




### LONDON HAS ONE OF ONTARIO'S PIONEER EXHIBITION BUILDINGS

Built About 1849, It Is Still in a Fairly Good State of Preservation-Mr. Samuel McBride Was an Exhibitor at the First Fair Held in It—Some Reminiscences.

Probably the oldest exhibition building in Ontario today stands in the city of London. It is situated on property owned by Mr. Alex. Harvey, sen., of Talbot street, standing back in a field north of Oxford street, immediately east of the Oxford street bridge.

Nobody appears to know for a certainty just what year the old building was erected, but it was built, it is mought, some time about 1840. For 50-years or more it has remained idle, but to this day it stands square and erect in the field, and if left alone will probably weather it out for another 50 or 60 For some time last year the place was used for a glue factory, but that industry has been removed to another location, and the building is idle

early days when London was a vHage, the old structure did service as a main building on the exhibition grounds, and the place was looked up to mightily in those times. In London there still lives a gentleman who was an exhibitor in the building the first time a fair was held in it, and this man is Mr. Sam Mc-Bride, who was a prominent merchant of London 60 years ago.



This pioneer says that old and all as the old fair building is, it was not the first building erected in London for exhibition purposes. Mr. McBride says that the first exhibition London knew was held on the ground now occupied by the Grand Trunk Railway for roundhouse and other purposes, one or two exhibitions being held on that sitt, when the exhibition grounds was changed to where the old building stands on the Harvey property. For a short time the annual fair took place there, when the exhibition grounds were once again removed to the location north of Victoria Park, which was in the standard property. in those days known as the barracks grounds, British regulars being quartered there for many years. And latterly, as is known to most Londoners, the exhibition grounds were changed to Queen's Park, or the

doners, the exhibition grounds were changed to Queen's Park, or the place some people will remember as being called Salter's Grove.

Mr. McBride laughed as he retailed the exhibitions which were held in the early forties in the old building up north. In those days London boasted of probably 1,200 or 1,500 people, and such things as manufacturing concerns were unknown. The exhibits, consequently, consisted almost totally of agricultural products — vegetables, grain, pigs and cattle being the attraction to draw the people. There were, of course some small manufacturers in Ontario at the time, but as there were no railways and all goods had to be shipped laborious. as there were no railways, and all goods had to be shipped laboriously from place to place in wagons, none of the manufacturers were willing to stand the expense of exhibiting in London, where the market was small. 



And there have been other drawbacks. The consumption of fuel has been necessarily greater than for very many years. The shipping trade has been almost prohibited. The snow blockade has been particularly hard on the florists, and very little has gone out of the city from local florists. The chief flowers kept back by the lack of sunshine, and for the other reasons, blooming plants.
