When this has been done the applications will be allowed. The Advertiser of Tuesday, 19th inst., again informs us that on Saturday last the commissioners met and granted a license to J. Goulding, of Bryanston The natural inference is that Mr. Goulding has made the necessary repairs to the hotel premises, demanded by the commissioners or the inspector. If he has done so, the demands were easily met, as the only visible repairs made, if it can be called such, was open shed, with three cords of gravel. We have made inquiries and have not been able to learn of anything further done. There has been no appearance of workmen engaged in any other way around the premises. Several houses are under repair in the village now, and it is very manifest what the owners are trying to do. The hotel is the only place where the repairs are invisible (except the graveling), although every part of the hotel premises is in a most dilapidated state. A more wretched-looking place, under license, could scarcely be found in the Province. We understand that licenses are issued by the commissioners on the recommenda-

tion of the license inspector. Perhaps License Inspector Baily would inform the temperance people of Bryanston and vicinity what repairs had been issued to Mr. Goulding. Did Mr. Baily see that the repairs had been made, or did he simply accept the word of the hotelkeeper that they had been made, the finest stock of the island. The taxation of railways in Ontario is one of the foremost questions with which the Legislature is dealing. The proposed new assessment law provides for the assessment of railroad property at its actual value, in the same manner as the property of a private person is appraised. The valuation is to be made by a Provincial board, which will allot to each municipality its share of the taxation. The railroad companies, as might be expected, have entered a strong protest. The legal representative of the Grand Trunk points out that the company pays on 2,650 miles of roadway in Ontario \$121,-000 in municipal taxation and \$13,000 to the Provincial treasury. In rural districts he says the tax is \$20 per mile or \$2 50 per acre. This is equivalent to \$250 on 100 acres, and no farmer, he submits, could pay such a tax. The assessment of the Grand Trunk in Ontario under the proposed law would be \$75,000,000, and the taxation, at 15 mills on the dollar, would be \$1,125,000, which is equal to \$450 a mile, or \$56 an acre. CHAMBERLAIN ON COLONIAL TRADE

Prosperity of Mother Country Hosiery Depends Upon It.

WANTS A COMMERCIAL LEAGUE

Says Great Britain in the Past Has Thought Too Much of Buying Cheaply.

London, May 22.-In a letter to a constituent, Mr. Chamberlain further emphasizes his belief in the necessity for an imperial commercial league. He

"I am firmly convinced that the prosperity of this country depends largely on our trade with the colonies, which, under a wise system of mutual concession, will increase by leaps and bounds. We have been apt in the past to consider too much the advantage of buying cheaply, and not to pay sufficient attention to methods whereby we may have the means that enable us to pay at all. Increased wages are even more important to the working classes than reduced cost of living." Chamberlain adds that he has the fullest confidence in the working classes and in their power to realize the "great issues which depend on

our present action." The Graphic, in an editorial on Mr. Chamberlain's recent speech on preferential treatment, says that though Canadians have welcomed the speech of the Colonial Secretary, they have never given any indication that they are prepared to treat the mother country with the same liberality that she treats her colonies.

REFUGEES FROM RUSSIA

15,000 of Them Are Headed Towards American Continent.

New York, May 22.-The terror put into the hearts of the Jews throughout the countries of the old world by the Kishineff massacres has started an army of refugees towards this country, and Tuesday the vanguard of the persecuted people, numbering 1,500, arrived in this port on the steamship Staatendam. Thousands are waiting in the big emigrant cities on the other side to take ship for America. It is estimated that at present the total headed for the United States alone is 15,000, and that another week will see them all on their way.



ST. PETERSBURG ANXIOUS

Fears Grave Trouble During Bi-Centenary Festivities.

St. Petersburg, May 22.-The greatest anxiety prevails in administrative circles owing to the possibility of serious outbreaks on the occasion of the approaching bicentenary of this city. The police have requested the owners of workshops and factories to refuse a holiday to the employes during the festivities; but the men will probably refuse to work. The latter have recently shown much unruliness. Revolutionist emissaries have been flooding the workshops with seditious litera-ture, in which it is declared that while the Czar, in his proclamation of March 11, pretended to be animated by a desire to ameliorate the lot of the peasants, his majesty in reality cares nothing for them, and the men must themobtain their rights. These pamphlets are couched in language most insulting to the Czar, the Czarina and the Government. The employers are asking for police protection during the celebrations, fearing attacks on their establishments;

THOSE SMALLPOX CASES

Provincial Medical Inspector Explains the Essex Epidemic.

Toronto, May 22.-Dr. Hodgetts, provincial medical inspector, states that during his reent inspecton in Essex county he met with no cases which had been reported to the local health authorities as chickenpox and which proved to be smallpox, and, further, there were only two families in quarantine in Anderdon township. difficulties in Malden township been increased by reason of the fact that chickenpox had been prevalent in some portions of the municipality about the beginning of the year. Since then some of these persons had de-veloped smallpox. In other instances the disease, being of a mild type, had not been treated by a medical man, and many of the residents doubted that the people were suffering from the more serious ailment. The physicians were in every case familiar with the disease, and were most anxious to assist the health authorities in carrying out the law.
