Committees are requested to have their subscription lists completed and collected, and reports of their business for the year drawn up prior to the Secretary's visit. In this way trouble and delay in preparing the Auxiliary's Report will be prevented.

Committees of branch societies contributing \$50 and upwards to the Auxiliary are requested to nominate one of their number for membership in the Auxiliary's Committee, and to notify the Recording Secretary in Ottawa of such nomination on or before the second Tuesday of February in each year.

Committees, and especially their Secretaries, will, it is hoped, see that Reports and Leaflets are widely circulated without delay. It is desirable that among others who will read them, as well as subscribers of a dollar and upwards, the reports be distributed.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

—OF THE—

### Ottawa Auxiliary Bible Society.

---

1. The Society shall be denominated the "OTTAWA AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY;" the object of which shall be to co-operate with the British and Foreign Bible Society in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures both at home and abroad.

2. Conformably to the principles of the parent institution, the Bibles and Testaments circulated by the Society shall be without note or comment.

3. All persons subscribing One Dollar and upwards, per annum, shall be members of the Society; or Twenty Dollars at one time, shall be members for life.

4. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, two Secretaries, and a Committee of not less than twenty members, with power to add to their number. Five members of the Committee shall form a quorum.

5. All resident Protestant Ministers shall be considered *ex-officio* members of the Committee.

6. No lay member of the Society shall be eligible as a member of the Committee, unless he be a life member, or pay an annual subscription of not less than Two Dollars.

7. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as shall have rendered essential service to the Society as Honorary Governors for life.

8. The Committee shall meet once every month, or oftener if necessary, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

9. The whole of the subscriptions and donations received by the Society, and not required for its own operations, shall from time to time be remitted to the Parent Society.

10. For the purpose of giving full effect to the benevolent designs of the British and Foreign Bible Society, in their grant of the Scriptures for distribution among the poor, the Committee shall make it their business to enquire what families or individuals are in want of Bibles or Testaments, and it shall be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced price, or *gratis*, according to their circumstances.

11. A general meeting of the subscribers shall be held annually, in the City of Ottawa, when the Committee's proceedings, and Treasurer's accounts for the previous year shall be reported, and a new Committee be appointed.

12. No alterations shall be made in these laws, except at a general meeting of the Society, called by special notice, to be advertised in two or three City newspapers once a month previously.

N.B.—The Committee shall meet regularly on the second Tuesday of every month in the Committee Room in the Ladies' Parlor of the Y. M. C. A., at 4.30 p.m., and oftener if the business require it.

THE FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE OTTAWA

SUBMITTED MAY 4TH, 1898.

---

**F**ROM the beginning God willed that His people should know and make known the word of revelation. To Israel He said, "These words which I command thee this day shall be in thine heart; and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and thou shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up, and thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes, and thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house and on thy gates." The Psalmist prays for the favor and mercy of God, that His way may be known on earth and His saving health among all nations. Through Isaiah we hear the word of God saying, "Come near, ye nations, to hear, and hearken, ye people; let the earth hear and all that is therein, the world and all things that come forth of it. \* \* \* Seek ye out of the book of the Lord and read." But more especially is it the mission and great work of the Christian Church to proclaim and publish the glad tidings and truths of the Holy Scriptures. Every Christian is in trust with the Gospel and in debt to the world. The mission of the Church, said a great Missionary, is missions. Each Christian is called to be a missionary in preaching or sending the Gospel to every creature. To His followers Christ said, Ye shall be witnesses for Me unto the uttermost parts of the earth. The field for the individual Christian is the world. Christianity is pre-eminently the religion of love, and true Christians must therefore be consistently characterized by their love to God and man. In no better way can this be done than by making Christ and His salvation known to a miserable and perishing world. "Whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowls of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him"?

But not only is the Church a Missionary institution, the Bible is a Missionary Book in its origin and purpose. To the Missionary idea in the Divine mind, and to the Missionary life and labors of



the servants of God are we indebted for the whole book. When God revealed to Abraham the covenant of grace, which may be termed the Constitution of the Bible, He said, "In thee shall all nations of the earth be blessed." Accordingly, He afterwards commanded to declare His glory among the heathen and His wonders among all people.

The writing of the New Testament was occasioned by the Missionary exigencies of the Apostolic Church, and almost every, if not every page of it was written by Missionaries. That the Bible is a Missionary book is evident because it is so easily translated. "Singular to tell" says McCulloch, "the Bible is the easiest of all books to translate, and in every tongue into which it is rendered, the easiest to read; while it is over and above the fullest of life and vivacity. The beauties and delicate touches of other books decline to be translated into a foreign tongue, and die under the process, but the vitality of the Scriptures passes immortal like the transmigrating spirit from one body to another." Therefore, the translation and circulation of the Holy Scriptures can never be a doubtful work to true Christians. They know it is the will of God, and they know that Bible circulation is like gold currency compared with paper. The former maintains its value, as has been thoroughly proven by this century of the free and universal use of the Scriptures.

The propriety and necessity of a Bible Society in connection with the Christian Church is, therefore, most obvious, and, consequently, the wonderful success of the British and Foreign Bible Society for 94 years throughout the world, may surely be taken as a convincing token of the divine favor. Never were doors to all nations more widely open, and the promises of God concerning His word brighter, than in this year of our Lord. The recent reports of our Parent Society abundantly confirm this statement. Not to speak of the Protestant countries, the last annual report shows that the circulation of the Bible was materially increased in every Roman Catholic country of Europe, as well as in the great Russian Empire, where 60 years ago there was very little Bible work to report. The Muhammadan races in Africa and Asia are reported to be less hateful and more liberal towards Christianity. The prejudices which have so long locked and barred the Moslem mind seem to be gradually breaking down. In Cairo and Alexandria the diffusion of Scriptures has been greater than ever before. Progress is reported from East, West and Central Africa; and the report of no country so vividly illustrates the progress of recent years as that of the South African Auxiliary, with its 200 Branches, covering from Mashonaland to the Cape of Good Hope.

From the Far East, from Japan, Corea and Maylaysia come reports grave and moderate in tone, yet full of hope. China increased her circulation from 236,000 to 366,000 copies. India received over 450,000, and much revision and translation work was carried on with unabated success. The total circulation for the most part in foreign countries, was about 4,000,000 copies. Five new translations were added to the list, making a total of 339 translations made by this Society, 335 of which are in active use. The total issue of the Society in these translations from its commencement in 1804 now exceeds 154,000,000 copies.

Since our last annual meeting the British Empire has celebrated the Diamond Jubilee of Her Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria. The 60 years of her illustrious reign was reviewed and considered by the most eminent thinkers of the Empire from all points of view, and many sought to show the secret of the most wonderful progress ever enjoyed by a nation. The *London Times* said: "There is no more remarkable characteristic of the Queen's long and glorious reign than the importance which her people have attached to the Scriptures, and the extraordinary impetus which they have given to their world-wide dissemination. The progress and expansion of the British Empire and the British race have been illustrated in a thousand ways during the past year; but there is nothing which exhibits that progress and that expansion in a clearer or better light than the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society."

The Committee of the Ottawa Auxiliary rejoices to have a share in the prosecution of this great enterprise, and desires to thank God for His great mercy in enabling them to present a report of another prosperous year. Eleven meetings of Committee were held, the average attendance being larger than for many years.

#### MEMBERS DEPARTED.

It is with deep sorrow we mourn the removal by death of two of our most worthy and active workers, Mr. John Munro, a Vice-President, and Mr. Thomas Kenny, of Arnprior. Both of these brethren were greatly beloved for their loyal co-operation in the service of the Society, and for their faith in God and His word.

#### VISITATION OF BRANCHES.

The Recording Secretary, as directed, visited 91 Branches and addressed 124 meetings, as well as the Perth Auxiliary and its 4 Branches. The average attendance was good as compared with previous years. A new set of diagrams, illustrating the work of



our Society, and a large Missionary map was again used, to the satisfaction of all. In connection with Branch work 24,000 leaflets giving information respecting the Society, and 400 almanacs were circulated. The Secretary desires to express his thanks to the many friends of the Society, and especially the officers and collectors, for their faithful and sympathetic co-operation.

#### FREE DISTRIBUTION.

One of the good offices of the Bible Society is to grant the Scriptures gratuitously to the poor and needy, to public and charitable institutions. Good was done in this way in many instances during the year, notably in aiding the fire sufferers at South Indian and Casselman, the Salvation Army, the Young Men's Christian Association, and scores of individuals through our Colporteurs. The total free distribution and reduction in prices amount to 241 volumes, value, \$103.18.

#### COLPORTAGE.

Colportage, as last year, was mostly confined to the lumbering camps. During January, February and early March nine Colporteurs visited the Shanties of the Du Lievre, Gatineau, Coulonge, Du Moine, Mattawa, Kippewa, Pettawawa, Bonnechere, Madawaska, Mississippi and those of rivers between North Bay and Sudbury.

When we consider the class of men who, for the most part, labor in the woods, that the majority are of Roman Catholic faith, and that their wages are very low, it is wonderful that from year to year the circulation among them should be so well maintained and so often greatly increased. That an incalculable amount of good is being done cannot for a moment be doubted by those in possession of the facts.

The Colporteurs continue to report the kindness and generous hospitality with which they are treated in the Shanties by Roman Catholics as well as Protestants, and the respectful attention given the reading of the Scriptures and the worship of God.

The labors of the Colporteurs aggregate 11 months and 12 days. They visited 231 Shanties and Depots, in which were over 8,000 men; 684 families were visited. They sold 1057 copies, value, \$557.86. Free distribution, 74 copies, \$16.07; reduction in price, \$9.25. The shantymen gave subscriptions amounting to \$160.41. Altogether these figures eloquently express the great and good work done last winter among this isolated class of men, who receive so little religious attention.

## FINANCES.

The bountiful harvest, the advance in prices of produce, the increased demand for labor and, consequently, the freer circulation of money, gave hope during the year that receipts would in all probability be increased; this hope has been realized as receipts from all sources of income are in advance of last year. The total contribution from Branch Societies is the largest in the history of the Auxiliary.

A bequest of \$2,500 was received from the estate of the late John Bryson, M.P., Fort Coulonge, Que. The value of this legacy was lessened by \$250.00 tax exigible by the Quebec Government. The Bryson family have been for many years most generous supporters of the Bible Society, and this bequest greatly augments our contribution this year to the Parent Society.

## EXPENDITURE.

The expenditure has been :—

Free contribution to the Parent Society, (£1000) \$4,816.67. The largest annual contribution heretofore was \$3,000. Stock, \$2,182.41; colportage, \$624.84; salaries, \$1,200; printing and advertising, \$306.40; insurance, freight and expressage, \$112.05; postage, stationery and collector's books, \$72.48; rent, commission, &c., \$598.83; sales returned, twice paid, \$11.22; branch depositories and sundries, \$43.91; balance in bank, \$707.58. Total, \$10,676.39.

## CONCLUSION.

A thoughtful review of the past year and past history of the Bible Society will lead to the conclusion that its work is essential to the most rapid, intelligent and spiritual extension of the kingdom of God, and, therefore, it is a work that is destined to continue, unless the church should be allowed to lapse into great

unfaithfulness and ignorance. It is inspiring to be engaged in an enterprise that is not only useful and needful, but also has in it the element of permanence. A book that has everywhere and in every age commanded the admiration of all men, that is prized above all earthly treasure by the people of God, is not likely to pass into absolute disuse by any nation receiving it in its own language, nor can misapprehension and opposition prevent the triumph of the Bible. It has a history of many battles and as many victories. It overcame the wicked and desperate opposition of the Roman Empire, when its New Testament writers were better known than they can be again. It survived the gross ignorance and superstition of the dark ages, the corruption of pre-Reformation times, the infidelity and misrepresentations of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, and it is most surely outliving the ingenious assaults of our own day. Man cannot invent a substitute for it, nor can he rival or ruin it. "The word of the Lord is perfect, and endureth forever."

Sad is it to think of the millions that are without its divine light, and the multitudes that are indifferent to its holy claims; yet sadder is it to think of the foolish ones, who contend with it. They sorely bruize themselves, but not the Book of God for we behold it still.

### ABSTRACT OF THE NINETY-THIRD REPORT OF THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

---

#### GENERAL AND INTRODUCTORY.

---

**A** REVIEW is necessarily a retrospect ; and the eye exploring the events and the work of the year, is naturally turned backward to the point at which its progress began. In an ordinary annual survey this retrospective glance need not be carried further. But in one very pleasant and very important respect the year 1896-7 is an exceptional one. With its close comes to an end not merely a single twelvemonth, but a period—a secular term of years—to which the eyes of many great populations are being directed, and with which the thoughts of a mighty empire are being engaged. There is being surveyed and celebrated, not the latest year of the Queen's genial reign, but the completed term of sixty years since Her Majesty ascended the throne. Science is estimating the immense spaces over which her restless feet during that period have passed : Art is assembling the beautiful creations of her genius : Literature, her brilliant treasures : Commerce is counting her profit in a market which has become as wide as the world : Political History is marking the sweep of boundaries which compare so wonderfully with the limits of the earlier realm. And with examples so suggestive, and with the story of an enterprise no less inspiring, as its objects is higher than any of these, it cannot but be instructive to extend the review beyond the limits of the Bible Society's latest year and compare, if only in some of its outlines, and as the survey proceeds, the position of its affairs when the Queen's reign began.

The Report of the Bible Society, which was issued just about the time when the young Monarch came to the throne, was the 33rd in the series which began in 1805. Already the Society had completed a term of years equal to that of an average generation. And there is perhaps nothing more striking—nothing more justly remarkable when one examines these earlier records—than the evident maturity of the Society's aims, and even, to a certain

degree, of its accomplishments. It was already, and most evidently, inspired by conceptions much vaster than any which are merely imperial : it was stretching out its benevolent influences to the limits—and it had already touched the limits—of the world. One is surprised to find that almost every important country mentioned in the current Report is mentioned also in the earlier one. Did the beautiful young Queen, in any leisure hour—'free from the cares that cumber state'—in those now distant years, ever glance at the pages of the Bible Society's new Report. Did she notice—and with her prompt Christian sympathies if she had noticed, it could not be but with pleasure—that the unpretentious book surveyed a field which included in its operations a kind of Christian empire far wider than her own. From the little Moravian settlement of Nain in Labrador—whence an Eskimo *Isaiah* was being sent for publication—to Van Dieman's Land, to which a supply of Scriptures for the convicts was despatched : from Brazil to South America, and from Sierra Leone in Africa to China and the Asiatic Archipelago, to which an Agent had just been appointed : from farthest North to South, from East to West, there was no field for Christian work to which the Society was not looking, and wonderfully few with which it had not some more or less close connection. In those days it was an eminently British organisation, for there were some 2,300 auxiliary Societies at home, but it was fast becoming, and in a way worthy of the name, foreign, for there were nine agents, and more than 230 Auxiliaries and Associations, abroad.

But if comparable to the later Reports as to mere extent and outline of operations, that of 1837 is in other respects as strikingly different. Like the settler in some new country, it had surveyed its possessions, but in many directions it had done little more. It had touched, and here and there it had occupied, the coast line of continents : but the vast inland regions—the unexplored hinterlands—were yet for many years to remain unpossessed. In these early records the Colporteur—that patient, indispensable worker—has hardly done more than made his appearance. The Bible-woman had not yet found entrance for her gentle ministries to the still dark—how long afterwards were they to remain dark and secluded !—Zenanas of the East. The Society's editions were offered for sale to subscribers and Auxiliary Societies only. The cheapest English New Testament cost elevenpence, and, with the exception of the Psalms, Portions were unknown.

The reports which are submitted year by year may often seem to consist of details and changes of slight significance. The fluctuations of income and circulation, the gain or loss in workers, the story of translation and revision, the persistence of hostility, and the measure of spiritual achievement are familiar and recurrent



features in the Society's annals. But when we realise that in the past sixty years the number of the Society's versions has increased from 135 to 335 and its circulation sevenfold, and that it has ceased to be a crime in almost every land to love and spread the Holy Word, we know that a harvest is come 'So is the Kingdom of God, as if a man should cast seed into the ground, and should sleep and rise night and day, and the seed should spring and grow up, he knoweth not how.'

And yet the past year is not without its fruits and flowers of promise. The Society has thriven amid opposition and calumny in Roman Catholic and Muhammadan lands, holding in both a unique position. The Roman now reads more than ever the record of what the Lord said and the apostles wrote, and the Muslim often respects the sacred page even when he reviles the preacher. Both East and West Africa receive the Bible with avidity. South Africa announces a record for circulations in the year of the jubilee of its Auxiliary, Dutch and English co-operating in a work dear to both. The China Agency has increased its work during the year at least by half, and South America holds out its hand for help in a forward missionary movement for which it has waited long.

#### I.—FINANCE.

At one time during the year it seemed as if expenditure might exceed receipts, so large had been the falling off in legacies during the first nine months. In the last month that fear was removed, and the income proved more than sufficient to meet the cost of recent developments.

The New Income of 1876-97 was £128,504 9s. 11d., or £2,131 18s. more than that of 1895-96. There has been a welcome increase of £3,470 0s. 11d. in Free Contributions. A part of this, however, is in legacies; the rest is in special donations.

Receipts from Sales amount to £87,654 4s. 5d., as against £87,590 2s. 1d. last year. They include an increase of nearly £1,000 on Sales in the Society's Foreign Agencies.

The sum of the two, or the General Fund, that is, the total receipts for the year apart from Special Funds, amounts to £216,158 14s. 4d., giving an increase of £2,196 0s. 4d. over the total of last year.

Payments for Subscriptions, Depots, and Colportage, show under each head a considerable increase. Payments from the General Fund have come to £202,681 13s. 1d., as against £197,756 19s. The increase of £5,924 14s. 1d. is a welcome sign of greater activity abroad.

The receipts for Special Funds have been £834 15s. 7d., and

the payments £1,011 12s. 1d. The excess of payments has been met by the balance in hand on this account from last year.

## II.—ISSUES.

The following issues have now to be reported: from the Depot in London, for the year ending March 31st, 1897, 1,780,993; from Depots abroad, for 1895-96, 1,995,140; making an aggregate of 3,776,133 copies in Bibles, Testaments and Portions. The total issues of the Society from its commencement in 1804 now amounts to 151,132,802 copies. The decrease of 194,306 copies in the new issues is to be explained by the fact that the returns from all the Foreign Agencies and Auxiliaries are not complete in time to allow of their embodiment in the report issued for the year of work. The present returns contains the figures for the Foreign Depots for 1895-96, the year prior to that now described in the Report. When the figures for the year just expired are completed they will confirm the encouraging reports which many of the Agents have submitted.

## III.—TRANSLATION AND REVISION.

The work of translation and revision has been pressed on incessantly during the year; but full details cannot be given here. It will be found, however, that the mass of editorial work done surpasses that of any previous year. The Bible for Uganda has been completed, and is now in the hands of the people. With this version are associated the names of Mackay, and Ashe, and Gordon, and Pilkington, and other scholars of Europe and Africa, whose names will live in the coming days.

The New Testament in Kien-Ning, on the publication of which the late Rev. R. W. Stewart had set his heart, and with regard to which he wrote one of his last letters, has been carried through the press under the care of Miss B. Newcombe of the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society. Miss Newcombe has returned to China with this message of peace in permanent form to avenge the martyrdom of her loving sisters, and that of the strong but gentle missionary on whom they all leant.

The Bible in Tukudh is in process of completion, under the care of the Ven. Archdeacon McDonald, for 2,000 Indians occupying 100,000 square miles of a desolate region on the confines of the Arctic Circle; and the Rev. E. J. Peck, of Cumberland Sound, is carrying through the press an edition of the Four Gospels in a new form for the Eskimo, scattered over 2,000 miles of frozen coast.

The important versions of India and China are undergoing revision at the hands of men of exceptional qualifications, and the



publication of the New Testament for the degraded Ainu of Japan is approaching completion under the care of the Rev. J. Batchelor, the translator.

In the distant Isles new translations are progressing, and the Rev. F. Langham, who has spent thirty-seven years in Fiji, is devoting his closing years, and his mature and ripe scholarship, to the perfecting of the Fiji Bible.

The work expands and deepens in all lands, and we can say with thankfulness (boasting is excluded) that the Committee have thus far taken up with glad alacrity every item of translation and revision work that has been brought before them with sufficient evidence and missionary usefulness.

#### FRANCE.

*Population, in 1891, 38,228,969, The returns as to religion, 1881, were Roman Catholics, 29,201,703, being 78.50 per cent. of the total; 692,800 Protestants, or 1.8 per cent; and 7,684,906 persons who 'declined to make any declaration on religious belief.' Average number of colporteurs working the whole year, 40; total circulation for the year, 149,441.*

'It is not difficult to characterise in a single sentence the year which is just ending,' writes M. Monod, 'it is one during which the watchword seems, at least in some circles, to have been "Down with Protestants!"' We have no longer to do with M. Mahy's morbid reveries, discovering everywhere the pernicious and subtle influence of English "Methodist" and of English Bible Societies; such follies can do harm only to their author, and must provoke smiles rather than indignation. But now the attack is against French Protestants. Their crime is not that they are not Catholics, for religion is outside the question, the accusers being anything but religious men: but great efforts are made to lead people to believe that it is not possible to be at once a Protestant and a loyal Frenchman. In other terms, French Protestants are publicly charged with an entire lack of patriotism. The accusation is at least strange coming as it does from a party that receives its orders from Rome. But it is not the less perfidious and dangerous.

'This anti-Protestant crusade began some years ago by the allegation that Protestants occupied in the higher positions in the State, in Government offices and generally speaking in all the *emplois superieurs*, and in our great public schools, a proportion of places far in advance of their share, considering their number in relation to the population. And such is also *the fact*. But most of those higher positions are attained by public competition where

chances are equal for all competitors ; the first places are in consequence won by merit and not by favour.

' At present it is the question of Madagascar that has stirred this hornets' nest ; all the rage of the Jesuit party has been roused. That on French soil Roman Catholics should be a small minority and Protestants many and strong is simply unbearable ; and if in point of religion it is impossible to prove the superiority of Roman Catholicism, then let the Protestants suffer in the public mind by charging them with not being French. That is the odious calumny the Thiebauds and others are propagating in their conferences from village to village, preaching " Down with Protestants ! " Now we shall not reply by " Down with Roman Catholics ! " but by, " Make way for the Gospel, for the good news of salvation through Jesus Christ, to every sinner who repenteth and believeth. " Such is the cry of a few courageous and devoted men such as Pastor Houter, in the south, and Pastor Delattre in Auvergne. In theatres, in dancing-rooms, in salles, in the mairies, or in school-rooms, they proclaim to crowds that assemble to hear them that " Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. " It is the eternal battle of truth against error, and no doubt is possible for a Christian as to its final issue ; but until the day of victory we must accept the fight as a necessity. We have the truth on our side and in our hands the Word of God " sharper than any two-edged sword, " and it is *that Word* that our colporteurs circulate, bringing light where the enemy would gladly take advantage of darkness to accomplish his works of darkness.'

#### THE FRENCH REFORMATION.

It is a common saying that France will never embrace Protestantism, a form of religion antagonistic to its national genius. The assertion is accepted blindly, when a short examination would prove its falseness. History and facts together prove that it is not well founded. From the very first the French Reformation was eminently French. The old Parisian Doctor Lefèvre d'Etaples, predecessor of Farel, had found by himself the Evangelical doctrine at its very source in the Gospel, and he taught it six years before Luther. In 1525 Farel protested against the errors contained in Luther's earlier publications, where he maintained such doctrines as Purgatory and Invocations of Saints, those doctrines having been rejected for years by the French Reformers. We find among the Reformers of the 16th century the greatest French names, the Bourbons, the Rohans, the Chatillons. Calvin was French, and Duplessis, Mornay, Conde, Coligny. It is, however, an exaggeration to say that before the persecutions the half of the kingdom was Huguenot. From an enrolment made in 1583 by Henri IV.,



shortly before the publication of the Edict of Nantes, it appears that about twelve hundred thousand Protestants were then in the kingdom, and that number increased by a third after the publication of the Edict. Whether or not under Louis XIV. there were twelve hundred thousand or even two millions of Protestants, it is certain that they were reduced to four hundred thousand in 1756.

At the end of the 18th century, after having been decimated by the persecutions, French Protestants stood first among the true *patriots*. It was a Protestant, a pastor, the son of the old pastor of the Desert, Rabaut St. Etienne, that the *Assemblée Nationale* chose for its President. This may suffice to refute the argument that Protestantism is a foreign importation.

In 1807 Protestants were four hundred and eighty thousand, and now their number does not exceed six hundred and fifty thousand, which is as much as to say that since the end of the period of the Desert up to our days, the increase of the Protestant population corresponds exactly to the increase of the population of the country. We are thus a very small minority amidst thirty-seven and a half millions of nominal Roman Catholics.

The forty-four colporteurs employed sold 60,925 copies as compared with 59,422 last year, while the sales at the depots have been 66,733 copies in comparison with 59,665 in the previous year, the increase in the sales at the head depot at Paris being specially noticeable.

#### COLPORTAGE.

Our colporteur Quintin, aged forty-three years, with thirteen years of service, reports constantly about men, specially sailors, who purchase the Scriptures, because they have heard of them in some *salle* of the McAll Mission in another port. Quintin's sales are of about 1000 copies, but of course he does not limit himself to the city ; sales in the rural districts are much easier now than they were a few years back, and this is the unmistakable sign of the decrease of priestly influence.

I then came to Quimper, where I had a real pleasure in meeting our colporteur *Le Goasduff*, a converted sailor. I also enjoyed much the kind hospitality of Mr. Jenkyn Jones, his correspondent. *Le Goasduff*—his name betrays sufficiently his origin—is thirty-five years old and has been in our service four years, in the course of which he has been making evident progress, both in spirituality and in the practice of colportage. His sales reach now far beyond 1000 copies, and he estimates that he will sell twice as many with the price of the Breton Gospels reduced to five centimes. Married five years ago they have lost their eldest child and have only a baby boy. With the open manners of a sailor he succeeds

in many places where others would fail ; his happy countenance and energetic ways are good to see. I trust that with God's help Le Goasduff has before him a useful and blessed career.

#### WHAT IS THE TRUE GOSPEL ?

'I have a Gospel in English,' said a man ; 'it is a better translation than the French one, but I have torn the pages that did not agree with me.' 'What do you mean ? Why did they not agree with you ?' 'Because they did not agree with our religion.' 'You had better tear off what *in you* does not agree with the Gospel.'

A curé told me, 'Go to Madagascar : there you will sell your books, but not here, where we all are good Catholics. Protestants are not French, they are Jews. They are English, Germans, Prussians.' 'People here are as much in need of the Gospel as in Madagascar.' 'Yes, but not Luther's and Calvin's Gospel.' He turned round and asked for a match to burn the books. 'But they are excellent,' said a woman. 'I have a Testament ; I read it, and am very fond of it.' The curé went away murmuring, 'Were I the *maire* I would not tolerate your presence here, and next Sunday I will preach against your books.'

#### PROTESTANT BOOKS.

At Vannes a woman refused my books because they are Protestant. 'But, mother,' said the girl, 'I wish to have a copy.' 'I see no harm in that,' said the father, but the mother exclaimed, 'Look here ! you have been to confession to-night ; you are to receive the holy communion to-morrow morning, and you should not read such books ! That would be to sin with a full purpose of doing so.' 'How,' I asked, 'can the fact of reading the Word of God be a sin ?' 'The Word of God, indeed ! and it is a book full of horrors against the Virgin, to whom my daughter is consecrated.' I pointed to Luke i., 26—36, which the girl read aloud. 'You see, mother, how you are mistaken. Let the book be Protestant, I want to know its contents ;' and she bought a copy with her father's, but not her mother's approval.

At *Vastes* a woman said, 'Why should we buy books that the curés forbid us to read ?' 'But they are not your masters, are they ?' 'In fact they are. We had bought a Testament that we liked to read, when the curé, catching hold of the volume, threw it into the fire. When my husband came home he was not pleased, and said that I should by all means buy a Bible from you if ever you passed again.'

'Is it really the true story of our Lord Jesus Christ ?' asked



a farmer's wife, after a short conversation, and when she believed my statement that it really was, she was so happy that she did not know how to express her thankfulness. 'And so you came so far only to bring me that book?' She spoke of the Saviour with an ardent love, though not yet realising how complete and gratuitous is the salvation He brings us. I showed her some passages on that point, and I feel sure that the work of grace begun in her will be perfected by the Holy Spirit.

Another day an old woman of 83 years was at first surprised that such a young man as I should speak to her of such things. 'But, sir, I love God. It is He who sends you? Please step in, that we may talk more intimately.' I did so, and told her about the great salvation the Saviour has secured for us. She drank in my words, and the tears ran down her cheeks. 'To think that He died *for me*. What a marvel!' She bought a Testament in large print that she can read very easily, and we parted, to meet again in our heavenly home.

This month I sold 250 copies among people favourably disposed. 'What a good thing,' they said, 'to circulate such books! It is a deplorable fact that even our children believe nothing. What will become of us if things continue in that way? We cannot allow our children to read bad books.'

I often hear, 'We have lost our faith in our religion, but we still believe *au bon Dieu*, and we want to read the Gospel.'

Another month 250 copies were again sold, all to Roman Catholics. This constitutes an abundant seed for future harvest in the Lord's own appointed time.

#### CALUMNIES.

'Do not buy those books,' said a worker to his friends, 'they are Protestant, and speak badly of our religion.' 'Who told you that? no doubt your confessor.' 'Yes, I had such a book; the curé took it from me, and said I was never to read such a one.' 'But, my friend—for I will be and am your friend—do you not suspect that your curé has not told you the truth? I wish your friends would look at my books,' and I distributed some copies among them. 'I know that book,' said one, after a while, 'and I also know that if we are forbidden to read it it is to keep us ignorant of what it is our interest to know, and I will buy a copy.' His example was followed by several others.

#### BELGIUM AND HOLLAND.

*Population 31st Dec., 1895, 6,841,950. There are some 4,000 Jews, and perhaps 25,000 Protestants: although Roman Catholicism is professedly the religion of the country, an increasing proportion of the population are Freethinkers.*

Perhaps the most interesting item of the year, as regards the great Roman Catholic countries of the Continent, is given in the report from Belgium. About a year since a gentleman from England, a visitor to the Belgian Spa, became interested in the people and in the Society's work. He was anxious to help in the circulation of the Scriptures, and accepting Mr. Kirkpatrick's advice, he set about his work in the colporteur's way. Courteous, accomplished, patient, and, above all, devoted, he had wonderful success. The people soon began to appreciate his zeal and to respect his grace and gentle persuasiveness. Supply after supply was sent until the returns showed that he had circulated, almost entirely by sale, nearly 11,000 volumes within four months.

## GERMANY.

*Population, (1896), 52,246,589, including (1890) 31,026,810 Protestants, 17,674,921 Roman Catholics, 145,540 'Other Christians,' and 567,884 Jews. Colporteurs (British and Foreign Bible Society)—average number for the year, 27—who circulated 70,763 copies: Total circulation of all the Bible Societies (including editions of private publishers) 730,328.*

No account could be more graphic or more succinct than Mr. Morrisson's of the work under his care in that great State which ancestrally is so closely associated with the Queen and with her noble Consort. In the report for the first year of her Majesty's reign, Dr. Pinkerton, then the Society's agent at Frankfort, refers with evident pain to the spread among the educated classes of scepticism and infidelity.

'When I was in Geneva last spring,' writes Mr. Morrisson, 'I walked across the French frontier to Ferney and saw the beautiful old house in which Voltaire once lived. There was a forsaken and desolate air about the place, and I could not help thinking that the neglected aspect of the philosopher's house corresponded in many respects to the neglected position of his philosophy. But the thought which occupied my mind most as I walked through the quiet woods around the house was the prophecy which Voltaire once uttered about the Bible. In a hundred years, he said, the Bible would be an unknown book; it would be found only in the collections of antiquaries as a witness to the folly of former generations. One hundred years have passed, and the Bible is better known and better loved than ever. The fifty translations of Voltaire's time have swelled to over three hundred, and the great Book which he mocked at has a circulation of six million copies a year.'

'When Strauss wrote his "Leben Jesu" he was preceeded

and followed by a crowd of German writers whose destructive criticisms of the text of Scripture caused many a heart-ache among devout Christians all over the world. Laborious scholarship, penetrating insight, profound science, were all at work in Germany, and slowly and surely the Sacred Book was being sapped at its foundations. Anxious eyes were turned towards those remorseless German students. The Much-Afraid, even those in the pulpit, felt that the Book could not resist the tremendous onslaught.'

'But what is the result? We find that the Bible, the conscience of the German people, as a well-known writer has called it, is deeper in the affections of Germany than ever, and that never before has so great a circulation of the Scriptures been affected as during the past year. 1896 is the record year in Bible circulation in Germany. We hear about the historico-critical professors in the theological faculties, about the baleful influence of the social-democratic leaders, about infidelity in high places; but nothing has yet been able to kill the love for God's Word in the hearts of the people who first made it a mighty and a living power in the world's development.'

In 1881, fifteen years ago, the total circulation of the Scriptures in Germany was 461,619 copies, or ten copies for every thousand of population. In 1889 it was 603,988, or thirteen copies per thousand. In 1896 it rose to 730,328, which makes fourteen copies per thousand. This is an advance of 37,479 copies on the figures for 1895, and, as I have already stated, the total is the largest yet attained in Germany.'

#### SWITZERLAND.

*Estimated population in June, 1894, 2,986,848. Total circulation for the year by the British and Foreign Bible Society, 51,576.*

'Owing to the energy and spirit of the various Cantonal Bible Societies the entire work of Bible circulation in Switzerland is now in their hands, and the only share which the British and Foreign Bible Society has in the work is to supply such Societies with whatever copies of the Scriptures they may prefer to draw from us.'

#### AUSTRIA-HUNGARY AND RUSSIAN POLAND.

*Estimated population in Austria-Hungary (Dec. 31, 1895), 44,449,474. This includes (1890) some 18,648,000 Slavs, 10,570,000 Germans, 7,435,000 Maggars, and 2,801,000 Roumanians. There are about 30,000,000 Roman Catholics, 3,888,000 Protestants, 3,190,000 Greeks and Armenians, 1,872,000 Jews, and*

493,000 *Muhammadans*. Last year the Bible Society had an average of 48 colporteurs at work, and the total circulation was 301,209 copies.

#### MAIN FACTS OF CIRCULATION.

The total issues have reached a far higher figure than ever before, numbering 301,209 as compared with 158,194 in the previous year.<sup>1</sup> This is of course mainly due to the circulation of 112,800 at the Buda Pesth Millennial Exhibition. But it is peculiarly satisfactory to note that this extraordinary effort has not harmfully affected the circulation through the ordinary channels. Almost all the depots report augmented sales, some to a very considerable degree. If it had not been for the special hindrances put in the way of colportage in Galicia, to which may be attributed a falling off in the circulation in that province amounting to nearly four thousand copies, 'we should,' says Mr. Millard, 'have had a most satisfactory year.' The sales by the colporteurs numbered 79,108 or only 1,536 behind the previous year. A striking feature of these figures is that more than half the whole number of copies sold consisted of New Testaments. A diminution in the number of complete Bibles sold Mr. Millard attributes to the great poverty prevailing in some districts, which hinders the sale of the more highly priced books.

#### LINGUISTIC.

Striking evidence of the composite character of the Austrian Empire is afforded by the table of languages in which the Scriptures have been issued within the Austrian Agency during the past year. Over one hundred copies have been issued in each of no less than twenty-one tongues, whilst smaller numbers have been disposed of in several others. This 'confusion of tongues' necessarily introduces an element of complexity into the work which greatly increases its difficulty.

The three printing-presses at Vienna, Buda-Pesth, and Bucharest have been busily at work during the year, and have struck off no less than 392,489 copies. These have comprised 27,134 Bibles, 115,564 New Testaments, and 249,791 Portions.

#### COLPORTEUR EXPERIENCE.—APPRECIATION OF THE BIBLE AND THE BIBLE SOCIETY.

A longing desire to possess the Scriptures is often evinced by the people. For this we cannot be sufficiently thankful, but no less so for the fact that frequently a high esteem is shown for the



Bible Society's blessed work ; and the same is often expressed by customers coming to our Depot premises. These kind acknowledgements are not only made by Christians, but also by Jewish friends. The latter frequently encourage others to buy copies ; and a Rabbi not only shewed much sympathy for our work, but urged his Christian servant to purchase a Bible.

One day a Jew prevented another from taking the New Testament for a peculiar reason. 'Don't buy such a book,' he said ; 'if you read it you will come to a better conviction.' 'Just for that reason I would like to do so,' was the reply. 'Don't do that,' the first retorted. 'I bought this book many years ago from that man ; the more I read, the more I began to love Christ. I had no peace of mind, and at last I could not do otherwise than confess Him in holy baptism ; but never will I join those who persecute our nation.' Our labourer had a long conversation with both of them. It is not difficult to understand the proselyte's feeling if the antisemitic movement is taken into account.

It seems natural to ask : Would it not be better to make a present of a Testament or Bible to each of these good folks ? We gladly do so in cases of great need, and are always willing to listen to applications for grants where such seem appropriate. But in cases like the above we should be depriving many of a great joy, namely, to obtain the precious Word of God at the cost of much self-sacrifice.

#### ITALY.

*Estimated population (1894) 30,913,663, including some 62,000 Protestants (27,000 of these Waldenses) and 38,000 Jews. The Bible Society has 13 Depots, and employed the whole year 32 colporteurs. Total circulation, 168,212.*

'From the foundation of the Italian Agency in 1860 to the end of 1896 no less than 2,864,975 copies of the Word of God have been scattered far and wide, over the whole peninsula, and the large and small Islands adjacent to it. It would be difficult to find a district now in the highest Alps or in the interior of Sardinia that has not been visited by the colporteur, bearing the precious Word of God.

The sky of the religious world in Italy has also been overcast, although the diffused light of the widespread circulation of God's Word has waned, and one ray of bright sunshine has broken through the gloom in the outburst of a remarkable evangelical movement in Northern Italy. But of these matters we will allow Signor Meille to speak in detail.

## THE RELIGIOUS OUTLOOK.

Turning to that other and much more active and wisely managed sphere of Italian activity which is presented to us by the Vatican and its numberless following, it cannot be said that the prospect is more cheering. True the *Vatican has suffered in 1896 two remarkable defeats*. Leo XIII's pet scheme of uniting all the Protestant and Oriental churches under his spiritual sceptre, has, as he might have guessed, were he not living quite outside our present life and world, completely fallen through. And his clever stroke of policy in trying to liberate the Italian prisoners in Abyssinia, by sending a solemn embassy to Menelik so as to appear in Italy more powerful than King Humbert and his ministers, brought to him only confusion and ridicule. His ambassador had no sooner returned to Rome, proclaiming aloud the impossibility of making peace with Abyssinia, than the news arrived that a simple major of the Italian army had succeeded where the Pope's Legate had so signally failed. These magnificent fiasco of the Papacy will not be deplored by any man who thinks the free Gospel preferable to outward unity, and views with suspicion the moral influence our degenerate times have allowed the cleverest Pope of our century to gain over the world at large ; but they are not sufficient to console one for the increase of superstition and fanaticism on the one hand, and of practical infidelity on the other, which are the characteristics of the Italian nation of our day.

## STRIKING RELIGIOUS MOVEMENT IN LOMBARDY.

There occurred in Lombardy last year, a most interesting and promising religious movement, which I thought worth my while to go and study on the spot during one of my tours. The originator of it is Don Paolo Miraglia, a Sicilian priest, who was called in May, 1895, to preach the usual sermons in honour of the Virgin Mary, in the large and aristocratic church of San Savino, in Piacenza. Miraglia is a fervent admirer of Savonarola, to whom he has also a physical likeness—tall, thin, spare, with sparkling eyes, and a power of speech and a rapidity of utterance I have seldom seen equalled. Leaving aside the usual idolatrous topics of the 'month of Mary,' he began to preach on the necessity of a moral and religious reformation in the Church and in the State, quoting largely from Savonarola, and more so from the Bible. His sermons created a great sensation, and the church of San Savino was crowded, day after day, with eager listeners belonging to all classes of society. But his brother priests began to take alarm, or to be jealous of his success, and accused him of infidelity to the Church. He was reprimanded by the Bishop, and the upshot was



that he left the Church of Rome, although he remains a priest, and began to say mass and to preach in a large hall, lent to him by one of his admirers. His may be called a Dissenting Catholic Church, and I am assured that he has in Piacenza, and in the neighborhood, several thousand followers. I called on him and had some conversation with him ; and on the same day was present (unknown to him), at his service, the usual Sunday morning eleven o'clock mass. I saw, from my place at the back of the altar, a very sea of faces, an audience closely packed up to the very alter steps. I heard him expound, with great force, the Gospel for the day (Matt. x. 34-42), which could not have been more appreciate to his situation. Although many of his ideas still savour of Romanism, he spoke with great force and clearness of the necessity of war against error, superstition, and vice, as the earnest exhortation to his hearers to study the Word of God in their own tongue, and to stand firm in their resolve to bring Italy back to the pure Gospel. He, himself, distributed several hundred copies of Martin's New Testament amongst his followers, and he always welcomes any of our men that go to Piacenza in order to sell the Scriptures there. During the whole winter he has preached nearly every evening to crowded audience, that fill, not only the hall, but also the neighbouring courtyard.

It will easily be believed that the clergy have done all in their power to get rid of this obnoxious reformer. Threats and bribes have been offered to him in turn, to obtain his leaving the town, or, at least, casting off the garb and title of a priest. On two occasions was his life attempted, so that he had to go about with a body-guard. Not succeeding in destroying him, his enemies had recourse to even more nefarious means to encompass his moral ruin. A lawsuit, resulting from charges brought against him, is not yet finished, and, meanwhile, the Prefect, most likely with a view to ensure for Government the clerical votes in last election, has ordered his oratory to be closed, and all religious services to be suspended there. In other days, such an audacious violation of the most elementary liberty of conscience and of worship would have created an immense sensation all over the country. But I am sorry to say that, such is the indifference and apathy which reigns now in Italy in religious questions, that even the opposition papers have scarcely noticed it. We are now waiting with anxiety the issue of the trial before the higher tribunal of Parma, before whom Miraglia himself will defend his case, and his enemies will have to answer the charge of having attempted his life.

In the meantime Don Miraglia does not remain silent. Besides continuing the publication of his weekly paper, which he calls by the honoured name of his master, *Savonarola*, he preaches wherever he is asked so to do, in evangelical churches. Not that

he means at all to join any purely evangelical denomination, for he wants to form a 'National Reformed Catholic Church,' and leans towards Count Campello's movement more than towards any other ; but he is glad of any opportunity to make known his views and defend his noble cause.

### SPAIN.

*Excluding the Balearic and Canary Islands, there are in Spain 47 provinces : in 5 of these the American Bible Society is at work, and in 5 the National Bible Society of Scotland. In the remaining provinces the British and Foreign Bible Society, in 1896, employed 25 colporteurs. The total circulation for last year (eleven months) was 72,625 copies. The population of Spain was in 1887, 17,565,632, of whom perhaps 7,000 were Protestants.*

The circulation increased from 75,000 to 79,000.

### ROMISH OPPOSITION AND SLANDER.

What can we say of the religious aspects of affairs, except that they seem to us disturbed and distressing ? Progress is slow ; Spain is joined to her idols. Her priests and friars show themselves sleepless in their enmity to a popular Bible, and while calling themselves Christ's, by their works they profoundly deny Him, revealing the spirit they are of in their unceasing hostility to the free and wide circulation of the wondrous words which the Master Himself spake. And the people, from whatever motives, seldom dare to assert themselves against the bondage of the priests, in fact too often allow themselves to be exploited by them for their own ends. Even when the Romish clergy are not loved, the strange thing is they are often outwardly obeyed.

### PORTUGAL.

*Population (1890), 5,082,247, including the Azores and Madaira. The established religion is Roman Catholic ; other forms of faith are tolerated. Average number of Colporteurs for the year (salaried and unsalaried) 9, Total circulation for the year 8,960 copies.*

### DETAILS OF CIRCULATION.

The total issues are almost double those of 1895, but this great increase is in Portions sent to Brazil. Our own actual sales show that colporteurs have sold 706 more copies in 1896 than they did in 1895 ; this increase, however, is wholly in Portions, Bibles



being five less, Testaments 50 less, Portions 761 more. It is nevertheless pleasing and cheering to note that there was an increase of nearly 800 in colporteurs' sales during 1895 over those of 1894, and again an increase of 706 during 1896 over those of 1895. This fact gives ample proof of the diligence of our colporteurs, showing that they are workmen of whom we need not be ashamed, or, to return again to Solomon's Song, 'They all handle the sword, and are expert in war,' as good soldiers of our Lord and Master.

#### EUROPEAN RUSSIA AND CENTRAL ASIA.

*Population of European Russia, including Poland and Finland with the Caucasus and Central Asia (1897), 133,479,381. The great majority are members of the Russo-Greek Church. Besides, there are Dissenters, Roman Catholics, Protestants, Jews, Muhammadans, and Pagans. Last year there was an average of 65 colporteurs and bookhawkers at work continuously. Total circulation for the year, 531,238.*

#### COLPORTEUR EXPERIENCE.

Our colporteur in Vladimir writes :—

'A soldier looked at a 25-copeck New Testament among the colporteur's stock, and eyed it wistfully. "Will you come again to us?" the soldier said; "Alas! I have no money." "Yes," said the colporteur, "I'll come for the whole week." On Friday our colporteur came again. Here was the soldier as eager as ever, but this time with a sound of triumph in his voice. He had got the 25 copecks, and received his Testament. "How have you got the money?" asked our colporteur. "I have sold my portion of meat for four days, and was content with the soup alone," said the noble fellow.'

#### SIBERIA.

*Siberia comprises 4,833,496 square miles, more than twice the area of all European Russia. Population in 1897, 5,731,732. Circulation for the year 35,105.*

Ten years ago when Englishmen connected the name of Siberia with the nameless horrors of exile and were content to know no more about it, the report for 1887, (p. 135) described Mr. Nicolson's journey to Omsk as 'a step in advance which will have important bearings on the future of the Society's work.' The same Report speaks of the Eastern Siberia work as being then 'little more than breaking ground.'

To-day the Western World knows Siberia better than it did then ; realises that here are, as it were, 'the Midlands' of the East, drawing in 'labour' by tens of thousands from the slower and darker peasantry of European Russia, and sees that the educational zest of the Siberian administration will go far to leaven the whole lump of Slavonic ignorance throughout the Empire.

But the few years or so during which the eyes of Western folk have been slowly opening to this fact have been years of great accomplishment in the ranks of our Depot-keepers and colporteurs ; so that the 1886 total 'in this hitherto dark region,' namely, 3,163 copies, expands into the 35,105 which Mr. Davidson gives as the total circulation for 1896. If it does nothing else, it justifies the wise policy which two years ago raised Siberia into an Agency by itself.

#### A PRIEST ON THE BIBLE SOCIETY.

'The priest in the village of Schozrinsk,' writes Brillin, 'helped me very much ; after the service in the Church he addressed his parishioners as follows : "I wish to say a few words to you, my brethren, as your pastor, about the Bible Society, whose aim and object is to circulate God's Word. His Imperial Majesty grants permission to this Society to work here amongst us Orthodox Christians in Russia. This Society engages good trustworthy men called colporteurs, who go about and sell the Scriptures at a very cheap rate. Such a one has come among us who has the Gospels and Psalms from two copecks upwards. See!"—pointing to me—"there is he who has them to sell. I would advise you, my flock, to buy the Word of God from this man ; he sells, not for his own profit, but for yours." Here followed a warm exhortation from the good priest on the reading of the Scriptures daily, which my limited space forbids me to quote. Brillin sold twenty-five copies in the above village, a very good number where only a few were able to read.'

#### TURKEY.

*Population (European Possessions) 4,790,000. Bulgaria (including Eastern Roumelia) 3,154,375. Average number of colporteurs employed for the year (including Greece) 32. Circulation 31,599, and, including Greece, 38,802.*

During these months of trouble the Society has not neglected its opportunities. It has distributed Scriptures among refugee Armenians and militant Greeks. It has supplied the hospitals for the wounded, and helped those who brought material relief to the



suffering to give spiritual food also. Regular work has been interrupted in some places, but in the unrest of men's minds which follows when massacre and war are over, there is hope that the Word will enter and find a sure lodging.

#### GREECE.

*Population (1889) 2,187,208. Adding the Greeks who are in the Ottoman Empire, the whole Greek nationality may be estimated at 8,000,000. Circulation 7,203 copies.*

#### EGYPT.

*Population (1882), about 6,817,265, including 90,886 European foreigners. Of these over 37,000 were Greeks, 18,000 Italians, 15,000 French, 8,000 Austrians, and 6,000 English. Circulation for the year in Egypt, 17,175.*

The past year has been one in which the Government of Egypt has had a great 'moral effect' on the mass of the people. Besides the check of cholera there has been the 'contest with and victory over the cruel destroyers of the villages and villagers of the Upper Nile Valley.' This has made the people 'deeply sensible of the beneficent result of the great effort which has been made to set them free. The progress of the Dongola expedition has been followed with interest, and its success has been hailed with great joy by the Nubians of the Valley and the people of Egypt at large.' All this tends 'to break down Muhammadan prejudices and to bring about a more approachable state of mind generally towards those who offer the Holy Scriptures to them.' No wonder that there are indications of a spirit of inquiry.

#### SYRIA AND PALESTINE.

*Population less than 2,000,000 ; that of Palestine is about 700,000. Circulation for the year, 6,250 copies of which 2,546 were issued from Depots and by Colporteurs.*

It is more true of the Holy Land than of any other land in the Society's sphere that 'the husbandman waiteth' and 'hath long patience for it.' The work has been carried on, Mr. Weakley says, entirely through the various British Missions which occupy the country, 'from the entering in of Hamath unto the brook of Egypt.' There is one notable exception in the distribution to pilgrims at the great Easter Festival, for which special provision is made. Though there is a slight increase in the colportage sales,

the total result is 'smaller by 668 than the output of 1895, but only 98 copies less than the sales of 1894.' But 'in lands under Turkish administration,' and especially in view of 'the generally distressful condition of affairs, political and commercial,' during last year, we can only be grateful that the difference is not larger than it is. Through it all, Mr. Weakley sees that 'the work of re-evangelising the Land of the Book is steadily, if slowly, advancing.'

#### ALGERIA AND TUNIS.

*Population of Algeria (1893), 3,817,465 ; of Tunis, 1,500,000. Average number of Colporteurs at work the whole year, 6. The total circulation was 15,245 in 24 languages.*

##### THE CIRCULATION.—COLPORTEURS AND DEPÔTS.

The number of colporteurs who were at work nearly the whole year round was six. Other men have, however, also been occasionally employed for short periods.

In 1895 the aggregate number of weeks spent on colportage work was 224, by seven colporteurs, and the sales amounted to 10,067 copies. This year (1896) there were 300 weeks spent, during which 10,150 copies were sold, being an increase of 83 copies. Such good results could hardly be expected. I had, indeed, every reason to dread a considerable decrease in our circulation this year. Thanks be therefore to our gracious Master for His having thus so richly blessed the efforts of his servants in their endeavors to circulate the Word of Life.

The circulation of 3,551 copies in Arabic represents the extent to which the natives of the country are making acquaintance with the Scriptures, while 1,079 copies circulated in Hebrew show the extent to which the Gospel light is penetrating into the many Jewish homes. The remaining circulation, amounting to nearly 4,000 copies in various European languages, chiefly Spanish reveals the influence which is being exerted over the inhabitants of the Canary Islands and over the considerable population of Europeans of many nationalities found in the coast towns of Morocco. The total circulation in 1896 shows an encouraging increase over recent years.

#### SOUTH AFRICAN AUXILIARY.

*President, Rev. Andrew Murray, Centre at Cape Town, with 188 Branches. Population (1889) of Cape Colony proper, including Griqualand, West Transkei, East Griqualand, and Tembuland, 1,458,823 ; the total white population is about 350,000.*



The following paragraphs condensed from the Jubilee report of the South African Auxiliary will be read with interest.

#### A RETROSPECT OF FIFTY YEARS.

Although there have been no detailed accounts preserved of the work of the first few years, yet it has been ascertained that in the first ten years of its existence this Auxiliary circulated 43,000 Bibles and Testaments, in the second ten years 57,000, in the third ten years 75,000, in the fourth nearly 110,000, and in the fifth decade close upon 304,000.

The financial progress, as seen in the amounts remitted to the Parent Society, is as remarkable as the numerical increase. These were for the first ten years nearly £5,000, the second ten years £8,000, the third ten years £11,000, the fourth ten years over £14,000, and the last ten years £24,000. Thus this Auxiliary, during the last fifty years, has added close upon £63,000 to the receipts of the Society, and nearly 600,000 Bibles and Testaments to the circulation of the Scriptures in this part of the world.

These numbers do not include those copies of the Bible that have been sent direct to missionaries, or to the Natal and two other auxiliaries. Possibly if these were added they would swell the number to at least three-quarters of a million.

#### FINANCES.

Before the last week of the year we had received and remitted to the Parent Society £1,000 as Free Contributions, clear of all expenses. The total amounts collected in the past year reach the sum of £1,425. The Committee are very grateful to all the churches, Sunday-schools, children's missions, and individual contributors, and particularly to all collectors, in town or country, who have helped to increase the subscriptions and donations.

In addition to the Free Contributions, we have received for the sale of Bibles £2,662 9s. 9d.

#### CIRCULATION.

The circulation of the Scriptures is greatly in excess of all previous years, 41,795 copies of God's Word have been disposed of during 1896, *i.e.*, 17,950 Dutch, 14,055 English, 7,600 native, and 190 foreign.

#### MADAGASCAR.

*Population about 3,500,000. There are about 450,000 Protestants, and 50,000 Roman Catholics. Three-fifths of the Malagasy are still Pagans.*

The Northern (Imerina) Committee held a meeting in Antananarivo on January 21st, 1897, and have sent home a retrospect of 1896, as the joint report of the four Missions represented in that part of the island, L.M.S., S.P.G., the Norwegian Mission, and the Friend's Foreign Mission. The books sold in their field were, Bibles, 1,270 ; Testaments, 2,926 ; total 4,196, besides free grants of 692 Portions. The number is not half that reported for 1895. The sum of £85 14s. 0d. has been sent home.

## PERSIA.

*Population (1894) about 9,000,000, including some 45,000 Armenians, 25,000 Nestorians, 25,000 Jews, and 9,000 Parsis. The Remainder are Muhammadans of the Shia'h sect. Circulation 10,738.*

## INDIA.

*Population (estimate for 1891) 287,223,431. Religion : Hindus, 207,731,727 ; Muhammadans, 57,321,164 ; Budhists, 7,131,361 ; Sikhs, 1,907,833 ; Jains, 1,416,638 ; Parsis, 89,904 ; Jews, 17,194 ; Animistic, 9,280,467 ; Christians, 2,284,380 ; (Roman Catholics, 1,315,263 ; Protestants, 695,328 ; Syrians, Armenians and Greeks, 201,684.)*

'The year under review, which began with every prospect of continued and increasing prosperity to our Society, has ended under the shadow of an appalling calamity.' Such is the first sentence of the 1896 record of the North India Bible Society, and another year will bring its tale of the horrors of plague in Bombay and of the scourge of earthquake in Calcutta. England has not been slow to give her sympathy to India in no grudging or unpractical spirit. Indeed, it is in times like these that 'the Raj' appears most blessed to her who gives as well as her who takes. 'God uses us,' as Fra Lippo says, 'to help each other so.'

For decade after decade, the Bible Society has been to India the incarnation of the mutual help which the one ought to have of the other. If there is famine, here is 'the Bread which cometh down from heaven, that a man may eat thereof and not die.' If there is sickness destroying at the noon-day, here are the only wholesome medicines by which all the disease of the soul can be healed. If there is earthquake and 'the removing of those things that are shaken' here are truths which 'cannot be shaken' but must 'remain.'

Taking the six Auxiliaries together, they report a year's issues of over 450,000 copies. This marks progress, but is it adequate

progress? It is computed that a fresh million is now added each year to the readers in India. What shall they read? What book but the Bible will teach them a high moral standard, when Western education has shattered the old traditional restraints?

### BIBLEWOMEN IN THE EAST.

'I want you to come every day to tell me of the Saviour. I shall soon be going over the river, and I want Him to be my guide.' This message from a dying old woman is the unvoiced cry of millions of native women in the East. And among the responses to that cry, feeble though they be, this Society's yearly grants, providing as they do about 500 additional Christian women to tell their sisters of the Saviour, and teach them to read His Words for themselves, hold no insignificant place.

From the statistical table given in this section, it may be seen that the 477 Biblewomen of 1895 became 486 in 1896. The number of women who became able to read the Scriptures was 1,669—above 200 more than the year before. On an average, about 29,000 a week heard the Bible read. Over 20,000 Bibles, Testaments and Portions were put into circulation by the Biblewomen, 15,190 of them by sales. This precious seed will not be lost.

When all the Bible women are grouped under their respective Missionary Societies, the figures are these:—Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and its Women's Mission Association, 32; Church Missionary Society, 54; Church of England Zenana Missionary Society, 23; London Missionary Society, 29; Wesleyan Missionary Society and its Ladies' Auxiliary, 70; Baptist Missionary Society and its Ladies' Association, 41; Zenana Bible and Medical Mission, 10; Society for Female Education in the East, 12; Presbyterian Missions, including those of the Welsh Calvinistic Methodists (34) and those of the Free Church of Scotland (21), 71; German and Danish Missions, 70; American Missions, 55; British Syrian Bible Mission, 11; and Miscellaneous, 8. Six Societies drew the full grant of £144 each for 1895-6.

The total circulation for India exceeds 450,000.

### CHINA.

*Population (1885): China Proper, 386,000,000; Manchuria, about 7,500,000; Mongolia and Zungaria, 2,600,000. The people are Confucianists, Taoists, Buddhists, and Worshippers of the Dead; and about 30,000,000 are Muhammadans. During the whole year about 106 colporteurs have (on the average) been at work continuously, and the total circulation was 366,347 copies.*

The remarkable development that has taken place in the China Agency during the past year gives much cause for thankfulness. In every department of the Agency there has been an advance significant of new opportunities and of resources and energy in rising to them. The statistics that follow of printing, issues, and circulation, give totals far exceeding those previously attained in the history of the Agency. New editions of the Scriptures have appeared, attractive in form and varied in binding and size of type to suit the tastes of different classes and localities, till the price list of China has swollen to the size of a small book.

GENERAL SUMMARY.—MR. BONDFIELD'S REPORT.

PRINTING AND ISSUES.

The Scriptures printed and received into stock have reached the large total of 540,696, viz., Bibles, 2,900; Testaments, 8,310; and Portions, 529,486. Arranged according to language the details are:—Wên-li, 545 Bibles, 3,280 Testaments, 103,500 Portions; Mandarin, 2,355 Bibles, 4,800 Testaments, 397,990 Portions; Canton, 130 Testaments, 1,500 Portions; Hakka, 100 Testaments, 100 Portions; and Portions in the following:—Canton (Roman character), 500; Swatow (Roman character), 806; Ningpo, 2,000; Tibetan, 2,000; Kalmuk, 11,000; Mongol (classical), 10,000.

In addition, 89,303 illustrated Scripture Calendars, with a daily text, have been printed by photo-lithography, and 169 pairs of texts, specially written and mounted as wall scrolls, have been prepared. The Scriptures printed in 1895 reached a total of 250,071 books.

The issues for the year show an increase of 190,077 over those of 1895 and of 188,763 over the previous highest total in 1893, and amount to 479,537 copies. Of the large number of books issued to sub-agencies, missions, &c., many thousands were sent out too late in the season to reach their destination before the close of the year. The demand for Scriptures has been steady throughout the year, and the orders have come from all quarters of the field.

CIRCULATION.

The number of books of Scripture circulated was 366,347, being an increase of 129,630 over the circulation of 1895, and of 77,591 over that of 1894.



## KOREA.

*Recent statistics estimate the population at 10,528,937. Among the foreign population are about 10,000 Japanese, 2,500 Chinese, and a few hundred Europeans. As to religion, Confucianism is held in high esteem by the Upper classes and there are numerous Buddhist monasteries. In 1892 there were 40 Protestants and 20 Roman Catholic missionaries. There are about 300 Protestants and 20,000 Romanists.*

The movement towards Christianity which was noted in last report still continues. Circulation in Depots and by Colporteurs 1,253 copies.

## JAPAN.

*Population (1893), 41,388,313. By the new Constitution absolute freedom of religious belief and practice is secured so long as it is not prejudicial to peace and order. The chief forms of religion are Shintoism, with 10 sects, and 14,751 priests. Buddhism with 12 sects, 30 creeds and 52,562 priests. There are also numerous Romanists, adherents of the Greek Church, and Protestants.*

The tone of optimism which has characterised recent reports from Japan is absent from the last. Natural calamities, the reaction of feeling after the excitement of the war, and the pre-occupation in the development of trade and defence have diminished the interest in spiritual things which was formerly so hopeful a feature in the people. Christian services, we are told, are not so well attended, and there has been no increase in the circulation of the Scriptures. The reaction, we trust, is momentary; the mind of Japan is too sensitive and sympathetic to remain permanently indifferent to the spiritual truth and moral power of the Christian religion.

Circulation of the 3 Bible Societies 100,456 copies.

## CHILI AND PERU.

*Population : Chili, 2,524,476 ; Peru : 2,970,000 (including about 350,000 uncivilised Indians).*

The 36th Annual Report of the Valpariso Bible Society presented March 31st, 1897, announces a sale of 5,811 copies in Spanish and 305 in other languages. It raises subscriptions locally, and receives a grant of Scriptures from the American Bible Society, and a grant of £350 and a liberal discount on Scriptures from this

society. The directors are doing their part in the opening up of South America to a purer and more enlightened form of Christianity than now exists there.

## ARGENTINE.

*Population in 1895, 3,973,626. Religion, Roman Catholic. Circulation, 16,397.*

## INCIDENTS OF WORK.

The colporteurs have to contend with the crudest misconceptions and prejudices. The Scriptures are refused because they do not speak of the saints, or because they are the books of Luther, or because they have not the approval of the Church, nor its explanatory notes. On many sides there is indifference to spiritual things. Some say the Scriptures are for those who have time to do evil, *their Bible is the plough*, which they must contemplate morning and night. One colporteur was asked, when visiting a place where some missionaries had preceded him, if the end of the world was at hand that they were offering for sale so many religious books.

## BRAZIL.

*Population in 1890, about 14,068,268. Of these 1,000,000 were 'wild' Indians and other uncivilised tribes. Of the inhabitants, 84 per cent. are illiterate. The Society last year employed for varying periods 7 colporteurs. Total circulation, 24,043.*

## WEST INDIAN AGENCY.

*Including Dutch, French, and British Guiana, the West Indian Islands, the Bahamas and Bermudas, the Republics of Central America, and British Honduras. Population of the British West Indian Islands, 1,645,534 ; British Guiana, 278,295 ; British Honduras, 31,371. The total population of the Agency is about 10,000,000.*

The agent of the society, for the West Indies, Rev. G. O. Heath visited Canada, he says :

I was allowed by the Committee to visit Canada, with a view to the engagement of a reliable colporteur speaking English and French. Most of our friends in Montreal were absent from home. In Ottawa the Committee of the Auxiliary readily took up my proposal, and the Rev. J. C. Campbell, recording secretary, at once set to work to find a man. I was very much encouraged by the



cordiality of our Canadian friends, and their intelligent interest in our work in the West Indies. I gained some idea of Bible work in Canada, and also no little information concerning the Great Dominion and her charmingly extensive and nobly planned cities. Canada is a grand country. The shrewd Scot, the sturdy Englishman and the vivacious Frenchman, are combining in the formation of a gallant race.

### KINDRED SOCIETIES.

#### THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

This Society reports cheering tidings of the good accomplished through its Agencies, and numerous and urgent calls for enlarged undertakings. At the same time there has been considerable solicitude on account of the falling off in receipts, and the managers make a strong appeal to the liberality of American Christians.

#### ISSUES.

The total issues for the year, at home and in Foreign lands, amount to 1, 513,499 copies. During eighty-one years the issues of the Society amount to 63,219,340 copies.

#### THE NATIONAL BIBLE SOCIETY OF SCOTLAND.

This Society has, in the words of its Report, steadily pursued its mission of peace and goodwill among the nations. It announces an advance in its income of £2,093, mainly owing to legacies and donations, and an expenditure falling only a little short of the receipts. Its Eastern Secretary, the Rev. Dr. Goold of Edinburgh, retired from office after thirty-six years' service, and has been succeeded by the Rev. J. S. Nisbet. The Committee in London sent a message of sympathy to their old friend, Dr. Goold, and have since heard with regret that he has departed at a ripe old age to his eternal rest.

#### DETAILS OF WORK.

The issues for the year amount to 705,610 Bibles, Testaments, and Portions of Holy Scripture, in thirty different countries, by the hands of more than 500 colporteurs and agents. Of this total 38,000 copies were circulated in France, 33,000 in Spain, 60,000 in Germany, 51,000 in India, and 230,000 in China.

## THE HIBERNIAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Hibernian Society, with its aim of bringing the knowledge of the Scriptures into every home in Ireland, feels the imperative necessity of giving all diligence so as to hasten the time of complete success. The total issues during the year have been 41,692. The issues since the formation of the Society amount to the grand total of 5,319,252.

## CONCLUSION.

The Duke of Connaught speaking at a meeting of the Bible Society, at Porthsmouth used words which may be recalled and are worthy of continued remembrance. He said : " I regard the Bible Society as one that is thoroughly national, because I think its ideas, apart from its lofty wishes, are thoroughly English..... It has been the pride, and I hope it will ever continue to be so, of our people that, as soon as a country is discovered, as soon as the very smallest forms of government are erected, immediately follow the missionaries and those who bring with them the Bible." That is surely a pride which is above reproach : it is an ambition which is worthy of a great people and of a reign crowned with so many honours—so many laurelled victories of peace. And the record of the Bible Society, during Her Majesty's reign alone, is a witness to what an inspiring degree that aim has been fulfilled.

THE FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL MEETING OF THE OTTAWA AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY was held on Wednesday, May 4th, 1898, in Dominion Methodist Church, Ottawa, Mr. George Hay, President, in the Chair.

Among those present and on the platform were : Rev. Dr. Saunders, Rev. Dr. Armstrong, Rev. George McRitchie, Rev. John Wood, Rev. Wm. McIntosh, Rev. D. Winter, Mr. F. T. Frost, M.P., Rev. A. A. Cameron, Rev. D. M. Ramsay, Rev. Dr. Campbell, Rev. A. N. Frith, Rev. Thomas Nelson, Rev. Deane Wentforth, Rev. E. T. Reed (Warrington, England), Rev. James Lawson, Rev. James Elliott, and Rev. Foster McAmmond.

The Rev. Dr. Saunders conducted the opening devotional service ; at his request the Rev. John Wood led in prayer.

The President, before calling for the Annual Report, earnestly addressed the meeting. He said :

The Report which is presented for your consideration will show that we have great reason for gratitude in the success which has attended the efforts of your Committee for the past year. In nearly every department there appear tokens of progress, and we have special cause to note with thankfulness, that while our local work has been carried on with a good measure of vigor, and we have paid up for our purchases of stock, we have been enabled also to send to the Parent Society the largest free contribution which we have hitherto remitted, viz., the sum of £1000 sterling to aid in the general work of that noble Institution in its world-wide operations.

The pleasing position in which it is our privilege to appear before you has not been attained without considerable effort on the part of the many warm friends of the Bible cause throughout our numerous branches, who, without fee or reward of any earthly kind, by their gifts, by their personal service, and by their presence at the numerous meetings held, have manifested their hearty sympathy with our work, and have earned our cordial thanks for their valued aid.

While we would rejoice in this continued and extended interest in our work, and fondly regard it as some indication of the influence which the possession and the perusal of the sacred Scriptures is exerting on our community, it may not be out of season to inquire whether results far deeper and wider might not be reached by the operations of this Auxiliary.

ised blessing to attend the work of Bible circulation everywhere, in much greater measure than it has ever hitherto done, we may depend that we shall not prove the power of prayer to fail in bringing the promised blessing.

The recent death of that remarkably devoted man, George Muller, of Bristol, England, has called the attention of the Christian world to the marvellous results of his childlike trust in God. His lifework of child rescue and support by means of his direct appeals to the promise-keeping Lord has been an object lesson as to the reality of "things unseen," which can be plainly read and admits of no misunderstanding as to the place and power of prayer in Christian service. Will you bear with me if from this chair, which by your indulgence I have so often inadequately occupied, and which I dare not presume to have many more opportunities of occupying, pray bear with me while I urge you, younger men and maidens, old men and children, in your closets, at your family altars, and ye who minister in the house of the Lord, as specially the Lord's remembrancers, I urge you to pray that the Holy Spirit may render effectual to the conversion of sinners and the building up of the household of faith the Book, God's own word, here at home, in all this land and throughout the whole world guiding and blessing all translators, all expositors, all colporteurs and missionaries employed in this blessed service, and God, even our own God, shall bless us.

The Recording Secretary, on behalf of the Committee, presented the meeting with the Forty-third Annual Report, which was printed and circulated in the pews; also, a list of the Committee's nomination of Officers and Committee for the ensuing year.

The choir having then sang an Anthem, the Rev. A. A. Cameron, Pastor of the First Baptist Church, moved the following resolution:—

"That the report now submitted be adopted and circulated under the direction of the Committee, and that the names in the said report be the Office-bearers and Committee of the Ottawa Auxiliary for the ensuing year, and that thanks are hereby given the faithful collectors and officers whose diligence God has crowned with success."

In support of the resolution Mr. Cameron said:—

This Resolution commends itself to the intelligence and to the heart of this meeting.

Mr. President you could scarcely place a resolution in my hand which would give greater satisfaction in moving its adoption than the one now before us.



This Ottawa Auxiliary has for 43 years been identified with the active Christian life of this city and the district it represents so far as Bible circulation is concerned. It is a tonic to *perseverance* to hear each successive report give such evidence of growth, and such manifold proofs of God's blessing on the officers and operations of this Society!

In moving the adoption of this 43rd report with its cheering record of noble work, memory brings me back a score of years. When the Rev. Richard Gavin represented in his unique personality much of the enthusiasm in Bible Society work, which has always distinguished this Auxiliary. He sought to impart and did impart his own Catholic Spirit and supreme love for the unadulterated word of the Living God!

He has had worthy successors, and with the Office-bearers and Committee for the current year the efficiency of this Society is guaranteed!

The operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society are conducted on a magnificent scale!

Think if a Society that engages 1,000 translators and revisors, 1,000 colporteurs and Bible Women, and every year places in circulation 4,000,000 copies of God's Word in nearly 400 languages and dialects.

Our own Auxiliary has during its life of 42 years circulated within its district 211,591 copies, besides donating 50,000 for foreign work. There is no feature in the *general* progress of the religion of Jesus so significant as the phenomenal efficiency and expansiveness of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Much has been written lately in prose and poetry concerning the VICTORIAN era, but has not this same era been made splendid by the triumphs of this Book rather than by British Arms and Diplomacy? England has her noble QUEEN, long may she continue to reign. Why not? for 70,000,000 of our cousins to the South have learnt to sing lustily our National Anthem. The Great Britain of to-day is very rich in all the equipments of a mighty Empire! Immense wealth, surplus revenues, distinguished statesmen, a representative parliament and a powerful army and navy! Millions of royal and loyal and educated subjects, but her Bible Society in its mighty operations has added more lustre to the Empire than all the others combined! It is the aggressive power of God revealed in the Christ of this Book that has placed the Anglo-Saxon race on the pedestal of the World's commerce and civilization. During the Victorian era the British Empire made vast acquisitions! During the same period the Bible Society made vast distributions. It is more blessed to give than receive.

England, during the reign of Queen Victoria, has accumulated enormous wealth, but this Society, as executors of marvellous

treasures, of wisdom and knowledge has been making enormous disbursements !

I question very much if England could ever have retained India and South Africa were it not for the Bible and Missionary Societies ! It has been acknowledged that Wm. Carey, through his translations and circulating them through his Missionaries did more for India than all her Generals ! England's sword can conquer a kingdom, but it takes England's Bible to hold it when conquered.

This Society commands our support because it has been the pioneer of Missions. This Book can go, and has gone, where the Protestant church at first cannot. Certain communities in many countries of Europe and America will admit the Bible but exclude the missionary. I believe it is a wise policy to send to such districts the Bible without note or comment. Through the same door the Bible enters the living Christ enters to give salvation without money in striking contrast with a mechanical religion ! The Bible read in the home independent of the ecclesiastic is the hope of the Latin countries and colonies at this hour.

Had this Book had free access to Spain, Cuba and the Philippines would be hers to-day ? When the living Word has severed a people from superstition let the minister of the Gospel of whatever name follow as an Evangel of the peace of God through Christ.

A converted priest in France gives this testimony : "I have a conviction that the pure Gospel alone can save the world, and that my church cannot without committing suicide give the Gospel to the people !"

This Society commends our co-operation because it keeps abreast of the political movements of our day. The story of the late war between China and Japan reads like a romance ! During the campaign the agent of the Bible Society in Yokohama went to Southern Japan and distributed 4,000 copies of the Gospel among the soldiers. He next visited one of the Secretaries of State, who not only approved of the distribution, but volunteered to send to the officers and men of the navy whatever donations the Society choose to make. 2000 copies were thus sent by one of the supply vessels to a Christian officer on board the flag ship, and thence distributed to all the ships of the fleet. Permission was then asked to make a distribution among the soldiers of the guards. Prince Komatsu, cousin of the Emperor, head of the army, sent for the agent and interviewed him in his palace in the presence of his Staff, thanking him for the work of this Society among the soldiers of the empire. As a result all the garrisons in Japan were visited and Bibles distributed to the number of 100,000.

Take the later Russo-Chinese crisis. Russia has been open-



ing a new Empire in Siberia and Eastward by her trans-continental R. R. to Port Arthur. While political England has through her masterly diplomacy been checking Russian advance, Christian England through this Bible Society has been sending her colporteurs and agents by the score, and Russia, instead of regarding this English army an enemy, has been generously giving free transportation, perhaps on the same train which carried her armies to the East. And I should not wonder but the Bible army might be heard by the Russians singing "Onward, Christian soldiers." God is thus making the wrath of man to praise Him there. Movements are creating open doors for ships of commerce and the R. R's. of traffic, but on board are Bibles and Missionaries, who will soon help these countries to exchange Buddha and Confucius for the Christ. This Book is bound to "Go." It has a self-circulating power. It has the power of the Cherubim Ezekiel saw. Who can chain a cherubim? Who is able to criticise what he reveals or does? Its sphere is above human analysis! So with this Word!

Napoleon's career was not unlike the critical movement of the hour!

For a time he swept all before him. Every battle showered glory! Austerlitz, *Jena*, *Leipsic*, the battle of the nations. But there is one more battle to fight and win ere he can have and keep the homage of Europe.

That one proud battle is Waterloo. Waterloo has passed into history and Europe has risen to her present proud position on the map of the World. Let all the opponents of these oracles meet in one decisive conflict. Mind against mind, scholarship against scholarship, criticism against criticism, Holy Ghost against Anti-christian hosts, and the result will be as disastrous and overwhelming to Napoleon, the higher critic as to Napoleon the Emperor and as auspicious to the Church after the struggle as to Europe after Waterloo.

The Rev. D. Winter, Pastor of the West End Methodist recoded the motion and in doing so said :—

MR. PRESIDENT AND BELOVED FRIENDS,

I consider it an exceeding honor to be associated in any way, however humble, with the interests of the British and Foreign Bible Society and its Ottawa Auxiliary. It affords me pleasure to second the resolution so ably moved by the Rev. Mr. Cameron, because it is in the interests of this Society. I regard the Bible Society as the peer of all the Societies of the Earth. I do not forget the good work done by Missionary and Tract Societies, by Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations, by the various temperance organisations of this day, and last, but by no means least, by the Christian Endeavor, Epworth League, and Young

People's Associations of the various churches. But in the very van, and head and shoulders above all other stands the Society which we represent to night. And I am sure it speaks well for the people of our fair city to see so large a gathering here to listen to the advocacy of the claims of this Society and also thereby to express their sympathy with it in its God-given work. I say God-given. Surely, sir, if any work on Earth can claim to be of God, this Society can claim that its work is assuredly Divine, I gladly speak on its behalf.

1. Because its sole business is the circulation of the Word of God, without note or comment. That Word which is called by way of pre-eminence "The Bible," "The Book." Sir Walter Scott when dying asked Lockwood his son-in-law to read to him. "What book shall I read, Sir Walter?" asked Lockwood, "There is but one book Lockwood, there is but one book," was the reply. And so there is but one book whose sole business it is to teach men how to live that they may know how to die. The poet Collins in the latter part of his life, withdrew from his general studies, and travelled with no other book than his English New Testament. A friend was anxious to know what book such a man of letters had chosen for a companion; the poet said, "I have only one book, and that is the best." This is the book that as Angus puts it "claims God for its Author, unmixed truth for its contents and salvation for its end." And its claims are by no means arrogant or illfounded. In the language of another, "The Bible has liberated the serf, rescued the gasping gladiator, emancipated the slave, enthroned woman as the angel of love and the queen of home, endeared infancy to the bosom of motherhood, hallowed the marriage bond, dignified manual toil, mitigated suffering, ameliorated the slavery of manual labor, torn down tyranny, overthrown oppression, levelled up social inequalities brought justice into exercise, and it has given benevolence a being. No nation is civilized, no people are free where its light has not shone and its power has not been felt or displayed."

2. Again this Society has greatly lessened the cost of the Sacred Scriptures. In the 13th century a single copy of the Bible would cost at the very least £30 sterling, or about \$150.00 of our currency. To-day, thanks largely to the British and Foreign Bible Society, you can purchase a complete copy of the Sacred Scriptures for a few cents, or if too poor to purchase one will be given to you for nothing. The good Book says, "He that withholdeth corn, the people shall curse him; but blessing shall be upon the head of him that selleth it,—" Prov. 11, 26. If this be true of temporal food, and it is, how much truer it would be with regard to the bread of life, the manna which cometh down from heaven. But not only has this Society averted the curse but it has abundantly



secured the blessing of the people, and what is infinitely better the manifest approval of God, by putting his word within reach of the poorest of earth's sons.

3. Further, this Society has marvelously multiplied the copies of the Word of God. Shortly after its organization inquiry was made into the case of 17,000 families in London where it was found that half of them did not possess a Bible at all. On the Continent there was if possible a greater dearth of the Scriptures than at home. In Lithuania, which was at that time a grand duchy, but has since been carved and divided between Russia and Prussia, among upwards of 30,000 families not a Bible was to be found. One half of the population of Holland appeared to be without the Scriptures. In Poland a Bible could hardly be obtained at any price. In the district of Dorpat, in Russia, not 200 Testaments were found among upwards of 100,000 inhabitants and there were Christian Pastors who did not possess the Scriptures in the dialects in which they preached. Into Iceland with a population of 50,000, of whom almost all could read not above 40 or 50 copies of the Scriptures had penetrated ; while in Sweden a Single Auxiliary found 13,900 families totally unprovided with the Word of Life. But how do matters stand to-day ? In 1896 the total issues of the Society were 3,670,437 in Bibles, Testaments, and Portions, or nearly 4,000,000 copies of the Word of God in whole or in part. And since 1804, the year in which the Society was organized, 151,142,802 copies have been issued. Now what do these figures indicate ? Why, that there must be a very great demand for the Word and that the number of those receiving and reading the Book of Truth is rapidly increasing. And yet though here we have cause for gratitude to God, yet surely the thought that multitudes of our race are still destitute of the Sacred Writings should, while it humbles us, arouse us to Christ like zeal and herculean efforts so that ere long, the blessed light of truth may fling its rays into the darkness of every heart and lead it out into the light of God. And if he who makes two blades of grass grow where but one grew before be a benefactor of the race, because he increases the productive power of the earth and thereby adds to the forces which go to make up the sum total of life, how much more worthy of the name of benefactor is that individual or that Society which multiplies and distributes copies of the Bible, thereby adding to the moral and spiritual forces of the Universe by which the World is lifted nearer God and fitted for His service here and His Glory hereafter.

4. Once more, this Society has repeated on a most magnificent scale the miracle of Pentecost. I refer of course to the miracle of tongues, when every man heard in his own language the wonderful Works of God. From the account we gather that about

eighteen different nationalities were represented in that immense concourse in Jerusalem on that marvellous day, and heard the Word of God. Many of them perhaps, for the first time. But to-day this Society speaks in upwards of 330 of the languages and dialects of earth and multitudes hear and read in their own tongue, wherein they were born, the wonderful story of salvation.

5. But my last reason is the relation in which this Society stands to the various Missionary Societies of the world. I quote from the Report of 1896 : "To study the work of the Bible Society within its own limits is sufficiently interesting, but to examine its relationships with every other active Christian Agency is perhaps more interesting still, and it can hardly fail to be exceedingly pleasant. It is important to know that the Society's own work is good, but to know that upon it vitally depends the work of all great Missionary Societies is perhaps better. And, that the Church of England, Missionary Society owes this friendly dependence, and, along with it, the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the Universities' Mission, and the Wesleyan Missions, and those of the Baptist and the London Missionary Societies—all this is an argument and an evidence of the most pleasant and instructive kind. The Bible Society is indeed debtor to all ; for from the trained and gifted scholars of the Missionary Societies it has received, and is still receiving many of its most admirable versions; but it is a delightful compensation that by restoring these and other versions they desire into their hands it makes them all its debtors in return." Allow me in conclusion to give you a few testimonies from leading men in some of the largest denominations in support of the position just taken. The Archbishop of Canterbury says : "Here are two great Church of England Missionary Societies, which have to go to the Bible Society and do go, I am rejoiced to say with thankful hearts for six-sevenths of the Scriptures of God which they are communicating to mankind, just consider that fact."

The Rev. H. Holman Bennett says : "In representing the Baptist Missionary Society, I do so with feelings of gratitude for the service rendered to us by this noble Society, and the firm belief that the help rendered is to be followed by still greater help. "I happen to be" states A. Spicer, M. P., "Chairman of the Congregational Union of England and Wales. I am glad to speak to my fellow Congregationalist, and say, keep a warm place in your hearts for the good old Bible Society. Keep not only a warm place in your hearts but keep as I feel sure you will keep a share of your gifts to maintain the Society strong in its finances."

Says the Rev. H. Johnston, of the London Missionary Society: "Dear friends pray and support our Missionary Societies but never forget that the British and Foreign Bible Society is the helper and handmaid of all."



The Testimony of the Rev. W. S. Swanson, Presbyterian Missionary to China is as follows: "The British and Foreign Bible Society has taken deep root in the hearts of all Christian people of this country. No Christian institution commends itself more to all who love the Lord Jesus Christ than this noble Society. It is the grandest and noblest and widest reaching Missionary Society of this or any land, I wish to emphasize this. And, last but by no means least, comes the testimony of the Rev. J. Nettleton of the great Wesleyan Church. "I am," he says "devoutly thankful for this opportunity of expressing the indebtedness of the Wesleyan Missionary Society to this great and noble British and Foreign Bible Society. As an old Missionary in the Southern Seas, I may say that in Fiji without this Society we should simply have been like Samson shorn, or like Israel without an ark."

While the collection was being taken (which was \$27.13), a Quartette sang "Jesus, lover of my soul."

The Rev. D. M. Ramsay, Pastor of Knox Church, moved:

"That this meeting heartily thanking Almighty God for continued prosperity vouchsafed to the British and Foreign Bible Society as manifested in ever-increasing openings, in multiplied and improved translations and in spiritual results, devoutly prays that the Divine blessing may more abundantly rest upon the circulation of the Holy Scriptures that Christ may be known in all the earth and His saving health among all nations."

Mr. Ramsay said:—

It is with great pleasure that I move this resolution especially because it unites so closely the circulation of Holy Scripture with the universal knowledge of Christ and of His salvation. The religion of Jesus Christ is bound up with the Bible. It was an indispensable work that Luther did in his confinement at the Wartburg when he translated the New Testament into the language of his people. Thereafter the movement he had begun depended not upon himself, but upon the living Word of God. It is especially the New Testament which reveals the will of God, but the testimony of Jesus is the spirit of the whole Old Testament. The Apostle says rather the spirit of prophecy, but I assert that the whole Old Testament is prophetic

In fact this is the truth which I wish to emphasize to-night. The whole Old Testament has the forward look upon its face. It looks forward to the New Testament. The Bible is a single organism. The close of the Old Testament shows this organism at a stage of its growth, which is full of promise. The end of the New Testament shows it in its perfection, heavy with the fruit of a

divine life. And the various sections of the Old Testament are essential parts of this organism. The historical books narrate the history of God's covenant with His people, and of the people in covenant with their God. The poetical books record the varied religious experiences of God's people in covenant with Him, and exhibit their need of the fulfilment of its promise. The prophets point forward from the untoward circumstances of the present to the time of this fulfilment. Now few are prepared to say that the prophets are unworthy of being read with the New Testament. Not many would be willing to abandon the Psalms, which form the nucleus, the heart of the collection of sacred poetry. But a large number seem ready to discard the historical books, and the book of the law in particular seems to them to have suffered from the researches of modern criticism. They tell us that these laws were not all given by Moses but on the contrary were by no means in force at the same time, that the book was not written by Moses but was gradually dovetailed out of separate narratives, that many of the statements are not historical but legendary, mythical and the like. Thus the Pentateuch is made a very human production. Now I do not propose to trouble you with the arguments of scholars on these points but rather to point out that if the New Testament is of divine origin, the Old Testament is divine as well. I desire to argue that you will seek in vain for the origins of our holy religion, if you cover these early books with the dust of oblivion, that they stretch forth their hands and reach out their feet towards the Christ and the Kingdom which are the theme of the New Testament.

At the very beginning a golden age is described. Man, created in the rational and moral likeness of God, is made Lord of creation and called into communion with the Creator. But that he might be brought to moral manhood, he is set in a Paradise which is not without temptation. He is seduced into disobedience by an evil power and degraded from this state. The golden age is at an end but God does not desire man to fix his wistful gaze upon the past. In the curse pronounced upon the power of evil, there is wrapped up a promise that in the struggle with it humanity shall prevail. To faith there is a golden future of which paradise is but the earnest. The quick and powerful Word of God is thus cast into the stream of human history.

For a while sin and righteousness ran side by side but at length the whole race save Noah fell into deep-seated and determined violence and corruption and was destroyed by the flood. In spite of this sanction the Covenant made with Noah failed. Man's anxiety for a self-made unity led to presumption which was punished by confusion and dispersion. Now for the sake of mankind a covenant is made with a chosen individual.

The vessels for the coming salvation may be prepared under



the ordinary providence of God but that the salvation itself may be prepared, a chosen people must be treated with apparent favoritism. For this end there are introduced into this race certain personages, certain institutions are given to it and it is led through a certain historical process. These do not at once bring the blessing in its fulness. The people had to pass through a certain discipline before they could receive the perfect salvation. They had at first a desire for a blessing which was only a shadow of what God had in store. Hence the Word and Promise of God had a springing and germinant fulfilment. Like other living things it grew—first the blade, then the ear, then the full corn in the ear. Let me illustrate.

1. The patriarchs were men who answered in a measure to the seed of promise. God's Word accomplished in them some part of His purpose. It was not nature but grace which made Abraham a man of faith, Isaac a man of endurance, Jacob a man in whom was no guile, Joseph a man who could forgive his foes. Yet neither of these were in the full sense the promised seed; neither of them even in his own life crushed the serpent's head; neither of them manifested in perfection even his own excellences. Their characters were fitted to inspire their children but still they turned the eye of the spiritual man forward to a Seed to come whose character should exhibit all their graces in their full glory. They were types of Jesus of Nazareth, the Holy One of God.

2. The worship of Israel restored in some degree man's original fellowship with God. By means of the sacrifices, through the aid of priests men communed with the God whose glory dwelt between the Cherubim in the tent of meeting. Had a man broken the covenant-law, he was restored to favor by a sin or a trespass offering; did he wish to dedicate himself to the service of God, he accomplished his purpose by a burnt offering; would he sup with his God, he brought his peace-offering to the sanctuary. And it would be easy to show that the ritual of each of these offerings was precisely suited to the idea. For example, in the peace-offering God gave a part of the sacrifice into the hands of the worshippers that a festal meal might be prepared. Accordingly I do not doubt that the religious needs of many Israelites were met by these services. But as men became more spiritually minded, they must have craved for a nobler satisfaction and thus their minds were carried on to Him who has borne our sins and trespasses and in whom we may give ourselves to God and hold fellowship with Him. They also were types of the once-crucified Redeemer.

3. Nor is the special divine guidance absent from the events of the history. Let me refer to the events of the journey to Sinai. At Marah the bitter water was sweetened; in the wilderness of Sin their hunger was satisfied with the manna; at Rephidim water flowed for them from the rock. Here too they conquered their

enemies (the Amalekites) by means of the rod of God. Will you notice that these events only are recorded of that journey and that every one of them is represented as miraculous? God Himself is in some degree fulfilling His promise of Redemption to His people. Yet of course these are only pledges of the full measure of salvation. That God's Word may not be partially void, there must come One who shall be the true Bread from heaven, a Rock stricken that the living water may flow forth from it.

I point out then most emphatically that God is *in* this history fulfilling his Word. In the early days it was only very partially that He could fulfil His Word. But He is constantly travelling towards the perfect fulfilment in Jesus Christ. The graces of men are a promise of the fulness of grace which dwelt in Jesus Christ, the services of the temple gave a foretaste of the friendship with God which He has secured, the events of the wandering are an earnest of that outbreak of miracle which began with the incarnation and culminated in the resurrection. Just because God cannot give His promise a merely partial fulfilment, the earlier results of it are a pledge of the later, even of those yet to come. They are types and it was when spiritual men in Israel turned under the guidance of the Spirit from these toward the future that they uttered the Messianic prophecies. Naturally then these become more and more definite. The seed of the woman becomes that of Abraham, the offspring of Judah, the son of David, David's Lord, God's own Son. And as the bruised heel is defined by Isaiah's prediction that the soul of the Servant shall be an offering for sin, so the crushed head is no longer a vague notion when it is promised that He shall divide the spoil with the strong.

I know not whether I have made my meaning plain. Here, I say, are lilies which give your mind an image of beauty that they cannot satisfy; here are roses in the garden of the Lord which send you in search of the perfect rose. It is from Jesus Christ that all these rills have taken their rise and to Him they all return. All the light in which Israel walked was but a foregleam of the King of the eternal day. All the divinely-inspired men, all the divinely ordered institutions, all the divinely guided events of Israel's history were prophetic. The New Testament is bound up with the Old Testament in bonds which no criticism can sever.

I hold no brief against that reverent study of Bible which is often called criticism. It has taught the Church much and its teaching is not exhausted. But whatever it may say of the human authorship of the Old Testament, there lies the book before us such as I have indicated. It has divinity stamped upon it. It is not by the New Testament alone but by the one book in its two great parts that our religious needs are satisfied to-day. The cathedrals of the old world were begun many a long age before they were finished but it



was the one plan of the one mind which guided the many work men. Each new age did not demolish that which its predecessor had left incomplete but built upon it. So the New Testament is built upon the Old Testament. It is the one plan which begins in Genesis and is wrought out to completion in Revelation.

I heard a fable the other day in Toronto. A great tree, the growth of many generations, raised its lofty head and flung out its mighty branches by the side of a village. One day a traveller came along who reminded the villagers of the great age of the tree, pointed out how its trunk was somewhat gnarled, its branches here and there twisted. He had almost persuaded them to cut it down for firewood when they bethought themselves that of its fruit they all found nourishment and under its branches they enjoyed delightful shade. So in the Bible and particularly in the Old Testament men find the gnarls and twists which are the marks of its human origin but the same book has proved itself the Word of God by nourishing the spiritual life of every generation of God's people and giving them heavenly comfort amid the dryness and heat of temptation and trouble. There is none like it. I do not mean that no other religion has a sacred book like it. Even those admirable works of the present and those immortal works of the past which have been inspired by it are not like it. Men influenced by God's Spirit have written these; they have been blessed by God's Spirit to men's salvation but of this only can it be said that the Spirit of God dwells in it, that in it men have fellowship with God their Saviour. Even as God was in the history, so is He in the record; even as He spoke by the prophets of old, so it is with Him we meet in their writings still.

Therefore are we not ashamed of this book even in the light of the 19th century. Therefore do we rejoice in the success of a society which now circulates the Bible in 335 versions, which in the 94 years of its existence has issued more than 150,000,000 copies of Holy Scripture, which to-day holds a unique position in Roman Catholic and Muhammadan lands, which last year did a greater mass of editorial work in translation and revision than ever. And our prayer is, in the language of the resolution, that the Divine blessing may more abundantly rest upon the circulation of the Holy Scriptures that Christ may be known in all the earth and His saving health among all nations.

M. F. F. Frost, M. P., of the well known firm of Frost & Wood, Smith's Falls, Ont., seconded Mr. Ramsay's resolution and in support said :—

advocate together to hear and discuss the report of the Committee, and also to devise other ways and means for continuing and extending the work throughout the Ottawa Valley by means of this Auxiliary Society.

It is now ninety-four years since the Bible Society commenced operations on a very small scale. At that time a great many lands were shut to the operation of the Society ; the Word of God could not find entrance everywhere, antagonism and animosity pervaded the minds of the people ; and it was only through faith and perseverance that the members and officers of that Society carried forward the work with such success that to-day we have heard on this platform that there is scarcely a place in the round world that is not open to the colporteur, to the missionary and to the Word of God. We have therefore very much to be thankful for and we can, in the words of the resolution which has been placed in my hands to second, "heartily thank God for what has been done and we can ask with all faith the prayers of the Christian people of the world that the Divine blessing may more abundantly rest on the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, that Christ may be known in all the earth and his saving health among all the nations."

Success in any enterprise always makes work and duty easy. We know that in our ordinary business ; we all understand how easy it is to do something if our previous doing has been crowned with success. Now no one can deny that the British and Foreign Bible Society has met with great success. We have heard that it is circulating now four million copies of the Scriptures, that the Bible is printed in between three and four hundred languages, and that every door throughout the known world is open to its distribution. In this respect, it must be admitted, the prayers of Christian people have been answered. God's blessing must have been given to this great work or in the very nature of things it must have failed. Therefore we can feel assured to-night that God's blessing has followed the work and it only remains for the people of this and other Christian countries to unite together to make this work an unparalleled success.

In the first place it is to be done by the prayers of Christian people, as stated in the words of this resolution, and in the second place by all combining together to supply the necessary means for printing the book and sending the missionary into lands needing the Word of God so as to bring the people who need it into close contact with its influence.

But now there is another thought that has struck me : Why is it that this great privilege has been accorded to us to circulate the Scriptures ; why is it that God in His great mercy and condescension has given to us the proud privilege of circulating His



truth throughout the world? Lord Roseberry, late Prime Minister of England, said a short time ago that Britain was probably the greatest secular power for the Christianizing and civilizing of the world that there was in existence, but I believe that behind this power of England lies the power of the Bible and I believe that the Bible Society is doing that work, and not only civilizing and Christianizing the world, but bringing all the world together and teaching the principles of freedom and liberty. The Bible is the book of liberty, and as the Anglo-Saxon is a liberty loving race, it is but reasonable that the Bible should become the great right arm of that great race and that it is now the great civilizing and evangelizing power of the world. How much then ought we to prize the privilege we possess, how ought we heartily to undertake this work and so gain His approval and reward, who rewards all who do his will with unerring wisdom.

There are counterfeits in the world. We have heard Confucianism and Buddhism mentioned, and these counterfeits will exist as long as that which is genuine does not come. The genuine Book of God will displace all counterfeits. The Bible Society is a main instrument in this great work and we are met here to-night to ask for prayer that it may increase, that the blessing of God may rest upon it, that the Divine Spirit may guide it, and that it may be carried on to still greater things till all the world shall hear the Gospel and Christ's name may be known from the rising to the setting sun.

The Bible teaches how to live here as well as of our future hereafter. It is profitable for the life that now is as well as for that which is to come. It meets us at the very earliest stage of existence and it goes with us to the end. This book has come to enlighten the world to lead it in the way of righteousness and to teach it the story of the sacrifice made for humanity on the cross. This is why all Christian people unite in carrying this book the world over.

I am very glad to see the President on the platform and other leaders in the work, although but an humble member myself. I have always had a very great interest in the Ottawa Auxiliary, having been connected with it nearly all my life, and I am glad to hear a report so encouraging, so fruitful in good work that has been done. I am glad to know that throughout this Valley and through all the District in which the Ottawa Auxiliary labors the Word of God has been better known and more appreciated and that the finances of the Auxiliary have been so well maintained; that this after all is a red letter year, in that, the largest amount has been sent this year to the parent society. All these things are very encouraging. They enable us to thank God and take courage for the future and to hope that it is yet the day of small things
