## TORRENT OF BOMBS DROPPED ON BASES OF FOE'S U-BOATS

Many Tons of Explosives Thrown By British Aircraft Into Ostend, Zeebrugge and Bruges

London, June 1, 5 p.m. - Many tons of bombs have been dropped by British aircraft on the Belgian towns of Ostend, Zeebrugge and Bruges, says an official statement issued this afternoon by the British war department.

#### BERLIN REPORTS IT.

Berlin, June 1 .- Via London .- Heavy gun firing last night reached a stage of great intensity in the region of the dunes on the Belgian coast and in the Ypres bend, particularly in the Wytschaete sector, says the official statement issued today by the German army headquarters staff.

The text of the official British announcement says: "Several raids were carried out by naval aircraft from Dunkirk in the course flast night, the objectives being Ostend, Zeebrugge and Bruges.
"Many tons of bombs were dropped on the objectives, with good results. In every case all our machines returned safely.

Gazing at the tempting loaf one could not blame him from giving expression to his feeling of pride But he did not give credit, in public, to the baker, but to the flour.

The whole tenor of Chatham's argument, as exemplified in this loaf, is equal to the best or a little better, and Chatham, being accustomed to good flour, should know.

# How the Military Draft Will Affect the U.S.A.

Tuesday, June 5, 1917, will be Registration Day under the selective draft law. It is expected that it will give the United States Government a list of 10,000,000 men (including those who have taken out first citizenship papers) of ages ranging from twenty-one to thirty years. From this list the first 500,000 men of the new national army will be selected to begin training about September 1.

#### D. Rizow, Minister to Berlin, Makes Concrete Proposals.

PETROGRAD, May 21-via London, June 1.-Maxim Gorky, the noted Russian author, publishes a sensational acount of an endeavor by D. Rizow, the Bulgarian minister at Berlin, to inveigle him into clandestine negotiations for a separate peace. In the Novaia Zhizn, of which Gorky is the editor, he prints Rizow's secret dispatch, occupying three columns, with concrete peace proposals, and, although he himself is an almost fanatical advocate of peace, denounces Rizow.

Rizow thereupon makes the following concrete proposal:

Russia to conclude an immediate armistice with her foes, both belligerents retaining their present fronts, and to summon immediately a Russian constituent assembly with the aim of deciding on peace or war. This, says Rizow, is the only means to save the Russian revolution from disaster. He invites Gorky to meet him at Stockholm or some other Swedish town, or, if that is impossible, to send a representative, who must be a Russian of authority. He invites Gorky to acknowledge the dispatch and appoint a meeting place by telegraph to a certain Grekoff residing it. Stockholm and suggests that he conceal his identity by signing it with his chirstian name "Alexi," or by the name "Max." In his newspaper Maxim Gorky characterizes Rizow's dispatch at base and stupid and declares that his only reply will be its publication.

#### FATHER AND MOTHER CHARGED WITH MURDER OF LITTLE DAUGHTER

Child Was Strangled by Placing Sawdust in Mouth and Nose.

Melrose, Mass., June 1 .- Joseph Wakein and his wife were arrested early today charged with the murder of their 7-year-old daughter Loretta a year ago today. Pending a hearing in the district court, the authorities declined to discuss their reasons for causing the ar-ests to be made at this time. It was rests to be made at this time. It was learned, however, that when District Attorney Tufts of Middlesex County assumed office this year, he thought that a renewed investigation should be made in an effort to clear the mystery of the death of the little girl, who was strangled, according to the medical examiner's report, by sawdust or a cereal stuffed in her nose and mouth. An assistant district attorney was directed statuted in her hose and mouth. An assistant district attorney was directed to look into the facts, and as a result, found evidence which he considered warranted the arrest of the child's parents. The Wakelin home is in a lonely section of the city. On the morning of the murder Loretta was sent home by her school teacher to get a hook. Sho her school teacher to get a book. She did not return to school, and later in the day her father found her body in the woods a mile from his house. Several arrests were made, but the inquest did not develop sufficient evidence to enable the authorities to bring anyone to trial.

#### MUST RULE BELGIUM. VON BISSING'S POLICY UNTIL HIS LAST HOUR

Copenhagen, Via London, June 1 .-The late Governor General Bissing of The late Governor General Bissing of Belgium maintained until the day of his death his belief in the necessity of the complete annexation of Belgium to Germany. German advocates of moderate peace have been asserting that von Bissing changed the views he expressed in the memorandum he addressed to the emperor advocating annexation. This is disproved by a letter written by you Bissing on January 14 to the Reichstag deputy, Dr. Stresemann.

In this letter General von Bissing be ruled and exploited interest. He chides thos thinkers who wish to con

"superficial thinkers who wish to content themselves with guarantees of a paper nature or who consider the Meuse line an adequate frontier, a line which can never constitute the frontier which we need."

Von Bissing goes on to say that the frontier, needed to protect Belgium against England and France, must be advanced as far as conceivable northward, and that the coast is and must be part of that frontier. The governor-general declared that his entire policy had been guided by this idea and that he had labored secretly but steadily to build up "connections" to support this program. He added that if these secret connections were maintained he hoped the time would come when Germany would be compensated through Belgium for her great sacrifices in the war.

#### PHONE EMPLOYEES OF MANITOBA ACCEPT THE ARBITRATORS' AWARD

Winnipeg, June 1.—The strike of the Manitoba Government telephone operators and plant men has been averted by their acceptance of the recommendations of the board of arbitration, which was submitted last evening. The employees were demanding an increase in wage rates and better working conditions, the operators asking a minimum wage of \$40 per month, and the plant men a 25 per cent increase. The finding of the board gives the operators their demands in full, while the plant men are awarded an increase of 18½ per cent. The report also recommends an eight-hour day, with two weeks' holidays each year with pay.

HOUSEKEEPING IS A BUSINESS. ECONOMICAL COOKING IS A SCIENCE.

BY ISOBEL C. ARMSTRONG. An indication of the place of importance which the subject of food holds at the present time in the minds of the thinking people of Canada is revealed by the prominence given to the discussion of the various phases of food conservation at the National Unity, or "Win-the-War" convention of last week in Montreal.

Montreal.

The "best thought" of the provinces which make up the Dominion, as represented at the convention, for promoting national unity and considering ways and means of more effectively prosecuting the war, considered the following resolution with regard to national food control:

That the convention urges upon the Government of Canada the prompt appointment of a national food controller, whose duties shall be among others as follows:

(1) To fix and control food and fuel prices where desirable.

(2) To encourage and protect the producer by guaranteeing minimum prices for food products.

(3) To prescribe regulations to govern the production and distribution of these commodities, and, if necessary, to requisition the producing factories, mines or other establishments.

(4) To compel holders of necessaries to release them in amounts insuring equitable distribution.

(5) To require railroads to give preference to the movement of necessaries. (6) To forbid the export of any foodstuffs from Canada except upon license for each proposed exportation, such license to be granted only in case the said foodstuffs are not needed by the Government for itself or for its allies, and

(7) To impose limitations or prohibitions upon the use of grain and other foodstuffs in the manufacture of alcoholic beverages."

MOTHERS' CLUB TO SEND RESOLUTION.

The resolution quoted was discussed at a meeting of the executive of the London Union Mothers' Club this week, with the result that it was decided to submit practically the same resolution, with additional clauses, on Monday evening next to the annual meeting of the club, which largely represents the housewives of the city. It is proposed to forward the resolution as approved to Premier Borden. The "educational clauses" will include one urging the Government to take immediate steps to insure an adequate supply of seed for the whole Dominion for 1918.

#### CANNING WITHOUT SUGAR.

With housecleaning out of the way and the garden progressing nicely, the ention of the housewife turns to the next important item on the year's pro-

With housecleaning out of the way and the garden progressing nicely, the attention of the housewife turns to the next important item on the year's program, the storing away of fruits and vegetables during the harvest season as supplies for the remainder of the year.

Empty jars have been filled with pineapple, pineapple and rhubarb, and with the humble pie-plant itself. In a few weeks the annual procession of small fruits will begin and from then until late autumn there will be continual opportunity afforded for augmenting stores.

Never in the history of the Dominion was there such necessity for the conservation of all resources. Never was there a time when the demand was so imperative that nothing, not even a small basket of fruit, should be allowed to go to waste. In the face of this, the price of sugar has advanced until more than one housewife has been heard to say, "I don't know how I am going to be able to afford to put down fruit this summer." Just at this point a prominent physician of London, who is interested in economics as well as in science, comes along with this suggestion:

consisting of London, who is interested in economics as well as in science, come long with this suggestion:

"Why use sugar at all for preserving? Sugar, indeed, is not a preservative, Probably it will surprise a number of the good house-keepers of London to know that in adding sugar to the fruit for preserving they are supplying food for the germs of fermentation. Moreover, it is not an economical way of using sugar. Our ordinary white granulated sugar is a pure cane sugar, the sweetest of sugars. Boiled any length of time, especially with fruit acids, it changes to glucose, which has only about 40 per cent of the sweetness of cane sugar. A much larger amount of came sugar is required to sweeten fruit at the canning time than when added just as the fruit is to be used. Saving half the amount of sugar is surely an important consideration when the sugar is double the price it was some years ago. Many women who always add sugar to applesauce or rhubarb just as it is cooked have never thought of applying the same principle to the preserving of their fruit for storing away. From an economical standpoint, there are four objections to the use of sugar for canning.

SUGAR NOT A PRESERVATIVE. At present prices \$10 would be nearer the mark at a moderate

average of \$10 worth of sugar for preserving fruit this summer. That will mean \$100,000 worth of sugar locked up in preserved fruit for three, six to twelve months. Canning fruit without sugar has the balance largely in its favor on the economic side. Further than this, there is no scientific reason why sugar should be added."

A further argument for canning without sugar is advanced by another advocate of this method, as follows: "The addition of sugar and subsequent heating affect the delicate flavor of some fruits and give others a distinctly different taste."

The physician who so strongly champions the cause of canning without sugar on economic grounds gives this suggestion for sweetening the fruit at the time it is required for use:

"Make a syrup as thick as desired and add it to the fruit."

A question was put to the doctor which is probably puzzling a number of readers: "But wouldn't the process of making the syrup cause the sugar to deteriorate in sweetening power?" His reply was: "Not for boiling the length of time required to make the syrup. The change in form of the sugar would not begin to take place under five minutes."

"MEDICHS" APPROVES CKIM MILL.

#### "MEDICUS" APPROVES SKIM MILK.

"Medicus," who from time to time has contributed valuable scientific information to Our Consumers' League department, says this week:

"I was heartily in sympathy with the article in your column a few weeks ago, drawing attention to the high food value of skim milk and advocating its more general use. What is the object of the present movement for food conservation? Simply and solely the conservation of life. With the ranks of humarity depleted as they have been in the war, conservation of life and reduction of infant mortality boom even more important than ever before. Under the circumstances, a fact which I am going to state should be of interest not only to parents of small children, but to every patriotic citizen of Canada.

"EXPERIMENT HAS PROVED CONCLUSIVELY THAT THE USE OF SKIM MILK FOR FEEDING CHILDREN HAS BEEN RESPONSIBLE FOR A DECREASE IN THE DEATH RATE OF CHILDREN.

"Cream upsets the baby's stomach, and in my experience cases have come under my observation where babies have begun to thrive only when put on a skim milk diet. The fat has been responsible for vomiting and many cases of diarrhoea are caused by excessive fats.

"A growing child requires more protein, weight for weight, than an adult. Protein goes to build up bone and muscle. The protein in milk is found in the curds of skim milk. "Medicus," who from time to time has contributed valuable scientific infor-

"The greatest growth is during the first year or two of life, hence the importance of supplying sufficient of the protein, or building stones, in digestible form. A baby that has not been doing well on whole milk will show marked improvement when a change is made in the diet to skim milk. Many mothers are hard to convince that the best food for their children is not to be found in the cream. My advice would be to take the fat and make butter and feed the family with the skim milk.

"The child going to school needs protein, and the only source of protein for the body is to be found in protein food. Eats may be obtained from carbohydrates, but protein alone can supply protein. The growth of the child depends in a large measure upon the nature of the food.

ADDING A CUBIT TO THE STATURE.

"Is it possible to add a cubit to a boy's stature? An experiment tried some years ago in Boston would indicate that the boy can take his choice, whether he is going to be short and stunted, tall and thin, or a happy medium.

"The Boston experiment consisted in feeding white mice tryptophan. On this they grew short and portly as aldermen. Feeding them on lysine, the protein found in skim milk, it was found that they grew long and thin. Similar results were obtained in trying the experiment on hogs.

"When the farmer feeds his pigs skim milk, which contains lysine, he must also give them corn, in which is to be found the tryptophan protein, in order that they may develop to conform to the required standard for pigs.

"Why not exercise similar care and intelligence in the feeding for development of children?"

#### HAD HER FINGER IN THE PIE.

The United States Government has passed a bill authorizing an exhaustive food census. The bill includes appropriations for more than \$17,000,000 for the food survey and increasing production. The amendment provides that "the secretary of agriculture shall, so far as is practicable, engage the services of women for the work herein provided for."

This "forehandedness" has come to be almost instinct, the result of years of experience, with the seasons coming in their appointed order. But a new order has arisen, as a result of war conditions. Seasons continue in their appointed course, but the war order demands still greater exercise of vigilance today, that there may be no famine tomorrow.
