BRITISH GO AHEAD DESPITE STIFFENED DEFENCE OF FOE

German Concrete-and-Steel Shelter For Machine Gun Crew

GERMAN'S BITTER ATTACK WAS BROKEN BY BAYONET AND FIRE

With the British Armies Afield, April 16.—British troops fought their way forward in the outskirts of St. Quentin and Lens today. Just north of St. were flerecely fighting against German defenders, and slowly encircling the coal city. The Germans fought desperately, while in the town itself they strove frantically to remove guns and supplies.

Again early today Germans threw two more strong attacks at British posi-tions at Monchy-le-Preux. Both failed. The British artillery, concentrated in a devastating fire, slaughtered the massed attacking forces of the Teutons.

CAPTURE OF VIMY

British Pield Headquarters, April 16.—The British apparently would like to take Lens without inflicting to it to great damage from ex-tensive bombardment. They have always been in a position to reduce the city to ',ins, but the shells have been directed against selected spots known to be used for military purposes by the Germans. Never-theless the Germans continue their work of destroying the city by blowing up buildings.

A Bitter Attack.

Further details of the fighting yesterday show the desperate character of several German attacks on the new British positions. The attack which was essayed from both sides of Queant and temporarily pierced the British line at Lagni-court was exceptionally bitter. It began at 4:30 o'clock Sunday morning and continued for three hours without interruption. Britadvanced posts were driven in but the support units joined the

issue with the Germans.

Hand to Hand. Many hand-to-hand encounters followed. There was also more actually aimed rifle shooting than for many months. During this fire the Germans fell in clumps. They attempted to seek cover behind bushes and in small thickets. The British fired into these with good results. When the reserves came up at last the Germans broke into full flight.

British Headquarters in Field, April 16.—There has been notable air fighting over Monchy, and many machines have been brought down there in the last two days. Large German formations have attacked the British scouts and the patter of machine guns overhead has been almost continuous during the daylight hours. The Germans as a rule are careful air fighters, and virtually never attack unless they outnumber the British three or four to one. A single German machine is seldom sighted. They have come to be known as "gang air fighters," but their tactics of lying in wait high above the fleety clouds and darting upon an isolated foe does not perturb the British fliers. The British continue to police the air, not only behind therown front, but far into German territory, and say they naturally suffer the same casualties as a police force would from encountering ambushed attacks from outlaws. 

Germans Cling Desperately to Lens Until Engineers Destroy Mines and Factories---"Three Savages" Position Near St. Quentin Taken---Large Captures of Guns and War Material Made in the Lens Region.

THE WAR SITUATION

London, April 16 .- Although British patrols have been in the streets of Lens, and General Haig's men are in the outskirts of St. Quentin, the fall of neither of these towns has as yet been officially announced, The Germans, it is apparent, have sent in their reserves, and are making a desperate defence to enable their engineers to complete the destruction of the mines and factories of Lens, which might have been

Despite the fact that all along the line between Lens and St. Quentin the German resistance has stiffened, General Haig reports today the capture of Villeret, which straightens his line northwest of St. Quentin, and announces further progress to the northwest of Lens. Counterattacks which the Germans have launched at Monchy and Lagnicour suggest that the British are approaching dangerously near the German line, which according to unofficial accounts, the Germans had not had time to complete before the British offensive was launched.



If the employees of all London's factories respond as readily to the call for volunteers to help the farmers as the men of the Greene-Swift Company did last evening, there will be no labor scarcity at seeding time. A few seconds after a call was made at the meeting last evening almost 20 per cent of the 250 men present were on their feet. The firm's employees were entertained at a supper last night and at its conclusion firm's employees were entertained at a supper last night, and at its conclusion Mr. S. Frank Glass, M. P., was introduced by Mr. Greene, and asked to present the claims of the greater production committee of London and its relation to the enlistment of labor to assist in the work of seeding on the farms.

sist in the work of seeding on the farms.

Mr. Glass said the meeting was unique and possibly the first one of its kind held within the province to promote the worthy object greater production. At the present time only such men as had experience in farm work would be useful for the purposes now pressing, that of seeding and preparation of the land for crops. It might be that not many of them had had such experience, but it was impossible to suppose that there were not some present who might not qualify and materially be of assistance.

Mr. Glass briefly reviewed the world's condition in regard to food suppoles, with ten countries on short rations, and six others practically on the verge of starvation, with 60.000,000 men withdrawn from production and labor, either fighting in the trenches or manufacturing materials and supplies of war, the constantly decreasing supplies of food necessarily followed.

He said it was the pressing duty of Canada to strain every nerve and exert power for greater production. The man who works on the farm, he pointed out, is working for his country, and patriotism should be an inspiration for every man to do his bit so far as may be in his power.

The Government of the province had established a bureau of labor in London, at present conducted in the office of the district agricultural representative at No. 15 Dominion Savings Building. This bureau was to be a permanent institution, and would be a kind of clearing house for all kinds of labor. It had for its object the mobilizing of labor, as well as its distribution—in other words, placing those seeking employment in touch with employers. It would serve a useful purpose to both employer and employee. Applications from all over Western Ontario were coming in dally for help, some 40 having been received Friday. He was glad to be able to say that there was a ready demand for all labor offering, and both men and boys were being sent out to satisfy the calls for help.
