THE EVILS OF DRINK

Weekly Temperance Meeting at Vic-toria Hall – Speeches by Rev. Messrs. Speller and Bond.

A large number of people were shown seats in Victoria Hall by the obliging Y. M. C. A. ushers at the weekly temperance meeting Saturday evening. The audience were particularly enthusiastic, and were quick to perceive the points of the speakers, who were liberally applauded. Rev. J. Allister Murray presided, and opened the proceedings in the usual way. Miss Mutch followed with a sole, rendered with sweetness and power.

The Chairman briefly excused his non-attendance at the previous meetings. His physicians had forbidden him to over-exert himself, but he could assure them his

heart was in the work.

Rev. H. C. Speller made a forcible address. In his opinion temperance was the most important moral question before them in the country and in the age. There was very little new to be said on the matter, but the arguments should be pressed home. "There is a degree of haziness," continued the speaker, "upon the part of a good many Christian people even in our day as to which side God stands on in this question, or as to whether God has taken sides at all in the matter. Well, some people say it is purely a question of politics, and by that wish us to understand that God has nothing to do with politics—that this is a matter this is a matbetween "wighten the part of a good many Livinian people area in this good with the control of t

The speaker further calculated that each man must spend \$40 a year for the purpose, and thought it too much expense altogether for these hard times or any other times. It he person who made his living out of a saloon helped no other man—except the hangman, the policeman, and the judge who tried the case. It was a business that fostered idleness, disease, poverty, crime. The man who took out a license shared in the criminal responsibility. The business as ordinarily carried on was a lawless one, whatever there might be of individual exceptions; the very fact of that being the case should excite a feeling of hostility to it. It was a vexatious thing, producing no good for the community, costing great sums, creating great evils, crime and suffering, and it deserved nothing else but extinction. The setting up and establishing of licenses developed the drinking habits of the community. No matter who the youth was if he went into a hotel and asked for liquor he would get it. The saloon-keepers would permit the young men to drink until they became the most despicable sots, and claim the right to do it. The very fact that the business operated on the moral nature of the man in such a way that he utterly disregards the neighborly obligations that he has to his fellow-men, and will allow a youth to acquire the habits of a drunkard, should be sufficient cause why we should intervene to save that man from so terrible and godless a conscience. From the nature of the licensing system it placed in public sympathy, one with the other, all those who were engaged in the business, so that they became an organized community for the purpose of carrying on a business direful in its influence. That is swhy licenses should not be granted at all. If they could not abolish

MINERAL PROFITS FOR THE

The principle that as far as possible the values accruing from the natural resources of the country shall be taken by the Government for the benefit of the whole people is a correct one, and should be maintained. In the older countries of the world individuals have been rendered immensely wealthy through the opportunity afforded them to profit by the industry of the whole people, while practically doing nothing in return. The experience has been repeated on this continent, and no better example of it could be obtained than the fact that the entire coal field of Pennsylvania is practically in the hands of a few men, who charge the consumers just what they choose. In England and Scotland many landowners have become fabulously rich through collecting royalties on coal, iron and petroleum shale discovered under the ground controlled by them. These lands were originally sold as farming lands; their owners, as a rule, did nothing to facilitate the discovery of the underground wealth, but they fattened at the expense of the ity which circumstance community which circumstances compelled to work and to purchase the commodities so brought to light.

The timber policy of the Ontario Government has been framed so as to divert to the public purse, for the benefit of the people, the profits derivable from the development of the country and sales of timber effected. That policy the people have again and again approved. It is a righteous policy, and should be continued, always provided our rulers are enlightened enough to keep planting trees to take the place of the forests hewn down year by year. That proviso sustained, the timber wealth of Ontario will be a source of never-ending profit to the people.
