C. N. R. ENGINEER FALLS FROM ENGINE

John McDavid Badly Injured When Thrown from Rapidly Moving Engine.
Mr. John H. McDavid of Campbellton, a locomotive engineer on the C. N. R., met with a bad accident Monday morning at Causapscal when he fell from his engine. While his train was pulling into the station going at the rate of seven or eight miles an hour Mr. McDavid was leaning out the engine window watching his train and looking for hot boxes. Losing his balance he fell from the engine his head striking a flat car before he struck the ground. The fireman immediately stopped the train and Mr. McDavid was removed to the station house in an unconscious condition. A special train was immediately arranged for and the injured man brought to Campbellton. Dr. Murray met the train at the depot here and in his auto took Mr. McDavid to his home where he was given preliminary treatment before taking him to the Hotel Dieu Hospital. Examination revealed the fact that while Mr. McDavid had received no internal injuries he was badly bruised about head, and chest, and will no doubt be confined to the hospital for several days. His many friends will be pleased to learn that he is reported to be resting quite easily at the hospital today and doing as well as can be expected.

COUNCIL TALKS TOWN MANAGER

Committee Appointed to Look Into Matter—Increased School Assessment.
A meeting of the town council was held last evening in the firemen's rooms at the fire station. His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair with Councillors Bisset, Jamieson, Ingram, Currie, Matthews, Devereaux and Dickie present.
The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.
A further communication was read from the Sun Assurance Co., with reference to repairs on the temporary building situated on King street belonging to the town. The company was desirous of ascertaining if it was the intention of the town to repair them. Laid on table.
A communication was read from the Secretary of the Board of School Trustees asking that an assessment of \$16,000 be made this year for school purposes, also that the amount so assessed be paid to the Board in twelve monthly instalments. Councillor Currie addressed the council in support of the \$16,000 assessment. He said the assessment last year was \$24,000, but there was at the present time a deficit of about \$6,000. This year five extra teachers would have to be employed, and all teachers would have to receive more salary than formerly. A large coal bin should be erected this year to store the winter's coal at the Grammar School. A retaining wall was also required at the Roseberry Street School building to prevent gravel from falling down on the adjacent property owner's land. Communication laid on table until the appropriations for the year were being considered.
Councillor Devereaux from the Police and License Committee reported recommending that a "renewal" license be granted Mr. S. M. Moore upon the payment of the prescribed fee, and that a license be issued to Geo. Dow for the sale of ice cream and soft drinks on the payment of \$15.00. Report received and adopted.
The usual departmental accounts were then presented and read.
Councillor Currie called a letter from Mr. Harold Wallace, owner of the land in rear of the town reservoir, in which Mr. Wallace offered to sell to the town the land at 26 per square foot, being the price paid some years ago by the town for property in this vicinity, the offer to remain open for sixty days. Councillor Currie explained that he had no authority to ask Mr. Wallace for a price on the land as he was not requested by the council to do so, but had done so as a private citizen, and was now placing the offer before the council and council could take such action as it cared to with reference to purchase. He figured the price at 26 per square foot would amount to about \$4,756 for the amount of land Mr. Wallace owned in rear of the reservoir. Communication laid on table.
Councillor Bisset from the Electric Light Committee reported upon Mr. Farrer's application that he be relieved of the arrangements of allowing the town the use of his horse on the payment of half the cost of the horse's keep. He recommended that the arrangement be discontinued, and the bill of Mr. Farrer for \$200 half the cost of the horse's keep be paid. Report received and adopted.
On motion the town clerk was instructed to write the editor of The Graphic with reference to an editorial which appeared in his paper last week in which it was stated the government was to purchase the town's overhead power amount to \$1,200 a year, and request him to have the statement retracted as the tax would by no means amount to any such figure. It was pointed out by a member of the council that the tax would not exceed \$12 per month.
Councillor Dickie on being questioned as to whether or not Engineer Holt had reported upon the water situation said he had not, but he expected a report by next meeting.
Councillor Devereaux brought up the matter of putting in a sewer on Minto street, stating that Mr. Joudry had spoken to him regarding the possibility of the cellar in the Commercial block again being flooded by reason of inadequate sewerage. The matter was laid over until the appropriations for the year were being considered.
Councillor Currie brought up the matter of the purchase of a new road making machine. The old one he said was worn out and not worth repairing. He moved that a new machine be purchased. Councillors Bisset, Devereaux and Ingram spoke strongly against the purchase of a new machine at the present time and Councillor Currie withdrew his motion, but stated that the town could find funds to purchase expensive fire fighting appliances which might have been held over for another year, but could not provide a needed street scraper.
On motion the salary of Town Engineer W. J. S. Walsh was fixed at \$150 per month, dating from May 1st. Councillor Dickie enquired of Council

AUTO STRUCK AT MOWATS CROSSING

Four Occupants Have Narrow Escape Last Saturday Evening.
What might have proved a fatal accident occurred at Mowat's crossing a few miles above Campbellton, Saturday evening when the I. N. R. train struck an auto driven by Mr. H. P. Doyle of this town. Mr. Doyle had gone up to Fraser's mill to bring down three of the workmen, Messrs. Wilfred Michael, Edward Jobb and LeMercier. Just a short distance from the mill, at Mowat's crossing, the auto was struck by the incoming I. N. R. train, the train catching the auto in the rear. Mr. Doyle remained at the wheel and was pinned under the car when it turned turtle. The other three were thrown from the car, two of them Messrs. Wilfred Michael and Edward Jobb receiving slight bruises about head and body. The train was stopped and backed up, the train crew assisting the men at Fraser's mill who saw the accident from the mill and immediately ran down, to extricate Mr. Doyle, whose injuries also consisted of minor bruises about the head and body. The three injured men were placed in Mr. Roy Saunders' auto and taken to the Hotel Dieu Hospital where their injuries were attended to, Messrs. Doyle and Michael being able to return to their homes late Saturday night, while Edward Jobb remained at the hospital until Monday morning.
Escape of all the occupants of the auto from instant death is most miraculous. Mr. LeMercier though escaping injuries received a bad shaking up.
Those who have examined the auto at Mowat's crossing, pronounce it beyond repair.

Frederick, N. B., July 26—Allan Tracey, a returned soldier belonging to Harvey was successfully operated upon for appendicitis at the military hospital last week. The operation was performed by Dr. W. Vernon Coffin of this city, assisted by Dr. Allan Stirling and was unique in one respect as the patient was not rendered unconscious. As a matter of fact, he smoked a cigarette while the operation was being performed, and coolly watched the surgeons at their work. This was made possible by the fact that he was under the influence of a spinal anaesthetic, administered for the first time in this province in an appendicitis case. He suffered no pain whatever.

Archbishop John Whitgift Is Remembered in Croydon

As Founder of Hospitals

LITTLE while ago, there took place in Croydon, the ancient town some ten miles south of London, an interesting and accented ceremony, namely, the annual festival service by which is commemorated the munificence of Archbishop Whitgift to Croydon. It was, in fact, the 224th anniversary of the foundation of the Whitgift Hospital, and headed by bands, the boys of the Whitgift Grammar and Middle Schools marched to the parish church. The Vicar of Croydon presided over a service, for which, under the terms of the bequest, he received sixteen shillings and eightpence, and all who took part in the festival wore "Whitgift" flowers. 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One Continent Is Lost

EVIDENCE has come to light recently that Columbus had set forth on his great voyage a few thousands or hundreds of thousands of years earlier he would have found three instead of two continents of America. That is to say, the world is shy at least one continent which existed formerly as what is now the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean Sea. Rumors of this loss were rife as long ago as the time when Greek mythology was being compiled, for the same references there to the lost continent of Atlantis; but whether the missing continent really disappeared in the Atlantic is not known. Further research may show that there has been a defalcation to the extent of several continents. What seems to be established is that the present island of Jamaica was not always such, but was, on the contrary, the centre of a vast continent. The only alternative theory is that the larger West Indian islands were once part of Central America. It is not too much to assume that many readers at present are unaware that between an island and a continent there is a difference than in mere size. Islands are of quite different formation, for the most part. Excepting those situated along what may be called the shelf of the continents, and were absent of the mainland, islands are of oceanic origin. They come to exist as a result of coral growth or some volcanic disturbance. They are either built up by incrusts or are thrown up by some tremendous convulsion of the earth. Continents are of the older line, and islands are mere upstarts. This is proved by the animal life found on continents and islands. On islands there have rarely any large mammals. Their animal life consists largely, if not wholly, of winged creatures that found it possible to cross large expanses of salt water from the mainland to the islands. They have also those lower forms of life the eggs of which happen to have been carried by hurricanes, water species or other natural agencies.

The discovery that related to the lost continent of Atlantis was made by Capt. H. E. Anthony, who headed an expedition sent out by the London Museum of Natural History, and who has spent several months in the Indian Ocean, exploring the islands, fossils, and the seekers were richly rewarded. They found fossil remains of many mammals now extinct, some of them being of varieties not elsewhere encountered. They were found in a great collection of bats, reptiles and birds, indicating to naturalists, but not giving evidence that the West Indian continent ever existed or part of a continent.

At the present time, the only wild mammals in Jamaica are the coney and the mongoose. The coney was introduced by the Spaniards, and unfortunately rats flourished in greater luxuriance and in order to exterminate the rats a large importation of Indian mongooses was made. The rats were more or less abolished, but the mongooses they turned their ferocious attention to the coney and they have become almost extinct. Capt. Anthony found some living in a restricted area in the mountains of Jamaica, and brought home some specimens in a preserved state. An interesting fact is that among the coney specimens the coney were unable to find any closely related to those in Cuba and Porto Rico. This has suggested the speculation of an eastern peninsula jutting out from Honduras, and that Jamaica may not have been part of the Antillean continent. The idea that Jamaica may have been isolated from all other land that mammals came to it on floating masses of vegetation does not commend itself to zoologists.

If there is a lost continent, Capt. Anthony says that it must have been an important mass of land, with great rivers and huge mountains, the latter rising perhaps 20,000 feet above the sea. The expedition also did some checking up on Herbert Spencer's theory that in tertiary times the present bottom of the sea was from a mile and a half to two miles higher than it is now from its present configuration. "If this be so," says Capt. Anthony, as quoted in the Boston Transcript, by J. Olin Howe, "it gives us our continent there which our fossil fauna seem to indicate. The ridges of the sea bottom seem to follow the general direction of the mountain ranges we find on the larger islands, and Spencer's contention that the ridges run under water and the mountain ranges which rear themselves above it were formerly all parts of the same system." He believes that the mountains of the lost continent were higher than any now on the American continent, but does not say that the high peaks may have become affected by its exaltation and have thus been incited to abolish a continent.

OVERDRAFT FOR JULY. We may add that this overdraft will be decreased by about \$20,000 when the Fire Station bonds are sold, but even then the overdraft will be about \$60,000, which is certainly a pretty heavy burden to face the assessment.

SOMETHING MAY BE DONE.
The meeting of the Town Council held Tuesday evening was a very interesting one and discussion was raised upon a number of matters which should lead up to something if followed.

His Worship brought up the Hydro-Electric matter and we certainly trust this will be followed up. With the high price of coal, cheap power rates are essential to the commercial and industrial development of the town. But while waiting for this Hydro Electric development could the Electric Light Committee not advance some plan whereby the day load of the plant could be increased at very little expense and provide much additional revenue. We feel sure if a low enough rate was given, many would take current for domestic purposes during the summer.

The matter of a Town Manager was discussed and a committee appointed to look into the matter. If the right man can be found we feel sure that the Town would benefit.

While little was said upon the water question, yet an important matter was brought up. At last the owner of the land immediately in the rear of the reservoir has set a price upon it. If this land can be purchased at a reasonable price, and thus allow for the size of the present reservoir, we as well as many other citizens think it would be a wise move.

The school assessment was also discussed. It costs something now to run our schools and the net too coming statement has been made that the peak has not been reached. Twenty-four thousand last year and forty-five asked for this year of which over twenty-one thousand is for teachers' salaries alone.

Campbellton's taxpayers must pay more taxes, but if they do they would like to be sure that their money is being wisely and economically expended and not wasted.

A CHANGE AT HAND.
For the past few years we have enjoyed a wonderful prosperity. There has been work for everyone who would work. The labor demand was in excess of the supply.

We have worked away from that condition—or we are drifting away from it. The labor reservoir is filling up, which means that many men will be without jobs. Already in some manufacturing centres of the country the question of employment is becoming more or less of a problem.

The time is approaching when a man has to think of keeping his job, not of leaving it. This requires a new mental adjustment on the part of the worker. Up to now he has been able to leave one place and go to another, with a certainty that he would find a good position without much difficulty. Now it is becoming different. A few days ago we read of a big railway system laying off 10,000 men and thousands more to be laid off in a short time. The lack of transportation, the high costs of labor and machinery, as reflected in high selling prices to the consumer, and other causes are slowing up business. When business slows up there is retrenchment, and retrenchment means idle hands somewhere, somehow. All of which means that a man who has a reasonably good position now should hang on to it. So far as his individual power, he should hold fast to his job. If the present trend keeps up it is going to be worth something to a man to have a job at a reasonable wage.—Ex.

DYNAMITING JACQUET RIVER
Lumber Boss Accused of Serious Offense Against Fishery Laws.

Dear Editor,—
I think it is to everybody's interest to publish what I saw on August the 3rd, between four and five o'clock in the morning. I was awakened by a tremendous shock of dynamite, I ran over to the Pool and the first man I saw was Abel Clowater, travelling boss for the Louisa Lumber Co. I accused him of blowing the Pool and he said it was no worse for him than for others. I went down to the beach and saw the dead fish come to the top of the water and there are a number of small dead fish to be seen in the pool known as the McLean pool. It is about two weeks since the government replenished the river with fish and this is not the only pool that has been blown and dead salmon to be seen along the river. I have witness to what I publish here.

ENGLISHMAN BUYS ENTIRE TOWN.

(By H. Thomas)
Milford Haven, a town of considerable antiquity, in Pembrokeshire, in Wales, has just been purchased by Major Hugh J. P. Thomas, a well known land owner for \$1,250,000. This big estate comprises 1,000 houses, a lordship of three manors, a fine castle, a mansion house and the market tolls of the town, in addition to the finest land-locked harbor in the world.

Commercially the port is in its infancy, but with the development of the plans and schemes contemplated, it may some day rival Liverpool and Southampton in the trade from the Americans.

The site of the town formed part of the possessions of Sir William Hamilton who built the mansion of Castle Hall a hundred and twenty years ago; Castle Hall, as the home of the beautiful Emma Hamilton, was often visited by Lord Nelson.

The church men, the haven was consecrated in 1808 and the font with the Hamilton arms was given by Lady Hamilton. In those days the mail coach from London brought the mails for Ireland to Milford.

All this district is rich in history; there's a letter in existence from the Earl of Pembroke to Queen Elizabeth, dated February 11th, 1592, about the necessity of fortifying Milford Haven.

Back in 1885, the Earl of Richmond, afterwards the Henry the Seventh, landed at Milford Haven, on the way to his victory at Bosworth Field.

Earlier still is the period of the priory, founded in the 12th century and the Via Julia, one of the Roman Roads, forms part of the mountain road to-day.

So Major Thomas has certainly made a unique purchase when he bought Milford Haven.

NEW STUMPAGE REGULATIONS NOW

Provincial Government Makes Important Changes in Stumpage Rates.

The New Brunswick department of Lands and Mines has issued new stumpage rates as follows:—
The stumpage payable on all logs, timber or other lumber cut or made upon Crown Lands under Saw-mill or Pulp and Paper License, shall be as follows:

For Spruce, Pine and Hemlock	\$5.00
Hardwood Timber, up to an average of 14 inches square, per ton	1.50
Hardwood Timber, above 14 inches, additional per inch per ton	0.10
Hardwood Logs, per M, superficial feet	1.25
Pine Timber, up to 14 inches square, per ton	3.00
Pine Timber, additional per inch, per ton	0.50
Hemlock Timber, per ton	1.00
Spruce Timber, per ton	2.00
Cedar Logs, per M	5.00
Railway Ties, 8 feet length, each	.17
Hemlock Logs, per M, superficial feet, including bark	4.50
White Birch, for spool wood, per M, superficial feet	2.00
Fir Logs per M, superficial feet	4.50
Poplar Logs, per M, superficial feet	4.50

And for all descriptions of lumber not specified above, 10 per cent. of the market value thereof, at the mill place of shipment or place of consumption in the Province.

Permits issued by the authority of the Minister of Lands and Mines to enable Licensees to cut under-sized lumber on barren lands or thickets, will pay the same rate of stumpage as stated above, with the addition of twenty-five cents per M. being the cost of supervision.

CANNING FRUIT WITHOUT SUGAR

Much of the Small Fruit Crop May be Conserved by this Method.

Due to the scarcity and high price of sugar the possibility of much of the coming crop of small fruits going to waste is greatly increased. There is a method of canning without sugar, and to secure the best information available on the subject, the Commission of Conservation invited Miss Jeannette Babb Instructor of Household Science at Macdonald college, to prepare a short paper. Miss Babb especially emphasized the caution that in sugarcane canning the utmost care must be observed, and every rule strictly followed. Otherwise loss of fruit and wasted effort may result. Fermentation and decay are caused by the bacteria, yeasts and moulds, which are ever present in the air, coming in contact with fruit. We must, therefore, destroy these forms of life present in the containers and prevent their further entrance into the containers, by sealing and sterilizing by boiling. This is what is termed canning.

There are many reasons why canning is as follows: Wash boiler, or large kettle, with an airtight cover; fitted rack for bottom of boiler; good jars and covers properly sterilized; good rubbers; long-handled spoon or silver knife; strainer or clean cheesecloth for washing fruit, blanching and cold-dipping, boiling water, and clean towels, all of which should be sterile.

To prepare the jars, test them first for leakage, by filling with water, fitting on rubber, sealing tightly and inverting on a dry table. If no moisture is seen on the table the jar is safe. Sterilize the jars and covers by placing on rack in boiler, covered with cold water, bring water to boiling point, and boil for fifteen minutes. Sterilize the rubbers in a shallow dish of boiling water for five minutes.

In the cold pack method the importance of the two terms, blanching and cold dipping, should be emphasized. Blanching is to dip in boiling water for from a few seconds to five minutes, according as to whether the fruit is of the soft or hard variety. Cold dipping means the immediate plunging into cold water, to set the colouring matter, to aid in keeping the fruit whole and to make it easy to handle.

PREPARATION OF FRUIT.
 1. Select when it is at its best and thoroughly sound, ripe but firm and free from bruises.
 2. Grade of size and quality for sake of uniformity.
 3. Cut the day it is picked, and as soon as possible after picking, especially where no sugar is used.
 4. Clean fruit and prepare as for table use.
 5. Blanch in case of hard fruits.
 6. Cold dip.
 7. Pack products quickly into jars, which have just been picked, and which have not been sterilized.
 8. Use the time from the boiler, using a sterile knife or spoon handle for packing.
 9. Fill with boiling water, insert top to let out air and fill again to top with water running over jar.
 10. Put on sterilized rubber, cover and partially seal at once.
 11. When all jars are ready, place in rack in boiler and cover with water, or of the same separated.
 12. Keeping the jars under the boiling point and boil until the fruit is cooked.
 (a) Soft fruits require from 10 to 15 minutes where sugar is used. When no sugar is used we add 15 minutes more to the required length of time with sugar.
 (b) Hard fruits with sugar require from 30 minutes to one hour plus twenty minutes without sugar.
 13. Uncover boiler at end of time for sterilizing or boiling, allow steam to escape and seal jars tightly immediately upon removing from boiler. Invert until cool.
 14. When cool screw tight again, wash outside of jars, label and put away in a cold, dry, dark place.
 NOTE—In sugarcane canning, the utmost care must be observed, and every rule strictly followed.—Jeannette Babb, Instructor Household Science, Macdonald College.
