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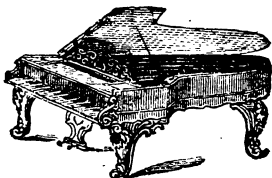

In this case, Canada retains the two cents charged on each paper, and the postage of one cent per two ounces weight *only* is credited to the United States.

* Where an asterisk is prefixed, an additional charge of one cent per two ounces weight on Newspapers, and one cent per ounce on Books and other printed matter must be collected, and the whole of this additional charge must be credited to the United States.

Was a Lord in Waiting to the Queen, from 1849 to 1852, and from 1854 to 1858 ; attached to Earl Russell's special mission to Vienna, Feb., 1855 ; British Commissioner in Syria, 1860 ; Under Secretary of State for India from 1864 to 1866, and for War from 1866 to following year ; and Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and Paymaster General, from 1868 to 1872. Appointed Lord Lieutenant of the County Down, 1864 ; and Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, 22 May, 1872. (Salary £10,000, *stg.*) Is Honorary Colonel of the North Down Rifles. LEGAL QUALIFICATIONS

OF SENATORS AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF
COMMONS. WHO ARE ELECTORS.

The Parliament of the Dominion consists of
the Queen, a Senate of 77, appointed by the

Crown for life, and a House of Commons of 200 members chosen by the people. The members of this Parliament are locally apportioned as follows :

The number of Senators is fixed (except that six additional Senators may be appointed by the Crown); that of Members of the House of Commons is to vary according to the population ascertained at each decennial census, Quebec always retaining the same number. The term of election is five years, unless the House be sooner dissolved. The Sessions are annual. The property qualification is: For Senators, the possession of \$4,000 real and personal estate, over and above all liabilities; for Members of the House of Commons in Ontario and

The Senators of Quebec are nominated one for each of 24 territorial districts, in which their property qualification must be.

Quebec, £500 sterling of real estate; in New Brunswick, the possession for six months previous to the issue of the writ of election, of \$1,200 of real estate; in Nova Scotia, "a legal or equitable freehold estate in possession of the clear yearly value of eight dollars (\$8)," or the candidate must be "qualified to be an elector."

The following are electors:—

In Ontario, every male subject of the age of 21 years, being actually and *bona fide* the owner, tenant or occupant of real property, and being entered on the then last revised assessment, for any city, town, village or township as the owner, tenant or occupant of such real property of the actual value, in cities of \$400, in towns of \$300, and in incorporated villages and townships of \$200; there are special provisions in the law with regard to voters in the electoral districts of Algoma and Muskoka, and in the new townships recently added to South Renfrew.

In Quebec, every male subject, of the age of 21 years, being the owner or occupier or tenant of real property of the assessed value of \$300, or of the yearly value of \$30, if within cities or towns, or of the assessed value of \$200, or the yearly value of \$20, if not so situate. In New Brunswick, every male subject of the age of 21

years, not disqualified by law, assessed for the year for which the register is made up, in respect of real estate to the amount of \$100, or of personal property, or personal and real, amounting together to \$400, or \$400 annual income. In Nova Scotia, all subjects of the age of 21 years, not disqualified by law, assessed for the year for which the register is made up in respect of real estate to the value of \$150, or in respect of personal estate, or of real and personal together, to the value of \$400.

Voting in Quebec, Ontario, Nova Scotia, Manitoba and British Columbia, is open, on inquiry by the Returning Officers, after the person desirous of voting has by reference to the registration list established his right to vote.

In New Brunswick votes are taken by ballot.

Voting is confined to a single day in all the Provinces, but it is not compulsory that the elections be simultaneous.

1867.

THE Parliament of the Dominion of Canada met for the first time at Ottawa, on the 6th Nov., 1867. On that day the Hon. J. E. Cauchon (who was on the 5th Nov. appointed Speaker of the Senate) took and subscribed the oath prescribed by law, and was then conducted to the Chair at the foot of the Throne, where he received the Governor-General; on the 7th, His Excellency delivered the Speech from the Throne; on the 11th, the Hon. G. W. Allan moved, seconded by the Hon. J. McCully, the usual address in reply to the Viceregal speech, which was agreed to on the same day. On the 21st Dec., the Senate adjourned until the 12th March, 1868, when it re-assembled and continued to sit until the prorogation on the 22nd May.

1869.

Parliament assembled on the 15th April, when the Speech from the Throne was delivered. On the 16th, the Hon. Dr. Lacoste moved, seconded by the Hon. D. Wark, the address in reply, which was adopted on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 22nd June.

1870.

Parliament met on the 16th Feb., when the Speech was delivered by the Governor-General. On the 17th, the Hon. J. R. Benson moved the address in reply, seconded by the Hon. R. B. Dickey, which was, as on the two previous occasions, agreed to on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 12th May.

1871.

Parliament met on the 15th Feb. On the 17th, Hon. Alexander Macfarlane moved the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, seconded by Hon. J. F. Armand, which was duly adopted on the same day. Parliament was prorogued on the 14th April.

1872.

Parliament met on the 11th April. On the following day Hon. Marc Amable Girard moved the customary address, seconded by Hon. John

Robertson, and the same was duly carried on the same day. Parliament rose on 14th June.

Has been a Bencher of the Law Society, U.C. Represented Cataraqui division in L.C., Can., from Nov., 1858, until the Union. Was

Speaker of that body from 12 Feb., 1863, until the dissolution of Parliament in May, same year; and a mem. of Ex. Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands, from March, 1864, until the Union. Ancestors were early settlers at Charlesbourg, near Quebec. B. in Quebec, 30 May, 1820. Ed. at the Quebec Seminary. M., 1840, Miss Massé, of Quebec. Called to the Bar, L.C., Aug., 1841. Created Q.C., 1853. A well known French Canadian *littérateur*; author of *Charles Guérin*; *roman de mœurs Canadiennes*, &c. Was Solicitor-General for L.C., from Nov., 1851, to Aug., 1853; and Provincial Secy., Can., from latter date to Jan., 1855, when he retired from office, and in the same year was apptd. Superintendent of Education, L.C., an office which he held from that time until the Union. CHRISTIE, *Hon.* DAVID.

CHURCHILL, *Hon.* EZRA.

Of Eng. descent. B. at Yarmouth, N.S., 1806. Ed. there. M., 1826, Mrs. Anne Davison, of Hantsport, N.S. An extensive ship-builder. Sat for Hants in N.S. Assembly from 1855 to 1867, and supported Confederation. Called to Senate

COCHRANE, *Hon.* MATTHEW HENRY. (*Wellington.*)

Family came to Can. from the north of Irel. S. of the late Mr. Cochrane, a Quebec trader. An eminent cattle importer and breeder. Is a trustee of Lennoxville University. CORNWALL, *Hon.* CLEMENT FRANCIS, *B.A.*

S. of Rev. Alan Gardener Cornwall, Rector of Newington, Bagpath and Beverstone, Gloucestershire, Eng., and Chaplain in Ordinary to Her Majesty; by Caroline, his wife, dau. of Thomas Kingscote, Esq., of Kingscote Park, Gloucestershire. The ancient English family of Cornwall is descended in an unbroken line from a son of King John of England, who was created Earl

Cornwall; the Kingscotes of Kingscote have lived on the lands they now hold from a period antecedent to the Conquest. B. in Eng., 1836., Ed. at a private school, and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A. M., 1871, Charlotte, 3rd dau. of Rev. DE LÉRY, Hon. ALEXANDRE RENÉ CHAUSSEGROS.

Descended from the Chevalier Gaspard Chaussegros de Léry, head of the family in this country, a nobleman who was sent out in 1716 by the King of France, to construct a system of fortifications in Can.; one of his cousins became a Vice-Admiral in the French navy, and his grandson, Vicomte de Léry, attained the high position of Engineer-in-chief of the Imperial Army. MILLER, *Hon.* WILLIAM, *Q.C.*

Descended from an Eng. family that emigrated to N.S. over eighty years ago. B. at Antigonish, N.S., 12 Feb., 1835. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Andrews, and the Antigonish Academy. M., Oct., 1871, Annie, dau. of Hon. James Cochran, a mem. of the Executive and Legislative Councils of N.S., and formerly re-

Assembly, from g.e., 1863, until the Union, and while in that House rendered material assistance to the Union cause. ADJOURNMENT.—See Interruption of the Sit-

AMENDMENT.—See Order.

AVOIDANCE OF A DECISION.—When a motion has been made upon which the House is unwilling to come to a vote, there are certain formal modes of avoiding a decision, amongst which are “passing of the other orders of the day,” “moving the previous question.” The former means that the House should—casting aside and taking no notice of the matter then before it—proceed to the other business appointed for the

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day ; the latter, that a vote be previously taken as to the expediency of coming to any decision on the question raised. If "the previous question" be negatived as a matter of expediency, the motion to which it referred is only gotten rid of for the time, whereas a direct negative to the motion itself would be a proscription of it for the remainder of the Session, as well as a denial of its principle. With respect to a Bill, moving that it "be read this day six months," or "this day three months," is a mode of throwing it out without coming to an express declaration against the principle of the measure.

BILLS (PRIVATE).—Private Bills are chiefly introduced to enable individuals or bodies corporate to undertake works of public utility at their own risk, and chiefly for their own emolument and benefit ; but there are other private bills which frequently come before Parliament, such as Bills for adjusting claims to property between individual claimants, and Bills relating to divorce, naturalization, &c., &c. The expenses of legislation in such matters must be paid by the parties seeking the relief ; and certain deposits, varying in amount, must be made before the measure can be taken up by the Private Bill Committee. All these Bills have to be

read a second time, and then, if all the rules of the House have been complied with, they go to the Committee, and it is before this Committee that proper attention must be given by the parties interested. Individuals or companies may appear by Parliamentary Agents.

BILLS (PUBLIC).—A Bill is the draft or skeleton of a Statute. Any bill which the Senate can originate may be introduced and laid on the table by any individual Senator without the previous permission of the House; but in the Commons, no bill can be brought in unless a motion for leave be previously agreed to. Permission having been granted, a Committee is appointed to prepare the bill. It is then brought in and read a first time, without amendment or debate, and a day is appointed for a second reading, previous to which it is printed and a copy furnished to each member. The bill, after the second reading, is referred to a Committee of the Whole House, at the sittings of which its details are considered, as its principles were at each of its several readings. Members are at liberty to discuss its principles at any of its stages, but no one is considered to have declared decisively in favor of its principles, unless by his vote he supports its second reading. In Committee, the bill is debated clause

by clause, the blanks left for names, dates, nature and amount of penalties, &c., are filled up, and sometimes the bill is entirely new-modelled. The blanks, as they are called, which are usually filled up in italics, are agreed to without a question being put, unless a member should propose to alter them. The next proceeding is, that the Chairman of the Committee should make a report to the House of the changes that the bill has undergone, which he does by presenting a copy of it to the Speaker in its altered form. The report of the Committee is agreed to without discussion, the bill is ordered to be printed, and it is then read a third time, when any further amendments can be made. If a new clause be added, it is called a rider. The last question but one is that the "bill do pass;" after this nothing remains except to determine its title, which used to be a general one for all the acts passed in the session, but in modern times distinct titles are used for each statute. During the progress of a bill the House *may* divide on the following questions: 1st, on the second reading; 2nd, that it be committed; 3rd, that the report of the Committee be received; 4th, or that the bill be re-committed; 5th, that it be read a third time; 6th, that it do pass; 7th, the title of the bill. These are quite exclu-

sive of any division in Committee, or any amendments, or of any clauses added to or expunged from the measure in or out of the Committee. Alterations are not usually proposed in a bill until after its principle has been disposed of on the second reading. Immediately after the passing of a bill, it is taken by a member to the bar of the Senate, desiring their concurrence, where it passes through the same forms as in the Commons. If the bill be rejected, no further proceedings ensue. When the Senate agree with the Commons in the principle of the measure, but differ on matters of detail, a conference usually follows between members deputed from each House, who generally succeed in adjusting the difference; but if both Houses remain inflexible, the bill is dropped. The same proceedings are adopted, *mutatis mutandis*, when the bill originates in the Upper House. The bill having thus passed both Houses, remains with the Senate, except in the case of a bill of supply, which is sent back to the Commons, to be by them presented at the bar of the Senate to the Representative of the Sovereign. The assent of the Crown is the final proceeding which converts a bill into an Act of Parliament. (See "Royal Assent.")

BUDGET (THE).—The Minister of Finance makes

one general statement every year to the House of Commons, the object of which is to present a comprehensive view of the financial condition of the Dominion. Sometimes there are preliminary, or supplemental, or occasional speeches ; but the great general statement of the year has, for a long time past, been quaintly called "*the Budget*," from the French *bougette*, by a common figure of speech, putting the name of that which encloses, to signify the thing contained. The annual speech known by that appellation embraces a review of the income and expenditure of the past year, as compared with those of preceding years ; remarks upon the financial prospects of the country ; an exposition of the intended repeal, modifications, or imposition of taxes during the session ; and a detail of the public expenditure during the current period, with its grounds of justification.

CABINET.—The Government of a State or community is understood to signify the exercise of supreme authority, and includes the executive, the legislative, and the judicial powers ; but in popular acceptance it means only the first of these, the higher and more immediate functions of which are exercised by the Cabinet, a select body through whom, for the time being, the principal functions of royalty are discharged.

It is only since the adoption of the system of Responsible Government that any of the B.N.A. Provinces has had a Cabinet of Ministers. Before this took place, those who advised the Executive or Her Majesty's Representative, were called, as they were in fact, Members of the Executive Council. They are here dignified by the same name as that by which they are acknowledged in the Parent State—they are called the Government, when the fact is that this word only applies to the three Estates which constitute the Government; but we have come into the use of the term usually employed in England, and as such it will be the best to use it. When speaking of the Supreme Government of the Dominion the people understand the Members of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada. The Queen's Privy Council for Canada is at present composed of twenty members, but seven of these are not of the Cabinet. It usually includes all those who are bound to retire when a change of Ministry takes place. The Privy Council being more immediately responsible for the conduct of public affairs, their deliberations are always considered confidential, and are kept secret. The head of the Cabinet, who has been entrusted with its formation, is called "The Premier," but more properly "the head

of Her Majesty's Canadian Government." The Cabinet, as it stands at present, comprises the following officers:—"The Minister of Justice and Attorney-General;" "The Minister of Militia and Defence;" "The Minister of Customs;" "The Minister of Finance;" "The Minister of Public Works;" "The Minister of Inland Revenue;" "The Secretary of State for the Provinces;" "The Minister of Marine and Fisheries;" "The President of the Queen's Privy Council;" "The Postmaster-General;" "The Secretary of State for Canada;" "The Minister of Agriculture;" and "The Receiver-General." They usually resign when they have lost the confidence of the House of Commons, or they may be dismissed by Her Majesty's Representative, and either House can, by address to the Governor-General, ask for the dismissal of his Cabinet or advisers. The members of the Cabinet or Administration, are supposed to agree upon principles of policy and legislation, and are expected to co-operate in Parliament, upon all matters and questions not specifically agreed upon as "open questions." The office of Premier may be held in conjunction with either of the principal departments of State, though heretofore, (before Confederation), it has been usually associated with the office of Attorney-General.

CLERK OF THE CROWN IN CHANCERY.—The Clerk of the Crown in Chancery is by right an officer of both Houses of Parliament. His duties are to take charge of all the Poll Books and Election documents; to issue Writs of Election, &c., attend with those at the table when so ordered by the House; and at the closing of each session of Parliament to read aloud the title of each several Bill before it receives the Royal assent by her Majesty's Representative. We reproduce from *Macqueen's Appellate Jurisdiction of the House of Lords* that portion which refers to the duties of this officer in England:—"The duties of the Clerk of the Crown do not now, as heretofore, require his constant attendance in the House of Lords. He assists when the Royal assent is given to Bills; but has no concern with the business of the Appellate Jurisdiction. In an ancient manuscript, preserved in the office of the Clerk of the Crown, the following particulars are given, respecting this ancient officer:—The Clerk of the Crown, sitteth in the Upper House of Parliament, by the Clerk of that Court, upon the Woolsack, attending there all the Parliament, and is sometimes sent on messages to the Lower House; and on the last day of the Parliament he readeth the Acts, and the Clerk of the Parliament giveth

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the King's answer ; where it is to be noted that all the time of Parliament he sitteth on the right hand of the Clerk of Parliament, and when he readeth the Acts, he standeth on his left hand, which is the higher place, being on the King's right hand."

CLERK OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.—"The Clerk of the Commons House of Parliament" holds an office of great trust and importance. He, with one assistant, sits at the upper end of the table. The Crown appoints him by commission. It is his duty to make minutes, not of the arguments held in the House, but of the decisions at which it arrives—in other words, to record its votes, resolutions, addresses, orders, reports, divisions, and all other proceedings in which it may be engaged ; to see that they are correctly printed and distributed to the members ; to read aloud all such documents as the House may order to be read ; to perform the duty (without taking the chair) of president or moderator during the choice of a Speaker, putting a question and directing a division in the same manner that a chairman would do.

COMMITTEES.—In common with courts of law and equity, the Houses of Parliament can pun-

ish all contempt of their authority, or disobedience of their mandates. Each House is armed with power to repress any aggression committed upon its rights, or any interference with its privileges; but in the case of the Commons the operation of this power is limited to the session of Parliament; committals by that House being invalidated by a prorogation. Either House can delegate to a committee the power of sending for papers and records, and of enforcing the attendance of necessary witnesses.

COMMITTEES.—Are, first, those of the Whole House, which may be to consider certain resolutions, as to the nature of which considerable latitude prevails; or the House resolves itself into such Committee, to consider the details of a bill, the principle of which may be discussed at any or all of its other stages; or there may be Committees for financial purposes, as those of "Supply," or "Ways and Means" (which see). Secondly, there are Select Committees chosen by ballot or otherwise, for some special purpose—the number composing such bodies seldom exceeds fifteen members, except by permission of the House. Thirdly, Election Committees, which are judicial tribunals, appointed to try the merits of controverted election

They are appointed by a General Committee or Elections, who, after having selected a certain number from the members to constitute the chairman's panel, divide the remainder into panels, and report the same to the House, marked 1, 2, and 3. The Clerk, in the presence of the House, places the whole three in a hat and draws them forth, marking each in rotation A, B, C. The General Committee then selects four members for the Committee for the first controverted election referred to them, and at the same time the chairman's panel assembles and ballots for a chairman for the particular Committee chosen. Fourthly, Committees on Private Bills (which see.) When the Whole House is in Committee, the Speaker vacates the chair, the Mace is placed under the table, and some other member is called on to preside, who sits in the seat of the Senior Clerk.

CONFERENCE.—This is a species of negotiation between the two Houses of Parliament, conducted by managers appointed on both sides, for the purpose of producing concurrence, in cases where mutual consent is necessary; or for the purpose of reconciling differences which may have arisen. If the conference be upon the subject of a bill depending between the two Houses,

it must be demanded by that House which is in possession of the bill, at the time of asking the conference. It is the sole privilege of the Senate to name the time and place for holding a conference, no matter by which House it may have been demanded. Reasons in writing for the course resolved to be taken, are usually furnished to the managers on both sides, in which case it is simply called "a conference." Should this proceeding fail, a "free conference" must be held, which gives an opportunity for the managers individually, and unrestrained by any precise form of argument, to urge such reasons as, in their judgment, may best tend to influence the House to which they are addressed. A free conference is usually demanded after two conferences have been holden without effect. After one free conference, none other but free conferences can be held touching the same subject.

CROWN.—In speaking of the Crown, the reader must remember that the attributes and powers are exercised in Canada by a Representative—viz., the Governor-General. Its attributes are:—

To give or refuse to bills "*The Royal Assent*"; to cause the laws to be duly administered and executed; to act in behalf of the whole commun-

ity in its intercourse with other countries, (but the Representative of the Crown can neither declare a war nor conclude a peace; this power cannot be delegated); to direct the Naval and Military forces within the limit of his Administration; to administer the Public Revenue; to prorogue or dissolve Parliament. The Queen's Representative, in appearing for the Crown, represents the source of justice and mercy, confers office, honors, and emoluments; but in the same manner as the Monarch acts by Ministers who are amenable to the Imperial Parliament, so the Representative in Canada acts by Ministers who are responsible to Parliament, and the choice of those Ministers is the only prerogative which can be constitutionally exercised without responsible advisers; but even in this, Parliament, or rather the People's Representatives, exercise the controlling power; for the appointment of such Ministers by the Crown's Representative can have no practical effect, unless it rests upon men whose characters and measure prove generally acceptable to the House.

ESTATE OF PARLIAMENT.—Parliament fully assembled, consists of the Monarch, or his Representative, the Upper House and the Lower House. They are more frequently spoken of as

the three branches of the Legislature. Neither House deliberates in the presence of the Queen's Representative, nor will either of them permit any allusion in debate, to the opinions or sentiments entertained by him. The three branches taken together exercise none but legislative functions, and they must all consent, or no law can be passed. But they have separate functions as well. The Monarch, or Representative, holds the whole Executive authority, and while the Lower House alone can originate Money or Tax Bills, the Upper House is deprived of this power. Nor does the Upper House possess the great function of trying impeachments, which is held by the Lords in Great Britain, from the simple fact, we presume, that there is no power invested with the right to impeach. But we will speak of each one separately :

HOUSE OF COMMONS.—The Speaker takes the Chair at 3 P.M. daily. If there be a quorum the business is proceeded with ; if not, the House is adjourned to the next day, at 3 P.M. Early meetings take place shortly before the termination of the Session, in order to expedite business and bring matters to a close ; the House does not usually meet on Saturday, nor does it assemble on any holiday. No one can be admitted to hear the debates without an order from the

Sergeant-at-Arms, which is generally obtained through a member. Twenty members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum.

THE SENATE.—The time for the ordinary meeting of this House is at 3 P.M., unless some other time shall have previously been ordered. If a quorum is not present at thirty minutes after the time of meeting, the House is adjourned until the next sitting day. Fifteen members, including the Speaker, constitute a quorum. The Speaker of the Senate is an officer appointed by the Crown.

EXECUTIVE.—See Cabinet.

FINANCE.—See Budget.

INTERRUPTION OF THE SITTINGS OF PARLIAMENT.

—The proceedings of the Legislature may be interrupted or suspended either by adjournment, prorogation, or dissolution.

Adjournment, as the term itself implies, is a postponement of the sittings or proceedings of the House, from one time to another specified for the re-assemblage. When the sittings of both Houses are interrupted by Royal authority, it is called prorogation. Dissolution puts an end to the representative character of the individuals who, at the time, compose the House of Commons, and Parliament cannot therefore

assemble until after a new election, except in cases hereinafter mentioned. The power of adjournment is a right belonging to each House, and there are no restraints to this power.

The House of Commons can interrupt or postpone any debate, defer the consideration of any measure, or altogether adjourn its sitting, but the practice is always to adjourn to some stated time ; and we think there can be no doubt that, by the previous permission of the House, the Speaker can leave the Chair for a certain number of hours ; but this does not amount to an adjournment, and could not be noted as such by the Clerk. But it must be remarked that the adjournment of one House does not adjourn the other. The Crown may, pending an adjournment, summon by proclamation either House or both, and may direct either, or both Houses to adjourn to any particular day. But while this power exists, and although in former times it has been frequently exercised in the Imperial Legislature, it has grown into desuetude there, as well as in the Provinces enjoying the privileges of their own local Legislatures.

An individual member may for a time interrupt the progress of business by successive motions for adjournment, which may be repeated indefinitely, with this restriction : no second

motion to adjourn can be made until after some intermediate proceeding shall have been had. The motion in committee, that the chairman report progress, is equivalent to a motion to adjourn the debate.

Adjournment does not close the session; nor does prorogation terminate Parliament. The former is an act which either House can perform; the latter is a power vested in the Crown, the duration of which may be subsequently shortened or extended as the Crown pleases. All unfinished business terminates and dies with a prorogation, but during an adjournment they remain *statu quo*, to be revised on the re-assembling of Parliament. A member who moves the adjournment of a debate, or who is in possession of the floor at the time of the adjournment, is said to be in possession of the House with the right to re-open the debate which has been interrupted. This is not the case, however, when Committees of the Whole House adjourn. Prorogation never extends beyond forty days, but it may be repeated from time to time by proclamation, and continue to be renewed until it is intended that Parliament shall meet for the despatch of business. The Crown can summon Parliament at any time by giving fourteen days' notice.

Dissolution is the simple death of Parliament, and may be brought about in two ways, either by the pleasure of the Crown, or by lapse of time for which it was called into existence. There was a time when the existence of a Parliament terminated by the demise of the Crown, but a special law removed this provision of the Constitution. But there is no power in the Constitution by which a Parliament in Canada can be extended beyond five years. If Parliament, at the time of the Sovereign's death, be separated by adjournment or prorogation, it must assemble immediately, or within a reasonable period. If no Parliament be then in existence, the members of the last must again meet, and may serve as a Parliament for six months, unless sooner prorogued.

LAW CLERK.—It is necessary to mention this officer in particular, because the Rules of the House assign to him and the translators under him certain duties which must be performed, to ensure correct legislation. He is appointed by the Crown. It is laid down as the duty of the Law Clerk to revise all public bills after their first reading, and to certify thereon that the same are correct; and in every subsequent stage of such bills, the Law Clerk shall be responsi-

ble for the correctness of said bills, should they be amended. The responsibility is increased by the fact of all bills having to be printed in both languages, English and French, before they can be disposed of.

MINISTER (PRIME).—See Cabinet.

MINISTRY.—See Cabinet; also Executive.

MONEY BILL.—See Supply; also Ways and Means.

ORDER.—By this word is meant an obedience to certain rules and regulations intended to facilitate the despatch of business, and preserve that necessary decorum so essential in all deliberative assemblies. The rules by which the business of Parliament is conducted are of two kinds; one class the House possesses in common with all deliberative assemblies—another is peculiar to its own existence and powers. For the proper application of all these rules, the Speaker's or Chairman's decision is had, and to this decision due deference is at all times paid. The Speaker, while in the Chair, takes no part in the debate, it being his duty to regulate the manner in which business shall be transacted;

to confine those members who address the House to the subject under consideration; to give his opinion in all things which relate to order; to put the matter in dispute into the form of a question upon which the votes of members are taken, and to declare the majority as soon as it is communicated to him by the Clerk. It is also his duty to declare the business of the House closed, and to see that the affairs of the House are correctly and properly recorded. After routine he calls upon the member whose motion stands first on the paper of notices, or who is otherwise entitled to precedence. All motions must be seconded, or they fall to the ground; being seconded, the motion is handed in writing to the Speaker, who has to read it before debate can be had upon it—having been read, objections may be urged. There are several ways by which a motion may be opposed; it may be met by a direct negative, or by an amendment, or by a motion to postpone, or by proceeding to the next order of the day, or by moving the previous question, or by the simple motion of adjournment. A motion once read cannot be withdrawn without the permission of the House. It must not be forgotten that unless a speech is made objecting to a motion, neither mover nor seconder can speak a second time except in ex-

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planation. If, however, a debate does arise, in which an opposition is given to the mover of a motion, he has the right of reply ; but it must be understood that this privilege does not belong to the mover of an amendment. All are permitted to explain. The debate being ended, the Speaker or Chairman puts the question, and calls upon those in favor to say "Yea," and those of a contrary opinion to say "Nay." He then declares that in his opinion the "Yeas" or the "Nays" (as the case may be) have it. If his decision is questioned, the House divides, the "Yeas" rising and their names being taken down; the "Nays" following; the numbers are counted from the record, and declared. When an amendment has been moved, the vote is simply taken on the amendment, and then on the original question. Should the amendment be adopted, it then becomes the substantive motion, and may be amended in the same way that the original motion was amended. Thus a number of successive amendments to the original motion may be disposed of. Any member is at liberty to interrupt another by "rising to order," which means that he rises in his place, and calls the attention of the Chair and the House to a breach of the orders then being committed. In the debate it is contrary to order to

mention any member by name; the same rule prevails in Committee of the Whole, except as regards the Chairman, who is sometimes called by his name, and not Mr. Chairman.

ORIGINATING BILLS.—All Bills relating to public income and expenditure, and all Bills usually called Money Bills, must originate in the Commons, and be introduced by the Government. (*See Bills.*)

PARLIAMENTARY AGENTS.—In England all the business transacted for private Corporations and individuals is attended to by what they call Parliamentary Agents, who are parties generally well up in the practice of Parliament, and who take off a great deal of the drudgery from Members. Parliamentary Agents are now employed in Canada, and are a very useful class of men. Being up in their business, they do not annoy the Members, nor neglect the interests they have in charge.

PETITIONS.—There are several regulations which govern the presentation of Petitions to Parliament, which should be attended to by those who are interested. Petitions to the House of Commons should be addressed

"The Honorable the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled." The petition must be respectful, the statement of grievance or cause of complaint must there be set forth, and the whole must conclude with a specific prayer. Without a prayer to the petition, it would not be listened to, as the mere complaining for the sake of complaining will never be countenanced by Parliament, and the correct form is, after having alleged your complaint, to finish by connecting it with the prayer, beginning, "*Wherefore your humble petitioner, &c., prays, &c.,* setting forth the redress and relief that is sought. Signatures to petitions must be original; no agent should sign a petition to Parliament for any purpose. No chairman can sign for a public meeting, but the common seal of a corporation is received as the petition of the whole body. All petitions must be in respectful and temperate language; they should not animadvert upon the conduct of Parliament, the Courts of Justice, or constituted authorities. It is not proper to make reference to any motion or subject under debate, or to a motion in the course of preparation. After presentation, all petitions undergo a close inspection in the Clerk's Department, and when the time comes for receiving them, the Speaker offers such remarks

as their nature calls for. In England there is a Committee on Public Petitions, which takes this duty from the Speaker, and it appears to work well, for they frequently find it their duty to report the substance, and frequently the exact words of a petition to the House, and not unfrequently recommend such action to be taken as the case suggests.

PREVIOUS QUESTION. — See Avoidance of a Decision.

PRIVILEGES OF PARLIAMENT.—There are three kinds. 1st, The privileges which appertain to members individually. 2nd, Those which belong to the House in its collective capacity. 3rd, Those which belong to the two Houses jointly.

It is unnecessary that we should here discuss the points of privilege which appertain to the two Imperial Houses conjointly on the subject of assuming the supreme power of the realm. Amongst the privileges which the Commons claim are :—

The power of committing individuals to prison—the power of publishing matters which, if not issuing from such high authority, might become the subject of proceedings in a Court of

Law—the power of directing the Law Officers of the Crown to prosecute persons accused of offences against the laws, or affecting the privileges of Parliament—and finally of doing anything not directly contravening an existing Act of Parliament, which may be necessary for the vindication and protection of its own rights, in the exercise of its constitutional functions. Questions of privilege take precedence of all other proceedings, and are always in order. The privileges claimed by individual members are—freedom of speech and person, including freedom from legal arrest and seizure under process from the Courts of Law and Equity. This does not extend to indictable offences or to actual contempts of the Courts of Justice. Members of Parliament are exempt from all duties, the performance of which might interfere with their prompt attendance to their Parliamentary calls. Privilege of Parliament, such as it is, continues for a convenient time after prorogation and dissolution.

PROROGATION.—See Interruption of the Sitzings of Parliament.

QUESTION.—See Order.

ROYAL ASSENT.—The Act by which the Crown agrees to a Bill is called the Royal Assent ; this assent is usually given at the end of a Session, unless there is urgent necessity for the Act becoming law without loss of time, in which case the Governor-General, or the person administering the Government, comes down to the Upper House, and there in the presence of both Houses, gives his assent. When this is done, either at the close of the Session or on a special occasion, the Governor-General being seated on the throne, the House of Commons is summoned to the bar of the Upper House ; being there, the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery reads the title of the Bill, hands it to the Chief Clerk, who says in both English and French : “ In the name of Her Majesty the Queen, His Excellency the Governor-General sanctions this Bill.” His Excellency specially manifests his assent to the Supply Bill. Bills to which the Royal assent is not given are pronounced to be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty’s pleasure thereon, and are mentioned in the “ *Official Gazette* ” as having been reserved for Her Majesty’s consideration. Unless a reserve is made in the Act itself, so soon as the Royal assent is given, the Act becomes a Law, and can proceed on before any competent Court.

England, sometimes the Royal assent is given by Commission, but in a Colony such an event has never taken place, although there can be no doubt that the Governor-General has power to appoint a Commission to give this Royal assent.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.—This officer, although in attendance on the House of Commons, is appointed by the Crown. It is his duty to obey the commands of the House, to apprehend and take into custody all those who are committed for any offence by the House. All the messengers and servants of the House, except the Clerks, are under his orders. He has a seat at the Bar of the House, and directs all arrangements for the maintenance of order in the approaches thereto, and in the galleries. He is of course in immediate attendance upon the Speaker, from whom he takes all orders connected with his duties.

SESSION.—The Session is the term occupied by Parliament from its commencement to its prorogation. An adjournment does not close a Session. Parliament is annually assembled for the despatch of business. There are certain important Acts which are renewed every year, and without which the Government could not be

carried on, which compels the Government to meet the Representatives of the people, and render an account of the past year's transactions once a year at least. Unless this be done, there will be no supplies. By an understanding, Parliament meets in the month of February, although circumstances sometimes arise to postpone the time. While the Crown has a right to summon Parliament where it pleases, it is generally understood that it assembles at the Seat of Government. The House being assembled the Governor-General commands the attendance of the members of the Lower House at the Bar of the Upper House, and delivers a Speech from the Throne. This Speech is the first subject taken into consideration; no other business is commenced until the answer to it is given. As is stated elsewhere, the mere fact of one or both Houses adjourning, does not terminate the Session; it can only terminate by being prorogued by the Crown. All bills and other measure left unfinished, when the prorogation takes place, are dead, and parties who wish to revive them must recommence their labours at the next Session, as if nothing had been done in the premises. The mere assembling of members does not constitute a Session,—one Bill, at least, must pass both Houses, and receive the Royal Assent, before it can be called a Session.

SPEAKER.—Beyond all doubt this officer was designated Speaker, from the fact of his being the spokesman of the Commons, in their intercourse with the Crown. He is the presiding officer of the body. He reads all communications which come from the Queen's Representative to the Commons; he has to present and read such addresses and petitions as are carried up to the Governor-General by the Whole House, and to deliver the usual speeches, on the part of the Commons, when presenting the Supply Bill, and other Bills calling for particular note and remark. Through him, all witnesses and prisoners at the Bar of the House are examined, and he directs all arrangements, when the House is to be addressed by Counsel. It is his duty to deliver the reprimand of the House to any one who has incurred the penalty of receiving it; it is also his duty to issue warrants of committal, or release for breach of privilege, to communicate with any parties, when so instructed by the House. It is his duty to closely examine the provisions of private Bills so as to protect the public against any surprise, or undue encroachment or injury; to control and regulate the conduct of subordinate officers of the House; to enforce the Rules of the House; he cannot join in any debate unless in Committee of the Whole

House. As the presiding officer of the House, he has all the duties attached to such an office. The Speaker is chosen by the members of Parliament, subject to the approbation of the representative of the Crown, and holds his office until the Parliament in which he is elected is dissolved. Should a member persevere in disobeying the order of the Speaker and of the House, the Speaker may "name him," as the term applies, a course uniformly followed by the censure of the House. In extreme cases, the Speaker may order members or others into custody until the pleasure of the House be signified. On divisions, when the numbers happen to be equal, he gives the casting vote, but he never otherwise votes.

SUPPLY.—All proceedings which relate to the public income or expenditure must originate with the Commons, and must be begun by resolution moved in Committee of Supply, which is always Committee of the Whole House. In the course of the Session, estimates are submitted to a Committee of Supply, and resolutions moved thereon, granting to the Crown the sums requisite for the management of the various departments of the Government, and the support of various public and private institutions. Such

as are confirmed by the Committee of Supply are reported to the House, where they are again reconsidered and adopted, or rejected, as the case may be. Upon these, a Bill is passed, and this Supply Bill furnishes the authority to the Government for disbursing the various sums appropriated. The Upper House may reject this or any other money Bill, but they cannot alter or amend the substance of a Supply or Money Bill; such a course would be regarded as an invasion of the privileges of the Lower House. Before any Bill can be introduced, authorizing the expenditure of any public money, resolutions must be moved in Committee of Supply, agreed to there, reported and confirmed by the House.

THREE MONTHS (This Day)—See Avoidance of a Decision.

WAYS AND MEANS.—As the Committee of Supply relates to the expenditure of the country, so the functions and duties of a Committee of Ways and Means have reference to the funds by which such expenditure is to be met. Loans, duties, taxes, excise and revenue of every description, are submitted to the Committee of Ways and Means. The propositions of Government on

this subject are reduced to resolutions, submitted, considered and decided on, and such as are agreed to are reported to the House. Those which may be adopted are embodied in a Bill or Bills, and in due course and form become the law of the land. As in Supply, the Upper House may reject these Bills, but cannot amend them, nor can the Upper House insert a pecuniary penalty in any Bill.

DURATION OF THE SESSIONS, &c.

[*The reader is referred to the paragraph with the above heading at the opening of PART II. for data which it is unnecessary here to repeat.*]

1867.

The Parliament of the Dominion of Canada met for the first time in Ottawa on the 6th Nov., 1867. Immediately after the return of the Commons from the Senate Chamber, the Clerk being in the Chair, the Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, K.C.B. (*Kingston*), moved, seconded by the Hon. G. E. Cartier (*Montreal East*), that the Hon. James Cockburn (*West Northumberland Ont.*) do take the Chair of that House as Speaker, which was carried unanimously. Mr. Speaker was then conducted to the Chair where he returned his humble acknowledgments for the great honor conferred upon him. O

the 8th Nov. the Hon. C. Fisher (*York, N.B.*) moved the address to reply to the Speech, seconded by Dr. L. L. L. Desaulniers (*St. Maurice*), which was agreed to on the 15th. On the 21st Dec., the House adjourned until the 12th March.

1869.

On the 16th Apl., Mr. W. M. Simpson (*Algoma*) moved the usual address in reply to the Speech, seconded by Mr. J. Bolton (*Charlotte*), which was adopted the same day.

1870.

On the 17th Feb., Mr. A. W. Savary (*Digby*) moved the address, seconded by Mr. J. Scriver (*Huntingdon*), which was adopted on the 22nd.

1871.

On the 26th Feb., Dr. Lacerte (*St. Maurice*) moved the address in reply to the Speech, seconded by Mr. G. A. Kirkpatrick (*Frontenac*), which was carried on the same day.

1872.

On the 12th April, Mr. Henry Nathan (*Victoria, B.C.*) moved the address, seconded by Mr. Edward Carter, Q.C., D.C.L. (*Brome*), and was adopted on the same day.

ABBOTT, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOHN JOSEPH CALDWELL, D.C.L., Q.C. [Argenteuil.]*

Eldest s. of the late Rev. Joseph Abbott, first Anglican Incumbent of St. Andrew's, Argenteuil, well known as the author of *Philip Musgrave; or, the Adventures of a Missionary in Canada*; by Harriet, dau. of the Rev. Richard Bradford, first Rector of Chatham, same county. B. at St. Andrew's, 12 March, 1821. Ed. there, and at the Univ. of McGill College, Montreal. M., 1849, Mary, dau. of the Very Rev. J. Bethune, D.D., Dean of Montreal. Called to the Bar, L.C., Oct., 1847. Created Q.C., 1862. Is Dean of the Faculty of Law and Prof. of Commercial Law in Univ. of McGill College; Lieut-Col. of the 11th Batt. or "Argenteuil Rangers," raised by him during the "Trent" difficulty; Presdt. of the Canada Central Railway and of the Fraser Institute, or Free Public Library of Montreal; Vice-Presdt. of the North Shore Railway; a dir. of the Northern Colonization Railway and of the Intercolonial Coal Mining Co., and author of *the Insolvent Act of 1864; with notes &c.* (Que., 1864); a measure which he introduced and carried through the Can. Parl. Apptd. Counsel to Can. Pacific Railway Board Jan., 1873. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Solicitor-General, L.C., from 24 May, 1862,

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14 May, 1863. Was elected for present seat in Can. Assembly, at g.e., 1857, but not returned, and only seated after an arduous contest; continued to represent the county in that House until the Union. Sat for St. John (county) in N.B. Assembly from 1860 to g.e., 1866, when defeated on Confederation question, to which he was opposed. Was

member of Ex. Council, N.B., for a few months, 1866. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and again at last g.e. A Conservative; opposed to present Government. Accepts Confederation, and is willing to give the new Constitution a fair trial.—*Waterloo St., St. John, N.B.*

ARCHAMBEAULT, Hon. LOUIS, N.P. [*L'Assomption.*]

B. at L'Assomption. A Notary Public. Has been Registrar for L'Assomption. Elected Presdt. of the Board of Notaries for the Province of Quebec, 1870. Apptd a mem. of Ex. Council and Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works for the Province of Quebec, July, 1867; and apptd. a Govt. dir. Northern Colonization Railway, 1872. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1857, until g.e., 1861, when defeated; and again from g.e., 1863, until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last g.e. ARCHIBALD, CYRIL. [*Stormont.*]

Family came from North of Irel., about 1718, and settled in New Hampshire, thence a branch settled in N.S. about 1760, and in 1796, his grandf. moved to Vermont, from which his father came to Stormont, 1816. B. in Osna-bruck, May, 1837. Ed. at Upper Canada College. Unmarried. Has served in the County and Township Councils. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. Was for several years a Municipal Councillor, on two occasions elected Reeve of the Township of West Flamboro', and, in 1870, Warden of Wentworth. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at last g.e. A Reformer. *Strabane, Ont.*

BAKER, GEORGE BARNARD, *M.A. (Missisquoi.)*

Third s. of the late William Baker, Esq., who represented Missisquoi in the L.C. Assembly, from 1834 until the suspension of the constitution of that Province in 1837; and nephew of Stevens Baker, Esq., who represented the county in the same body from 1830 to 1834; the grandfather was a U.E. loyalist. B. at Dunham, Que;

26 Jan., 1834. Ed. at the Univ. of Bishops' College, Lennoxville, where he graduated, 1855. M., 1860, Jane Percival, eld. dau. of Peter Cowan, Esq., of Cowansville, Sheriff of the District of Bedford. Called to the bar, L.C., same year. Is a Trustee of the Univ. of Bishops' College. Ont. B. in Toronto, 7 Sept., 1826. Ed. at Upper Canada College. Unmarried. Graduated as M.D. at Univ. of McGill College, 1847. Is one of the examiners in Ontario College of Physicians and Surgeons, and a Trustee of Cornwall High School. Entered Volunteer Militia Service, as captain of a company raised by him during "Trent" difficulty, 1861; became Major, 1866, and promoted Lieut.-Col. 59th "Stormont and Glengarry" Batt., V.I., 1859, a command he still holds. BROOKS, EDWARD TOWLE, *M.A.* [*Sherbrooke.*]

S. of the late Samuel Brooks, Esq., who sat for Sherbrooke (county) in Can. Assembly from 1844 until his death, 1849. B. in Sherbrooke. Ed. at Dartmouth College, N.H., where he graduated, *M.A.* M. the dau. of the late Eleazar Clarke, Esq., Revenue Inspector and High Constable, Sherbrooke. Called to the Bar, *L.C.* 1854. First returned to Parlt., for present seat by acclamation, at last g.e. A Conservative and a supporter of the present Administration —*Sherbrooke, P.Q.*

BROUSE, WILLIAM HENRY, *M.A., M.D.* [*Southern
Grenville.*]

S. of Col. Jacob Brouse, a descendant of one of the first U.E. loyalists who settled on the banks of the St. Lawrence. B. in Matilda Dundas, Ont., 1824. Ed. at Victoria College Cobourg, in Arts, where he took degree of *M.A.* studied with Hon. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Great St. James St., Belleville, Ont.*

BELL, *Lieut.-Col.* JACOB DOCKSTADER. (*Brockville.*)

Youngest s. of the late *Lieut.-Col.* William Bell, 7th Leeds Militia, (medal with clasps for "Chrysler's Farm"), who was one of the representatives of the county of Leeds in the U.C.

Assembly from 1828 to 1836, (having been thrice elected); and grands. of the late William Buehl, Esq., a U.E. loyalist and an officer in the "King's Rangers", who represented the county of Leeds in the U.C. Assembly, 1801. B. in Brockville, 4 Oct., 1827. Ed. there. M., 1st., at Pittsburg, Susan Chaffey, 3rd dau. of the late John Chislett, Esq., (she d. M., 8 March, 1855, Henrietta, youngest dau. of late Thos. Robinson, Esq., of Sheffield, Eng. A dir. of the Confederation Life Association, and Vice-Presdt., Evangelical Alliance, N.B., a senior partner in firm of I. & F. Burpee, Co., hardware merchants, St. John, and extensively engaged in manufacturing. Has been Mayor of town of Portland for several years. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. CAMERON, Lieut.-Col. Hon. JOHN HILLYARD, D.C.L., Q.C. [*Cardwell.*]

Descended from the Camerons of Glenevis in Scot. (See Skene's *Highlanders of Scotland.*) S. of the late Angus Cameron, Esq., an officer in the Royal Canadian Rifles, and formerly of the

79th (or "Cameron") Highlanders, by the dau. of Saml. Hillyard, Esq., of St. Ives, Huntingdonshire, Eng. B. at Beaucaire, Lanquedoc, France, 14 April, 1817. Came to Can. when very young. Ed. at Kilkenny College, and Upper Can. College. M., 1st, 1843, Elizabeth, third dau. of the late Hon. H. J. Boulton, (she d. 1844); 2ndly, 1849, Ellen, second dau. of Gen. Mallett. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1838. Called to the Bar, L.C., July, 1869. Created Q.C., 1846. Is a distinguished *Nisi Prius* Counsel. Author of *A Digest of Cases Determined in the Upper Canada Court of Queen's Bench, &c.* (Tor., 1840); *The Rules of Court and Statutes Relating to Practice and Pleading in the Court of Queen's Bench, U.C.* (Do., 1844) *Reports of Cases Determined in Queen's Bench &c.* (Do., 1845.) Is *ex officio* a Bencher of the Law Society, and Treasurer of that body Chancellor of the Univ. of Trinity College Toronto; Lieut.-Col. 3rd Batt. Toronto Militia Presdt. of the Provincial Insurance Co. Chairman Can. Board Edinburgh Life Assurance Co.; a dir. of the Can. Life Assurance Co., of the Beaver Mutual Fire Insurance Association, and of the Dominion Telegraph Co. Held the office of Grand Master of the Orange Association of B.N.A. for some years

and has been a mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto, and an Alderman of that city. Degree of D.C.L. (hon.) from Univ. of Trinity College, 1855. Was a Commissioner for Revising the Statutes of U.C., 1840; and for Consolidating the Statutes of U.C. and Canada respectively, 1856. Was Solicitor-General, U.C.; from July, 1846, to March 1848, and a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from May, 1847, to March, 1848. Declined the Attorney-Generalship, on party grounds, 1847. CAMPBELL, *Lieut.-Col. Hon. STEWART, Q.C.*
[*Guysborough.*]

S. of the late John Campbell, Esq., of the Island of Jamaica, who sat in the House of Assembly of that Island for many years, and was a distinguished Militia General Officer during the rebellion in Jamaica in 1832; and grand (maternally) of the late James Stewart, Esq. of Stewart Castle, Trelawney, Jamaica, who was for many years a mem. of the Jamaican Legislature, and also an Assistant Judge of the Superior Court in that Colony. B. in Jamaica 5 May, 1812. Ed. in Eng. M., 1837, George Mackintosh, dau. of the late Matthew Richards Esq., of Halifax, N.S. Called to the Bar, N.S. 1835. Is a Queen's Counsel; Surrogate of

Court of Vice-Admiralty, N.S.; and Lieut.-Col. of the Guysboro' Reserve Militia. Has held the offices of Judge of Probate and Coroner for the Co. Guysboro'. Was from 1863 to 1865 a Commissioner, with Messrs. Blanchard and Harrington, to revise and consolidate the Statutes of Nova-Scotia. Was Speaker of the House of Assembly, N.S., from 1854 to 1860, having been thrice elected to that office. Sat for present seat in N.S. Assembly from 1851 until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at g.e., 1867; returned to the Commons by acclamation at g.e., 1872, and has consequently continuously represented the same constituency of Guysborough for a period of 22 years. the London and Canadian Loan and Agency Co. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Receiver-General, Can., from 27 March to 21 May, 1862, when the Ministry of which he was a mem. was defeated; and a mem. of Ex. Council and Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works for the Province of Ontario, from July, 1867, until Dec., 1871, when the Govt. was defeated and retired from office. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1857, until the Union, when returned to Commons; re-elected at last g.e. Represented London in Local Assembly from 1867 until 1872, when he resigned. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir John Macdonald. — *Waterloo St., London; Toronto Club; Rideau Club.*

CARTER, EDWARD, *D.C.L., B.C.L., Q.C.* [*Brome.*]

S. of the late Dr. Geo. Carter, Staff-Surgeon British Army; and grands. of the late Rev. Dr. Short, Rector of Three Rivers, Q. B. in Three Rivers, 1 March, 1822. Ed. there and at Nicolet College. M. his cousin, the dau. of the late Jas. Hastings Kerr, Esq., of Quebec, and grand-daughter of the late Hon. Mr. Justice Kerr. Called to the Bar, L.C., Feb., 1845. Created Q.C., 1862. Was Clerk of the Crown and Associate Clerk of the Peace from 1862 to 1866. Is professor of Crimi-

nal Law in McGill University. Sat for Montreal Centre in Quebec Assembly from g.e., 1867, to g.e., 1871, when, defeated. Returned to Commons, for present seat, Nov., 1871; re-elected at last g.e. An unsuccessful candidate for Chateauguay in Local House, g.e., 1871. A Conservative and a supporter of the present Administration.—31 *Cadieux St., Montreal; Stadacona Club.*

CARTIER, *Hon. Sir* GEORGE ETIENNE, *Bart., Q.C.*
[*Provencher.*] P.C.

Descended from a brother of the celebrated navigator and discoverer, Jacques-Cartier, of St. Malo, France. S. of the late Licut.-Col. Jacques Cartier, of St. Antoine, River Chambly, by Marguerite, dau. of Jaseph Paradis, Esq. B. at St. Antoine, 6 Sept., 1815. Ed. at St. Sulpice College, Montreal. M., 1846, Hortense, dau. of M. Edouard Raymond Fabre, of that city. Called to the Bar, L.C., Nov., 1835. Created Q.C., 1854. Was made an honorary mem. of the Bar of U.C. by the Law Society, Hilary Term, 1866. Dir. of the Montreal Mining Co., and of the Life Association of Scot. Is author of the French national song: *O Canada, Mon Pays*, and of other songs, which have been set to music. Has been Presdt. of the Mon-

treal *St. Jean Baptiste Société*. Declined Solicitor-Generalship, L.C., 1851, and the Commissionership of Public Works, 1853. Declined the Companionship of the Bath (Civil), 1867. Was a Govt. dir. of the Grand Trunk Railway from Nov., 1852, to May, 1853, and has been Solicitor to the Co. for many years. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Speakership of Can. Assembly, 1854. Entered Parlt. as a supporter of Messrs. Lafontaine and Baldwin, became afterwards the principal supporter of Messrs. Hincks and Morin, and succeeded to the leadership of the French Canadian Conservative party on the retirement of Sir L. H. Lafontaine and M. Morin. Sat for Verchères, (formerly Surrey, and represented by his grandfather in the first Canadian Parlt.), in Can. Assembly from 1848 until g.e., 1861, when returned for Montreal East, which he represented until the Union, and afterwards in House of Commons, until last g.e., when defeated. An unsuccessful candidate for Montreal at g.e., 1857. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, Can., from 27 Jan., 1855, to 29 July, 1858, from 6 Aug. of latter year to 28 May, 1862, and from 30 March, 1864, to the Union, and during these several periods was Provincial-Secy., from Jan., 1855, to May, 1856, and Attorney-General, L.C., from latter date to 1861.

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Augt., 1858, when he resigned office with the other members of the Cabinet. Apptd. Inspector-General, 6 Augt. of that year. Was entrusted with the formation of a Govt., in which he held office of Attorney-General, L.C., from 7 Augt., 1868, until 21 May, 1862, when he and his Cabinet resigned, being defeated on the Militia Bill. Was a second time called upon to form a Govt., in March, 1864, but declined in favor of the late Sir Etienne Taché, in whose Administration he again held the office of Attorney-General, L.C., a position which he retained until the Union of the B.N.A. Provinces, July, 1867. Prominent features in the policy of the Cartier-Macdonald Administration of 1858, were: The Confederation of the B.N.A. Provinces (for the first time adopted as a part of the policy of a Canadian Govt.); the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, and the maintenance of the Queen's decision in favor of Ottawa as the permanent seat of Govt. of Can. Proceeded as delegate to Eng., 1858, to bring the two first-named schemes under the attention of the Imperial authorities, as a means of settlement of the vexed constitutional difficulties, which then existed in the Province of Can., also the question of the acquisition by Can. of the Hudson's Bay

Territory. The suggestions contained in the letter addressed at that time to the then Secy. of State for the Colonies (the late Lord Lytton) by the delegates, constituted the basis of the policy of the Can. Coalition Govt. of 1864, formed for the purpose of securing the Confederation of B.N.A. Was a mem. of the Charlottetown and of the Quebec Union Conferences, 1864, of the Confederate Council of Trade, Quebec, 1865, and of the B.N.A. Colonial Conference, London, 1866-7, which finally obtained the passage of the British North America Act, 1867. Sworn of the Queen's Privy Council, Can., and apptd. Minister of Militia and Defence for the Dominion, 1 July, 1867. Created a Baronet of the United Kingdom, Augt., 1868. Created a Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Order of *Isabella la Catolica* (of Spain), Jan., 1872. Was a delegate to Eng., 1868, to confer with the Imperial Govt. respecting the defences of the Dominion, and the acquisition of the North West Territory. We enumerate some of the public measures which owe their existence to Sir George C. : The construction of the Grand Trunk Railway, including the Victoria Bridge. The promotion of Education and the establishment of Normal Schools. The improvement in several particulars of the Criminal Laws. Final abolition of Feudal Ten

ure. Decentralization of Justice in Lower Canada Determining and settling the Laws with regard to Lands in the Townships of Lower Canada. The Codification of the Civil Law and the Civil Procedure of Lower Canada; the Confederation of B.N.A.; the reorganization of the Militia of the Dominion; and the erection of fortifications for the defence of the country. Was chairman of Railway Committee of Can. Assembly from 1852, with the exception of one session, until the Union, a position which he also holds in the House of Commons. Returned for Provencher, by acclamation, at last g.e. Represented Montreal East in Local Assembly from the Union until g.e., 1871, when returned for Beauharnois. A Conservative.—*Notre Dame St. Montreal*; "*Limoilou*," *Hochelaga, Montreal*; *Cartier Square, Ottawa*; *Reform Club, London*; *St. James Club*; *Rideau Club*.

CARTWRIGHT, RICHARD JOHN. [*Lennox*.]

S. of the late Rev. R. D. Cartwright, Chaplain to the Forces at Kingston; and grands. of the late Hon. Richard Cartwright, a U.E. loyalist, who sat in the Parliament of U.C. B. 4 Dec., 1835. M., Aug., 1859, Frances, eld. dau. of Col. Alex. Lawe, late H.E.I.C.S. A dir. of the Canada Life Assurance Co. Was Presdt. of the

late Commercial Bank of Canada. Author of a pamphlet on the Militia question. Sat for Lennox and Addington in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons for present seat at g.e., 1867, and again at last g.e. An Independent Conservative.—*King St., Kingston, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

CASEY, GEORGE ELLIOTT, B.A. [*West Elgin.*]

S. of the late William Casey, Esq., of Southwold, Elgin, Ont., by the dau. of the late George Elliott, Esq., one of the earliest settlers in Elgin. B. in Southwold, March, 1850. Ed. at the Grammar School, St. Thomas, and at the Univ. of Toronto, where he graduated (with honors in Classics), June, 1871. Passed matriculation of Law Society of Ontario, Feb., 1872. Unmarried. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at last g.e. A Reformer, and an opponent of the Macdonald-Cartier Ministry.—*Fingal, Ont.*

CASGRAIN, PHILIPPE BABY. [*L'Islet.*]

Descended from an ancient French family originally belonging to Airvault in Peitou, members of which came here in the early years of French settlement in Can., served in the French Army, and became possessed of the Seigniories of La Boutellerie, St. Denis, and

L'Islet de Bonsecours. S. of the late Hon. Charles Eusebe Casgrain, who sat for Cornwallis in L.C. Assembly from 1830 to 1834, was a mem. of the Special Council of L.C., from 1838 to 1840, and at his death held the office of Asst. Com. of Public Works, Can., by Anne Elizabeth, dau. of the late Hon. James Baby, -at one time Speaker of the L.C. of L. Can. B. in City of Quebec, 1827. Ed. at St. Anne College. M., 1854, Matilda, dau. of the late Col. Perrault, and granddau. of the late F. X. Perrault, Esq., for many years Prothonotary of Dist. of Quebec. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1850. Was Deputy Prothonotary of Superior Court, Quebec, for 13 years, an office he resigned, 1873, in order to enter Parlt. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal; favors Political Independence.—4 Collins St., Quebec.

CAUCHON, *Lieut.-Col. Hon.* JOSEPH EDOUARD.
[Quebec Centre.]

Descended from a mem. of the *Conseil Supérieur*, who came to Canada in 1636; a son of this gentleman, Cauchon de Laverdière, was a Judge of the *Cour Royale*, at the Island of Orleans. B. at St. Rochs, Quebec, 31 Dec., 1816. Ed. at the Seminary of that city. M., 1st, 1844, Julie, eld. dau. of M. Chas. Lemieux, of Quebec,

(she d. 1864); 2ndly, 1866, Miss Nolan, of the same city. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1843. Edited *Le Canadien* newspaper, from 1841 to 1842, and in the latter year founded *Le Journal de Québec*, of which he is still chief political editor. Was Lieut.-Col. of the 9th Batt. of Volunteer Militia, or *Chasseurs de Québec*, and Mayor of Quebec for some years. Elected Presdt. of the North Shore Railway and St. Maurice Navigation Co., 1870. Is author of *Notions Élémentaires de Physique*, (Que., 1841); *Etudes sur l'Union Projetée des Provinces de Britanniques de l'Amérique du Nord.* (do., 1858); and *L'Union des Provinces de l'Amérique Britannique du Nord.* (do., 1865.) Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands, Can., from Jan., 1855, to April, 1857; and Commissioner of Public Works, from June, 1861, to May, 1862. Called upon, in 1867, to form a Government for the Province of Quebec, a duty he failed to accomplish, owing to causes beyond his control. Sat for Montmorenci in Can. Assembly from 1844, until the Union, when he was returned to Commons and Local House by acclamation. Resigned seat in former House on being called to Senate, and apptd. Speaker of that body, 5 Nov., 1867, where he remained until July, 1872, when he resigned in order to re-enter Commons. Resigned seat in

Local House, Dec., 1872, and again returned by acclamation. Returned to Commons for Quebec Centre, at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Administration.—17 *D'Auteuil St., Quebec.*

CHARLTON, JOHN. [*North Norfolk.*]

Father came from Northumberland, Eng. B. near Caledonia, N.Y., 3^d Feb., 1829. Ed. in New York. M., Nov., 1854, in Can., Miss Ellen Gray. A Lumber-merchant. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Lynedoch, Ont.*

CHIPMAN, *Lieut.-Col.* LEVERETT DE VEBER. [*Kings, N.S.*]

Family came originally from Eng. during the old times of persecution, and settled in the old New Eng. States; at the termination of the Am. revolution, Ward Chipman, formerly of Mass., a graduate of Harvard University, and who held the office of Deputy Muster-Master-General of the Loyalist forces in the revolted Colonies, settled in N.B., and founded a branch of the family there; he subsequently became Chief-Justice and President of that Province. (See *Sabine*.) Another branch was founded in N.S. by Handey Chipman, who proceeded there before the close of the revolution. S. of the late

Assembly from 1844 to 1850 (when he retired from Parlt. for a short time), and again from 1866 until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for the same seat, 1840. Returned to Commons by acclamation at g. e., 1867, and again at last g. e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Cambridge, Queens Co. N.B.*

FINDLAY, JAMES. [*North Renfrew.*]

S. of Mr. Robt. Findlay, of Hamilton, Scot., who came to Can., 1829. B. at Chateaugu. y.

Que., 16 May, 1833. Ed. there. Unmarried. Is editor and proprietor of the *Pembroke Observer*. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat, Oct., 1869. First returned at last g.e. "A Liberal in every sense of the term," and opposed to present Government.—*Beachburg, Ont.*

FISSET, JEAN BAPTISTE ROMUALD, *M.D.* [*Rimouski*]

S. of Henri Fiset, Esq., J.P. of St. Cuthbert Que. B. there, 7 Feb., 1842. Ed. at Montreal College; graduated as M.D. at Laval University. M. Aimee, dau. of Honoré Plamondon, Esq., of Quebec. Is a town councillor of Rimouski, and Surgeon, Provisional Batt. Rimouski Militia. An unsuccessful candidate for Rimouski in Local Assembly, April, 1872. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Govt.—*St. Germain de Rimouski, Que.*

FLEMING, GAVIN, *J.P.*, [*North Brant.*]

S. of the late Mr. John Fleming, by Margaret Dobbie, who came to Can., from Scot., 1831. B. at the farm of Shieldhill, near Falkirk, Stirlingshire, Scot., 5 June, 1826. Ed. at Falkirk. Came to Can., 1849, and for 20 years was a merchant at Glenmorris; retired from business, 1871. Was Treasurer of South Dumfries for 4 years. First

returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal. "In favor of a stringent election law; of the trial of controverted elections by judges; of prohibiting placemen from having seats in Parlt.; an income franchise; and an elective Senate. Believes in giving such encouragement to Railways and other public works as the finances of the country will warrant."—*Glenmorris, Ont.*

FLESHER, WILLIAM KINGSTON, *J.P.* [*East Grey.*]

B. at Kingston-upon-Hull, Eng., 10 June. 1825. Ed. there. A millowner, and Capt. 31st "Grey" Batt. V. I. Was Reeve of Artemesia for the long period of 16 years, and Warden of Grey for 6 years. Forbes, in 1405. Great grandfather, Wm. Forbes, settled in Island of St. Kitts, establishing a branch of the family there. S. of—Forbes, Esq., a native of St. Kitts, and an officer in the 64th Regt., who, after retiring from the army, was apptd. Collector of Customs at Yarmouth, N.S. B. at Gibraltar, 1820. Graduated at University College, N.Y. M. Sarah Jane, only dau. of W. S. Jacobs, Esq., of Liverpool, N.S. A Physician, and surgeon to 1st Batt. Queens Co. Militia. Has been Coroner for the Co. for over 20 years, and Health officer for Liverpool and the Co. for a longer period. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected, by acclamation, at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Liverpool, N.S.*

FORTIN, *Hon. PIERRE, M.D. [Gaspé.]*

B. at Verchères, Que., Dec., 1823. Received his classical education at Montreal Seminary; studied medicine at McGill College; where he took his degree, 1845. Unmarried. Served as surgeon at Quarantine, Grosse Isle, during 1847 (fever year) and 1848. Aided in 1849 in forming a special mounted constabulary force for quelling disturbances of the peace in Montreal and adjoining districts, a troop of which was placed under his command. Was stipendiary magis-

trate for the protection of the fisheries in the lower River and Gulf of St. Lawrence (from 1852 until the Union, when he resigned,) and as such, commanded first, the armed steamer *Doris*, and afterwards the armed schooner *La Canadienne*, built specially for the service, in which latter vessel he was wrecked in Nov., 1861, during a violent storm on the North Coast. Appt. a mem. of Ex. Council, and Commissioner of Crown Lands, for Province of Quebec, Feb., 1873. First returned to Parlt. for present seat by acclamation at g.e., 1867; re-elected, by acclamation, at last g.e. Has represented Gaspé in Local Assembly since 1867. FOURNIER, TELESPHORE, Q.C. [*Bellechasse.*]

sents Montmagny in Local House, for which he was elected at g.e., 1871. A Liberal; opposed to the present Government, and in favor of the Independence of Canada.—11 *Garden St., Quebec.*

GALBRAITH, DANIEL, *J.P.* [*North Lanark.*]

B. in Glasgow, Scot., about 1815. Ed. there. Came to Can., with his father, 1821, and settled in Ramsay, Lanark, Ont., where he has since remained. M. Miss Macfarlane, of Ramsay. A farmer. Is a dir. of the Brockville and Ottawa Railway. Was Warden of Lanark and Renfrew, and after division of those Counties, of Lanark. Sat for North Lanark in Local Assembly from g.e., 1867, until July, 1872, when he resigned, to contest seat for Commons. Returned at last g.e. A Liberal, and an opponent of present Govt.—*Almonte, Ont.*

GAUDET, JOSEPH, *J.P.* [*Nicolet.*]

A mem. of the Council of Agriculture for Quebec. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1857, until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and again at last g.e. Represented same seat in the Local House from g.e., 1867, until g.e., 1871. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. Cartier—*Gentilly, Que.*

GENDRON, PIERRE SAMUEL, *N.P.* [*Bagot.*]

S. of M. Simon Gendron, *Cultivateur*, of Ste. Rosalie. B. there, 31 Augt., 1828. Ed. at St. Hyacinthe College. M., 1850, Louise, dau. of M. Marcel Fournier, of St. Simon. A Notary Public. Is Presdt. of the Bagot Colonization Society. Has been Secy-Treasurer of the Municipal Council of Bagot for the past 14 years. First returned to Parlt., at g.e., 1867, to Commons and Local House. Re-elected to Local House at g.e., 1871, and to Commons at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. Cartier.—*Ste. Rosalie, Que.*

GEOFFRION, FELIX, *N.P.* [*Verchères.*]

S. of M. Félix Geoffrion, of St. Simon, Co. Bagot, by the late Catherine Brodeur. B. at Verchères, Que., 4 Oct., 1832. M., Oct., 1856, Almaïde, the youngest dau. of Joseph Dansereau, Esq., of Verchères. A Notary Public. Was Registrar for Verchères from 1854 to 1863. Has been Secy-Treasurer of County Schools. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1863 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and again at last g.e. A Liberal, and opposed to present Government—*Verchères, Que.*

GIBBS, WILLIAM HENRY, *J.P.* [*North Ontario.*]

Of Norman descent. S. of Mr. Thos. Gibbs (a native of Kingsbridge, Devonshire, Eng., who came to Can., 1819, and settled at Oshawa, Ont., 1832), and younger bro. of the mem. for South Ontario. B. at Terrebonne, Que., 29 Nov., 1823. M., 23 Dec., 1845, Frances, second dau. of the late Geo. Wells Colton, Esq., of West Whitby, Ont. A mem. of the firm of Gibbs & Brother, produce dealers and mill owners, Oshawa. Is Reeve of Oshawa, and Presdt. of Oshawa Cabinet Co. Has been Deputy Reeve of Whitby, and Warden of Ontario. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Simcoe St., Oshawa.*

GIBBS, THOMAS NICHOLSON, *J.P.* [*South Ontario.*]

Of Norman descent. S. of Mr. Thos. Gibbs, who came to Canada from Kingsbridge, Devonshire, Eng., in 1819, settled at Terrebonne, Que., and in 1832 removed to Oshawa, Ont.; and cousin of F. W. Gibbs, Esq., C.B., formerly tutor to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales. B. at Terrebonne, 11 March, 1821. Ed. in Eng. M., Augt., 1843, Almira, youngest dau. of the late Joseph Ash, Esq., of Cobourg, Ont. Head of

the firm of Gibbs & Brother, produce dealers and proprietors of the Oshawa Mills. Is Vice-Presdt. of Ontario Bank, and a dir. of the Confederation Life Assurance Co., of the Dominion Telegraph Co., and of the London and Canadian Loan and Agency Co. Was the first Reeve elected for Oshawa, 1850; and the first Warden elected for the Co., 1854. Contested North Ontario unsuccessfully at g.e., 1854. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from Jan., 1865, until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and again at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Administration. *Oshawa, Ont.*

GIBSON, WILLIAM. [*Dundas.*]

GILLIES, JOHN. [*North Bruce.*]

Is Reeve of Elderslie, and has been Warden of Bruce. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal, and opposed to the present Administration.—*Paisley, Ont.*

GLASS, DAVID. [*East Middlesex.*]

Second s. of Mr. Samuel Glass, who in 1818 emigrated from north of Irel. to Co. Middlesex,

where he has since resided. B. in Westminster, East Middlesex, Ont., 1 July, 1830. Ed. at London Grammar school. M., 22 Dec., 1852, Sarah, second dau. of the late Henry Dalton, Esq. Called to the Bar, U.C., Easter Term, 1864. Entered City Council of London, 1855, where he remained, as an Alderman, until 1858, in which year he was unanimously elected Mayor of the city, an honor which was subsequently twice conferred upon him, by vote of the people, 1865-66. He has also filled the position of Police Magistrate and Recorder of London. An unsuccessful candidate for Bothwell at g.e., 1867. First returned, for present seat, at last g.e. A Conservative, and generally in favor of the policy of Sir John A. Macdonald's Govt. "In favor of a uniform penny postage, and of the acquisition, by Govt., of the telegraphic system of the Dominion."—*Talbot St., London, Ont.*

GRANT, JAMES ALEXANDER, *M.D., F.G.S., F.R.C.S.*

M., 1855, Maria, second dau. of the late Ed. Malloch, Esq., who sat for Carleton in the L.A. of U.C. before, and, in the L.A., Can., after the Union of 1840. A Fellow of the Geological Society, Eng., and of the Royal College of Surgeons, (Edin.); mem. of the Royal College of Surgeons, (Lon.), and of the Royal College of Physicians (Lon.) and a corresponding mem. of the Academy of Natural Sciences, Philadelphia. Elected Presdt. of the Canadian Medical Association, 1872, and is Presdt. of the St. Andrew's Society, of the Literary and Scientific Society, and of the Metropolitan Canadian Society, all of Ottawa. Has been President of the Medical Council of U.C. and of the Mechanics' Institute and Athenæum, Ottawa, and Vice Presdt. of the Montreal and Ottawa City Junction Railway Co. Author of various papers on medical and surgical science in English and Canadian medical journals. First returned to Parlt. for present seat, at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last

g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Rideau St., Ottawa; Rideau Club.*

GROVER, PEREGRINE MAITLAND, J.P. [*East Peterborough.*]

S. of the late John Grover, Esq., of Grafton, Ont. B. there, 17 Oct., 1817. Ed. at Upper Canada College. M., 1856, Harriet M., dau. of the late J. A. Keeler, Esq., of Colborne, Ont. Has been Warden of Peterborough, and is a dir. of the Can. West Farmers' Mutual and Stock Insurance Co. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Trent division in L.C., Can., 1863. First returned to Parl. for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Norwood, Ont.*

HAGAR, ALBERT. [*Prescott.*]

Ancestors emigrated from Eng. to Massachusetts before the Am. Revolution. S. of Abner Hagar, Esq., J.P., who came to Montreal, 1801, was a well-known merchant in that city, and settled in Plantagenet, 1820, by Miss Hannah P. Barker, of St. Johnsbury, Vt. B. in North Plantagenet, Prescott, Ont., 1827. Ed. at Peacham Academy, Vt. Unmarried. A farmer, merchant, lumber dealer, and grist and saw mill owner. Holds a captaincy in Militia. Has been Local

Supdt. of Schools, Reeve of North Plantagenet, and Warden of Prescott and Russell. First returned to Parliament for present seat at g.e., 1867. Re-elected by acclamation at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Plantagenet, Ont.*

HAGGART, JOHN GRAHAM. [*South Lanark.*]

S. of John Haggart, Esq., formerly of Breadalbane, Perthshire, Scot., but latterly of Perth, Lanark, Ont., by Isabella Graham, of the Isle of Skye, Inverness-shire, Scot. B. in Perth, Ont., 14 Nov., 1836. A saw and grist mill owner. Was for several years Mayor of Perth. Unsuccessful candidate for South Lanark in Local Assembly at g.e., 1867, and in 1869. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. A Liberal Conservative, and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Perth, Ont.*

HARVEY, WILLIAM. [*East Elgin.*]

First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e.. A Reformer, and opposed to present Administration.

HARWOOD, ROBERT WILLIAM, J.P. [*Vaudreuil.*]

Second s. of the late Hon. Robt. Unwin Harwood, a mem. of the Special Council, L.C., from 1838 to 1840, subsequently the representative

of Vaudreuil in the Can. Assembly, and at his death, 1863, mem. for Rigaud in the L.C., Can., by Louise Josephite, eld. dau. of Hon. M. E. G. Alain Chartier de Lotbinière, a mem. of L.C. of L. Can. B. in Montreal, 27 Oct., 1826. Ed. at St. Sulpice College, in that city. M., 7 Oct., 1856, Mary Charlotte, eld. dau. of John McGillis, Esq., of Williamstown, Glengarry, Ont. A Captain in the Militia and Presdt. of the Commissioners Court. Has been Warden of Vaudreuil. An unsuccessful candidate for Vaudreuil in Local Assembly at g.e., 1871. First returned to Parlt., at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir George Cartier. A Protectionist in trade matters.—*Vaudreuil, Que.*

HIGGINBOTTAM, *Lieut.-Col.* NATHANIEL. [*North Wellington.*]

Is Lieut.-Col. 30th "Wellington" Batt. of Volunteer Rifles. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Reformer, and opposed to present Administration.—*Queen St., Guelph, Ont.*

HINCKS, *Hon. Sir* FRANCIS, *K.C.M.G., C.B.*
[*Vancouver.*] P.C.

Youngest s. of the late Rev. Dr. Hincks, Professor of Oriental Languages in the Royal Bel-

fast Institution ; and bro. of the late Rev. Edward Hincks, D.D., formerly Fellow of Trinity College, Dublin, and afterwards Rector of Killyleagh, who was well known by his writings on subjects connected with Egyptian, Persian and Assyrian Archæology. The Irish family is a branch of one long settled in Chester, England. B. in the City of Cork, 14 Dec., 1807. Ed. at the Royal Belfast Institution. M., 1832, Martha Anne, dau. of Alexander Stewart, Esq., of Ligoniel, near Belfast. Founded, in 1839, the Toronto *Examiner*, a Reform journal, which he edited for several years ; and, in 1844, the Montreal *Pilot*, also devoted to the interests of the Reform party, of which he was for many years chief political writer. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council and Inspector Genl. of Can. from June, 1842, to Nov., 1843, when he retired from the Govt. with his political chiefs, Messrs. Lafontaine and Baldwin ; held the same office again : 1st, from March, 1848, to Oct., 1851, in the Cabinet of Messrs. Lafontaine and Baldwin, and, 2ndly, from latter date to Sept., in 1854, in the Hincks-Morin Administration, of which he was the leader. Visited Washington on several occasions to confer with the British Minister there on the subject of commercial intercourse be-

tween Can. and the U.S., and was selected by the Earl of Elgin to accompany him as representative of Can. when he negotiated the Reciprocity Treaty in 1854 ; was a delegate to the Maritime Provinces in 1852 on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway, and in the same year a delegate to the Imperial Govt., to urge the repeal of the Clergy Reserve Act, and the grant of a guarantee for the Intercolonial Railroad, during which visit he made the preliminary arrangements with Messrs. Peto, Brassey, Betts and Jackson, which resulted in the construction of the Grand Trunk Railway by English capitalists. Was Governor-in-Chief of Barbadoes and the Windward Islands from 1855 to 1862 ; and Governor of British Guiana from latter date until 1869. Created a Companion of the Order of the Bath (Civil), 1862 ; and a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, 1869. Sworn of the Privy Council of Can., and apptd. Minister of Finance for the Dominion, 9 Oct., 1869 ; resigned, Feb. 1873. Is Presdt. of the Confederation Life Assurance Co. of Canada ; and a member of Council of Royal Colonial Institute, London, Eng. Author of various pamphlets on public affairs. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1841, for Oxford, in Can. Assembly which he represented until

g.e., 1844, when defeated. Returned for same County at g.e., 1847; again at g.e., 1851, and also for Niagara, but elected to sit for Oxford. Returned for South Oxford and for Renfrew at g.e., 1854; elected to sit for latter seat, which he did until he temporarily retired from Canadian public life, 1855, on accepting an appointment from the Imperial Govt. On again accepting office in Can., returned for North Renfrew in the Commons, Oct., 1869, which he represented until the close of Parliament, when returned for present seat, by acclamation. An unsuccessful candidate for South Brant, at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Russell House, Ottawa; Reform Club, London; Rideau Club; Toronto Club.*

HOLTON, Hon. LUTHER HAMILTON, J.P. [*Chateauguay.*]

B. in South Leeds, Ont., 1817. Removed to Montreal, 1826, where he entered mercantile life, and was for many years a mem. of the firm of Hooker & Holton, forwarders. M., Miss Forbes. Was a contractor for a portion of the Atlantic and St. Lawrence Railway. Has been Presdt. of the Board of Trade (repeatedly), and of the Montreal City and District Savings' Bank, a Vice-Presdt. of the Free Trade Association, a

Harbor Commissioner, a dir. of the City Bank, and a mem. of the Corporation of Montreal. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 2 to 6 Aug., 1858, and from May, 1863, to March, 1864; and held the office of Commissioner of Public Works, Can., on the former occasion; and that of Minister of Finance on the latter. Was a Govt. Director of the Grand Trunk Railway from Nov., 1852, to July, 1857. Sat for Montreal in Can. Assembly from 1854 till 1857, when defeated. Was mem. for Victoria Division in L.C., Can., from Sept., 1862, to May, 1863, when he resigned, (on being appointed Minister of Finance,) and was returned for present seat, which he represented until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and again at last g.e. Represents Montreal Centre in the Local House (where he leads the English Opposition), for which he was returned at g.e., 1871. Entered Parl. as an advanced Liberal, and has always been in accord with the Liberal party, except on question of Confederation, which temporarily divided that party. HOWE, *Hon.* JOSEPH. [*Hants.*]

P.C.

Family originally came from the southern counties of Eng. during the old times of persecution, and settled in the New Eng. States. S. of the late John Howe, a loyalist, formerly of Boston, Mass., where, at the revolutionary era, he conducted the *Massachusetts Gazette* and *Boston News Letter*, and latterly of Halifax, where he held the office of King's Printer and Postmaster-General for a lengthened period; and bro. of the late Asst. Com. Gen. Howe. (See Sabine's *Am. Loyalists.*) B. on the North West Arm, Halifax, N.S., 1804. Ed. by his father. M., 2 Feb., 1828, Catherine Susan Ann, only dau. of Capt. John MacNab, Nova Scotia Fencibles. A Governor of Dalhousie College, Halifax, and of King's College, Windsor; a Vice-Presdt. of the N.S. Historical Society, and Presdt. of the Mechanics' Institute, Halifax. Was for many years a prominent journalist in N.S.; editor and proprietor of *The Acadian* (Halifax) from 1827

to 1828, and of the *Nova Scotian*, from the latter year until 1841, when he retired from the press for a brief period, but returned in 1844, and edited the *Nova Scotian* and the *Morning Chronicle*, from that time until 1856. M., 23 Apl., 1862, Berthe, dau. of the late Toussaint Laflamme, Esq., merchant of Montreal, and sister of the mem. for Jacques Cartier Called to the Bar, L.C., 1857. A corresponding mem. of the *Société de Législation comparée de Paris* (France). Is Treasurer of the Montreal Bar, editor of the *Revue Critique de Législation et de Jurisprudence du Canada*, and a correspondent of the *Revue de Droit International de Gand* (Belgium). Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1861, until the Union. Elected by acclamation at g.e., 1867, as member to Commons and Local House, in which latter body he is Leader of the French Can. Opposition. Re-elected to Commons, by acclamation, at last g.e. JONES, FRANCIS, *P.L.S.*, *C.E.*, *J.P.* [*North Leeds and Grenville.*]

LANGEVIN, *Hon.* HECTOR LOUIS, *C.B., Q.C.*
[*Dorchester.*] P.C.

S. of the late Jean Langevin, Esq., formerly Asst. Civil Secretary to the Earl of Gosford, and Lord Sydenham, during the periods those noblemen held the office of Governor-General of Canada, by the late Sophie Scholastique La Force, whose father was acting Commodore of the

British fleet on Lake Ontario during the Am. revolutionary war; and bro. of the Right Rev. J. Langevin, D.D., Bishop of St. Germain de Rimouski. B. in Quebec, 25 Aug., 1826. Ed. at the Seminary of that city. M., 1854, Justine, eld. dau. of Chas. H. Tetu, Esq. Called to the Bar, L.C., Oct., 1850. Created Q.C., March, 1864. Was editor of the *Mélanges Religieux* (Montreal) from 1847 to 1849; subsequently of the *Journal d'Agriculture* (same city); and at a later period, of the *Courrier du Canada* (Quebec.) Sat as a mem. of the City Council, Quebec, for some years, and was chairman of the Water Works Committee. Called to the Bar, U.C., Easter Term, 1840. Created Q.C., 1867. A Bencher of the Law Society of Ontario (elected 1871), and Presdt. of the Ottawa Agricultural Society. Was Recorder of Ottawa, during the existence of that office, and was Mayor of Ottawa, 1858-59. First returned to Parl., for present seat, by acclamation, at last g.e. Third s. of John Little, Esq., of Pitchcabe

(she d. 1866); 2ndly, 1869, Mary Harriet, youngest dau. of Wm. Bennett, Esq., of Claremont, Pickering, Ont. Has been a mem. of the Innisfil Council for 15 years, and of the County Council for 11 years. Is a Major South Simcoe Reserve Militia, and Presdt. Innisfil Agricultural Society. First returned to Parlt. at g.e., 1867, for present seat; re-elected, by acclamation, at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Allendale, Ont.*

[*Glengarry.*]

Railway, and built the aqueduct for the Water Works of Montreal. Has been Warden of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding the Glengarry Reserve Militia; Presdt. of the Montreal and Ottawa City Junction Railway; and a dir. of the Ontario Bank. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1857, until the Union. Elected to

Commons by acclamation at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and opposed to the present Administration.—*Alexandria, Ont.*; *Rideau Club*.

MACDONALD, *Hon. JAMES, Q.C.* [*Pictou.*]

Family came from the Highlands of Scot, to Pictou, N.S.; nearly a century ago. B. at East River, Pictou, 1 July, 1828. Ed. at New Glasgow, N.S. M, 1856, Jane. dau. of the late Wm. Mortimer, Esq., of Pictou. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1851. Created a Q.C., 1867. A dir. of the Confederation Life Association. Was Chief Railway Commissioner for N.S., from June, 1863 to Dec., 1864, when he was apptd. Financial Secy., in the Govt. led by Dr. Tupper, which he continued to hold until the Union. Was one of the Commissioners, (representing N.S.) apptd. to open Trade Relations between the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil and the B.A. Provinces, 1865-66. Sat for Pictou in N.S. Assembly from 1859 until the Union, and from g.e., 1871, until July, 1872, when he resigned. An unsuccessful candidate for Pictou in House of Commons, at g.e., 1867. First returned to Commons at last g.e. A Conservative and a Unionist; supports the present Administration.—*Tobin St., Halifax*; *Halifax Club*.

MACDONALD, *The Right Hon. Sir JOHN ALEXANDER, K.C.B., D.C.L., (Oxon.) LL.D., Q.C. [Kingston.]* P.C.

Eldest s. of the late Hugh Macdonald, Esq., of Kingston, Ont., and formerly of Sutherlandshire, Scot. B. 11 Jan., 1815. Ed. at the Royal Grammar School, Kingston, under Dr. Wilson, a Fellow of Oxford University. M., 1st, Isabella, dau. of the late Alexander Clark, Esq., of Dalnavert, Inverness-shire, Scot. (she d. 1856); 2ndly, 1867, Susan Agnes, dau. of the late Hon. T.T. Bernard, a mem. of H.M. Privy Council of the Island of Jamaica. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Hilary Term, 1836. Created Q.C., 1846. A Bencher, *ex-officio*, of the Law Society of Ontario. Is the grand representative in Can. of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Eng., and holds the rank of a Past Grand Senior Warden of the Freemasons of Can. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 11 May, 1847 to 10 March, 1848, from 11 Sept., 1854 to 29 July, 1858, from 6 Aug., same year to 23 May, 1862, and from 30 March, 1864 until the Union; and was during these several periods, Receiver-Genl. from 21 May to 7 Dec., 1847; Commissioner of Crown Lands from latter date to 10 March, 1848; Attorney-General for U.C. from 11 Sept., 1854 to 29 July, 1858, when

as Prime Minister he and his Cabinet resigned on being defeated on the Seat of Govt. question. Returned to office on 6 Aug., same year, as Postmaster-Genl., a position which he resigned on following day, on his re-appointment as Attorney-Genl., U.C., which he continued to hold until the defeat of the Administration on the Militia Bill, in May, 1862, when he and his colleagues again retired from office. Sir George E. Cartier and he led the Opposition in the Assembly, and so continued until the formation of the Taché-Macdonald Govt., 30 March, 1864, when he returned to his old office of Attorney-Genl., and was Govt. leader in the Assembly from that time until the Union of the B.A. Provinces, 1867. Held the office of Minister of Militia Affairs, jointly with that of Attorney-Genl., from Jan. to May, 1862, and from Aug., 1865, until the Union. Was requested to take the place of Sir E. P. Taché, as Prime Minister, on the death of that gentleman, in 1865, but waived his claim in favor of Sir N. F. Belleau. Has been a delegate to Eng. and other countries on public business on many occasions, and was a delegate to the Conference in Charlottetown in 1864, for the Union of the Maritime Provinces, to that which succeeded it in Quebec, same year, to arrange basis of Union of all the B.A. Colonies

and was Chairman of the London Colonial Conference, 1866—7, when the Act of Union, known as the "British North America Act," was passed by the Imperial Parlt. In 1871 was apptd. one of Her Majesty's Joint High Commissioners and Plenipotentiaries, together with Earl de Grey, (now Marquis of Ripon), Sir Stafford Northcote, Sir Edward Thornton and Right Hon. Montague Bernard, to act in connection with five commissioners named by the President of the United States for the settlement of the "Alabama" claims, and of matters in dispute between Great Britain and the United States, the labors of which Joint High Commission resulted in the Treaty of Washington, signed at Washington, U.S., on 8 May, 1871. Received degree of D.C.L. (hon.) from Oxford University, 1865. Is also an LL. D. of Queen's University, Kingston. Created K.C.B. (civil) by Her Majesty, July, 1867. Created a Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Order of *Isabel la Catolica* (of Spain), Jan. 1872. Apptd. a mem. of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, July,

1872. Sat for Kingston in Can. Assembly from Nov., 1844, until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and at last g.e. Sir John A. Macdonald's legislation amongst many other important public measures, includes the following measures: The secularization of the clergy reserves; the improvement of the Militia laws; amendments to the law relating to the jurisdiction and procedure of the surrogate courts; abolishment of imprisonment for debt in certain cases; prevention of preferential assignments to creditors; amendment of the jury law; amendment of the election law; improvement of municipal institutions in U.C.; punishment of frauds by bankers, trustees, &c.; defining election franchise; amendments to controverted elections act; consolidation of the Statutes for Canada and U.C. respectively; utilization of convict labor in the penitentiary, respecting courts of superior jurisdiction in U.C.; promotion of public instruction in U.C. relating to legal profession in U.C.; regulation of County Courts; amendment of Common Law Procedure Act; civilization of Indians; defining territorial divisions in U.C.; respecting foreign judgments; amendment to law respecting the administering of poisons; amendment of law respecting extradition from U.S.; prevention of vexa-

tious Indictments; abolishment of recording sentence of death; establishment of Criminal Lunatic Asylums; inspection of Prisons, Asylums and other public institutions; abolishment of the right of Quarter Sessions and Recorder's Court to try treason; respecting Court of Error and Appeal, U.C.; prevention and repression of outrages and violations of law at the frontier; quieting titles to real estate in U.C.; regulation of the costs of arbitrators; defining duties of Police Magistrates; alteration in the law of dower, and regulation of proceedings in actions for the recovery of dower; extending powers of Court of Chancery; amendments to the law of property and trust, U.C.; enabling aliens to transmit and take real property by descent; public works for the defence of Canada; the confederation of the B.N.A. Provinces; prevention of contagious diseases at naval and military stations in Canada; Amendments to the acts respecting the militia and volunteer militia force; respecting the hearing of causes in Court of Chancery; prevention of unlawful training of persons to the use of arms, &c.; lawless aggressions act; suspension of *Habeas Corpus*; interpretation act; members' indemnity; construction of Intercolonial railway; continuing Parliament in case of the demise of the Crown; res-

pecting the publication of parliamentary papers securing the Independence of Parliament ; indemnification of certain members ; providing for the internal economy of the House of Commons ; respecting commissions, and oaths of allegiance and of office ; respecting the security to be given by officers of Canada ; respecting inquiries concerning public matters ; respecting the manufacture or importation of copper coins or tokens ; respecting aliens and naturalization ; providing for the better security of the Crown and of the Government ; respecting forgery, perjury, and intimidation in connection with the Provincial Legislatures ; respecting accessories to and abettors of indictable offences ; respecting police of Canada ; respecting persons in custody charged with high treason or felony ; respecting penitentiaries and the directors thereof ; and for providing for taking evidence in Canada in relation to civil and commercial matters, &c.—

MACKENZIE, Hon. ALEXANDER. [*Lambton.*]

B. at Dunkeld, Perthshire, Scot. Edited for some years the *Lambton Shield*, a Reform journal. Declined a seat in the Can. Cabinet, 1865. Was Leader of Ontario Opposition in

House of Commons from Union until 1873, when elected Leader of whole Opposition party. Is Major 27th "Lambton" Batt. of Volunteer Infantry; Presdt. of the Isolated Risk Fire Insurance Co., and of the Dominion Board of the National Life Insurance Co., U.S., and Chairman of the Canadian Baptist Edifice Society. Was a mem. of Ex. Council and Treasurer of Ont. from Dec., 1871, until Oct., 1872, when he resigned with Mr. Blake. Several important public measures owe their existence to Mr. M., viz.: the Act amending the Assessment Act of U.C. (1863); that consolidating and amending the acts relating to the Assessment of Property, U.C. (1866); and the highly useful measure for providing means of egress from Public Buildings (1866). As Chairman of Committee on Municipal and Assessment Laws (1866), wrote and framed the greater part of the General Act on Municipal Corporations, &c. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; and at last g.e. Represented West Middlesex in Local House, from g.e., 1871 until Oct., 1872, when he resigned, A Liberal; and opposed to the present Administration. In favor of British connection and the extension of the Dominion.

Fourth s. of the late Hon. Joseph Masson; and bro. of Hon. Edouard Masson, late M.L.C., Can. B. at Terrebonne, Q., 7 Nov., 1833. Ed. at the Jesuit College, Georgetown, Worcester, U.S., and completed his classical studies at the College of St. Hyacinthe, Q. M., 1856, Louisa Rachel, eld. dau. of the late Lt.-Col. Alexander McKenzie, and grand-d. of the late Hon. Roderick McKenzie, a partner in the North-West Fur Co. Called to the Bar, L.C., Nov., 1859. Has held a commission in the Can. Volunteer Militia

force since Oct., 1862, and was appointed Brigade Major 8th Military District, L.C., 21 Aug., 1863, which he resigned, Jan., 1868. Served on the Frontier during the first Fenian Raid, March, 1866, and was on active service during the second raid, in the same year; promoted to present rank, 1867. Council. Sat for Charlotte in N.B. Assembly from 1854 until g.e., 1865, when defeated; and from g.e., 1866 until July, 1872, when he resigned in order to contest county for the Commons, in which he was successful. McDONALD, HUGH, *Q.C.* [*Antigonish.*]

Descended from the family of McDonald of the Keppeck, in the Highlands of Scot. B. at Antigonish, N.S., 1826. Ed. there. M., 1856, Sarah, dau. of Capt. Smith. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1855. Created a Q.C., 1872. Declined the Solicitor-Generalship, N.S., 1862. An anti-union delegate from N.S. to Eng., with Messrs, Howe and Annand, 1866. Sat for Inverness in N.S. Assembly, from 1859 to 1862. An unsuccessful candidate for same seat at a previous election. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; re-elected, by acclamation, at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Antigonish N.S.*

MCDONALD WILLIAM, J.P. [*Cape Breton.*]

Descended from the Clan Ronald family. B. at River Demie Rond, Inverness, N.S., Oct., 1837. Ed. there, and at St. Francis Xavier College, Antigonish. M., Feb., 1865, Miss McDonald, of East Bay, C.B. A merchant. Was Postmaster and Issuer of Marriage Licenses at Little Glace Bay, both of which positions he resigned, 1872. First returned to Parl., for present seat, at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Administration. —*Little Glace Bay, N.S.*

MCDONNELL, SAMUEL, Q.C. [*Inverness.*]

B. in N.S. Ed. there. M. the dau. of Hon. Peter Smyth, a mem. of L.C. of that Province. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1862. Created a Q.C., 1867. Sat for Inverness in N.S. Assembly, from 1863 until 1867, and from g.e., 1871 until Augt., 1872, when he resigned to contest the county for the Commons, in which he was successful. An unsuccessful candidate for same seat in Commons at g.e., 1867. A Conservative and a Unionist; supports the present Administration. —*Port Hood, N.S.*

MCDUGALL, WILLIAM, Q.C. [*Three Rivers.*]

Second s. of the late John McDougall, Esq., merchant, who sat for Drummond in the Can.

Assembly from 1851 to 1854. B. in Scot., 1831. Accompanied his parents to Can. when very young. M. the dau. of John Wilson, Esq., of Quebec. Called to the Bar, L.C., Jan., 1851. Created a Q.C., 1873. Is a dir. of the North Shore Railway Co., and of the Philipsburgh, Farnham and Yamaska Railway. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e., 1863. First returned to Parlt, Oct., 1868, on resignation of sitting mem., by acclamation. Re-elected, by acclamation, at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G.E. Cartier.—*Alexander St., Three Rivers, Que.*

McGEEVY, *Hon.* THOMAS. [*Quebec West.*]

B. in Irel. M., first, Miss Nolan, of Quebec, (she d.); 2ndly, the dau of the late J. B. Woolsey, Esq., of same city. A contractor and capitalist. Built the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa, the Quebec Custom House, and other important public edifices. Is Presdt. of the St. Lawrence Tow Boat Co., Vice-Presdt. of the Union Bank of Lower Canada, and of the Levis and Kennebec Railway Co., and a dir. of the English and Canadian Mining Co. Was for some years a mem. of the City Council, Quebec. Apptd. mem. for Stadacona in L.C. Quebec, Nov., 1867. First returned to Parlt.

for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Govt.—19½ *D' Auteuil St., Quebec; Stadacona Club; Rideau Club.*

MACKAY, NEWTON LE G., Q.C. [*Cape Breton.*]

Of Scottish descent. S. of the late William Mackay, Esq., C.E. A native of Halifax, N.S. Ed. at Dalhousie College, in that city. M. Kate, dau. of E. C. Bown, Esq. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1859. Created a Q.C., 1872. An unsuccessful candidate for Cape Breton in Local Assembly at g.e., 1867, and at g.e., 1871. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Sydney, Cape Breton, N.S.*

MERCIER, HONORÉ. [*Rouville.*]

Family came from France to Dist. of Montmagny; thence removed to Dist. of Iberville. S. of M. J. B. Mercier of St. Athanase, P.Q., by Marie Catherine Laflamme. B. at St. Athanase, 15 Oct., 1840. Ed. at St. Mary's (Jesuit) College, Montreal. M., 1st, 29 May, 1866, Delle Leopoldine Boivin, of St. Hyacinthe (she d); 2ndly, 9 May, 1871; Delle Virgine St. Denis, of same city. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1867. One of the directors of the *Parti National*, Jan., 1872. Author of *L'Héroïsme*, and *La Patrie*, two

lectures (St. Hyacinthe, 1865) Was ed. of *Le Courrier de St. Hyacinthe*, from 1862 to 1864, and for a few months in 1866. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Liberal.—*St. Hyacinthe, P.Q.*

MERRITT, THOMAS RODMAN. [*Lincoln.*]

METCALFE, JAMES. [*East York, Ont.*]

Is Vice-Presdt. of the Royal Canadian Bank. Formerly a contractor in Toronto. Resided some years in Australia. First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected, by acclamation, at last g.e. A Liberal.—40 *Adelaide St., Toronto; Yorkville, Ont.*

MILLS, David, LL.B. [*Bothwell.*]

Family, which came from near Plymouth, Eng., proceeded to Holland in the time of Charles I., thence to New Eng. with the Puritans, and the descendants removed to N.S. at the time of the Am. revolution. S. of Nathaniel Mills, who removed from N.S. to Can., 1817. B. in the Tp. of Orford, Kent, Ont., 18 March, 1831. Graduated at Michigan University. M., Dec., 1860, Miss M. J. Brown. Was Supdt. of Schools for Co. Kent from April, 1856, to April, 1865. Was employed by Ont. Govt., to define the boundary between Ont., and Quebec, 1872. Is author of a pamphlet on *The Present and Future Political Aspects of Canada* (1869) and another on *The Blunders of the Dominion Govern-*

ment in connection with the North West Territory (1871). First returned to Parlt. for present seat at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal; opposed to the present Govt.—*Clearville, Ont.*

MITCHELL, *Hon.* PETER. [*Northumberland, N.B.*] P.C.

Parents came from Scot. to N.B., and settled at Miramichi, in that Province, 1818. B. in Newcastle, Miramichi, 1824. Ed. at the Grammar School there. M., 1853, Mrs. Gough, of St. John. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1848. Has been an extensive shipbuilder. Author of *A Review of President Grant's recent Message to the United States Congress relative to the Canadian Fisheries, and the Navigation of the St. Lawrence River*, [Ottawa, 1870.] Sworn of the Privy Council and apptd. Minister of Marine and Fisheries, 1 July, 1867. (Salary \$5,000). Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, N.B., from 1858 to March, 1865, when his party was defeated on an appeal to the people on the scheme for the Confederation of B.N.A. In April, 1866, after the resignation of the Smith Government, was called upon to form a Government, in conjunction with the Hon. R. D. Wilmot, which he did, holding the office of President of the Ex. Coun-

cil from that date until the Union. Was a Delegate to Quebec in 1861, and again in 1862, on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway; to the Union Conference in same city, 1864; and to the London Colonial Conference to complete terms of Union of B.N.A. Provinces, 1866. Sat for Northumberland in N.B. Assembly, from 1856 to 1860, when appointed to the L.C., same Province, where he remained until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867, where he remained until g.e., 1872 when he resigned seat in that House in order to contest Northumberland for the Commons, for which he was returned by acclamation. MOFFATT, GEORGE, *J.P.* [*Restigouche.*]

A lumber merchant. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Commons, March, 1868. First returned, Nov., 1870, on death of sitting mem.; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Dalhousie, N.B.*

MORRISON, ANGUS, *Q.C.* [*Niagara.*]

S. of the late Mr. Hugh Morrison, a native of Sutherlandshire, Scot.; and bro. of Hon. Mr.

Justice Morrison, of the Court of Queen's Bench, Ont. B. in Edinburgh, Scot., 1822. Came to Can., 1834. M., at Three Rivers, P.Q., the eldest daughter of the late Robert Gilmor, Esq., Commissary-General in Can. during the war of 1812. Called to the Bar, U.C., Michaelmas Term, 1846, and has been a Bencher of the Law Society. Created Q.C., 1873. Is Presdt. of the Dominion Express Co., and of the Toronto Rowing Club; Vice-Presdt. of the Ontario and Erie Ship Canal Co., a dir. of the Northern Railway of Can., and of the Provincial Insurance Co. Was Secretary of the St. Andrew's Society of Toronto for eleven years, and Presdt. of same body for two years. Sat for North Simcoe in Can. Assembly from g.e., 1854 to g.e., 1863, when defeated, and for present seat from 1864 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last g.e. Unsuccessfully contested North Simcoe for Local House at g.e., 1867. A Baldwin Reformer; and has been a faithful supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald since he entered Parliament.—*Windsor Place, Toronto; Toronto Club; Rowing Club; Rideau Club.*

NATHAN, HENRY, JUN. [*Victoria, B.C.*]

Eld. s. of Henry Nathan, Esq., of Maida Vale, London, Eng. B. in London, 3 Sept., 1842. Ed.

at London University School. Unmarried. Is a mem. of the firm of Henry Nathan, Jun., & Co. wholesale merchants, Victoria. Represented Victoria City in B.C. Legislature from Nov., 1870, until the dissolution of that body, 1871. Returned to Commons for Victoria District by acclamation, Nov., 1871, on B.C. being admitted into the Can. Union; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Victoria, B.C.*

NELSON, HUGH. [*New Westminster.*]

S. of Robert Nelson, Esq., of Shore Cottage, Magheramorne; Antrim, Irel., by Frances Quinn; B. at Larne, North of Irel., 25 May, 1830. Ed. there. Unmarried. A mem. of the firm of Moody, Deitz & Nelson, mill owners and lumber manufacturers, Burrard Inlet. Represented New Westminster in B.C. Legislature from Nov., 1870, until its dissolution, 1871. Returned to Commons, for present seat, Nov., 1871, on the admission of B.C. into the Dominion; re-elected, by acclamation, at last g.e. A Liberal, and a supporter of the present Administration.—*Burrard Inlet, B.C.*

O'CONNOR, Hon. JOHN, Q.C. [*Essex.*]

Descended from two distinct families of the O'Connors, of Kerry, Irel.; father and mother

were both O'Connors, though not related within known degrees of kindred; they emigrated to Am. in 1823, and settled at Boston, Mass. B. at Boston, Jan., 1824. Came to Essex with his parents, 1828. Ed. there. M., April, 1849, Mary, eld. dau. of Richard Barret, Esq., late of Killarney, Irel. Called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1854. Created a Q.C., 1872. Is a mem. of the Michigan (U.S.) Bar. Has been Reeve of the town of Windsor. Was Warden of Essex for three years, being twice elected by an unanimous vote of the County Council; and for 12 years fulfilled the duties of Chairman of the Board of Education of the town of Windsor. Author of *Letters addressed to the Governor-General, on the subject of Fenianism* (1870). Sworn of the Privy Council, and was Presdt. of that body, from 2 July, 1872, until 4 March, 1873, when apptd. Minister of Inland Revenue. Was an unsuccessful candidate for present seat in Can. Assembly at g.e., 1861, but succeeded in 1863 in unseating the sitting mem. (Mr. Arthur Rankin), and obtaining a new election, when he was returned, and sat until the dissolution of Parliament in May of that year; again contested same seat at g.e., 1863, when a Special Return was made to the House by the returning Officer; both candi-

dates petitioned to be seated, and Mr. O'Connor's petition being thrown out by the Speaker upon preliminary objections, Mr. Rankin was seated. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867; re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative. *Bank Street Road, Ottawa; Windsor, Ont.*

OLIVER, THOMAS. [*North Oxford.*]

B. and ed. in Scot. A merchant. Has been Reeve of Woodstock, and Warden of the Co. Oxford. Sat for present seat in Can. Assembly from 1866 until the Union. Returned to Commons, by acclamation, at g.e., 1867, and at last g.e. A Liberal; opposed to the present Govt. — *Woodstock, Ont.*

O'REILLY, JAMES, Q.C. [*South Renfrew.*]

Descended from the O'Reillys of Cavan, Irel. Eld. s. of the late Peter O'Reilly, Esq., for many years Clerk of the County Court and Deputy Clerk of the Crown for the County of Frontenac, Ont., who came to Can., 1832, settled at Belleville, and during the Rebellion commanded a company of 2nd Hastings Militia on active service. B. at Westport, Co. Mayo, Irel., 16 Sept., 1823. Ed. at the Hastings Grammar School, under the late Mr. Wm. Hutton. M., Nov., 1850, Mary Jane, dau. of the late Francis Redmond

Esq. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Trinity Term, 1847; to that of L.C., 1870. Created a Q.C., 1864. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Ont., (having also held that position under the old rule), 1871. A dir. of the Kingston and Pembroke Railway. Was Recorder of Kingston from 1864 until 1869, when the office was abolished. Sat in the City Council of Kingston, as an alderman, from 1850 to 1855. Commanded a Company of Volunteers, for several years, and retired from the service, 1862, with the rank of major. First returned to Parlt., for present seat, at last g.e. A Baldwin Reformer, and a supporter of Sir John A. Macdonald.—*Barrie St., Kingston, Ont.; Rideau Club.*

PALMER, ACALUS LOCKWOOD, Q.C. [*St. John, City and County, N.B.*]

S. of Philip Palmer, Esq., of Sackville, N.B., who, for many years, represented Westmoreland in the N.B. Assembly; and grands. of the late Capt. Gideon Palmer, a loyalist, who left a large property in Westchester, N.Y., at the time of the War of Independence, and came to N.B., where he settled at Dorchester. B. at Sackville, 28 Augt., 1820. Ed. there. M., 11 Sept., 1849, Martha Ann, eld. dau. of Andrew Weldon, Esq., of Dorchester. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1846;

created a Q.C., 1867. Twice contested Westmoreland unsuccessfully, in Confederate interest, previous to the Union, and was an unsuccessful candidate for St. John (city) in Local Assembly, at g.e., 1870. Has been Warden of Perth. Sat for South Perth in Local Assembly from 1867 until 1871, when defeated. First returned to Commons, at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Shakspeare, Ont.*

TUPPER, Hon. CHARLES, C.B., M.D., L.R.C.S. (Edin). [*Cumberland.*]

Family, originally from Hesse Cassel, went to Guernsey, thence came to Virginia, and subsequently, at the termination of the Am. revolution, removed to N.S., with other loyalists; it is connected with the family of the late Sir Isaac

Brock, K.B., the hero of Queenston. S. of the Rev. Charles Tupper, D.D., of Aylesford, N.S. B. at Amherst, N.S., 2 July, 1821. Ed. at Horton in same province. Took degree of M.D. at Edinburgh, and obtained the diploma of the Royal College of Surgeons, same city, 1843. M., Oct., 1846, Miss Frances Morse, of Amherst. A physician. Is a governor of Dalhousie College, Halifax, (appointed by Act of Parlt., 1862). Was Presdt. of the Canadian Medical Association, from its formation in 1867 until 1870, when he declined re-election. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, and Provl.-Secy., N.S., from 1857 to 1860, and from 1863 to 30 June, 1867; and Prime Minister of that province from 1864 until he retired from office with his Govt., on the Union Act coming into force, 1 July, 1867. Was a delegate to Eng. from N.S. Govt., 1858 and 1864; from the Dominion Govt., March, 1868; leader of the delegation from N.S. to the Union Conference at Charlottetown, 1854; to that in Quebec in same year, and to the final Colonial Conference in London to complete terms of Union, 1866-7. Holds patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Ex-Councillor, N.S. Created C.B. (civil) by Her Majesty, 1867. Author of *A letter to the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Carnarvon on the Union Que-*

tion, (Lon., 1866). Declined seat in Can. Cabinet, 1867; and Chairmanship of Intercolonial Railway Board, 1868. Sworn of the Privy Council, June, 1870, and was President of that body from that date until 1 July 1872, when he was transferred to the Inland Revenue, and there remained until 22 Feb., 1873, when apptd. Minister of Customs. Sat for present seat in N.S. Assembly from 1855 until the Union. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867, and again, by acclamation, on his accepting office; re-elected at last g.e. The following are some of the measures which were introduced and carried through the legislature of N.S. by the hon. member; The Jury Law; Education Act providing free schools and assessment; Equity Judge Act; Windsor and Annapolis Railway Act; bill providing for a quarantine station and hospital; representation bill; Executive and Legislative Disabilities Act; he also moved the resolution for the Union of the Maritime Colonies, 1864, under which delegates were sent to Charlottetown in that year; and the resolution authorising delegates to be sent to London to arrange the terms for the Union of N.S. and N.B. with Can., 1866. B. in Ayr, Scot., 11 March, 1811. Ed. at Ayr Academy. M., in Montreal, 12 Nov., 1847, Miss Amelia Tilley, of New Brunswick. Came to Can., 1826, and was for many years a leading merchant, first in Quebec and afterwards in

Montreal. Commanded a Company of the Quebec Light Infantry on active service during the Rebellion, 1837; was Presdt. of the Free Trade Association, Montreal, 1846-7; a Harbour Commissioner of Montreal for 19 years, and Chairman of the Commission for 13 years; Presdt. of the Montreal Board of Trade during 9 separate terms; and first Presdt. of the Dominion Board of Trade, 1870-71. Is Presdt. of the Caughnawaga Ship Canal Co. Suggested and carried out the scheme of connecting Liverpool and the St. Lawrence by an ocean line of mail steamers; has also suggested a canal to connect Lake Champlain with the St. Lawrence; and an Ocean Telegraph to connect Europe with Can., *via* the St. Lawrence. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, and Chief Commissioner of Public Works, Can., from Oct., 1851, to Sept. 1852. Sat for Montreal in Can. Assembly from 1851 to. 1857, when he declined re-election. 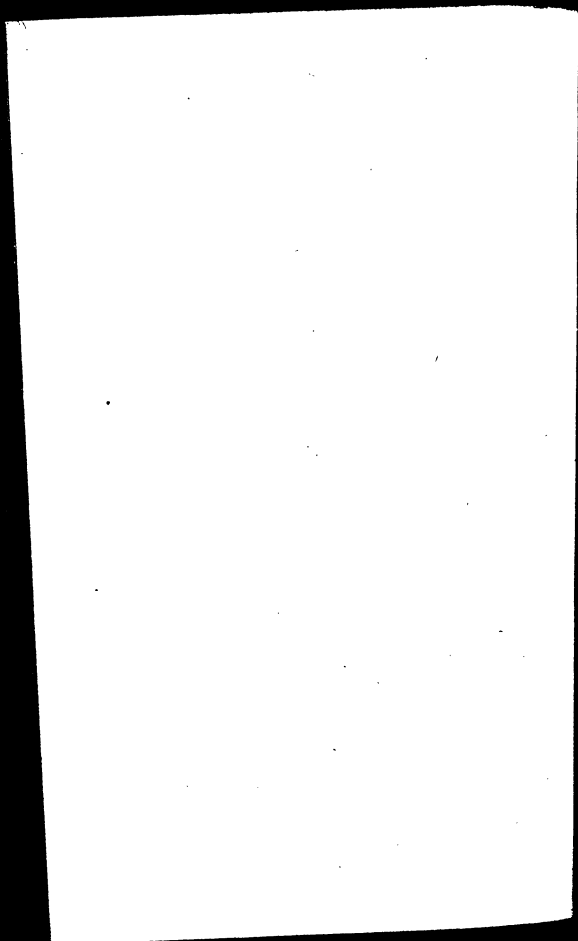

ONTARIO.

The Lieutenant-Governor—The Hon. WILLIAM PEARCE HOWLAND, C.B., P.C. B. at Kinderhook, Hudson River, N.Y. Ed. in Can. M., 1st, Mrs. Craik (dead); 2ndly, 1866, the relict of the late—Hunt, Esq., of the Military Store Department. Was long engaged in trade in U.C., and for some years held the position of Presdt. of the Board of Trade, Toronto. Is Presdt. of the London and Canadian Loan and Agency Co., Vice-Presdt. of the Confederation Life Assurance Co. of Canada, and dir. of the Ontario Bank, and of the Canada Landed Credit Co. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, Can., from 24 May, 1862, to 29 March, 1864, and from 24 Nov., 1864, until the Union, during which periods he was Minister of Finance from 24 May, 1862, to 15 May, 1863; Receiver General from latter

date to 29 March, 1864; Postmaster General from 24 Nov., 1864, to 30 Aug., 1866, when a second time appointed Minister of Finance, which office he held until the Union. Was a mem. of the Privy Council of Can., and Minister of Inland Revenue from 1 July, 1867, until appointed Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, July, 1868. Was a delegate to Eng., with Mr. Sicotte, 1862, respecting the construction of the Intercolonial Railway; to Washington with Mr. (now Sir Alex.) Galt and others, 1866, respecting Reciprocal Trade, and to the London Colonial Conference, 1866-7, to complete terms of Union of B. A. Provinces. Sat for West York in Can. 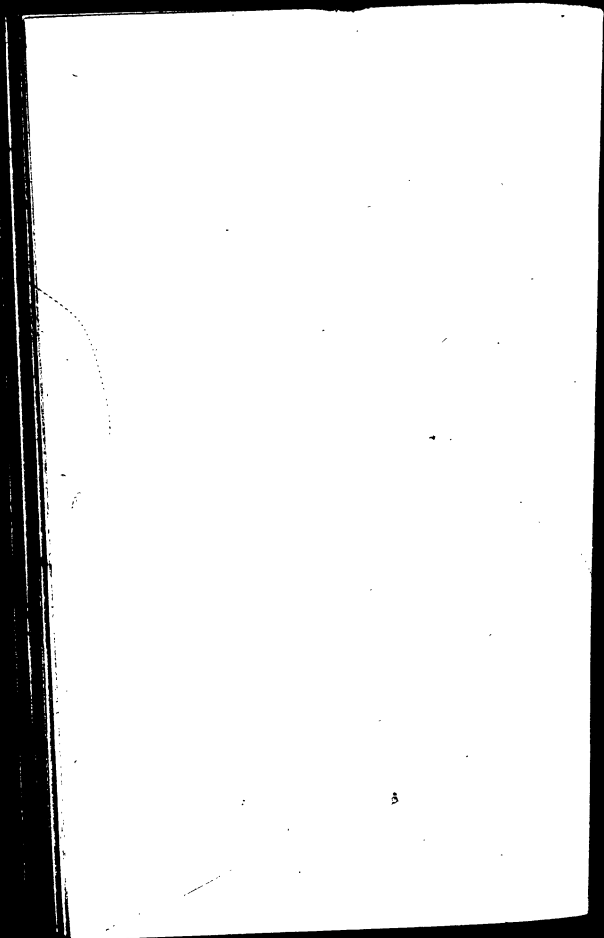

Only s. of Dr. Simon Fraser, M.D., Lieut. in the 42nd, or "Royal Highland Regt." (*Black Watch*), who took part in all the engagements fought by that corps from 1795 to 1803, including the celebrated battle, in which Sir Ralph Abercrombie fell, when more than three-fourths of the 42nd were either killed or wounded; and grands. of Colonel Malcolm Fraser, of Balliefurth, Abernethy, Strathspey, Scotland, a descendant of John, fifth son of Thomas, 4th Lord Lovat; he was a distinguished officer of the old 78th or "Fraser's Highlanders,"—under the command of his cousin, Lieut.-Col. Simon Fraser, s. of the celebrated Simon, Lord Lovat:—he fought and

was severely wounded at the taking of Quebec, on 13th Sept., 1759, and also at the disastrous battle of 28th April, 1760 :—he remained in the Province of Quebec, and became Seigneur of several seigniories and got a grant of the seignior of Mount Murray, several lots in the City of Quebec, and extensive tracts of land in the townships, as a reward for his distinguished and valuable services, both as a Judge and Captain and Paymaster of the 84th, or “Royal Highland Emigrant Regiment,” during and after the invasion of the Americans in 1774; he d. 14th June, 1815. B. at St. Martin’s, Q., on 25 Nov., 1816. Ed. at Terrebonne and Montreal. M., at Quebec, 24 Oct., 1842, his cousin, Elizabeth Fraser de Berry. A Notary Public. 1st Major of the Reserve Militia of the Regimental Division of Verchères, Justice of the Peace, President of Commissioners of Small Causes, Seigneur of *Cournoyer* and *Contrecoeur*, Patron of the Parish of St. John of Thurso, Presdt. of the National French Society of “*St. Jean Baptiste*,” author of the “*Fraserian Almanac*,” Chief of the “*New Clan Fraser*” of the Province of Quebec, &c., &c., &c. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Electoral division of Montarville, in L.C., Can., 1858. Called to the L.C., 1867, when he assumed the ancient French name of his family,

of "de Berry," on taking his seat in the French Canadian Province of Quebec. A Conservative.—*St. Mark de Cournoyer, Chambly River, Q.*

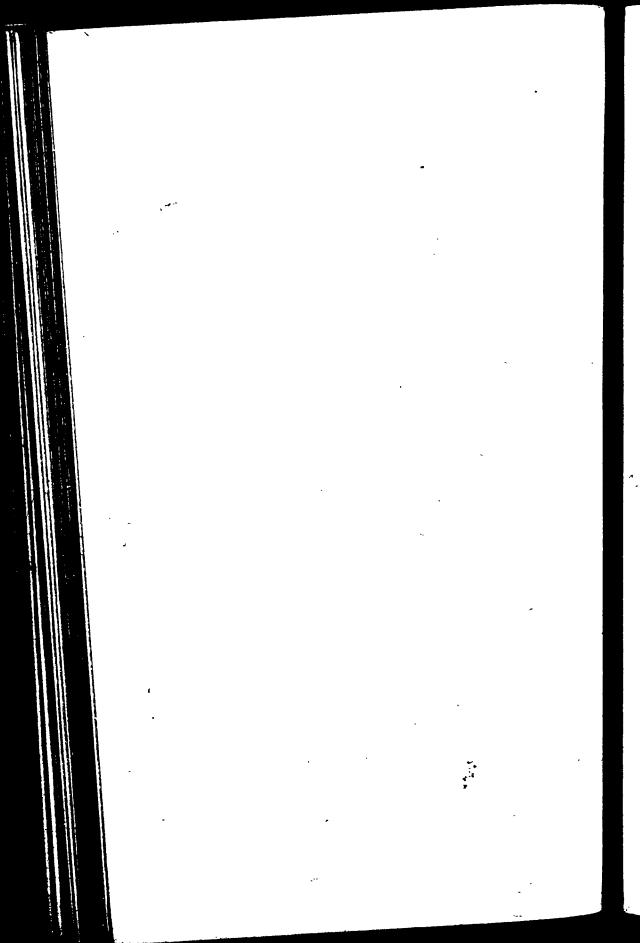

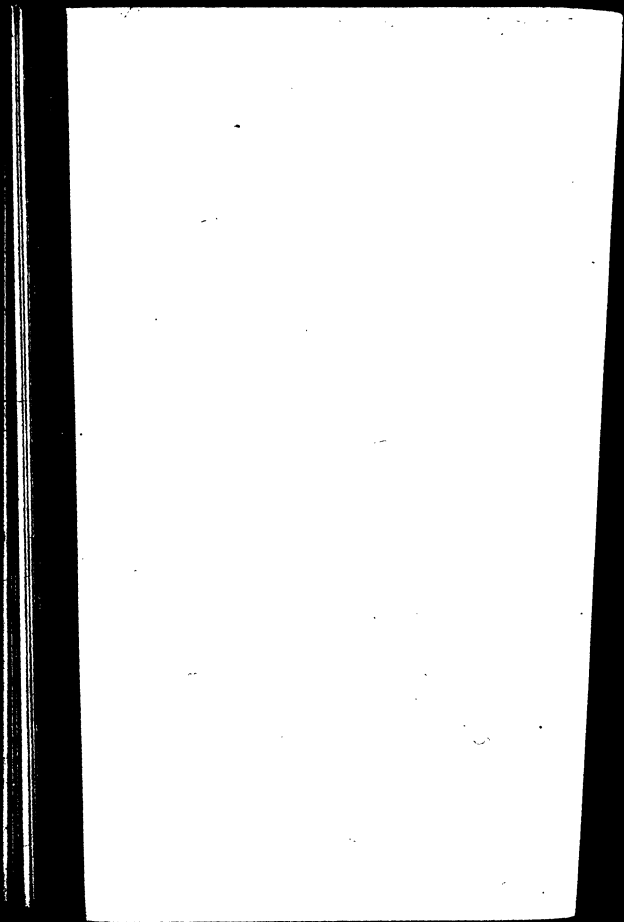

The Lieutenant-Governor—Lieut-Col. Honorable LEMUEL ALLAN WILMOT, *D.C.L.* S. of William Wilmot, Esq., of Sunbury, N.B., by Hannah, dau. of Daniel Bliss, Esq., who married a dau. of Col. Murray, a distinguished loyalist ; and grands. of Major Lemuel Wilmot, formerly of the Loyal American Regt., who settled in N.B. at the close of the Am. revolution, and of Elizabeth, sister of Hon. Samuel Street, who with other loyalists settled in U.C, at the close of the Am. revolutionary war. B. in Sunbury, Jan., 1809. Ed. at Grammar School and State College of New Brunswick. M., 1st, the dau. of the Rev. J. Balloch (dead) ; 2ndly, the dau. of the late Hon. W. A. Black, M.L.C., of N.S. Called to the Bar, July, 1832. Created C., 1838. Is Judge Advocate General and Lieut.-Colonel in the Militia ; Vice-Presdt. of the Workingmen's Educational Union of London ; and of the Wesleyan Education Society. Corresponding mem. of the Royal Horticultural

Society of London; Hon. Presdt. of the Young Men's Christian Association of Fredericton; and Supdt. of Wesleyan Sabbath School of same city. Raised and commanded a troop of Volunteer Dragoons who performed despatch duty, pending border difficulties, 1838-39; raised and commanded two rifle companies, 1842; raised and commanded a troop of Dragoons for escort duty to the Prince of Wales, on his visit to this country, 1860, and received personally the thanks of H.R.H. for the service. count of the loyalist tendencies of Capt. Saunders. Author of *The Law of Pleading and Evidence in Civil Actions* (Lon.) has been Surveyor-General, Provincial-Secy., in which office he held for nearly nine years; Clerk of the Circuits and Clerk of the Crown in the Circuits. M. the King of Spain a Knight Commander of the order of *Isabel la Catolica*, 1872; apptd. a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, Dec., 1872. Created a Q.C., Dec., 1872. Is an extra Aide-de-Chmp to the Gov.-Genl. (Salary \$2,600.) —*Augusta St.; Eastern Departmental Building.*

Chairman of Penitentiary Directors.—JAMES W. KING. Sat for Hants in N.S. Assembly from 1864 until the Union. Apptd. to present off

Deputy of the Minister of Militia and Defence.—GEORGE FUTVOYE, Q.C. B. 13 May, 1808. Was for time ed. of the *Morning Courier*, (Montreal). Held under Lord Durham the appt. of Inspector of Schools for the cities of Quebec and Montreal. Was afterwards apptd. the first City Clerk

of the City of Quebec, under the present incorporation. in which office he assisted much in the organization of the various Municipal Institutions of L.C. Was Secy. to the Commission of Enquiry into the state of the Crown Lands Dept., 1845, and afterwards was engaged at a head of a numerous staff in the preparation of the "Doomsday Book," or Record of Lands in U.C., to carry out the requirements of 9 Vic., cap. 34, sec. 31. Called to the Bar, L.C., 1838. Was Permt. Clerk of the Crown Law Dept. of Can. from May 2, 1851, until the Confederation; during that period he also held the office of Secy. to the Commission of Enquiry into the causes of the Fire at the Parliamentary Buildings, Quebec, 1854. Was apptd., 1862, Inspector of Registry Offices, L.C. Has been a Special Commissioner at various times, more especially to enquire into the management of different Public Offices connected with the Administration of Justice and Enregistration of Lands in L.C. Is the author of a number of useful works. Created Q.C., 1867. Apptd. to his present office under the Great Seal, 30 May 1868. Is a Major in the Militia, and a member *ex officio* of the Civil Service Board and of the Board of Audit. (Salary \$2,600.) *Sussex* North; *Eastern Block*.

Adjutant General of Militia.—Col. PATRICK ROBERTSON-ROSS. Second s. of the late Hon. Lord Robertson, a distinguished Scotch Judge. B. 19 May, 1828. Entered the British Army as Ensign, 7 Apl., 1848. Attained the rank of Lt.-Col. by seniority, 3 Aug., 1863, and was promoted full Colonel, 2 June, 1870. Apptd. Adjt., Genl. of Militia and Colonel in the Canadian Militia, 5 May, 1869. We append a copy of his official record:—"Colonel Robertson-Ross served as an Ensign in the Cape Mounted Rifles during the Kaffir war of 1850-51 (medal); was apptd. to the local rank of Capt. when in command of a corps of irregular cavalry called Armstrong's Horse, in which capacity he was engaged in many successful affairs against the enemy, including the action against Seyola's Tribe, 16 April, 1851, where he had his horse killed under him; and more particularly in the combined attack on the Amalolas, 28 June, 1851, where he commanded a detached body of cavalry; was six times thanked in General Orders with twice special mention in the despatches of the Commander-in-Chief, Genl. Sir Harry Smith, G.C.B. Was promoted to a lieutenancy in the 1st King's Own Regt.; served throughout the Eastern campaign, 1854-55-56, with the 4th Regt., and on the Staff, including the battle of

Sir Wm. Eyre, K.C.B. (Medal with three clasps; Kaffir war medal; Brevet of Major; Knight of the Legion of Honor of France; Knight of the Order of Medjidie of Turkey, and Turkish war medal). Is author of *The Regulations and Orders for the Militia of the Dominion* (1870), and of *The Orders and Regulations for Brigade Camps of Exercise and Instruction for the Militia* (1870.) (Salary \$4,000.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that the following Orders and Regulations have been made by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, under the "Free Grants and Homestead Act of 1868" and the "Public Lands Act of 1860," by Order in Council bearing date of the 27th of May instant.

ORDERS AND REGULATIONS

Made under "The Free Grant and Homestead Act of 1868, and "The Public Lands Act of 1860," by Order of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, dated 27th May, 1869.

1. The quantity of land to be located to any person as a Free Grant, under "The Free Grant and Homestead Act of 1868," subsequently to the 23rd day of January, 1869, shall be 100 acres; but in case it shall be made to appear to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, that any person located or to be located as aforesaid has not by reason of rock, lakes or swamp, 100 acres that can be made available for farming purposes, the quantity located to such person may be increased at the discretion of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, to any number of acres not exceeding in the whole 200 acres, so as to make 100 acres of such farming land: and the male head of a family located, or to be located, under said Act, since the 23rd day of January, 1869, having children under eighteen years of age residing with him, may be located for in all 200 acres.

2. Any locate under said last mentioned Act, being the male head of a family as aforesaid, shall be allowed to purchase an additional 100 acres, at 50 cents per acre cash, at the time of such locations, subject to the same reservations and conditions, and the performance of the same settlement duties as are provided in respect of Free Grant locations by the 9th and 10th Sections of the said Act, except that actual residence and building on the land purchased will not be required.

3. Squatters upon land situate within any Town-

ship, or part of a Township, appropriated by Order in Council for Free Grants and who had settled or improved upon such lands before the passing the said Free Grants Act, shall be allowed to purchase said lands (not exceeding in quantity 200 acres to any one person), at 50 cents an cash, each, such sale to be subject to the same conditions and reservations as are provided by the 9th and 10th sections of said Act in respect of Free Grant locations.

4. The right is reserved to the Crown to construct on any land located under said Act or sold as hereinbefore provided, any colonization road, or any road in lieu of, or partly deviating from any Government allowance for road; also the right to take from such land any wood, gravel or other material required for the construction or improvement of any such road, without making any compensation for the land or materials so taken, or for any injury occasioned by the construction of such road; and such right may be exercised by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, or any authorized by him for that purpose.

5. Holders of Timber Licenses, their servants and agents, are to have the right to haul their timber or logs over the uncleared portion of any land located as a Free Grant, or purchased as before provided, and to make such roads thereon as may be necessary for that purpose, doing no unnecessary damage, and to use all slides, portages, roads, or other works previously constructed or existing on any land so located or sold, and the right of access to, and free use of all streams and lakes theretofore used, or that may be necessary for the passage of timber or logs; and all land necessary for such works is reserved.

6. All Pine Trees growing or being upon any land hereafter located as a Free Grant under the said Act, or sold under the preceding regulations, shall be subject to any timber license in force at the time of such location or sale or granted within five years subsequently thereto, and may at any time before the issue of the patent for such land be cut and removed under the authority of any such timber license, while lawfully in force.

Conversion of Debentures into Stock.



All 5 per cent. currency Debentures may be converted into 5 per cent. stock at par, whatever may be the period for which the Debenture have to run.

All 6 per cent. currency Debentures not maturing before January, 1878, when the 6 per cent. stock is redeemable, may be converted into 6 per cent. stock at par.

The 6 per cent. currency Debentures issued in 1868 on which there is an endorsation that they are convertible into stock may be so converted at par.

Six per cent. currency Debentures maturing before 1878 may be converted into stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at such rates as the Board may direct in each case.

Six per cent. Debentures may also be converted into five per cent. stock upon application to the Treasury Board, and at rates to be fixed by the Board.

In case it should be desired to convert any 5 per cent. or 6 per cent. Debentures payable in London into stock, application must be made to the Treasury Board in each case.

In the three first cases above mentioned the Debentures may be sent in to the Receiver General or to any Assistant Receiver General upon which a certificate of stock will be issued. PUBLIC NOTICE relating to **FISHERIES** and **FISHING** in the respective Provinces forming the Dominion of Canada.

The undersigned is directed by the Minister to call the attention of all persons concerned and the public generally to the following provisions of the Fishery Laws and Regulations:—

NET FISHING for **SALMON** is prohibited—

In Quebec and Ontario, from 31st July to 1st May;

In New Brunswick, from 15th August to 1st March;

In Nova Scotia, from 31st July to 1st March.

ANGLING for **SALMON** is prohibited—

In Quebec and Ontario, from 1st September to 1st May;

In New Brunswick, from 15th September to 1st March;

In Nova Scotia, from 1st September to 1st May.

FISHING for SPECKLED (or *Brook*) TROUT WITH NETS or other apparatus is forbidden at all times. ANGLING for the same with hook and line, extends from 1st January to 1st October in Quebec, and from 1st May to 30th September in Ontario.

Fishing for WHITEFISH, with nets or other apparatus, is forbidden between the 19th November and 1st December in Ontario and Quebec, nor is it lawful to catch this fish with SEINES between the 30th May and 1st August in Ontario, and 31st July and 1st December in Quebec.

Fishing for BASS, PICKEREL (Dore), and MAS-KINONGE is forbidden between the 1st and 24th May in Quebec, and from 15th April to 1st May in Ontario.

Fishing by means of nets or other apparatus (except in the tidal deep sea fisheries) without Leases or Licenses from the Department of Marine and Fisheries is prohibited in the waters of Quebec and Ontario.

All *applications* for leases or licenses, or any other *communications* relating to Fisheries, should be addressed to the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa.

RULES RESPECTING THE LIBRARY OF PARLIAMENT.

A proper Catalogue of the Books belonging to the Library shall be kept by the Librarian in whom the custody and responsibility thereof shall be vested; and who shall be required to report to the House through Mr. Speaker, at the opening of each Session, the actual state of the Library.

No person shall be entitled to resort to the Library during a session of Parliament except the Governor General, the members of the Privy Council, and of the Senate and House of Commons, and the Officers of both Houses, and such other persons as may receive a written order of admission from the Speaker of either House. Members may personally introduce Strangers to the Library during the daytime, but not after the hour of seven o'clock, P.M.

During a Session of Parliament, no Books belonging to the Library shall be taken out of the Building, except by the authority of the Speaker or upon receipts given by a Member of either House.

During the recess of Parliament, the Library and Reading Room shall be open every day in each week, Sundays and Holidays excepted, from the hour of ten in the morning until three in the afternoon; and access to the Library shall be permitted to persons introduced by a Member of the Legislature, or admitted at the discretion of the Clerk or Librarian; subject to such regulations as may be deemed necessary for the security and preservation of the collec-

tion; but no one shall be allowed to take any Book out of the Library except Members of the Legislature, and such others as may be authorized by the Speaker of either House.

The Clerk of this House is authorized to subscribe for the Newspapers published in the Dominion, and for such other papers, British and Foreign, as may from time to time be directed by the Speaker; and to import annually the continuation of Periodical Works in the Library.

During the recess of Parliament, no Member of either House not residing at the seat of Government, shall be at liberty to borrow or have in his possession at any one time more than three works from the Library, or to retain the same for a longer period than one month.

No other person who may be privileged by card from the Speaker of either House, to borrow Books from the Library shall be allowed to have in their possession more than two Books at any one time, or to retain the same longer than three weeks, and all such persons shall return the Books so taken when required by the Librarian.

No Books of reference, or Books of special cost and value, may be removed from the seat of Government under any circumstances.

At the first meeting of the Joint Library Committee at every Session of Parliament, the Librarian shall report a list of the Books absent at the commencement of the Session, specifying the names of any persons who have retained the same in contravention of either of the foregoing Rules.

CUSTOMS CIRCULARS.

The Customs Circulars for 1872 related to:—

Customs Circular, No. 93, January 31st, 1872

—Ordered that all invoices of Littlefield and Chamberlin's Wood Screws," dated since December 27th, 1871, filled with the old discount of sixty *per cent.* must have added to them a value for duty of twenty-four *per cent.*

Customs Circular No. 94, 12th February, 1872, states that by the decision of the Treasury Board the article of "Shoddy" properly "Shoddy Wool" is liable to a duty of 15 *per cent ad. val.*

Customs Circular No. 95.—In consequence of complaints from Clifton and other frontier ports, all Collectors were ordered to return all manifests by mail, immediately after the goods they represent have been secured by the Collectors; the Collectors affixing the official stamp as well as signature.

Circular No. 96 decides that "Bristol's Sarsaparilla," and all similar compounds containing spirits are subject to a duty under the present tariff at the rate of \$1.20 per gallon, with an *ad valorem* duty of 15 *per cent.* on bottles and packages; and the Department having ascertained that these articles have been entered at several ports as proprietary medicines

at 25 per cent *ad val.*, the Minister of Customs instructs Collectors to allow whatever stock of the above may remain in bond, to be entered for duty at the said *ad val.* rate of 25 per cent., but that all future importations must pay the specific duty of \$1.20 per Gallon, and 15 per cent. on bottles, &c., or unless an alteration is effected in the law.

Customs Circular No. 97, March 18th, 1872.—Recites, that there has been diversity of practice at different ports respecting the item of marble, as to admitting it free of duty. The circular goes on to recite, that there are two classes of marble mentioned in the act; the first being "blocks" which means all pieces capable of subdivision, by sawing, into two or more slabs of not less than two inches thick, and such slabs, to be entitled to free entry, must not have undergone any process of manufacture beyond the terms of the Tariff, viz: "Sawn on two sides only." All "blocks" specially shapen, such as round, octagon or tapering, being subject to the *ad valorem* duty of 15 per cent. The second class is described as "slabs," and may be defined as oblong or square pieces not over inches thick, not specially shapen, which must have undergone no process other than sawing, and having at least two edges rough—the term "edges" applying either

to the sides or ends ; and it should be remembered, that any planing or other preparation for the manufacture of "Head Stones," "Mantle Pieces," &c., render such "slabs" liable to *advalorem* duty of 15 per cent. I am, Sir, your obedient servant, R. S. M. BOUCHETTE, Commissioner of Customs.

Customs Circular No. 98, March 27, 1872.—Provides for a system of glass seals, for the security of bonded and unaccustomed goods, carried in the Cars of the Grand Trunk and Great Western Railway Companies.

Customs Circular No. 99, May 3rd, 1872.—Requests Returns of Steam Fire Engines imported.

Customs Circular No. 100, May 5th, 1872.—Informs Collectors that "Foundry Facings" are alleged to have been admitted free of duty at many ports of the Dominion under the name of "Black Sand;" and state that "the Sand" mentioned in Schedule C, of the Tariff, is a natural product, while the "Foundry Facings" is manufactured from "Sea Coal," "Charcoal," "Plumbago," and other minerals, and is legally liable to duty at 15 per cent. *ad valorem* as unenumerated.

Customs Circular No. 101, May 12th, 1872.—Informs Collectors that it is not considered necessary that they should be required to compile and forward annual import returns.

Customs Circular No. 102, May 27th, 1872.—Advises with directions the sending of Sealed Locks to be substituted for Bar and Shackle Locks for the Grand Trunk and Great Western Railways, with directions for use.

Customs Circular No. 103, June 8th, 1872.—

Provides for the refund of Tea and Coffee Duties under the Act of last Session.

Customs Circular No. 104, June 13th, 1872—
Gives further detailed instructions as to the refund and re-entry of "Tea and Coffee" duties on the same subject.

Customs Circular No. 105, June 18th, 1872—
Gives further instructions.

Special Customs Circular, June 21st, 1872—
Allows Post Masters to act in certain cases as Customs Officers for re-bonding and re-warehousing packages of "Tea and Coffee."

Customs Circular No. 106, June 12st, 1872—
States that by Order in Council on the exportation of "Needles" which have paid duty on importation to be used with "Sewing Machines" manufactured in the Dominion, the duties so paid on the Needles shall be refunded, when the Sewing Machines are exported from Canada, together with such imported Needles. Customs Circular No. 107, August 17th.—
Referring to Circular No. 93, on the subject of discount on Littlefield and Chamberlin's "Wood Screws" states that a further reduction from fifty to thirty *per cent.* has been allowed by that firm, and stating that this reduction is equivalent to an advance upon the net cost of the screws of forty per cent. The duty is to be collected accordingly.

Customs Circular No. 108, 6th November, 1872
—Orders Collectors in consequence of the difference of opinion at several different ports of entry respecting "Calf Skins," or "Kipp," to charge 15 per cent *ad valorem* on calf or kip, weighing

less than 50 lbs. as being unenumerated, and 19 per cent. *ad valorem* on calf or kip, weighing 50 lbs or more per dozen, such skin being generally known in the trade as upper leather, and as such chargeable with the lower duty under the Tariff. I am, Sir, your obedient servant,

Customs Circular No. 109, 2nd December, 1872—Refers to the sending of returns to the Department.

Customs Circular No. 110, 7th December, 1872—An order of the Governor General, in Council, dated 14th May last, having reference to the mode of establishing or computing the Tonnage of Foreign Vessels entering or clearing at any of the ports in this country, and subject by law to the payment of tonnage dues when so entering or clearing, has ordered and directed that such tonnage dues shall be levied and collected upon the tonnage of such Foreign Vessels, as computed in accordance with the Rules laid down in Part 2 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854—that is to say, in accordance with the British Measurement of such tonnage, and you are therefore to be governed hereafter by the Rules so laid down, should you not already have adopted it, in the collection of tonnage dues at your port. It will therefore be your duty to cause Foreign Ships trading at your port subject to the payment of tonnage dues, to be measured under the Rules prescribed by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, referred to; but whenever such ships have been previously measured at any port in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and that satisfactory evidence of that fact shall be produced to you

you are to be governed by the British measurement so shown to have been made. I have also to call your attention to the fact that certain Foreign Countries having adopted the British mode of computing the tonnage of ships, you are not called upon to re-measure the ships of such countries, but that you are to be governed by the Tonnage as shown by the Registries of such ships. The only countries so far, that have adopted the Rule of Measurement laid down by the Imperial Merchant Shipping Act, are Denmark and the United States of America, official notice of which has been given to the Government of Canada, and is now communicated to you for your future guidance in such cases. Order in Council, December 24th, 1872—Orders in conformity with the provisions of the Act of the last Session, that from and after the first day of January next, a duty of ten per cent. is authorized, and it is to be collected on Tea and Coffee imported into Canada from the United States.

Circular 86, 1871, transmits forms of declaration and certificate for importers of Machinery, entitled to exemption of duty, under the Act 34 Victoria, cap. 10. Said forms are as follow :

Circular No. 87 applies to Province of Ontario only. It exempts vessels in Ontario from duty for the Sick and Distressed Mariner's Fund.

Circular No. 88 is as follows:—

CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT, Ottawa, 16th October, 1871.

SIR.—A different mode of weighing Cigars for duty appearing to exist at the several Ports of Entry in the Dominion, it has been considered advisable that, with a view to uniformity, the weights of Cigars should be ascertained by the selection of two lots of ten (10) boxes each, of every brand—a practice which is now followed at the Port of Montreal, and which is found to give satisfaction to importers. A notice inserted in the *Official Gazette*, in the English and French languages, and in one newspaper in the English, and one in the French language, in the district affected, or in both languages, if there be but one paper ; or if there be no paper published therein, then (in both languages) in the *Official Gazette*, and in a paper published in an adjoining district.

Such notice shall be continued in each case for a period of at least thirty days during the interval of time between the close of the next preceding session and the consideration of the petition.

Before any petition praying for leave to bring in a private bill for the erection of a toll-bridge, is presented to the House, the person or persons intending to petition for such bill, shall upon giving the notice prescribed by the preceding rule, also, at the same time and in the same manner, give notice of the rates which they intend to ask, the extent of the privilege, the height of the arches, the interval between the abutments or piers for the passage of rafts or vessels, and mentioning also whether they intend to erect a drawbridge or not, and the dimensions of the same.
