

THE Annual Meeting of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA took place in the National School Room at Halifax, on Thursday the 24th day of February, A. D. 1842, at 7 o'clock in the evening.

The LORD BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, President of the Society, took the Chair shortly after 7 o'clock, and opened the proceedings by calling upon those present to sing the Hundredth Psalm.

The Venerable Archdeacon WILLIS, D. D. read prayers.

The Right Revd. the PRESIDENT then briefly stated the nature and object of the present meeting, and called upon the Secretary to read the following Annual

REPORT.

THE General Committee of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY desire to express their thankfulness to Almighty God, that in His good Providence they are permitted to celebrate another Anniversary of the Society; and would take this opportunity of presenting to its assembled Members and other friends of its design an account of the operations of the Committee during the past year.

Since the last Annual Meeting of this Society took place, an opportunity of rare occurrence presented itself for enjoying the presence and the counsel of the Clerical Members of the Society throughout the Province. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese having assembled the Clergy of the Archdeaconry of Nova Scotia in Visitation, it appeared desirable to his Lordship, as President of this Society, to call a Special General Meeting of the Society at which the Clergy might be present. A meeting accordingly took place at the National School Room, in this city, on the 17th day of July, at which a small but most respectable auditory were gratified by hearing from several of the Clergy an account of their own undiminished interest in the welfare of the Institution, and of the operations which they had been enabled to foster and direct in the Local Committees over which they preside in their respective parishes.

Your Committee cannot but hope that a beneficial influence was exercised by the presence of the Clergy at such General Meeting upon the feelings of the members of the Church in this community, and feel assured that the Cler-

gy themselves returned to their homes fully impressed with the importance of such a bond of union between the Clergy and laity of the Church, as this Society is well calculated to supply, and more anxious than ever to bear a part and to lead their several flocks to bear a part in the work in which it is engaged.

As one gratifying proof of this result, your Committee are happy to refer to the immediate formation of an active Local Committee in the Parish of Digby at the instance of the newly appointed Rector of that Parish; and to record, as a proof of the ready co-operation of the people of his charge in his recommendation, the enrolment of 188 names of members of the Digby Local Committee, and the contribution by them of upwards of £30 to the general funds of this Society.

Advantageous however as was in many respects the presence of the Clergy on the occasion referred to, the opportunity thus afforded them of stating personally the condition of their various Local Committees has interrupted their written correspondence with your Committee, and consequently curtails the amount of information from that source by which the Committee might otherwise have hoped to interest the present meeting.

Your Committee must not however omit to mention the receipt of an interesting Report from the St. George's, C. B. Local Committee, with a Copy of an Address delivered by the Revd. President of that Committee.

In turning to a review of their own operations during the past year, your Committee would solicit your attention to the items of their Expenditure and their Income. EXPENDITURE.

LAY READERS.

They have only to report on the subject of Lay Readers, that several grants made in former years have been continued to those who have performed the duty under the supervision of the Missionaries in whose districts they have respectively been employed, and with the license of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. One addition only has been made to this class of persons, towards whose expenses yourCommittee have felt privileged to contribute, in the Parish of Newport, where, upon the application of the Rev. R. J. Uniacke, the sum of £20 was voted in aid of such an appointment.

Books.

Several grants of Books have been made during the past year, mostly upon the personal application of different Clergymen who were present on the occasion already referred to.

At the request of the Rev. Dr. Shreve, Books to the amount of £5 for the use of Schools in Sherbrooke were granted to him from the Depository of this Society: and on a similar application from Mr. Bartlett, in behalf of the Rev. T. C. Leaver, Books to the same amount for the use of the School at Tracadie, and also for the use of the School of Country Harbor, were entrusted to the care of that Reverend gentleman.

On application by Letter of the Rev. W. Elder, of Sydney Mines, C. B., a grant of Books to the amount of \pounds 10 was placed at his disposal, to be distributed gratuitously if he deemed it desirable, but with a recommendation that he should endeavour, whenever practicable, to obtain at least a trifle for their purchase, that thus a fund might be kept circulating for the continued benefit of his District.

In the view of the urgent, necessities of 'many ortions of the Parish of Cornwallis, to which the attention of the Committee was called by the Rev. J.Storrs, the lately appointed Rector of that Parish, Books to the amount of \$6 were, by his request, entrusted to him for distribution.

In making up these grants, and in supplying occasional

orders from the country, and the demands of town purchasers, there have been issued from the Depository during the past year

63 Bibles. 75 Testaments.

467 Prayer Books. 106 Bound Books. 2560 Tracts.

This number does not include the issues, which have been made during the last month, in supplying t of the various remittances received during that time.

Your Committee regret that in the altered arrangement of the Book fund, it has become necessary to adopt the suggestion of the Depository Sub-Committee,* and to require cash payments for all Books supplied on order to the various Clergymen and Committees in the Province. It is evident, that as the supply of Books is now entirely dependant upon the returns made from sales, and Books can only be procured by this Society to the amount of the remittance which accompanies the order, the former plan of extensive credits would soon exhaust their stock and leave them without any means of replenishing their shelves. It is believed, that though in this, as in other business, the adoption of cash accounts may produce at first some slight inconvenience, it will in the end be found beneficial to all parties concerned.

MISSIONARY EXPENCES.

The sum of $\pounds 10$ placed in the hands of the Venerable Archdeacon Willis, in August, 1840, having been expended, a further amount of $\pounds 15$ was committed to his care for the same purpose in November last. This sum has supplied the necessary expences of the Revd. Messrs. Porter and Elder on Missionary visits in the Island of Cape Breton, and has enabled the Rev. C. W. Weeks to make several excursions during the Summer and Autumn.

Under the head of Missionary Expences, it may be mentioned, that upon mature consideration it appeared desir-

able to the Committee to aid the exertions of the Sub-Committee appointed to solicit contributions for the erection of the Mission House at Ship Harbor. The situation of the Eastern Shore appeared so peculiar, and the necessity of aiding the people of that district in their efforts to provide accommodation for their Missionary so much more urgent than in ordinary missions, that the Committee thought a grant in the present case could not be drawn into a precedent for assisting in the erection of Parsonage Houses, and contributed to the subscription towards the Mission House the sum of £50. The Committee are happy to state, that the sum raised by the Sub-Committee referred to in the last Report, aided by grants from the two great Societies in England, and the contribution of this Society, will nearly suffice for the completion of the house: and that the building has made such progress, that, although not yet finished, it has been inhabited this winter by the Rev. R. Jamison, the Missionary to the Eastern Shore and his family.

CHURCHES.

The Committee continue to think that aiding in the erection of Churches in destitute settlements is one of their most important objects. They have gladly aided such applications as have come under their notice during the post year.

About the time of the last Annual Meeting an application was made by the Rev. Dr. Shreve for further aid towards the erection of the new Church at Chester. The peculiar circumstances of this case, the great exertions made by the people themselves, and the heavy expenses necessarily incurred in the erection of a building of sufficient dimensions for the increasing congregation of that Parish, seemed to justify a second grant from the funds of this Society, and a further sum of £25 was accordingly placed in the hands of the Rev.Dr. Shreve for the purpose.

An application was also made by the Rev. J. W. Weeks of New Dublin for aid in the erection of a new Church at Broad Cove in his Mission, towards which the people of the settlement had already contributed so well that it had been boarded in and shingled. The sum of $\pounds 25$ was also granted on this application.

The Committee have also felt much pleasure in being enabled to appropriate a small sum in aid of the beautifully situated and remarkably neat Chapel lately erected at the Three Mile House near Bedford Basin. The Committee feel that great credit is due to the earnest and persevering exertions of the Rev. R. F. Uniacke in providing the accommodation thus afforded to the inhabitants around for the worship of God according to the services of the Church of England, and readily endeavoured to lighten the burden of expense which he had thus incurred by contributing the sum of £25.

MISCELLANEOUS.

An application was made during the Summer by the Rev. A. Gray, stating the circumstances in which the death of Mr. Boyes, some time teacher of the colored school at Hammond's Plains, had left his widow and children. They appear to have been left not only in a state of destitution, but also encumbered with debt; and the exertions made by the widow to keep up the School in the settlement, and her anxiety to do all she could both to satisfy the claims upon her late husband, and to support her numerous family, engaged the sympathy of the Committee, and seemed to call for their aid. They felt warranted therefore in placing the sum of £15 in the hands of the Rev. A. Gray, to aid Mrs. Boyes, and encourage her in the endeavour to keep up the school, which is so much needed for the settlement.

INCOME.

for his means.

In turning to the consideration of the income of the Society, your Committee cannot but express their regret that, neither from the city nor, with one or two exceptions, from the country, are the contributions to its funds such as the general circumstances of the members of the Church, and the importance of the object submitted to them in this Society might warrant the Committee in expecting.

The City of Halifax has contributed during the past year, the sum, inclusive of the £36 taken at the last General Meeting, of £130 2s. 4d. The chief part of this amount has been contributed by those who have been from the first the steady friends of the Society, and it includes many of the pence of the poor, whose contributions bear a nearer resemblance to the widow's farthing, than the larger, but in proportion to their means smaller, subscriptions of those who are in affluent circumstances.

In addition to this amount, a collection was made at St. Paul's Church in this City on Sunday last, after a sermon by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, which amounted to the sum of £38 12s. 5d.

New Committees were formed in the settlements of Rawdon and Douglas, both under the pastoral care of the Rev. George Morris, just previously to the last annual meeting of the Society. Your Committee, however, was not informed of their formation in time to acknowledge it in the last Report. Immediately after that general meeting, those Committees handed in, by the Rev. George Morris, the sums of £8 5s. from Rawdon, and of £1 18s. 3d. from Douglas. During the present month, they have forwarded by the same channel from Rawdon, the sum of £5 7s. 2¹/₂d. and from Douglas a balance of last year's contributions amounting to £2 0s. 6d.

The Antigonishe Committee has remitted during the past year the sum of £15 13s. Of this sum £3 was directed to be remitted to the Society for Propagating the Gospel in Foreign Parts, in aid of Missions to the heathen, and was included in the sum of £8 18s. 11d. sent in April last, as mentioned in a note appended to the last annual Report. This, and the Committee for the adjoining mission of Guysborough, have manifested the greatest interest in this branch of missionary operations : and the sum so forwarded is chiefly composed of the remittances of those two Committees.

The Shelburne Committee handed in, by the Rev. T. H. White, the sum of $\pounds 4$ 9s.—of which one fourth was by request returned in books.

From Yarmouth, the Rev. A. Gilpin has forwarded the

sum of £13 7s. 6d.; of which two pounds had been contributed by an unknown friend, to be applied to the carrying out of Missionary purposes, and have been appropria-

ted to that object.

The Newport Committee has again forwarded, by the hands of the Rev. R. J. Uniacke, the handsome amount of £15 0s. 2d.,—a pleasing proof of the sustained interest of that Committee in the operations of the Society.

From Aylesford the sum of $\pounds 1$ 17s. 6d. has been forwarded by the Rev. H. L. Owen, being, together with his own subscription, the amount contributed after a Sermon in aid of the Society.

From Clements the Rev. W. M. Godfrey has forwarded the sum of $\pounds 1$ 2s. $10\frac{1}{2}d$.; but the Committee are without any particulars of the formation of a Local Committee in that Parish.

The Committee of St. George's, Cape Breton, to whose meeting allusion has already been made, has remitted the sum of £20.

From the Liverpool Local Committee, S. P. Fairbanks, Esq. the delegate of the present meeting, has paid in the sum of $\pounds 17$.

The Guysboro' Committee, one of the most punctual of our branches, has forwarded the sum of $\pounds 9$ 0s. $8\frac{1}{2}d.$; with a request that $\pounds 1$ 13s. 9d., might be applied in aid of efforts for the conversion of the heathen.

The Digby Committee, whose formation under such favourable auspices has already been referred to, has made a remittance of $\pounds 13$: a sum less than was stated to be the amount of annual contributions, because most of the subscriptions are made payable quarterly.

From Lunenburg, by the hands of John Creighton, Esq. a delegate at this meeting, the sum of $\pounds 17$ has been received.

The Chester Committee has forwarded the sum of $\pounds7$ 10s, which, although from the particular circumstances of that Parish less than former remittances, is yet accompanied with the gratifying assurance of a gradually increasing interest in the progress of the Society.

From Sackville the same assurance has been received, and a remittance of $\pounds 9$ —an increase upon former years.

The Committee at St. Margaret's Bay has forwarded also its punctual remittance by the hands of the Rev. J. Stannage, amounting to $\pounds 5$.

The Dartmouth Local Committee again deserves the most honorable mention in this Report; as, owing to the unusual exertions made, and the increased interest excited, an addition of 100 subscribers has been made to the former list, and the sum of $\pounds 51$ contributed to the general funds of the Society.*

The income of the Society during the past year, appears to have amounted to

In closing their review of the operations of the Society during the past year, the Committee feel that, however humble has been their contribution to the amount of effort with which these times abound for promoting the glory of God in the spread of the Redeemer's kingdom, they yet have cause to thank God for what He has permitted them to do, and to take courage in proceeding with their work.

Yet in repeating their regret that the contributions to the funds of the Society are not what the Committee conceive they ought to be either from city or country, they would accompany that regret with the fear, that the main

object of the Society's formation is not yet fully understood or appreciated. While they can only look to the amount contributed to the funds, as a test of the uumbers that form the Society, and of the interest they feel in it, the Committee feel it necessary to endeavour to impress the truth, that the great object is not the largeness of the amount, but the union of those who belong to the same branch of Christ's holy Church in a bond of fellowship and love. The present times seem to call upon churchmen for union and mutual good will. They seem to demand it of them, that they should come forward and bind themselves together, not in hostility to other denominations, but in love for one another. And the Committee feel assured that so far from such a union tending to contract the sphere of christian charity, the more the members of the church are enlightened with regard to her doctrines, the more they are attached to her communion, the more they imbibe her spirit, so much the more truly will their hearts expand with love to all them that love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity, so much the more will they manifest towards them that are without the pale of their own communion, that heavenly wisdom in their walk, which is pure, peaceable, gentle, and full of good fruits.

Again then would they urge upon all the members of the Church to do what in them lies for the promotion of such a spirit of mutual charity, of such a union of mind and act in the cause of Christ and of His Church. And they would pray that the Lord would shed abroad abundantly upon their fellow-christians, their brethren in the same family of Christ, the dew of His blessing, and enable them for His glory and their own truest happiness, to maintain the Unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

STANDING RULES

FOR THE CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SQCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA.

1. His Excellency THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR OF NOVA-SCOTIA for the time being, and THE SOCIETIES FOR THE PRO-PAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, and FOR PROMOTING CHRISTIAN KNOWLEDGE, shall be tespectfully requested to be the Patrons of this Society.

*II. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, with a control over all their proceedings. His approval shall be necessary for the completion of all important acts of the Society, and especially for the revocation or alteration of any of the standing, rules, and for making any addition to them.

III. There shall be two or more Vice Presidents, of whom the Archdeacon of Nova-Scotia shall be the first; a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary when necessary, and a Treasurer.

IV. There shall be a Standing Committee, consisting of the Officers, all the Clergy, and as many Laymen as it shall be thought convenient to choose at the Annual Meeting of the Society. The Lay Members shall continue in the Committee for a year, or until other Lay Members be chosen in their place; and any or all of them may be re-elected. Seven of the Committee shall be a quorum, provided four of them be Laymen.

V. The Society shall be open to all the Members of the Church, all of whom shall be invited to unite with it. Ten pounds paid at any one time shall qualify a person to be a Member during his life, and the payment in advance of any sum, however small, shall qualify a person to be a Member for a year.

VI. The members of the Church in every part of the Province shall be invited to co-operate with the Diocesan Society, by joining Committees of it which shall be formed, under the direction of their respective Clergymen, either in each mission 0

of the Proesan Society, d, under the ach mission or parish, or in more than one mission or parish united, as shall be deemed most convenient, and in strict accordance with the design and rules of the Diocesan Society; and it is recommended to the Committees to forward their funds, as they may be collected, to the General Committee, who will faithfully apply them to the general objects of the Society; but when the Local Committees desire it, they shall receive books at cost and charges to the amount of one fourth of their remittances.

VII. There shall be one General Meeting of the whole Society, including any members of the Local Committees who can conveniently attend, on such day and at such place as the President may name, of which due notice will be given, with an invitation to every Committee to send at least one Clergyman and two Laymen to represent such Committee, and with a recommendation that each Committee shall meet at some convenient time immediately before the General Meeting of the Society, that any necessary suggestions may be offered to the representatives of the Committees for their guidance at the General Meeting. And a Special General Meeting may be called at any time and in any place, when the President, or, in his absence, two or more Vice Presidents, shall consider it desirable to appoint such special General Meeting.

• VIII. The objects to which the attention of the Society shall be directed shall be, generally, those which have engaged the two great Church Societies in England for the Propagation of the Gospel, and for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

IX. The following objects shall more particularly engage the attention of the Society, as soon as their means may enable them to afford such attention :

 Supplies of Books and Tracts from the stores of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other, except in cases where other Books or Tracts, in strict conformity with the principles of the Established Church, and particularly adapted to local circumstances, shall first be carefully examined and approved by a Committee of revision, to be appointed by the General Committee, the approval of which General Committee shall be necessary in the next place, after which the books must likewise receive the written approbation of the Bishop.

- 2. Missionary visits to neglected and destitute places, under the direction of the Bishop.
- Upholding by all possible and proper means the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.
- Assistance to deserving young men desirous of being qualified for the Ministry of the Church, but requiring aid in pursuing their studies at the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.
- 5. Aid to Sunday and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.
- Encouragement to the instruction and training of respectable Teachers for Sunday and Daily Schools.
- Assistance to the erection or enlargement of Churches and Chapels belonging to the Established Religion, in peculiar or extreme cases.

To these objects, generally, the general contributions will be applied ; while coutributors who desire it may have their individual contributions scrupulously confined to any one or more of these objects. And as some members of the Church, who are not unmindful of the great spiritual wants in their own neighborhood, still feel constrained, in pious gratitude for the blessings they enjoy, to allot something, however small, from the means with which a gracious Providence has blessed them, towards the spread of the glorious Gospel among thenations which still sit in darkness,

X. This Society will gladly receive and forward to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, whatever sums may be given for the conversion and instruction of the Heathen, to which object such sums will be strictly confined by the East India Committee of that Society.

XI. Books and Tracts will generally be on sale at cost and charges; and whenever in particular cases a deviation from this rule is desired, it must be considered by the Standing Committee, and only permitted when recommended by them and approved by the President, or, in his absence, by two or more of the Vice Presidents.

XII. All Meetings of the Society and of the Committees shall be opened and closed with the prayers used by the two Societies in Ingland, adapted to our situation under the direction of the Bishop. T wee thei in th may Mee

APPENDIX.

As considerable inconvenience has been experienced by the General Committee from the want of attention to the following particulars, the notice of the Presidents and Officers of Local Committees is particularly requested to them, viz :--

The General Committee meets in Halifax on the third Thursday in February, May, August, and November, and all applications for aid should be forwarded to the Secretary at least a week before either of those dates.

Every application for aid should contain the following information, in defect of which the application must be postponed for fuller particulars : |For aid in the erection of a Church____

- 1. The precise situation, specially with reference to the nearest place of worship, and to the amount of population within 5 miles of the Church.
- The size of the building ; the numbers it can accommodate; and probable amount of the congregation that will usually attend it.
- The supposed cost of the building ; the progress it has made towards completion ; and the amount of contributions on the spot in money or labor.

For aid to Day and Sanday Schools :

- 1. The situation of the School as regards the nearest adjoining school.
- 2. The number of scholars in usual attendance, and the general circumstances of their parents.
- 3. Is the Church Catechism taught ? and the School generally conducted with a due regard to the principles of the Established Church ?
- 4. The nature of the aid required : whether books, assistance towards Master's salary, &c. ?

The Annual General Meeting of the Society takes place in the third week of February : and it is desirable that Local Committees should hold their anniversary meetings, and make their annual collections some time in the month of January, in order that their proceedings and remittances may be acknowledged in the Annual Report presented at the General Meeting.

For the information of Local Committees applying to the Depositary of this Society for books and tracts, it is thought desirable to publish the following extract from the minutes of the General Committee, under date of May 7, 1841.

"The Chairman of the Sub-Committee to whom the concerns of the Depository were entrusted, reported several resolutions which had been agreed to by the Sub-Committee, and are as follows :---

"I. Resolved,—That whereas the Diocesan Church Society can receive no books from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge except to the amount of the sum remitted with the order, no books can be supplied from the Depository of the Diocesan Church Society, unless the orders be accompanied with a remittance to the full amount.

"II. That all outstanding debts due the Depository be immediately called for, and until they be satisfactorily arranged, no further supply of books shall be issued to those who are in arrears.

" III. That Mr. Maxwell be requested to forward their accounts without delay, to the several persons indebted to the Depository, together with a copy of these resolutions."

"Whereupon it was resolved-

That whereas the importation of books to the Depository must, by the present arrangement of the Book Fund, depend entirely upon the returns made for books supplied from the Depository, the Committee feel bound to approve of and adopt the resolutions of the Sub-Committee."
