



NEGLECTED LOTS.

Following up the resolution passed by the lot holders two years ago, the directors had done much to improve neglected lots, some 50 old unsightly iron fences had been removed, value thereof used for work on these lots; in addition some in prominent sections with no representatives had been put in order and grass would be cut at least once during the season.
