CALIFORNIA VIA MONTREAL.

Mr. Mackay's Views on the Canadian Pacific Railway. From the New York Herald.

Mr. Mackay, who has just returned from his tour of inspection of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has been interviewed by the Herald...

"You must please excuse me," said Mr. Mackay, "if I decline to be interviewed. I am very much occupied with pressing business, and long ago I was obliged to make a rule never to give an interview."

"Well," continued the reporter, "the public have heard through the papers a great deal about the Canadian Pacific Railway about the great enterprise, and perseverance the construction of it involved. Therefore any information that you could give would undoubtedly be of interest to the public."

"Very well, what do you want to know?" "The Herald would like to know your views on the road generally and its advantages, if any exist."

"The railroad from Port Moody to Montreal has a mileage of 2005 miles, and for its size I consider it one of the best built roads in the world. The magnitude of the enterprise is beyond my power to describe. I may say, however, that it is the grandest I have ever witnessed in my own country or in Sweden."

"The trip is simply delightful, and to be properly appreciated the country must be traveled through. The accommodations provided are of the very finest. Splendid dining rooms are attached to the cars, and every passenger can take a plunge in the bath rooms attached to the sleeping cars."

"I am of opinion that every inch of the road is exceptionally well built. The making of it was surrounded with difficulties. There was a great deal of tunneling and trestle work to do. One of the wooden bridges was 264 feet high—the highest in the world—and the most magnificent wooden viaduct I have ever seen."

"What is your opinion of the land and resources of the country?" "Very good indeed. Like all other roads of this distance there are some places good and others that are not good. The western portion of the country is very fertile, and this part is filling up rapidly. The population already exceeds 50,000. I think the present very good; much more so than I had expected. I cannot refrain from saying that the engineers and the men who have been instrumental in successfully carrying this great project to completion deserve my warmest congratulations and my sincere admiration."

WOMAN'S BIBLE.

The Sexes Engaged With a Man's Version Which May be Disjoint to Them. Very few people know of a remarkable enterprise that is being undertaken in New Jersey in the shape of a female revision of the Bible.

The work is being carried on in this manner: In a richly furnished drawing-room about a broad table sit half a dozen women with intelligent faces and busy pens. Each one has a copy of the Bible which she reads carefully and occasionally clips out a verse and pastes it at the top of a long slip of white paper.

The others then cut out the same verse from their Bibles, and dispose of it in the same manner. With this before them they began to discuss it in turn. One of the commentators is an excellent Greek and Hebrew scholar. Another is profoundly learned in current Bible criticism, while still another has gone through with care and has her finger on all the great commentators of Henry, Scott, Dr. Adam Clark, and others. After each verse has been thoroughly discussed and the sheets are then passed in to a secretary. This secretary is a recent graduate from Vassar. She cuts out this material of verse from a larger sheet of paper, and then appends under it the notes of all the learned commentators. When asked what was the object of this revision, one of the ladies who inspires and carries on this tremendous labor, explained that they were doing what might be called a feminine revision of the Bible. "We find," she said, "in going over the Old and New Testaments, that about one-third of the Bible touches, in one way or another, upon women. We wish to know whether the male readings, translations and interpretations have been strictly fair to us, and in a spirit friendly to our sex. We and a great many other women have our doubts on the subject, and we propose issuing what may be called 'The Woman's Bible.' On our Revising Committee sit able women from England and America."

A well-known publisher has agreed to issue the revision when it is completed, and by next summer the "Woman's Bible" will be given to the public.

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LACROSSE AS IT IS TO-DAY

THE MATCH BETWEEN MONTREAL AND THE SHAMROCKS

Toronto's Great Interest in the Result—The Club Preparing for the Play-off of the Championship—The Shamrock's Aggregating the Best Torontonians for the Second Time.

At last Saturday's Toronto-Montreal lacrosse match was provided the Toronto club had won, to have faced the Shamrock's in the championship play-off at Toronto, so will this afternoon's Shamrock-Montreal match, provided the Shamrock's win. In the minds of most people the odds are against the Shamrock's, but they have proved themselves decidedly inconsistent in their wins and losses this year, and have done better against the Montrealers than against any one else since they had beaten the champions and once virtually tied them.

The Montrealers will play their hitherto unopposed team—Aird, Cleghorn, Louzon, Shephard, Cameron, Elliot, Patterson, Carl, McNaughton, Paton, Hodgson and Grant. The Shamrock team will be selected from Eric, Creswell, Hector, Duggan, McGuira, Murphy, Hall, Canadian, Devine, Ahearne, Reilly, Barry, Ryan and Tansley, all backing players.

The date of the playing-off of the Toronto-Montreal game has been postponed to Oct. 11, the Monday following the Saturday on which the Ontario play the Montrealers at Montreal. There is no reason why the game should not be played some day next week in any case in the event the Montrealers win, and the Toronto team beating the Ontario, the final play for victory between the Toronto and the Montreal will take place not later than Oct. 16, so that in two weeks at latest the agony will be over.

The decision as to the grounds on which the prospective Toronto-Montreal match is to be played lies with the Management Committee, which is composed of the President of the Association and one representative from each of the five clubs. Every indication points to the choice of the majority falling on the Shamrock Lacrosse Club's grounds in Montreal.
