A SLAP AT LAURIERISM IN COUNTY OF QUEBEC

Amyot, Government Candidate, Defeated In a Hard Fought bye-Election

Liberal Party Split Blamed as the Cause—Henri Bourassa M. P. Leads Revolt

Quebec, Oct. 24.—After one of the keenest political contests known to the Quebec district, the bye-election in Quebec County to fill the federal vacancy caused by the elevation of Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick to the chief justiceship resulted yesterday in the election of Lorenzo Robitaille (Independent Liberal) by a majority of 447 votes over George E. Amyot, the Government nominee.

The majorities by polls was as follows:
Robitaille—Beaupre 514, Charlesbourg 48, Sillery 32, Ancienne Lorette 12, St. Foye 3; total 609.
Amyot—St. Armand 30, Lorette 34, Cap Rouge 27, Valcartier 34, Lake Beauport 13, Towlesbury 30, Stoneham 24; total 162.

Majority for Robitaille 447.

Other numbers on the program were piano selections by Mr. White and vocal selections by Geo. Gant, who brought down the house with his "Laughing Song."

OLD WOMEN DIE

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 24.—Mrs. Jennette Falkner of London, Ont., is dead at the home of one of her sons in Fairview.

Mrs. Falkner, who was 70 years of age, had lived the greater part of her life in London. Next door to her lived Mrs. Kinsella, 69 years of age. The women had been close friends for years, and each had said she would not survive the death of the other.

Upon one of Mrs. Falkner's sons telephoning to relatives in London of the death of his mother, he was told that Mrs. Kinsella had died very suddenly only six hours before.

The funerals of the two will be held in London on the same day, and they will be buried in adjoining lots in the same cemetery.

ORIGIN OF SMALL-POX

Dr. Storey, M. H. O. for the Township of Harwich, Monday investigated conditions on the outskirts of the city, in his township. Some people living in that vicinity, it is believed, were responsible for many of the recent small-pox outbreaks. As they were living outside of the city limits, the local health department could not take steps to isolate the cases. A woman who had been visiting friends in the section mentioned, is said to have brought the disease from Michigan.

Dr. Storey had the houses disinfected, and will keep an eye on the locality.

A quiet wedding took place on Wednesday, Oct. 17th, at the William St. Baptist parsonage, when Elijah Maine and Miss Gessie Travis were united in marriage by Rev. Mr. Hoyt.

After the wedding ceremony the happy couple returned to the home of the groom's parents, 5th concession, Raleigh, where a number of guests awaited them, and all partook of a well prepared wedding feast. After spending the evening the young couple left for their home in the Alexandra Block, King St., amid showers of rice and congratulations.

He has opened a barber shop in this city, and his many friends wish him much success in his new venture, and a happy and prosperous married life.

A STRONG CANDIDATE

The Toronto News says of J. W. Plewes, who is now running for a position on the Educational Council: "Mr. J. W. Plewes, who is the present Public and Model school representative on the Educational Council, is Principal of Chatham Model school, which has a staff of twenty-six teachers.

"His career began in Middlesex, his native county. Since then he has been successively Principal's Assistant at London Model school, Principal of Wallaceburg Public and Convent school, and since 1900 Principal of Chatham Model school. He has held every position in the gift of the teachers of two counties, and was a member of the special committee to consider the reorganization of training schools. Last year Mr. Plewes was appointed to the Educational Council by the Ontario Cabinet, and has been a very prominent member. Although Mr. Plewes has held almost every kind of position in the Public schools, he is a young man, in fact the youngest of the nominees."

Gordon Boles Gives Advice On The Spraying of Trees

Well Known Expert Who has Made a Study of the San Jose Scale says that Spraying Should be Done During Winter Months—A Good Solution

The following letter is self explanatory:
To the Editor Chatham Planet:
Sir,—Seeing by a late issue of The Planet, that the Dominion Government is not going to send into the county their "spray motor" until the spring, I take the liberty of suggesting to those who wish to rid their trees of the San Jose scale, to cut back all their unweedy tall trees and treat as follows (this is for winter use only):
Lime, 40 pounds.
Sulphur, 20 pounds.
Water to make 60 gallons.
Boil two hours with a small quantity of water, then dilute to 60 gallons with boiling water.
Do not let this mixture become cold. Spray while yet warm.
Of course for small gardens a smaller quantity would only be needed, but the above formula must be used in proportion to size of place. I have used this with most telling effect, in fact after this winter treatment I never had to give but one spraying with kerosene emulsion in the spring, and in many cases, on small trees, it was done more as a precautionary measure. Spraying is just as much a part of fruit culture as pruning and cultivating. No fruit of marketable value can be grown for any length of time if a "slipshod" "take the chances" plan is carried out.

ANOTHER BANK SENSATION IS SPRUNG IN TORONTO

Charges of Fraud are Laid Against the Managers of Farmers' Bank

Writ is Issued by Several Shareholders and a Receiver is Asked For

Toronto, Oct. 24.—While on his wedding tour last week, John N. Spurr, of this city, met Holly G. Shepard, of West Bay City, on the train. Mr. Shepard will be remembered in St. Thomas as the gentleman who put on a couple of excellent minstrel shows under the auspices of the Talbot Club and 25th Regiment, respectively, and Mr. Spurr took a prominent part in the productions.

Mr. Shepard casually remarked to Mr. Spurr that he was on his wedding tour, having married Miss Anna Dark, of West Bay City, the young lady pianist who was with Mr. Shepard in St. Thomas. After a quiet smoke in the smoking car, Mr. Spurr invited Mr. Shepard to come into the other coach and receive an introduction to Mrs. Spurr, his own bride. This was particularly amusing, as Mr. Shepard had just been advising Mr. Spurr that it was time he was entering matrimony.

Mr. Shepard is also known in this city as a minstrel producer.

Toronto, Oct. 24.—Before the Farmers' Bank of Canada has actually started to do business a writ has been issued against it at Osgoode Hall, and the court has been asked to appoint a receiver.

Fraud and misrepresentation on the part of the agents of the bank is alleged, and the prospectus is also called in question.

The bank has now \$175,000 of its \$1,000,000 capital stock subscribed, but before it can get its charter or begin business it must have a quarter of a million subscribed.

Plaintiffs and Defendants.
John Sproatt, George Castle, W. A. Dixon, Wm. McLean, Finlay McCullum, Robt. Hume, James Murray, Geo. Denoon, John McLeod, James Shuert, and Wm. Harris sue on behalf of themselves and all other persons alleged to be subscribers for shares of the capital stock of the Farmers' Bank of Canada. The defendants are the Farmers' Bank, Jos. Gallagher, John Watson, John Ferguson, Alex. Fraser, Alex. E. Low, W. R. Travers, C. H. Smith, A. G. H. Luxton, W. J. Lindsay.

The plaintiffs dispute the validity of alleged contracts to take shares in the capital stock of the bank. They claim they were induced to subscribe for shares through fraud and misrepresentation. They ask that these contracts be declared void, and demand an accounting of all promissory notes received on behalf of the provisional directors of the bank.

The Bank's Side.
Mr. W. R. Travers, the general manager, made the following statement yesterday:

"The Farmers' Bank of Canada today, through their general manager, W. R. Travers, deposited with the Bank of Montreal \$250,000 for the credit of the Receiver-General, in accordance with section 13 of the Bank Act. And notice has been given in The Canada Gazette of a meeting of the shareholders for Nov. 26, 1906."

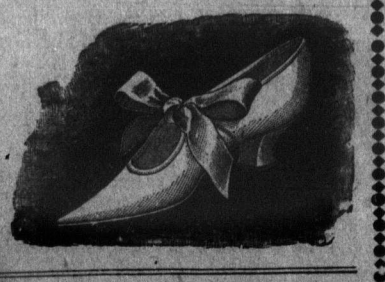

Household Hints For Women

A Column Specially Prepared By The Planet For The Busy Housewives of Chatham and Vicinity.

HOUSEHOLD SUGGESTIONS.

It is necessary at all times to keep the drain pipes in good condition, especially where the plumbing is old.

Native East Indian cooks are said to use the following method to distinguish edible fungi from poisonous foodstuffs.

It is said that lettuce has apterly in it that tends to soothe the alimentary canal and the entire nervous system.

When butter does not melt at a temperature of 95 degrees it is because it is adulterated with something like suet.

It is said that the green crown at the top of a pineapple should be taken off if the fruit is not to be used immediately, as otherwise it will absorb the flavor and juice of the fruit.

Take an old teakettle, cut the bottom out and place over irons that are being heated on a gas or kerosene stove.

Most crackers should be placed in a hot oven for a few minutes just before using. A little butter and a crusting in the oven makes quite a different flavor.

It is not good economy to cook the same things day after day. Study up new dishes and serve them daintily; use up all the left-overs; and put bits of bread, cereals, mashed potatoes, or anything of the sort in your griddle cakes, and they will be greatly improved.

If a drop of olive oil is rubbed on dinner knives before putting them away they will keep their brightness, and will not rust.

A little flour spread over the top of cakes before they are iced will prevent the icing from running off.

Where there is great affliction from mosquitoes the following remedy may be appreciated: Put some insect powder on a coarse plate.

Put the plate on an inverted tin pan in the centre of the room. Set fire to the insect powder, then close the door and open all the windows. The smoke will send outdoors all the mosquitoes and also flies.

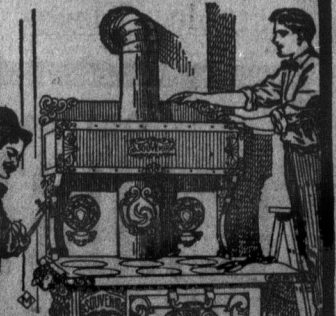

LAMONT IS GIVEN SEAT

Three Judges Appointed by Lib. Government Decide In His Favor

CASE MAY BE APPEALED

Regina, Sask., Oct. 23.—The controverted election law is not in force.

That is the decision reached in the Supreme Court sitting yesterday afternoon and the ruling of Judge Prendergast is therefore sustained.

The appeal was on the decision in the petition against Hon. J. H. Lamont in Prince Albert.

The court divided before coming to a conclusion and when all decisions were read it was found that Judges Wetmore and Scott were for quashing the decision of Judge Prendergast and allowing the hearing of election protests, while Judges Sifton, Newlands and Harvey were of opinion that the appeal should be quashed.

The last three judges are appointees of the Liberal Government, while the former two judges, Wetmore and Scott, were appointed by the old Conservative Government.

Five decisions were read out before the final result was known and each judge made his finding on a different ground.

The result of the decision is that 16 protests against the return of members of the Legislative Assembly charged with bribery and corruption are held in abeyance and cannot be brought to court for a fair hearing.

Feeling was running high in Regina last night and on the street there is almost as much excitement as when the election was held.

It is said that an appeal will be made to the Supreme Court of Canada.

MUST BE TRIED AGAIN.

Judgment in "Thin Red Line" Case Is Reserved.

Winnipeg, Oct. 23.—Lawrence Duggan, returning officer at Selkirk in the Dominion elections of 1904, must go to trial again.

At a sitting of the Appeal Court yesterday, the decision of Judge Perdue, withdrawing the case from the jury, was reversed. The court orders that the plea of not guilty must be set aside, and that Duggan, who is accused of what is known as the "thin red line" case, of having erased, or caused to be erased, the names of persons entitled to vote on the lists of the Dominion election, must go to trial again.

C. P. R. Extends.

Woodstock, Oct. 23.—It is reported from an authoritative source that the Canadian Pacific Railway will build from Woodstock to Brantford next spring. Surveys have already been made, and the necessary expenditure estimated and provided for by the company. The Canadian Pacific is making many extensions in Western Ontario.

Canadians Beat U. S. Rivals.

Montreal, Oct. 23.—The Canada Foundry Co. of Toronto has been awarded a large portion of a 20,000-ton contract for structural steel by the C. P. R. The steel is for bridges in Ontario. The Dominion Bridge Co. also secured a part of the contract. The Canada Foundry Co. bested bids of a number of large American companies.

Octogenarian Dead From Injuries.

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 23.—The Rev. Christopher J. Donigan, who fell with the bleacher stand at New Star Park during the Syracuse-Colgate game on Saturday, died yesterday afternoon. His back was broken. Father Donigan was 80 years old.

Drown In Building Foundation.

Detroit, Oct. 23.—For the foundation of the new Ford 18-story building on Griswold street, nearly 15 caissons or wells, from six to ten feet diameter, and from 150 to 200 feet deep, are being sunk. These wells will be filled with cement forming the piers upon which the structure will rest. Two men, Fred Rush and Laolo Tot, were caught at the bottom of one of the shafts 150 feet below the surface yesterday and drowned like rats.

FOR SMUGGLING JAPS.

Schooner Detained at Victoria—Severe Penalties Under Act. Victoria, B. C., Oct. 23.—The Japanese schooner Sulan Maru is held here for attempting to run a number of Japanese into Canada. Twenty-two Japanese out of fifty-three on board were landed twenty miles from here on Friday. Nine have been apprehended. The detained schooner is liable to confiscation and a fine of \$100 for each man not listed.

Slaughtering Quail. Windsor, Oct. 23.—Farmers coming into town report that a ruthless slaughter of quail is being carried on in Essex County by "pot hunters." The open season does not begin until Nov. 1.

See Captain Suicides. Halifax, N. S., Oct. 23.—Capt. Nelson Payzant, a well-known retired sea captain, committed suicide yesterday by hanging himself. Dependence caused by ill-health, is the supposed cause.

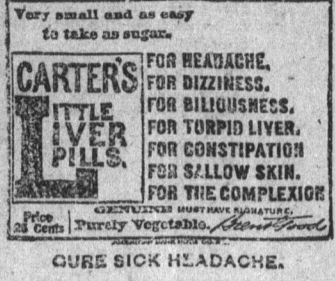

HURRICANE IN HONDURAS.

British Schooner Southern Queen Driven Ashore Goes to Pieces. Mobile, Ala., Oct. 23.—The first news of a terrible hurricane that visited the towns of Ruatan, Tela, Utila, Colorado and El Provenca, Honduras, on Oct. 12, was brought here Sunday night by the Norwegian fruit steamer Harold.

A number of vessels were wrecked, several destroyed and buildings in each of the towns mentioned badly damaged. The loss to the owners of the fruit plantations will, it is stated, reach almost a million dollars. The British schooner Southern Queen was thrown on the beach at Ruatan and went to pieces in less than an hour, and the Harold suffered somewhat and will have to be docked.

A tidal wave accompanied the hurricane and swept everything before it. Capt. Henrychen reports that when he left, the beaches were strewn with vessels of all kinds, including three large sailing vessels. No lives were reported lost.

Twenty Months "Hard Labor."

London, Oct. 23.—The man styling himself as Gerald Morgan, and who claimed to be a member of the Harvard Club, was yesterday sentenced at the Old Bailey to twenty months' hard labor on the charge of obtaining money by fraud.

In Council With the King.

London, Oct. 23.—King Edward held a council at Buckingham Palace at noon yesterday for the transaction of the state business referring to today's reopening of Parliament. The Premier, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, was subsequently received in audience by the King.

Three Months For Wounding.

Goderich, Oct. 23.—Matthew McCrelgion was convicted of unlawfully wounding Joseph Hussey and sentenced to three months in jail. The case was the outcome of a charivari.

Killed In An Elevator.

Winnipeg, Oct. 23.—S. Brookings, a tailor, was instantly killed by being jammed between the elevator and wall at the Modern Laundry yesterday morning.

SPEAKS AT SOO

R. L. Borden Says In Transportation Speech That Government Operation of Railways is Desirable.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Oct. 23.—Before the largest gathering ever assembled under one roof in the Soo, R. L. Borden, leader of the Conservative Opposition at Ottawa, delivered an address last evening.

For Government Operation. The feature of the speech was his declaration of the belief that the Government operation of railways is worth the experiment.

He assailed the Government on its policy with regard to the construction of the new Grand Trunk Pacific, and held that in view of the country guaranteeing nine-tenths of the cost it might as well have taken over the remainder and secured the railroad for the people.

Transportation was the principal theme of the address, and severe criticisms were offered with regard to the management of the Intercolonial. He advocated the extension of that line to the Georgian Bay, so that it could compete with other lines for the western trade, under which conditions he believed it would no longer follow.

Political Purity Is Not a Liberal. He also referred to the question of political purity, and gave the details of a number of the scandals of the Liberal administration.

Dr. Borden arrived in the Soo last evening and all day today was entertained by a committee of the Conservative Association. In the forenoon he was taken about the river for a trip on the steamer Algoma. He viewed the steel works and lunched with a number of political friends at the International.

Parade of 'Soo Cadets.

In the afternoon he took part in the function of opening the new Campbell public school. Previous to the opening of the school, a parade was held of 'Soo Cadets, who formed a guard of honor for the visitor, and the Algonquin Rifles Band.

Last night's meeting was held in the skating rink. Other speakers were W. H. Hearst, A. C. Boyce, M.P.; W. R. Smyth, M.P.P. W. J. Thompson was chairman, and an address from the Young Liberal-Conservative Club was read by C. V. Plummer.

BAPTIST CHURCH DAY.

Peterboro Convention Appoints a Committee On Church Union.

Peterboro, Oct. 23.—Yesterday was church day at the Baptist convention. The first resolution expressed horror at the Congo atrocities and recorded the emphatic protest of the convention at the system of forced labor, which prevails in the Congo Free State, and asking the influence of the Government to put down this injustice.

THE POPE MAY RELENT.

Nice, France, Oct. 23.—While disclaiming to speak on the authority of the Pope, Bishop Chapon in an interview yesterday flatly declared his conviction that if the Church hierarchy, through the Bishops, is given the right by a decision of the Council of State to decide on the resumption of the Catholic associations in France to which Church property may be surrendered a modus vivendi between the Church and the Government is possible, and the Vatican will not insist upon Parliamentary action.

English Regiment For Halifax.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 23.—It is reported in military circles that the West Surrey Regiment will arrive here from England next spring to increase the garrison here. The permanent corps stationed here is 500 men below its complement. As recruits cannot be obtained to bring the garrison up to full strength, a British regiment, it is understood, will again be stationed here.

Fell Into the River.

Kingston, Oct. 23.—Dennis McGuire of Strathcona was found drowned in the Napanee River, near Newburg, on Saturday. He was last seen on Friday night about 10 o'clock. The supposition is that he took the wrong road and fell into the stream. Coroner Leonard of Napanee deemed an inquest unnecessary. Deceased was 65 years of age and unmarried.

Man Badly Scalded.

Owen Sound, Oct. 23.—Sunday morning the Imperial Portland Cement Co.'s mill beds, an employe, Joseph Hooper, was in the boiler-room of the digger when the blow-off pipe burst, enveloping him in a cloud of steam. He was very badly scalded. No fatal results are looked for. Hooper is about 35 years old.

Hon. George Simpson Is Dead.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Oct. 23.—Hon. George Simpson, member of the Provincial Government, died on his farm in Bay View yesterday morning from blood-poisoning. Three days ago his arm was amputated, in the hope of saving his life. Hon. Mr. Simpson represented the first district of Queen's in the local Legislature since 1900. He was born in 1856.

A Hundred Girls Arrive.

Peterboro, Oct. 23.—Over 100 girls arrived at the Barnardo Home yesterday. They are from 8 to 15 years of age. They came over on the Dominion and had a good trip. The girls were in charge of Mr. Owen, superintendent of Barnardo Homes in Canada, and Mrs. Lloyd.

Loan By-Law Carried.

Hespler, Oct. 23.—Hespler is to have another industry. The ratapapras yesterday voted on a by-law to loan the Hespler Machine and Tool Co. \$15,000. It was carried by 245 to 14.

TOILET HINTS.

Frequently Change the Way of Dressing the Hair.

Always dressing the hair in exactly the same way is apt to make it thin in places, and the constant wearing of a frame to raise the hair from the front and sides is also liable to thin it where the wire presses the head. It is wise, therefore, to change the style of dressing for a day or two now and then, dressing it low in the neck to give the hair at the top of the head a rest from constant pressure of pins or frame. Never, if you value your hair, sleep with it dressed as you wear it in the daytime. Always take it down and comb and brush it well, plait it in a loose plait, and let it hang down. Do not fix it by pins during the night.

Complexion Care.

The latest cure for a thick or spotty complexion is to wash it with parsley water. Take half a pint of rain water and soak in it a large bunch of parsley, letting it remain in the water all night. In the morning when you dress rub the face well with a dry cloth, then dip a sponge in the parsley water, and pass the damp sponge over your face, leaving it on without drying it. Do this three times daily, and at the end of a fortnight you will be surprised to see that there are no more spots or roughness on your face.

Face Bath.

When the face is tanned by the sun, bathe it with water in which lemon juice in the quantity of a tablespoonful to half a pint of water has been added. For finger nails that are tender and loose, do not use the nail file or orange stick. To clean them, soak the finger tips in warm olive or sweet oil, wash thoroughly in warm soapsuds, using the nailbrush lightly. If dirt still remains under the nails, remove with a piece of old linen.

Orris root powder dusted over the hair is a good substitute for frequent shampooing. Sprinkle the powder into the hair and rub it well into the scalp, then brush it out. Orris is one of the few powders which may be used for this purpose, as it will not stop the pores. It is cleansing, and will give a faint, sweet odor to the hair.

MADE FUN OF PHARAOH.

The Ancients Evidently Had a Keen Sense of Humor.

The fables of Aesop prove that the ancients were not without a liking for fun, and the remains of ancient art tell the same story. Examples of artistic humor are more common than is supposed by most persons.

A drawing on a tile in the Metropolitan museum, in New York, represents a cat dressed as an Egyptian lady of fashion. She is seated languidly in a chair, slipping wine out of a small bowl and being fanned and offered dainties by an abject looking tomcat, his tail between his legs.

The cat figures largely in the ancient comic groups of animal life. In a papyrus in the British museum a flock of geese are being driven by a cat and a herd of goats by two wolves with crooks and wattle. One of the wolves is playing a double pipe.

There is in the museum of Turin a papyrus roll which displays a whole series of such comical scenes. In the first place a lion, a crocodile and an ape are giving a vocal and instrumental concert. Next comes an ass, dressed, armed and sceptered like a pharaoh. With majestic swagger he receives the gifts presented to him by a cat of high degree, to which a bull acts as proud conductor.

Another picture shows pharaoh in the shape of a rat, drawn in a carriage by prancing greyhounds. He is proceeding to storm a fort garrisoned by cats having no arms but teeth and claws, whereas the rats have battle axes and bows and arrows.

SLEEP AND DIET.

A CUSHION FOR BROOCHEES.

This novel little cushion should find a place on every dressing table and is of use for keeping brooches that for the time are not required in good condition. In the center is a round cushion covered with wash leather, and about this, sewn on at the edges, are four flaps of material lined with chamois leather. The brooches are placed on to this cushion in the ordinary way and then the flaps fold over, the last two tying together with ribbons and thus inclosing the jewelry entirely in a chamois leather covering which should keep it nice and bright. Any pretty material can be used for the exterior of the case, the dimensions of which must be determined by the number of brooches it is intended to contain.
