The recent announcement by Signor Marconi that his new high-power wireless station in Argentina has received messages from Clifden, Ireland, is the high water mark so far in wireless achievement. It means that the apparatus has shown itself capable of thrilling the ether for a distance of 5,600 miles, or more than one-fifth of the earth's circumference. In 1892 Sir William Precee and in 1897 Signor Marconi sent wireless messages between Flatholm and Lavernock, on the Welsh coast, a distance of 3 1-13 miles.
