That having carefully deliberated on the subject of rict Meeting inisters' Salaries, in con-quence of the increased expenditee Delegate in all articles of produce, the Conference unanimously lopt the following scale:—

- (7.) That a married Minister in full Connexion, have £25 $_{
 m r}$ quarter.
- (8.) That the salary of all married Ministers, on *probation*, £20 per quarter.
- (9.) That the salary of single Ministers in full Connexion, £12 per quarter, exclusive of Board and Horse keep.
- (10.) That the salary of single Ministers on *probation*, be 0 per quarter, with Board and Horse keep.
- (11.) That if a Circuit chose to make any arrangement thits Minister, to grant him more allowance than is stated rule, it shall be at liberty to do so.
- (12.) That the first Quarterly Meeting on each Station, er Conference, shall make the needful regulations to raise amounts for the Minister's Salary, and where they think expedient, they shall form a Committee, to solicit from the gular hearers quarterly contributions on behalf of the cause God.

- (27.) That to awaken greater earnestness and effort in our Missionary operations in the coming year, it is recommended to form Juvenile Missionary Societies in our Sabbath Schools, wherever practicable.
- (28.) That we, as a Conference of Miristers and Lay Brethren, record our grateful thanks to Alhighty God, for having enabled us to add 51 Members to our Body, besides making up a loss of 594 by removals, fallen, and deaths, with 16 reported too many, last year.
- (29.) That the thanks of our Conference be given to Bro. J. Davison for his Conference Sermon, and to Bro. T. Adams for his Ordination Charge.
- (30.) That the thanks of Conference be given to Bro. R. Walker, for his services as General Treasurer; to Bro. E. Barrass, for efficient services rendered to the Connexional Committees during the year; and to Bro. J. Lacey for his services as General Committee Delegate; and to the retiring President and Secretary of Conference.
- (31.) That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Bro. M. Gray, for the gift of one acre of land in Brant, for

Conference Pastoral Address,

TO THE MEMBERS

Of the Primitive Methodist Church, Canada.

DEARLY BELOVED,—" Grace and peace be multiplied unto you, through the knowledge of God, and of Jesus our Lord, according as his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of him who hath called us to glory and virtue."

In again addressing you a fraternal epistle, we feel bound to thank God the Father of mercies, for the blessings vouchsafed to us all during the past year; and for the manifestations of his presence during the sittings of Conference, held in the town of Brampton.

All the services connected with this occasion have been of a highly interesting character, having been graciously favored with the divine influence. The unity of the Spirit has been enjoyed; and brotherly love has prevailed. We have found, that as "iron sharpeneth iron, so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend;" and that the mutual converse and counsel of brethren is delightful and instructive. While bowing together at the throne of the heavenly grace our souls have been quickened with desire for the salvation of our Membership and Congregations, and for the prosperity of the Universal Church of Christ; to whom, with the Father and Spirit, be glory, dominion, and power, for ever and ever. 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to the Gentiles is far too rare among modern Christians,-" I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live: yet not I, but Christ liveth in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me." There is too little living with God in the closet: too little walking with him in life's busy scenes. We profess to believe in the knowledge of salvation by the remission of sins;—the witness of the Spirit, of our adoption into the heavenly family; -the entire sanctification of our nature-body, spirit, soul; -and that we may be preserved in such a state of perfected holiness " unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." Let us, then, "go on unto perfection;" and seek and obtain those higher blessings of light, purity, and joy, purchased by the blood of the everlasting covenant. It is from the inward, spiritual life; that the holy obedience of the Christian flows; and all the virtues which adorn the child of God, and which, together with the "work of faith and labour of love," mark him a power of holy influence in the church and the world, proceed from the same fountain. Oh! then, live in constant communion with the Saviour, that his grace may be in you, " as a well of water springing up into everlasting life."

Next to personal holiness, the importance of family religion presses itself on our attention. The family is an institution of God. It is intended to subserve important purposes in the destiny of the human race. He who has placed us in families, has wisely ordained that parents should "command their children, and household after them; that they may keep the way of the Lord, to do justice and judgment." Like Joshua, then, resolve that, "as for you and your house, you will serve the Lord." If, as one has remarked, a well-trained family is the best legacy that a parent can leave to the world, train up your children "in the way in which they should go," being assured by the word of inspiration that when they are "old they will not depart from it." l piety lies The life lness here, eat Apostle exerting an untold influence on the moral welfare of our offspring and domestics, amid all the changing scenes of mortal life. Were we, besides the ordinary reading and prayer, to connect singing the praises of God with family worship, as frequently as possible, it would, we think, cause increasing interest to the younger members of the social circle, and also prepare them for taking part in the hymr of praise in the public services of the sanctuary. Seek, then, in faith, the conversion of your children: and, believing rightly, you will attain it. Instruct your ramilies carefully in the doctrines and morals of the gospel, leaving not all the work to your pastors and teachers, and the family shall become what God designed it to be, the nursery of the church;—yea, each of you will have a "church in your house."

And while we attend properly to the spiritual wants of our own children, let the welfare of the young in general share in our best regards, and most earnest Christian efforts. Sabbath School affords an opportunity of sowing the good seed in the virgin soil, which should be eagerly embraced by all who would lay the foundations of life in the principles of evangelical religion. Here is an important sphere of labour, to which we feel anxious you should direct, with us, most earnest attention. Let the Sabbath School, and the Bible Class, go hand in hand in the work of the conversion of the young. The facts elicited at the Sabbath School Convention, recently held in the city of Kingston, ought to be sufficient to stir up even the sluggish to labor in the good work. And while Romanists are striving to undermine our excellent Common School system, let us watch sedulously the interest of general education, and ply diligently the work of moral training in our Sabbath Schools.

We would also remind you of the obligations of the Sabbath, and of the necessity of rightly improving its sacred hours, so that the day of the Lord may be kept holy. "In holy duties let the day, in holy pleasures pass away."—Thus shall it greatly aid in the formation of Christian charac-

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ter; and in preparing us for the never-ending Sabbath of the New Jerusalem. Sabbath-breaking is a sin that characterises the present age, in connection with its increasing facilities for travel and the pursuit of commerce. Worldly men seem determined, on our railways, stages, and steamboats, to break through all the restraints of divine and human laws, and to outrage the moral sense of the public mind, by robbing God of his Sabbath, and sowing broadcast the seeds of vice and infidelity in our young Canada. Surely it becomes the disciples of Christ to bear a public and faithful testimony against such high-handed wickedness. By example and by precept, let us reprove the Sabbath-breaking of the age.

We invite your attention to another topic, namely, the great Philanthropic, Moral, and Religious Institutions of the day; such as the Temperance cause; the movements in order to the Abolition of Slavery, and the removal of that plague-spot from the heart of the neighbouring Republic; and Bible, Tract, and Missionary Societies. Let all these have our sympathy and co-operation, We most affectionately entreat all our Members to abstain from the bewitching cup of inebriety; and to aid those who seek the deliverance of our land from the scourge of drunkenness, by the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic.

We wish to acknowledge your praiseworthy efforts—your liberality, in the past year, in sustaining the Missionary Society; but we have also to admit, from the continued high prices, the necessity of a further advance in your Ministers' salary, which we hope you will cordially approve, and as liberally sustain.

In calling your attention to the ordinances of God's house, we would direct your thoughts especially to prayer and classmeetings. A faithful attendance to these will cause you to relish the more public means of grace, help to keep alive the flame of divine love in your hearts, and lead you to pray much for those who labour among you in the word and doctrine "ye also helping together by prayer for us." Remember that the Spirit's influence is absolutely needful, to

render effectual the means which we unitedly employ for the conversion of the world. And the Spirit is poured out in answer to prayer. Those among us, as well as in other sections of the Christian church, who have been eminently useful, have been remarkable for prayer, and devotedness to God.

To our Class-Leaders and Stewards,—Brethren, you occupy important positions in the Church: yours are responsible stations. You, with our Local Preachers, are helpers of the regular pastors; and on the proper performance of your duties depends very much the healthy state of the church, both in regard to piety and finances. In order that we may "give ourselves to prayer, and to the ministry of the word," we hope you will prevent unnecessary burdens of financial matters from resting on the minds, or occupying the time of your Ministers;—such things should not be allowed to interfere with their studies, and pastoral duties.

May our Class-Leaders imitate the "Good Shepherd," going before their flocks,—having their own souls alive to God,—"being filled with the Spirit,"—so that out of the abundance of their hearts they may speak to their charge words of warning, direction, and comfort; which they themselves receive from the Mouth—the Book of God. Let us act in union; live in love; walk by faith; and the very God of peace shall be with us, and sanctify us wholly; and we pray "that your whole body, and soul, and spirit, may be preserved tlameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of a good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen.

Primitive Methodist Church in Canada,

TO THE

CONFERENCE IN ENGLAND.
