DOUKHOBORS AGREE TO SELL ALL LANDS WHEN VETERANS IN WEST **NEGOTIATIONS** A HAND IN

Peter Veregin, Leader of Colonies, Signs an Agreement at Grand Forks, B. C., in Which His Followers Promise To Dispose of All Lands To Government For Use as Soldiers' Settlements.

Grand Forks, B. C., April 12 .- Returned soldiers yesterday took a hand in the fight of the Grand Forks reconstruction board to secure the Doukhobor lands in Canada for soldler settlement, and went in a body to Interview Peter Veregin, head of the Doukhobor communities.

At the suggestion of the returned veterans, the Doukhobor leader, In the presence of 500 of his followers in the chapel of the colony here, signed an agreement to sell to the government all Doukhobor lands in Canada, or to sell their lands in British Columbia and remove to more remote parts of the Dominion. This was the climax to a series of sensations which have followed each other in their train since the arrival of the Doukhobor chief in the district last Tuesday.

Doukhobor lands here embrace nearly 5,000 acres of the choicest land in the valley, and, according to Peter Veregin, produced last year a surplus of over 100 carloads of food products to feed Doukhobors in other communities.

Chairman Drayton Says Matter of Time the Country Shall Observe Belongs to Parli ament, and Sends It There-Daylight-Saving Time Is Adopted For the House of Commons Sittings After Judgment Is Announced.

OTTAWA, April 11.—"Daylight saving is a matter for Parliament, and the board having no jurisdiction, cannot pass upon the merits of the issue one way or the other," says Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the railway board, in a judgment handed down today.

Fellowing the judgment of the railway commission on daylight saving, Parliament this evening adopted local time for the sittings of the House. Just before the House adjourned, Hon. Arthur Meighen, who was leading the Government, rose and stated that the effect of the judgment was that the setting of standard or local time was a matter for provincial jurisdiction. That being the case, he suggested that the House, when it adjourned tonight, should meet again at 3 o'clock summer time on Monday.
