

Here and There

Mineral production in Canada for 1924 is estimated at \$203,194,000, as compared with \$214,079,331 in the preceding year, according to a preliminary statement issued by the Department of Mines. Metallic minerals accounted for \$96,034,000 of the total, followed by fuels and other non-metallics with \$73,830,000, and structural materials and clay

The Port of Montreal created new world record in 1924 for the amount of grain handled by any one port in any one year, namely, 165,-139,396 bushels, while from January 1 to November 30 she handled 94,-866,508 bushels more than her near est competitor and 17,332,709 bushels more than the seven next busiest ports combined.

Described as the finest coastal vessel in the world, the "Princess Kathleen," recently launched by Lady Mount Stephen, widow of the late Lord Mount Stephen, a former president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, left Glasgow on January 15 on her ten thousand mile journey through the Panama canal to join the Canadian Pacific's fleet of coastal steamships plying the sea-board of British Columbia.

A historic pageant of some proportions is being planned by the Calgary exhibition board for this year fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the city by the old North-West Mounted Police in 1875. In the period which has since elapsed, Calgary has grown to be an extremely busy, modern city, having a population of 75,000. A stampede similar to those held in Calgary in previous years is also planned for this summer.

The itinerary of the "All Blacks," New Zealand's wonderful rugby team, hitherto unbeaten, in their tour of Canada, was announced by the Canadian Pacific recently. Landing at St. John, N.B., on January 31, from the company's steamship "Montlaurier," the team will proceed across the Dominion via Canadian Pacific lines. They will make short stays at Montreal, on February 1; Toronto, February 2; Niagara Falls, February 3; Calgary, February 6; Banff, February 7-9; Vancouver, February 10-21, and sail from San Francisco on the 25th. Calgary is giving them a ball and dance at the Palliser Hotel, they will take part in the Banff winter carnival, and will play teams from Van-couver and Victoria while on the

Very heavy summer travel is anticipated by the Canadian Pacific Railway during 1925, especially to conventions on the Pacific coast of Canada and the United States, C. B. Foster, passenger traffic manager of the company, announced recently. Canadian and American railroads expect 150,000 persons to attend these conventions, some of which will be very large. At least thirty westward bound special trains, and as many eastward bound, will be provided by the Canadian Pacific to handle the delegates, Mr. Foster stated, and Banff and Lake Louise expect great seasons, as so many of the travellers will stop off at those famous mountain resorts. THE BEST MONEY-MAKER

Dr I H Grisdale, Deputy Ministe of Agriculture in the Federal Govern ment says that the best money-maker in Canada today is the sheep industry Here is a statement of his: "Indica tions are that the prices of wool will be higher this year than for a very long time. The wool supply of the whole world is down. The supply of of mutton is low. The United States can take all that Canada can provide it with; and yet the total value of shep flocks in Canada is only about \$2,750,000 not one-quarter of what it easily might be.'

It is not only the United States which is a great potential market for Canadian wool, but the Orient as well Japan alone the wool imports in 1913 were 6,655,000 pounds. In 1923 they had increased to 46,985,000 pounds Wool yarn imports increased from 3,262,000 to 21,143,000 pounds, and wool and cotton mixture cloths from 8,836.000 to 21,060,000 yarns. China's demand, too, is growing at a remark able pace. Conditions the world over tend to point to the sheep industry as sure and staple in every respect Here in British Columbia at many points there are ideal conditions for the raising of shep, but the industry in this quarter is only in its infancy and at present we doubt if there is an ounce of the local produce going to oversea markets, although that prodcut, properly encouraged, might be made a source of increasing wealth to the province.


