NECK IS BROKEN SKULL FRACTURED

Clothes of the Corpse Same As Those Worn By Harry Bartlett When Last Seen,

That he body of the man who was found at Muncey yesterday morning was that of Harry Bartlett was practically established last night, when Mr. Newman Pidd, son of Mrs. Pidd, 165 Clarence street, with whom Bartlett boarded, identified the clothes on the body as the same as those worn by Bartlett the night he disappeared.

That Bartlett met with foul play was also reasonably established when Dr. Woods, the coroner, informed The Advertiser that the man's neck is broken, and that there is a fracture at the base of the skull, supposedly caused by some blunt instrument.

The Jury.

A coroner's jury viewed the body, and adjourned until Monday next, when a thorough examination into the cause of the young man's death will be made.

Neck Is Broken.

"The man's neck is broken," said Dr. Woods, the coroner, to The Advertiser, "and there is a fracture at the base of the skull.

"Mr. Pidd practically identified the body last night, and there is no doubt of the clothes being the same. There was a photo of Bartlett shown us, and the vest and the tie are the same. So it looks very much as if it were the missing man. The inquest will be most thorough and searching."

Mr. Pidd also pointed out that when Harry Bartlett left the house on the evening of Dec. 5 he had an overcoat, a coat of the same material as the trousers, and a stiff felt hat. None of these have been found. They were not near the body, and could not be located anywhere.







Mr. Bowman (North Bruce) introduced an amendment to the act to regulate the speed and operation of motor vehicles on highways. It provides that motorists approaching horses being driven or ridden on highways, shall exercise reasonable precautions to prevent the frightening of horses, and to insure the safety of riders and drivers. Outside the limits of cities or towns motorists, when meeting horses, shall stop at least 100 yards distant and shall not proceed till the horses are safely passed, and shall, if necessary, assist the horse's rider or driver to pass safely. If the motor car driver desires to pass horses from behind, he shall signal and give the riders or drivers a chance to turn out, and if the horses appear frightened, the motorist shall immediately stop and not proceed further, unless it be necessary to avoid accident or injury, or until the horses are under control. Another clause prohibits the operation of motor vehicles on town, village or country roads between 7 a.m. and 9 p.m. on Saturdays and 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. on Sundays,
