

Beginning west of Pless on the Vistula River, and running west of Gleiwitz, west of Tost and Gross-Strehlitz, north to between Rosenborg and Kreuzberg, and thence to the frontier of Northern Upper Silesia.

IRON AND STEEL PRODUCTION IN CANADA INCREASES

Ottawa, Aug. 9.—The production of iron and steel in Canada has shown a continued increase for the month of June, according to the monthly report published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics,

Six blast furnaces were operated during the month of June, an increase of one over May. The output of iron for the first six months of 1921 was 309,206 tons, as compared with 449,810 tons for the same period of 1920, a decréase of about 69 per cent.

The total amount of steel made in the first six months of 1921 was 395,140 tons, as against 547,000 tons made in the same period of 1920.







Crops in Saskatchewan.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 8. — (By Canadian Press.)—Unusually heavy rains during the last week have interrupted cutting operations, especially in the southern control of Markoba and Saskatchanan

operations, especially in the southern sections of Manitoba and Saskatchewan, where it had become fairly general, says the weekly crop report of the Canadian Pacific Railway, issued today. The report further says:

"Due to various causes, chiefly drought the crop is a most uneven one at present, and recent damage by hail and rust has contributed to reduce expectations of a few weeks ago. Weather is now cool and clear over the West, and harvesting should resume at once. "In Manitoba there is snoticeable damage by rust, and saw-fly is working some fields, although advanced crops ready for harvesting will not be affected as later grain. Some light damage has been done to odd fields by the hail, but not extensive.



The Hon. Arthur Meighen made his debut on his seturn to the stage of Canadian politics in the triple role of optimist, prophet and apologist. As an pumist Mr. Meighen is not at all convincing. He lacks that power of carrying his audience with him, which is the natural heritage of great actors. Fresh from the invigorating atmosphere of the Imperial Conference, we expected something better from the Premier of Canada than the mere expression of opinion that "those who lament about Canada have not seen much of other countries in these times."

It is small consolation when a man has got a black eye to tell him that some other fellow has got What other countries does Mr. Meighen mean? Does he refer to ravaged Belgium or desolated France? Does he imply that Great Britain is still weltering under her wounds, without hope of recovery? The stest news from that quarter is that Britain is bravely acing her responsibilities and is slowly getting on her feet again. But if the premier alludes to ragged Serbia or starving Russia, grammercy for his com-

Canada, too, has had her wounds and her scars, but she takes her stand in the world not as a nation that has been weakened by misfortune, but se one that has been made stronger by her sacrifices. She only awaits someone to lead her back to the promsed land of prosperity, and Mr. Meighen knows in his heart of hearts that he will never be that one.

Nevertheless he calmly usurps the mantle of Moses, Does he expect that the hash of which he has conocted his cabinet pudding at Ottawa will be palatable the people of Canada all that time? It is already nouldy, stale, evil-smelling and repulsive to the apetite, and the people are sick of it.




