first part of this year, but who were made very unhappy as they were unable to get what they wanted. There are many other such cases. All of the last named family have returned to England except the husband. In Toronto and other cities where new people are coming in, houses are going up to meet the demand. Could you not, through your valuable paper, stir up the people of St. John to do something on this line. It is greatly needed.

Sir—Yesterday I had the pleasure of inspecting the twenty-four water colors of Antoine Barbier, which Miss Moss is showing in the studio of the St. John Art Club. Mr. Barbier has studios in Paris and Lyons, France, and is an artist of high rank, excellent technique and rare skill, being represented in most of the picture galleries of Europe, and honored with medals and diplomas from many art associations.

It is a delight to go from picture to picture, and note the wide variety of subjects and the happy treatment of each. Several have been already sold.

The largest painting, A Market Street in Cairo, is ablaze with the brilliance of Egyptian sunlight, and with its Moorish architecture, striking costumes, and vivid yet harmonious coloring would grace an art gallery or brightest parlor. The next largest in size is a fog effect of St. Paul's, London, viewed from the river, and is a powerful and artistic effort. His mastery is shown in the clear cut way in which the great dome, the ships and other objects come out to the view through the misty air, and yet the prevailing impression is of a mysterious darkness; and the cool tone of the fog is warmed by just the proper amount of color on the sails of the nearer vessels, each of which has some feature of interest. Of equal but darker beauty are No. 10, The Fog of Senne; No. 18, Cloister of Beles; and several others, while some pic-

The new syndicate hopes to profit largely by the increased Russian sugar exports to western Europe, and more especially to the United Kingdom.

## BORDEN'S PROPOSAL IS TO GIVE THREE DREADNOUGHTS

Premier's Naval Scheme is Announced; Cost to Canada \$35,000,000 — Says Dominion Cannot Hope for Half Century to Build Great Battleships

### TEXT OF GOVERNMENT'S NAVAL AID BILL

**Special to The Telegraph.**

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—The following is the text of the Naval bill:

"His majesty with the advice and consent of the Senate and of the House of Commons of Canada enacts:

(1) That from the moneys of the consolidated fund there may be paid and applied a sum not exceeding \$35,000,000 for the purpose of increasing immediately the effective naval forces of the Empire.

(2) The said sum shall be employed and applied under the direction of the government-in-council in the construction and equipment of battleships or of armored cruisers of the most modern and most powerful type.

(3) The said vessels, after they have been constructed and equipped, shall be placed by the government-in-council at the disposal of his majesty for the common defense of the empire.

(4) The said sum shall be paid, employed and applied and the vessels shall be constructed and placed at the disposal of his majesty subject to such terms, conditions and arrangements as may be entered into between the government-in-council and the government of his majesty.

The bill was given its first reading and will probably come up for the second reading and debate on Tuesday next.

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—Thirty-five million dollars for the construction of three super-dreadnoughts to be built in Britain by the admiralty and operated as part of Britain's fleet, was the naval programme launched in parliament today by Premier Borden.

Expectation of the announcement drew a great crowd to the commons chamber. Almost every member was in his seat, and on the floor, in places of honor, were a number of distinguished people, among them Their Royal Highnesses the Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia. The Duke of Connaught was not there, as in Canada he personates the king, and in Britain monarch has entered a sitting of commons since Charles I.

Premier Borden read his speech, which had been carefully prepared, and the reading occupied just an hour and a quarter. While reading ensured accuracy it was fatal to the dramatic possibilities of the occasion, which would have been made up of by a ready and confident orator.

erily carried with it responsibility for the control of foreign policy.

"With the enormous increase of naval power by all great nations in recent years, this tremendous responsibility has cast an almost impossible burden upon the British Islands, which for nearly 1,000 years have exercised so profound an influence upon the world's history. The burden is so great that the day has come when either the existence of this empire will be imperilled or the young and mighty dominions must join with the motherland to make secure the common safety and the common heritage of all.

**Must Have Say in Empire's Policy.**

"When Great Britain no longer assumes sole responsibility for defence upon the high seas she can no longer undertake to assume sole responsibility for and sole control of foreign policy which is closely, vitally and constantly associated with that defence in which the dominions participate. It has been declared in the past and even during recent years that responsibility for foreign policy could not be shared by Great Britain with the dominions.

"In my humble opinion the adherence to such a position could have but one result—that a most disastrous result."

He had recently in England propounded the doctrine that dominions sharing in defence must share in direction of foreign policy.

"It is satisfactory to know that today not only his majesty's ministers but also the leaders of the opposite political party in Great Britain have explicitly accepted this principle and have affirmed their conviction that the means by which it can be constitutionally accomplished must be sought, discovered and utilized without delay."

Premier Borden quoted his declaration made two years ago on the need for speedy emergency action and added that "as to present policy the people have the right to be consulted. Regard must be had to far-reaching considerations, a permanent solution must be worked out, and the right to be given to every citizen in this country, then it would be the duty of any government to go to the people of Canada to receive their mandate and accept and act upon their approval or disapproval of that policy."

Premier Borden expressed his "warm appreciation of the manner in which we were received by his majesty's government in England this summer, who took us most fully into their confidence on the great questions of foreign policy and of defence, and who have accorded to us all relevant information at their disposal."

The premier emphasized the need of securing English supremacy at sea as the condition of the overseas dominions taking a share of the burden and of a long admiralty memorandum which stated:

and authority of Great Britain, so long as her naval strength is unbroken."

**Moral Effect Great.**

The final paragraph of the memorandum on which the premier mainly based his proposals was as follows:

"The admiralty are assured that his majesty's government will not hesitate to ask the house of commons for whatever provision the circumstances of each year may require. But the aid which Canada could give at the present time is not to be measured only in ships or money. Any action on the part of Canada to increase the power and mobility of the imperial navy and thus widen the margin of our common safety would be recognized everywhere as a most significant witness to the united strength of the empire and to the renewed resolve of the overseas dominions to take their part in maintaining its integrity."

"The prime minister of the dominion having inquired in what form any immediate aid that Canada might give would be most effective, we have no hesitation in answering, after a prolonged consideration of all the circumstances, that it is desirable that such aid should include the provision of a certain number of the largest and strongest ships of war which science can build or money supply."

The premier spoke warmly for continued peace, and then dwelt upon the necessity of preparing for war.

"A crushing defeat upon the high seas would render the British islands, or any of the dominions, subject to invasion by any great military power. The loss of

"I am assured that the aid which we propose will enable such special arrangements to be consummated that without courting disaster at home an effective fleet of battleships and cruisers can be established in the Pacific, and a powerful squadron can periodically visit our Atlantic seaboard and assert once more the naval strength of the empire along these coasts."

"I do not forget, however, that it is the general naval supremacy of the empire which primarily safeguards the overseas dominions. New Zealand's battleship is ranged in line with the other British battleships in the North Sea, because there New Zealand's interests may best be guarded by protecting the very heart of the empire."

borne in mind that we are not undertaking or beginning a system of regular and periodical contributions. I agree with the resolution of this house in 1909 that the payment of such contributions would not be the most satisfactory solution of the question of defence.

Cost \$35,000,000.
These ships will be at the cost of such a battleship we are informed by the admiralty that it is approximately \$2,350,000 including armament, and the first outfit of ordnance stores and ammunition. The total cost of three such battleships, which, when launched, will be the most powerful in the world would be approximately \$35,000,000 and we ask the people of Canada through their parliament to grant that sum to the king in order to increase the effective naval force of the empire to safeguard our shores and our sea-borne commerce and to make sure the common heritage of all who owe allegiance to the king.

"These ships will be at the disposal of His Majesty the King for the common defence of the empire. They will be maintained and controlled as part of the royal navy and we have the assurance that if at any time in the future it should be the will of the Canadian people to establish a Canadian unit of the British navy these vessels can be recalled by the Canadian government to form part of that navy in which case, of course, they would be maintained by Canada and not by Great Britain.

"In that event there would necessarily be reasonable notice and indeed Canada would not desire or suggest the sudden withdrawal of so powerful a contingent from any important theatre in which the naval forces of the empire might be exposed to severe and sudden attack. In the meantime I am assured that special arrangements will be made to give Canada the opportunity of serving as officers on these ships."

Against a Canadian Navy.
The creation of a navy, Premier Borden said, took time. "In my humble opinion nothing of an effective character could be built up in this country within a quarter or perhaps half a century. Even then it would be but a poor and weak substitute for that splendid organization which the empire already possesses, and which has been evolved and built up by centuries of the highest endeavor. Is there really any need that we should undertake the hazardous and costly experiment of building up a naval organization especially restricted in terms we can take such part as we desire in naval defence through the existing naval organization of the empire and in that way can fully and effectively avail ourselves of the men and the resources of the command of Canada?"

"Where shall these ships be built. They will be built under admiralty supervision at present to maintain the reason that at present there are no adequate means for constructing them in Canada. The plant required for the construction of a Dreadnought battleship is enormous and it would be impossible at present to maintain shipbuilding in this country on such a scale. In any case only the hull could be built in Canada because the machinery, the armor and the guns would necessarily be constructed or manufactured in the United Kingdom.

"The additional cost of construction in Canada would be about \$12,000,000 for the three, and it would be impossible to estimate the delay.

"No one is more eager than myself for the development of shipbuilding industries in Canada but we cannot upon any business or economic considerations begin with the construction of Dreadnoughts, especially we could not do so when these ships are urgently required within two or three years at the outside for rendering aid upon which may depend the empire's future existence. According to my conception, the effective development of the shipbuilding industry in Canada must commence with small beginnings and in a business-like way.

May Build Small Craft in Canada.
"I am assured therefore that the admiralty are prepared in the early future to give orders for the construction in Canada of small cruisers, of tank vessels and of auxiliary craft of various kinds. The plant required is relatively small, as compared with that which is necessary for a dreadnought battleship and such an undertaking would have a much more secure and permanent basis from a business standpoint. For the purpose of stimulating so important and necessary an industry we have expressed our willingness to contribute of the increased duty, for a time at least. I see no reason why all vessels meant for service should not be built in Canada even at some additional cost.

"The premier extensively reviewed the defence expenditures of the various countries of the world and stated that in the country of Great Britain had spent not less than \$600,000,000.

On the question of giving overseas dominions a voice in the policy of the committee on defence, he said:
"Would Consult Canada.
"I am assured by his majesty's government that sending a final solution of the question of voice and influence they would welcome the presence in London of a Canadian minister during the whole or a portion of each year. Such minister would be regularly summoned to all meetings of the committee of imperial defence and would be regarded as one of its permanent members. No important step in foreign policy would be undertaken without consultation with such a representative of Canada.

"This seems a very marked advance both from our standpoint and from that of the United Kingdom. It would give to us an opportunity of consultation and therefore an influence which hitherto we have not possessed. The conclusions and declarations of Great Britain in respect of foreign relations could not fail to be strengthened by the knowledge that such consultation and co-operation with the overseas dominions had become an accomplished fact.

"Canada is sending these ships to range themselves in the battle line of the empire with those of the mother country, of Australia and of New Zealand. They will be the three most powerful battleships in the world and they will bear historic names associated with the name of the empire. Every Canadian will realize in seeing or reading of these ships that they are a gift in which he has participated and that their presence in the battle line of the empire he has freely taken a direct and the true share in maintaining the empire's safety."

INTERDICTS AND THE LAW

Should it be Made Automatic?—The Sale of Liquor in Bottles—An Interesting Discussion at the Every Day Club

George Scott opened an interesting discussion at the Every Day Club last evening on the interdict law. In opening, he submitted the following resolutions:
Believing that the interdict law as it stands on the statute books at the present time is very ineffective and that it should be made automatic in its action;
Therefore, we respectfully ask that said law be amended by the insertion of a clause making it obligatory on the police magistrate to place on the interdict list the name of any man who has appeared before him three times in any one year on a charge of driver license because it places all the onus of identification on him while furnishing him no sure means to that end; and since automatic action of the interdict law would greatly swell the list we would respectfully ask that provision be made for photographing all interdicts and that copies of the photographs be sent to each of the saloon keepers.

Inspector Jones, who was present, was called upon and said that he heartily agreed with the suggestion to make the interdict law automatic. The inspector related some of his own experiences and pointed out that there were cases where those who should have a man put on the list were afraid to do so.

Discussing the enforcement of the law in general, the inspector said that he would welcome the cooperation of active temperance workers, and would be glad to have anyone place in his hands definite information on which he could act. In his sixteen years in office, however, he could recall but one such instance. Mr. Jones did not discuss the other sections of the resolutions.

Mr. Henderson.
George A. Henderson, who was also present and was asked to express his views, agreed heartily with the proposal to make the action of the interdict law automatic. With regard to the photographs, he thought there might be difficulty about that, but perhaps the interdict could be compelled to wear a badge or long service medal of some sort. Touching the bottle trade, there was the difficulty that wholesalers could well, by making the action of the interdict law automatic, make possible the chance of getting rid of rum.

Berlin, Dec. 6.—With the death of a once famous prima donna, Fraulein Josephine Schefsky, in Munich, there is revealed, after being religiously preserved for forty years, the secret of why the great singer so suddenly fell into disgrace in 1879, and was practically compelled to leave Munich to sing at the opera houses at Nuremberg, Karlsruhe, and Berlin.

The singer jumped to her cost, however that opera singing and comedy are two very different arts. Not only did the king notice at once that the spot where the half-submerged prima donna was appealing for help was one of absolute danger, but he also saw through the meaning of the by-play.

PROPOSE TO USE SCHOOLS AS EMPLOYMENT BUREAU. Schoolhouses as employment offices is the most recent proposal in the movement for the wider use of the school plant, according to information received at the United States Bureau of Education.

Professor John B. Commons, a member of the Wisconsin Industrial Commission, proposes using the schoolhouse as a labor exchange. He believes that the school, serving as a branch of the children's department of the employment office, should be made to help reduce the maladjustment of occupations that is now a crying evil.

The vocational bureau of the city of Boston is directing the future occupation of children in the schools. In Ohio, the trust officer is required, by a recent statute, to keep on file a list of the children between the ages of fourteen and sixteen, who have received school certificates and desire employment; prospective employers are to have access to this list.

PETERSON SENT TO PENITENTIARY

Ten Years For Him and Five For Herman Phillips

'MENACE TO THE PUBLIC'

Judge Forbes so Styles Peterson in Sentencing Him on Old Charge of Stealing Razors

His Honor Judge Forbes this morning sentenced Herman G. Phillips to five years in Dorchester on one of three charges of theft, forgery, and obtaining money by false pretences, and suspended sentence on the other two charges. Wm. Peterson was sentenced to serve ten years in Dorchester penitentiary on a charge of stealing 30 razors of which he was convicted last February.

Phillips pleaded guilty to the three charges in the indictment and L. A. Conlon, who appeared in behalf of the prisoner, asked the court to show leniency in view of the prisoner's previous good conduct, as well as his youth.

Attorney-General Grimmer referred to the seriousness of the offence, and urged that the prisoner be not allowed to escape punishment. His Honor then imposed a sentence of five years for the first offence, and suspended sentence on the other two charges.

Peterson was then called before His Honor, and the prisoner asked to be allowed to say a few words in his own behalf. He went on to say that since February last he had been working almost every day, and during that time he "did not handle a dishonest cent." He worked, he said, in some of the best houses in the city, and he had plenty of opportunity to steal if he was so disposed.

His Honor—"Peterson, you've beaten me out every time. You're a pretty smooth customer. You're too smooth an article to be let loose in this country. You're a menace to the public. I told you when I let you go last February that if you ever came before me again I would give you a good stiff sentence. You haven't kept faith with me, but I'm going to keep faith with you. I'm going to send you to Dorchester to serve ten years with hard labor."

Peterson—"Your Honor, I'm thirty years old now. I'll be forty then. You may just as well say my life is gone." Peterson was a few days ago given in charge by his wife for abusive conduct.

HE LOOKS FOR HIGHER PRICES FOR FOOTWEAR. R. T. Hayes, Home After Trip To Manufacturing Centres, Sees Prospect of Advance

Of his return after a trip to the principal shoe centres in the New England states and upper Canada, this week, R. T. Hayes, manager of J. M. Humphrey & Co., Ltd., brought back the interesting information that there was every likelihood of the price of boots and shoes going higher. The market at present, he said, was strong and showed an indication to strengthen still further. The increasing cost of hides was the chief cause for the steady advance in prices, and there were no signs which had to be allowed for.

Mr. Hayes said that the smaller manufacturers were sorely pressed at present in trying to fill their contracts at the prices originally quoted as they were unable to purchase a sufficient supply of hides. The larger manufacturers were better protected as they had been able to buy in larger quantities. Some of them, he said, were turning orders aside. As soon as the orders on hand had reached an end, and when the present stock of leather with the larger houses had to be replenished, Mr. Hayes thought there was certain to be an advance again in the price of boots and shoes, unless the hide market became easier, and of this he thought there was scant prospect just now.

OTHERS DRIVEN OR KEPT AWAY BY HEAD TAX. H. P. Robertson Has Experience of This in Carrying on Fish Business

Another illustration of the effect of the \$7.50 laborers' tax is furnished by the experience of H. P. Robertson, wholesale fish merchant and packer. A few days ago several men who were employed by him during the rush season were notified that they would have to pay the tax, but instead of paying if they decided to throw up their jobs and leave the city. This is not an unusual case, but is something with which all the fish packers have had to contend. During the fall when the rush of work is too great for their regular staff it is necessary to bring men to the city as they cannot secure them here familiar with the work. The difficulty regarding the head tax has been a constant source of trouble to them as the men refuse to pay it and time and again they have been left short handed on this account. One of the men to whom Mr. Robertson wrote offering work this year said that he had come here for several seasons and had paid the tax, but that this was an imposition and refused to come again. The extra men are employed for about only three months and they feel that it is unjust that they should have to pay \$7.50 for the privilege. Some of them cannot afford it, and others object to the principle as much as to the payment of the cash. Whatever their reason the Times is told that the tax has given the local fish men considerable trouble.


