IS the assertion true? Let us have a little talk over it and find out, if possible, what it is and what it will injure.

Does the rumshop help a man to be more many, or a woman to be more womanly? Does it implant motives to industry, principles to economy, teach lessons of self-respect, add any moral impulse, or inspire with any spiritual fervor? Nay! not so.—The rumshop gives drunken citizens, unreliable workmen, tramping employees, teaches idleness, and want of thrift; debases and degrades wherever it has influence and gets custom. It manufactures three-quarters of our criminals; more than half our paupers; destroys innumerable homes and spreads misery in every quarter.

Is all this good for trade? Does business flourish best when most citizens are debased, degraded and ruined? Do you know that an honest industrious citizenship is the very basis of all prosperity and business advancement. And everybody knows that the open rumshop is the relentless enemy of honesty, morality and industry in any community.

Then vote out the rumshop and give our manhood a chance to come to its best. *Will the rumshop be interfered with if we close the liquor shops? NOT AT ALL.*

Yonder is a carpenter's shop, with its dozen workmen. No material, or ornament, or tool is rendered more difficult to obtain, no muscle is made less strong, no brain less clear, no hand less skillful because the rumshop is closed; the sound of plane and saw and mill is heard all the day and the workers are busy and happy. Now open the rumshop beside it. How long before confusion appears; there is the material, the tools, all there, but now, brain less clear, his will to work is less strong. By and by a place is vacant at the work bench, and a place is filled at the drinking bench.

"Where's Bob to-day?" inquires the stove founder, as he comes in and finds a place vacant.

"He is not around sir, he was drunk last night," answers his fellow workman. And so the whole work of the foundry must be retarded because the rumshop has been helping the workman on one of the sets.

"Has the cutter come in yet?" asks the master taylor, as he looks over his long list of measurements.

"No sir," replies the clerk, "the cutter has gone on a spree, and we shall not see him for two or three days." And the master taylor is so thankful for the kind-ly aid of the rumshop.

There is in fact, no single industry which is not hampered or hindered by the interferences of the rumshop. Let us vote it out and give our industries an opportunity to do their best.

Can't you see that every rumshop competitor gets you for these wages, and what it gets you lose.

GENTLEMEN:—  
A vacancy having occurred in the representa-  
tion of this County in the Local Legislature, I  
have been requested by a number of you to  
offer as a candidate, and after consulting with my  
friends in the several parishes, in view of the  
importance of the office, and the fact that I  
have been elected to it in the past, I have  
decided to do so.  
For this purpose it will be necessary for me  
to resign the office of the Provincial  
Government, which I now hold, but I need  
scarcely say that I regard as much more  
honorable and important, if not so remunerative,  
the position of representative of this my native  
County.  
If elected it will be my effort to inform my-  
self as to your local wants, to meet your just  
and reasonable expectations with reference to  
the same.  
Road and Bridge Service,  
and, generally, to faithfully discharge my  
duties as your representative.  
Believing that the present government has, in  
general, well administered the affairs of the  
Province, I will be prepared, if elected, to give  
it a fair and honorable support, so long as in  
my opinion it continues to merit it.  
At the same time I will seek by every legiti-  
mate and proper means to secure a  
reduction in the rate of Stamp-  
age upon Lumber,  
which now bears so heavily upon one of the  
principal industries in our County in common with  
the other North Shore Counties.  
I will support and vote for a  
**Good Lien Law,**  
adapted, in my judgment, to the requirements  
of this Province, by which the Lumberman and  
Mechanic may be to some extent protected, and  
secured in the payment of their hard earnings  
in the case of the insolvency of, or transfers of  
property by, the employer or merchant.  
I will favor Legislative enactments and  
Grants to encourage the colonization and set-  
tlement of our own people in the County, as  
has already to some extent been accomplished.  
My sympathy and support will be given to  
such legislation as will tend to promote habits  
of sobriety amongst our people, and render  
more effective the laws now upon our statute  
book having for their object the  
**Advancement of the Cause of  
Temperance.**  
In view of the spread of Education amongst  
all classes through the influence of our common  
schools, universities and colleges, I think the  
time has arrived when the Franchise should be  
enlarged and the right to vote given to every  
man who has reached his majority, without re-  
gard to property qualification.  
I will be prepared on every proper opportu-  
nity to encourage the construction and exten-  
sion of the  
**Railways**  
now projected in the County, and the obtaining  
of such aid therefor as the province may  
be financially in a position to give.  
I will endeavor to see as many of you person-  
ally as I can before Polling day, but as it will  
be impossible for me to call upon all, I  
would now ask those who are favorable to my  
election to do what they properly can to bring  
about that result, without waiting for a per-  
sonal canvass.
