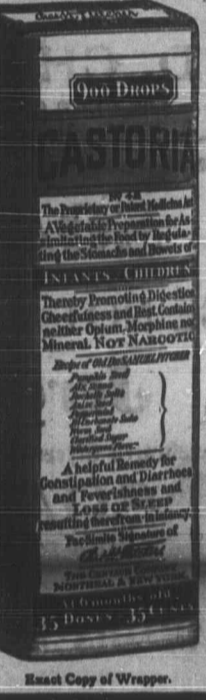

A Heavy War Loss.

The world's stock of sheep has decreased by 54,000,000 head since the war began. Millions of cattle and swine have also been destroyed. While the war lasts the resulting shortage in cattle and hogs will have to be in part endured in order to conserve grain for shipments overseas but the immense gap between supply and demand must be bridged as far as possible to save a desperate situation. The most effective step that we can take at present is to greatly increase the number of sheep. These can successfully be maintained on pasture in summer without any supplementary food, and in winter on hay and roots with a very trifling amount of grain in the present crisis, and especially in view of the shortage of mill feed which must follow a low yield of grain in the West, it is imperative to increase the stock of sheep in Eastern Canada. In this connection we direct attention to the joint policy of the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture which is advertised in a late issue of this paper.

The Nova Scotia Act for the protection of the sheep against dogs.

Every owner of a dog in Nova Scotia is liable for any damage done by his dog found worrying or ferociously attacking sheep or lambs.

An amendment passed last Session makes it compulsory for every municipal council to collect a minimum tax of \$1.00 on every male dog and \$5.00 on every female. This dog tax supplies a fund for the repayment of sheep owners who have had lambs or sheep destroyed by dogs of which the owners are either not known or not able to pay.

In this amendment together with the law of Nova Scotia has legislation for the protection of sheep which is not excelled in America, and there is no longer any excuse on the dog score for not keeping sheep.

It has now become a patriotic duty to add to the old flock or establish a new one of this most profitable stock the former can raise. To put sheep breeding within the reach of all, the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture are co-operating to furnish ewes at the lowest figure, and to assist in locating and supplying registered and unregistered rams.

With Remembering.

When preparing a chicken, try rubbing the inside with a piece of lemon and you will find it very good, as it whitens the flesh and makes it more tender.

To keep a chimney free of soot, occasionally sprinkle a little salt petroleum on the fire. Teaspoonful is enough.

Also, new buttonholes shut be fastened with a sweater or any other white garment where buttonholes are in the neck.

To remove dent marks from white enamel, rub with a moist cloth dipped in whiting.

A colored faded blouse may be bleached white by boiling in cream of tartar solution.

Equal parts of turpentine and ammonia will remove pain.

To restore color taken out by acid use ammonia (not volatile, or hartshorn) drop on the faded spot.

When travelling dip the tops of corked bottles in hot paraffine before packing them and the contents will never spill or leak out.

Use kerosene or gasoline for cleaning purposes only during the daytime - and in the open air or in a well-ventilated room containing no open fire.

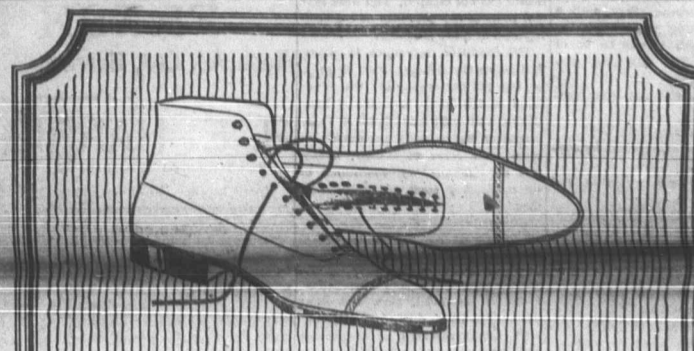

Rich Loot For Hunns.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3. - The Cathedral of the Holy Saviour in Moscow, says Stray Stories is probably the most magnificent church in the world. Its five cupolas are covered with pure gold to the inch in thickness. Its interior decorations are magnificent and very costly.

This church is the nation's thank offering for the deliverance of Moscow from the French. It took fifty years to build, and its cost has been estimated at \$15,000,000.

In the Cathedral of the Assumption, situated inside the Kremlin, is the most sacred picture in Russia, the Virgin of Vladimir, said to be painted by St. Luke. The jewels which adorn it are valued at \$5,000,000, one emerald alone being said to be worth \$250,000. Napoleon took from the church five tons of silver and 500 pounds of gold, but its most precious treasures were concealed previous to offering for the deliverance of Moscow from the French. It took fifty years to build, and its cost has been estimated at \$15,000,000.

German Spy is Landed Again.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. - Lieutenant Robert Fay, convicted German agent, in prison more than two years ago who was caught in Spain recently, has been brought back to this country and is in the custody here of the department of justice. He is held here today under guard from New London (Conn.) where he arrived from Spain on a United States naval vessel.

Disposition of his case awaits instructions from Washington. It was announced by the department of justice yesterday. Fay, who styled himself a lieutenant in the Prussian army, was sent to Spain three years' sentence after his conviction in the New York federal court on the charge of conspiring with others in a plot to blow up United States ships leaving New York harbor. Fay had perpetrated a powerful bomb, designed to blow up a ship's stern.

Wooden Men and Steel Cars.

A. R. Whaley, former operating vice-president of the New Haven, recently implicated the congestion in the Jersey City yards and was discussing it with the yardmaster, an old time railroad man.

"What's the basic trouble?" asked Whaley. "We used to handle things better."

"I'll tell you," said the yardmaster. "Twenty-five years ago, when you and I started, they had wooden cars, but they had men of steel handling them. Now they've got steel cars, but they've a blamed lot of wooden men handling them."

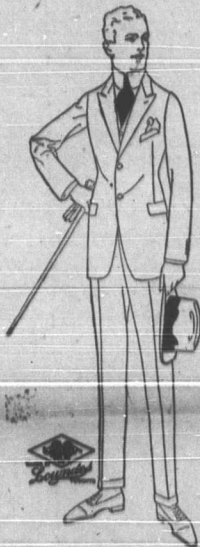

NOTICE—MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917
REGISTRATION OF UNITED STATES CITIZENS

Male citizens of the United States living in Canada or AGES 21-30, both inclusive, MUST REGISTER BY REGISTERED POST with the Registrar under the Military Service Act of the district in which they live, during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING SEPTEMBER 28th, 1918; and such CITIZENS OF THE AGES 19, 30 AND 31-44, both inclusive, must so register during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING OCTOBER 12th, 1918. It must be emphasized that THIS INCLUDES AMERICANS LIVING IN CANADA OF THE ABOVE AGES, MARRIED AND SINGLE, and includes ALSO ALL THOSE WHO HAVE SECURED DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION OR HAVE REGISTERED WITH AN AMERICAN CONSUL, or HAVE REGISTERED FOR MILITARY SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES.

Registration letters may be handed to local Postmasters for despatch to the proper Registrar, under the Military Service Act.

MILITARY SERVICE BRANCH.

NOTICE—MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917
MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS

Having in view the importance of leaving a sufficient number of men on those farms, which are actually contributing to the National Food Supply, notice is hereby given as follows:

1. ALL MEMBERS OF CLASS I POSSESSING EXEMPTION AS FARMERS which is expiring and WHO WISH TO REMAIN EXEMPT should communicate with the Registrar under the M.S.A., of their respective districts REQUESTING AN EXTENSION IN TIME OF SUCH EXEMPTION. Questionnaires will thereupon be issued to these men by the Registrar and they will receive further exemption upon furnishing satisfactory proof that they are contributing sufficiently to the National Food Supply.

2. In order to facilitate productive employment during the winter months, MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS SHOULD APPLY TO THE REGISTRARS FOR PERMITS TO ENGAGE FOR THE WINTER IN SOME OCCUPATION OF NATIONAL INTEREST, SUCH AS LUMBERING, MUNITION WORK, ETC. Such permits will serve to enable exempted farmers to pursue other useful occupations for the months during which farming operations cannot be carried on.

Death of Prominent Wolfville Man.

Wolfville has sustained a severe loss in the death of a respected citizen, Mr. A. J. Woodman, which took place after a brief illness, on Saturday morning last.

The deceased was one of the best known men in the community and will be deeply missed and very much missed. He was a native of Wolfville, a son of the late William Woodman, and had spent all his life here. He was a successful business man and a good citizen. A generous and faithful supporter of the Methodist church his place will be hard to fill. For many years he conducted the music and was always at his place.

Mr. and Mrs. Woodman returned recently from a trip to Washington where their youngest daughter was married a few weeks ago. He was not feeling well on his return but no anxiety was felt until at the first of last week when he consulted a doctor. On Friday morning he had a stroke of apoplexy and never regained consciousness, passing away on Saturday.

He is survived by a surviving widow and two daughters, Mrs. Fosby of Wolfville, and Mrs. Ryan of Rochester, N. Y. Mr. F. W. Woodman, of this town, is a brother. The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon from his late home, under the direction of Mr. Snow, of Halifax, a professional friend of the deceased. It was one of the largest funerals ever seen in Wolfville. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Watts, pastor of the Methodist church, Rev. Mr. Armitage, a former minister, Dr. DeWolfe, Dr. Chute and Rev. Dr. Borden of Kentville, took part. The floral tributes were numerous and beautiful. Messrs. W. C. B. Harris, T. L. Harvey, J. D. Harris, L. W. Sillip, R. H. Burgess and Brighton Fielding were the pall bearers. The Boy Scout band, of which Mr. Woodman was a warm friend, led the long procession to Willow Bank and played the "Dead March" and other selections.
