Refuses To Declare as Out of Order Premier Asquith's Motion to Rescind Decision of Committee—Prolonged Debate Is Expected.

[Canadian Press.]

London, Nov. 23.—The hopes of the Unionists in connection with the home rule bill were destroyed by the Speaker of the House of Commons today. The Unionists desired the Speaker to declare out of order Premier Asquith's motion to rescind the decision of the committee of the House, which amended the

home rule bill and defeated the Government on Monday. Speaker James Lowther said the Premier's motion was unprecedented, but was quite in order.

The Premier then submitted his motion, and in support of it said if the House did not reverse the decision reached by the committee on the amendment of Sir Frederick Banbury, the Government would be able to proceed with the bill.

A prolonged debate is anticipated.



For choice butchering bulls there was a good demand, and, centrary to the trend of most other cattle, prices strengthened. They brought from \$5 to \$5 50, while common to mediums brought from \$3 50 to \$4 75. For milkers there exists an increasing demand. Good beasts sold at \$5 to \$10 higher yesterday, prices ranging from \$65 to \$85 each, while for inferior grades from \$45 to \$65 was raid. paid. Springers were steady. 

JAMES BRYCE'S RETIREMENT. The intimation that James Bryc will retire from the diplomatic service has brought a flood of regretful eulogy from the press of the United States without regard to party. As the New York Post remarks, Mr. Bryce is an Englishman, but he is at the same time about the most popular American. His masterpiece, "The American Commonwealth," revealed the American people to the world and to themselves. James Russell Lowell wrote a biting essay on "a certain condescension in foreigners," in which he satirized the patronizing attitude of English writers to with democratic institutions. He has mind to the interpretation of the republic, a mind magnificently equipped for the task by its stores of historical and political knowledge. Mr. Bryce had an almost unique university record, and showed such amazing precedity that at 24 years of age he wrote a classic, "The Holy Roman Empire." He practiced law from 1867 to 1882, and was regius professor of civil law at when he entered the British Parliament, he has been one of the orna ments of British public life, and one of the glories of British Liberalism. A member of three ministries, Mr. Bryce has been the ideal statesman, a phil-

osopher in action The American people regarded it as a high compliment when he was named ambassador to Washington. No living foreigner had so great a reputation in the United States, and none could have been so welcome. No man in the United States has been so sought after by colleges, historical societies, chambers of commerce, bar associations and other public bodies. He has played the role of the candid friend to perfection, and has almost reached the dignity of a national institution. To the educated class of Americans his retirement will be felt as an irreparable loss to the

higher life of the republic. Canadians have reasons to be grateful to Mr. Bryce. Holes are as numerous as prominent citizens at a conflagration. The other streets in the eastern section of the city are on a par. Ottaway avenue is fair in parts, as it appears o be much drier than the others, Dundas Street East.

Coming north on Egerton street one hits about as bad a piece of road as can be found in the city on Dundas street, the leading thoroughfare of the city, between the fair grounds and the easterly limits. At no time during the year has this street been even passable. Today it is the worst possible. 

FREE LIBRARIES IN THE RURAL DISTRICTS

The Ontario Library Association Asked to Take Steps to Establish Them.

At the closing session of the London District Library Association on Tuesday afternoon a resolution was passed asking the executive board of the Ontario Library Association to take steps for the establishment of free libraries in the rural districts, and to request the Ontario Government to pass legislation to this effect. The need for rural libraries formed one of the prinlic libraries, Toronto, opened the sesconvention, and it culminated in this resolution.

Mr. R. W. Nursey, inspector of public libraries, Toronto, opened the session with an address on "Library Accounts, Government Reports and Invoices." The inspector told of several instances where the Government had withheld library grants on account of mistakes made by the librarian in his annual report. He also explained various ways in which a library could be financed, but the method of selling off old books and magazines as a source of revenue was illegal.

Mr. J. Davis Barnett, of Stratford, conducted the question drawer and gave valuable information in reply to several queries on libraries and how to conduct them on a paying basis. What Mr. Barnett didn't know about libraries is very little, as in his home town he owns a library containing over thirty thousand volumes.

The delegates tendered a vote of thanks to the Middlesex county council for their grant of \$25 to each library in the county.







SPANISH GOV.T WILL NOT RESIGN

Assassination of Premier Canelejas Will Make No Difference at Present.

RECORD OF PARDINAS

Young Anarchist Was Expelled From Buenos Ayres for Anarchistic Agitation.

[Canadian Press.] Madrid, Nov. 13.-The body of the assassinated Premier Canalejas lay in state from an early hour this morning on a catafolque which had been erected in a temporary chapel in the Chamber of Deputies. hTe body was ressed in diplomatic uniform, and beneath the corners of the gray silk canopy covering the catafalque stood military guard of honor, the men with their heads inclined on their arms which rested on their reversed

A vast silent crowd of people gathered both in and outside the chamber to pay their last respects to the dead statesman. The population of the capital appears to be deply impressed by the crime. Work has been almost entirely suspended, and nearly every business house is closed, while most of the houses in the residential secion are draped with mourning decor-

The Liberal cabinet will continue to hold office under the temporary presidency of Foreign Minister Marquis at least, until the signature of the Mococcan treaty with France, which should have been completed today. Premier Poincare, of France, however, elegraphed this morning to the Spansh Government to defer the matter, until a more convenient date. The assassin, whose name is Pardinas, is a man of distingushed appearance. He has regular features, is smoothshaven, and has luminous eyes. When arrested he had several manuscripts in his possession, one in cypher was inscribed on the outer sheet, International Conflagration." Another was a thesis on the anatomy of the human stomach. He also carried one of Flammarion's astronomical books, and the photo of a woman, on which was written, "To my unforgettable Manuel." The recent movements of Pardinas

are known in outline to the Spanish police. He was expelled from Buenos Ayres last March on account of his participation in anarchistic agitations. He returned to Spain and stayed for a few days in Madrid, whence travelled to Paris, London, Biarritz, Bordeaux, and Marseilles, and then again to Paris, which city he left en days ago for Madrid. The Paris olice notified the authorities in Madrid of Pardinas' departure and informed them of an article he had written against King Alfonso for an anarchist

STREET RAILWAY **OBJECT TO GRADE** OF NEW LINES

Company Notify City They Will Not Be Responsible for Service.

RICHMOND ST. GRADE IS BEING CUT DOWN

Cheapside and William Street Grades Are Also Said To Be Very Bad.

The London Street Railway Company is taking serious objection to the manner in which it has been compelled to construct the new lines in the north end of the city, and in a recent communication to the city engineer, the management of the road denies any responsibility should it be found impossible to maintain an efficient service during the coming win-

The difficulty arises from the grade for the new lines furnished by the city engineer's department, by reason of which the rails are laid in a trough in the centre of the road. This condition is apparent on both Cheapside and William streets, where the new north end etxensions have already been laid, and according to those in charge the works on Richmond street north, where the Wellington is being straightened out, the tracks will be from eight to ten inches lower than the crown of the road.

People Are Incensed.

The management of the company has been informed that the trouble will be overcome when plans for grading the street are carried out, but citizens of the north end, who are interested declare that there has been no occasion for the reduction of the grade, and that several thousands of dollars will be wasted.

The intention of the city engineer is said to be to cut down the surface of Richmond street from eight to ten inches in order to bring the grade to the level at which the street railway company has been compelled to work. This may be proper in the opinion of the city engineer, those who are inter-ested declare, but it is difficult from the point of the layman to understand why a road that was just reconstructed a year ago and that furnished practically the only satisfactory main artery from London to the north, is now to be destroyed without apparent rea-

Wright, who was then city engineer, undertook improvements, and built one of the very finest roads to the city limits.
