SHOWS FROM THE PAST. Yet the whole history of the Irish race proves their sublime mission. God has kept, as an arrow in his quiver, this little island to go forth to conquer spiritual kings.

MISSIONS ABROAD. St. Patrick's bishops and priests were so ardent, so zealous, and so energetic, that they carried the light of the gospel into England, Scotland, Germany, France, even into Italy.

We feel it a consoling duty to address all our beloved people throughout the Diocese, the vast major portion of the children of Ireland, upon this Festival of Ireland. Our object is twofold; to encourage them to fulfil their sacred mission

A PROTESTANT MINISTER'S VIEW OF IMPORTANT SUBJECTS—ITS ABILITY AND EQUIVOCALTY. ADDRESS OF REV. DR. HOPKINS, PORE THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

One of the most important topics discussed by the Episcopal Church in its session here some months since, was the following: The following report of one of the most prominent ministers' views on the subject of the Confession is one of the most valuable which it would not be hard to reason to the conclusion, were it not hindered by our own obstinacy and prejudice.

Let us look at the subject, first simply in the light of common-sense, here the other two learned professions furnish us with reasonable aid. In each of the three learned professions, law, medicine, and theology—men prepared, by a long and special training, to make themselves useful to their fellow men in that branch to which they have devoted themselves. But how is this assistance rendered to the strivers of *laici*? Should be said, that at different seasons have given their clients advice; have encouraged litigation; selfish ends; have extorted money from their clients that their advice have made themselves the agents of the law, rather than of justice and equity; and that, therefore, all ought to be confined to the delivery of public lectures on the laws and principles, which every body might wish to hear, and that each should apply these legal principles to his own case. But how is this to be done? If his own private judgment, and if that nobody shall be permitted any private, confidential conversation any lawyer under any circumstances? How would such a rule strike the common-sense of mankind? It would provoke inextinguishable laughter.

The chief use of lawyers is, in particular cases, to be made known to the minutest and fullest confidence of the far from prohibiting confidential communications, it is not only granted that such will be made, but that the lawyer should be bound to the protection of so that no lawyer can be compelled by process of court, to reveal them at any time or under any circumstances; and the common-sense of the world is against the idea of a man's giving the general principles of the law to the public. In this case, also, the law is not to be understood as the law of the individual, but as the law of the profession.
