

GERMAN AIRSHIP MEN TOOK LEAVE TO-DAY FROM FRENCH SOIL

The Landing of Big Zeppelin Which Caused Great Excitement in France Was Satisfactorily Explained and the Airmen Waved Good-Bye to the Populace.

LUNEVILLE, France, April 4.—German Air Cruiser Zeppelin IV, after reinflation, ascended and departed for Germany shortly before three o'clock this afternoon.

It is reported that the Germans will not be allowed to depart until the whole matter has been fully cleared up.

The investigation conducted by Col. Rirschauer, Brigadier-General Antide Leon Lesco, and the commandant at Luneville under the presidency of Prefect Lacogne, concluded with the following findings:

The balloon belongs to the Zeppelin Company; the German officers on board were designated to test the workings of the dirigible before acceptance by the German Government; the airship landed at Luneville because those in charge had lost their way and the officers on board perceived they were near a French garrison town.

The lack of knowledge of these secrets was, it is stated in military circles here, responsible for the failure of the dirigible belonging to the British admiralty.

The Zeppelin IV, according to the German war office did not carry any military equipment or machine guns.

The chief director of the Zeppelin factory departed for Luneville last night in order to supervise the return journey.

STILL MAKING THINGS HOT

Railways Are Alarmed as to What Suffragettes Will Do In Old Land

LONDON, April 4.—Two girls suspected of being militant suffragettes about to commit an outrage were arrested at dawn this morning. They tried to escape from the police by dropping bags they were carrying and retreating away from the scene.

The girls were brought up at the police court where they gave their names as Phyllis Brady and Millicent Dean. They were remanded on the charge of being suspected persons. They had explained to the policeman who arrested them that they were returning from their Easter holidays.

LONDON, April 4.—Warnings were sent out to-day by the directors of the railroad systems throughout the United Kingdom to the effect that militant suffragettes had threatened to burn stations in various parts of the country. Patrols were ordered to be organized at all stations and in the tunnels.

At the close of the caucus held yesterday it was announced it had been decided to fight the naval bill even to the extent of all night sessions and to the obstruction of business.

An apparently inspired editorial in the Ottawa Free Press, official organ of the Liberal party at the Capital, strongly advocates this very line of action.

Fair Reasons or Foul. The Free Press says that closure should be fought by either constitutional or unconstitutional methods to the last ditch and adds, "We believe the Liberals would be justified in turning the Commons into a veritable 'bear garden' should such an attempt be made.

Trial Marriages Legal Says New York Judge

NEW YORK, April 4.—Trial marriages for young women under 18 years of age are legal in New York, according to a decision by Supreme Court Justice Cohan yesterday.

The decision was in the case of Mrs. Iva Mundell Coster, who sued to annul her marriage with Norman B. Coster. The justice found that although Mrs. Coster's mother had consented to her marriage, as she was only 17 when she became Coster's wife, she was entitled to maintain an action of annulment.

(Grantland Rice). The American League like the National, is divided into three segments, sections or parts. Boston-Philadelphia-Washington. The A. L. flag race will be a tale of three cities, Boston and Philadelphia—wonderfully matched—have a shade on Washington. The Senators have come pounding forward, but they have hardly the power, speed and general ability yet to attach a flag.

Around the circuit the bulk of the dope tips the Athletics to resume where they suddenly quit off in 1912. There will be no 95 per cent confidence, no Crawford. What Cleveland needs more than any thing else is an influx of the same ambition which roused Washington last spring. The Naps are inclined to loaf and dog it through stated intervals. If they will only get in the game they can furnish trouble for any one they meet.

The White Sox still have Ed Walsh—and that means a shot at the first division and no worse than fifth place. Walsh has a great little team—but not a pennant winner unaided. Callahan has improved his club a trifle, but not to any great extent, with about the same old roster at work. The punch isn't there.

The Battle for the Grotto. Taking up New York, Detroit and St. Louis we should have here a great little battle to keep out of last place.

Minus Cobb the Tigers will be a cinch bet for the Upside-Down championship. With Cobb at his best they have a feverish argument on to finish as high as sixth.

The best chance can hope for is sixth place unless he works miracles. His club is too brittle to range any higher. There are more "its" connected to his clan than to any other two clubs in the game.

It is not surprising to learn that Jordan has signed up with the Toronto Leafs. It was an easy matter to decide that such would result. The Toronto moguls realize that without Jordan they would be very ordinary. Holly's release paved the way.

Boxing has made great strides towards popular favor in Germany during the last few years and the sport has found an enthusiastic patron in Prince George of Bavaria, grandson of the late Regent Luipold and of Emperor Francis Joseph I of Austria. The young prince—he was born in Munich thirty-three years ago to-day, April 3, 1880—held for eight years the middleweight championship of the German army. As a result of his propaganda boxing is now the favorite sport of the Kaiser's soldiers. The prince is intensely democratic, and shocked his royal relatives by putting on the gloves with private soldiers. He waived all the privileges of royalty in these bouts,

and always invited his opponents to forget the identity of the man they were facing. Some of them forgot so effectually that the prince acquired cauliflower ears and a broken nose. His influence has been felt in all classes, and even the youngsters of Munich have taken up the game and look upon George as their hero. Despite the popularity of the sport, professional boxing has made no headway in Germany, and the "verboten" sign has been put up to warn away the professional pugilists of other countries.

The Grand National Steeplechase one of the big events of its kind on the British turf, is scheduled for decision to-day. This classic handicap is worth \$17,500, including a trophy valued at \$625. The rules also prescribe that the breeder of the winner shall receive \$500 from the stakes. The Grand National will be held over the Aintree course, distance four miles and 856 yards. Jerry M., the winner of last year's race has gone bad and is not entered. The new weights for the race have discouraged many owners who expected to compete, and have upset all the form dope, leaving the betters up in the air. The event is limited to five-year-olds and upward. In the meantime the Liverpool Spring cup and the Hylton handicap, both to be decided at Liverpool, will afford excitement for the English racing fans to-day. The Spring cup, as usual, attracted only a small entry.

On account of the death of King George of Greece the engagement of King George V. to visit Liverpool for the running of the Grand National steeplechase to-day was cancelled and he will not be present.

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**Big Games To-Morrow**

**What's Doing in the Realm of Football in the Old Land.**

(By Tom Watson)  
Saturday's international game between England and Scotland at Stamford Bridge, Chelsea, will decide the international championship for the season. This is as it should be for when these countries meet, the game is regarded as the principal event of the football season. It does not affect the matter that Wales and Ireland are now able to meet the other countries on absolutely equal terms and that they always have a sporting chance of success. Time was when the Rose and Thistle monopolized all the honors between them but now there is not a certainty for any nation. They are so well matched that the slightest bit of luck or ten decides the issue.

**Results to Date**  
Following are the international results up to date:  
Jan. 18, at Belfast—Wales, 1, Ireland, 0.  
Feb. 15, at Belfast—Ireland, 1, England, 1.  
March 3, at Wrexham—Wales, 0, Scotland, 0.  
March 15, at Dublin—Scotland, 2, Ireland, 1.  
March 17, at Bristol—England, 4, Wales, 5.  
These results give three points each to Wales and Scotland and two each to England and Ireland, the latter being the only country to have an adverse goal record, while Scotland is alone in having had less scored against her than she has obtained. England has more goals than either of her rivals, but that is discounted for by the fact that she has given more away. She is all square and so is Wales, but the latter has completed her programme whereas England has an opportunity to improve her position or to make it worse than it is at present.

It is satisfactory to know that the international championship this season will not depend upon goal average. Either England or Scotland must come out on top and the chances favor the Thistle, whose representatives have only to draw at Chelsea to make certain of the championship, for Scotland would have four points against the three of England and Wales.

**Why Goals Were Prolific.**  
A football match was arranged between the C. and D. Batteries of Territorial artillery brigade and one of the officers of D promised each member of the team a pint of ale for every goal scored by the side. The result was most extraordinary—53 goals by the D battery to nil. The officer who had promised the ale was astounded. "Marvellous," he exclaimed, "what a pint of beer will do!" John L. Sullivan in his best time beat every crack heavyweight in this country. He knocked out Slade, the Maori, supposed to be champion of the Antipodes. He went to England and publicly offered to fight Jim Smith, heavyweight champion of England, for nothing, and agreed to give Smith a few thousand dollars if he stayed four rounds. Overcome by the audacity of such a challenge Smith refused to fight Sullivan under any circumstances. John returned to America. No long after that he began to lose his fighting form through dissipation. He wasn't the great Sullivan when he fought Mitchell in France, or when he avoided Jackson and Fitzsimmons, picking Jim Corbett as an easy mark. When Corbett beat Sullivan at New Orleans, John L. was a fat man, possessing few fighting qualities aside

from a stout heart and the pride that grows with a championship. Corbett beat Sullivan, and was acclaimed 'champion of the world.' He wouldn't have won a world's championship had not Sullivan held the title.

Luther McCarthy is matched to box Jim Flynn six rounds in Philadelphia April 16.  
This protects Luther from being annoyed by challenges during the next three or four weeks. Foxy stunt, taking on little Flynn in Los Angeles a few months ago, and using him as a buffer to keep off Willard, Gunboat Smith and others who might be dangerous!

Probably McCarthy will get a thousand or so for boxing Flynn—after turning down \$10,000 for boxing Wells. But, of course, there's little doubt of the outcome of a bout with Flynn.

In that fight Willard clowned around until Kearns hit him a number of good body punches. Then he became petulant for a moments, shot his right over just once, and helped the Soldier's seconds to carry him to his corner. Yes, Willard has the real "kick." He is big, too, and can take a hard punch and fight back. So he may have a chance against Smith—a pretty good chance.

**CREWS HORSES ALL LOOK GOOD**

**The Select Trio, Ambertie, Ta Nun Da, Luckola, Have Wintered Well.**

There are several small stables of runners located on the east side, one of the best known being that of Mr. Charles Grew. He has in Ambertie, Ta Nun Da, and Luckola, a select trio that were prominent on the Canadian circuit tracks last summer, all of which have wintered well.  
Ambertie was a most consistent bread-winner for her stable, and the star of the three. In fourteen appearances under colors she was only once unplaced, and won four races, including The Breeders, The Maple Leaf, and The Stanley Produce Stakes. She is a phenomenal record for a three-year-old filly. She was a creditable second in the King's Plate, and was much the best of her age and sex shown in this vicinity in several years.

The sister to Shimonese was troubled with her under-pinning on several occasions during the season, but has fully recovered from her lameness of last fall, and should again be most prominent in events for Canadian bred this summer.  
**Ta Nun Da Improvement.**  
Ta Nun Da was more of an erratic animal, and trained off near the close of the season. He is looking in fine shape this spring and should show improvement.

The cross-country performer, Luckola, succeeded in landing his field home on three occasions last year, and will again be sent through the field. The big "leaper" has been on the ailing list with kidney trouble of a mild nature, which has caused his owner considerable anxiety. The ailment has been given careful attention and it is thought will leave no civil effects, however.  
At the stable is also a fine looking big yearling bay colt, by Inferno—New Dance (half brother to Capet Sauce), and a yearling ch. f. Martini—Bennie for the King's Plate in 1912. Carrie Maid is also due to foal at an early date to Martini.

In all probability, Mr. Grew will try his hand as a trainer this season, and handle his own string. They are at present receiving their daily gallop on the Kingston road.  
**Meagher's String Looks Well**  
Trainer Thomas Meagher, who handles a public stable, has five head in his charge, and all of the number are doing well. They include C. J. Keen's Havrock; J. Morgan's Lady Orimar; J. McBurney's Live Wire; J. Meagher's Moonraker; and Flecco, his own property.  
Havrock shows no ill effects his change in his boarding house, and is looking in excellent shape. The Seagram cast-off was going "great guns" near the close of last season, and may be depended upon to give another good account of himself this year. The same applies to Live Wire, who was formerly in the stable of Ed Trotter, and is at home when racing in mud.  
Lady Orimar went wrong last fall after an extensive campaign during the summer, but the long winter rests has worked wonders on this mare. Barring a slight limp, the result of an accident to one of her fore-legs this

## MANDATE TO NIAGARA FALLS

### Vaccination For Smallpox Must Take Place, Otherwise a Quarantine on Entire Town.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Friday, April 4.—Confronted with the threat of the provincial health authorities to quarantine this city at noon tomorrow if the orders of the District Officer of Health were not carried out, the City Council at a late hour last night decided to issue a general compulsory vaccination order and name a committee to build two quarantine hospitals.

The meeting was called and this action taken following the arrival of an emphatic mandate from the provincial health authorities and backed up by the Ontario Government. The telegram was received late yesterday and read as follows:

"Mayor Cole, Niagara Falls:—Please take notice that if your Council does not forthwith carry out the orders of the District Officer of Health respecting smallpox there the Provincial Board will quarantine your city at twelve noon to-morrow."

"J. W. S. McCULLOUGH, Chief Officer."

To Isolate City. It was a notice to the City Council at its meeting last night that unless the orders of Dr. D. A. McClellan, the District Officer of Health,

were complied with and a proclamation issued ordering all the unvaccinated inhabitants of the city, men, women and children, to appear before the authorities for vaccination the city would be absolutely isolated. No person would be permitted to enter or leave; no trains could discharge or take on passengers; the big international bridge across the Niagara would be closed to traffic.

Vaccination Unpopular. While submitting to the requirements of the authorities, a number of aldermen and many citizens are entirely opposed to compulsory vaccination, and signs of this feeling were evident at the council meeting. When Aldermen Pitt, said that if he were compelled to submit to vaccination he would make sure that the instruments used were sterilized, he was cheered to the echo by the 200 citizens who had crowded the council chamber to hear the discussion.

Following the resignation Wednesday of T. E. Watson, M. Wimberton and City Health Officer F. W. E. Wilson, three of the five members of the City Board of Health, the Council last night appointed Dr. Harris Logan as City Health Officer, and H. W. Hopkins, druggist, and B. V. Bradford, merchant, to fill the positions so suddenly vacated. The newly appointed health officer has already passed a recommendation through the council that complete isolation of every infected house be carried out and that all premises be thoroughly inspected at once for any signs of infection. This stringent action really means a great campaign of isolation, vaccination and fumigation against the disease which has gained such a hold here.

The newly organized board will get into action at once, and a meeting will likely be held to-day.

During the meeting last night startling revelations were made as to the apparent unconcern with which the epidemic is treated by some citizens. At the Stamford Park Fair Grounds smallpox patients were alleged to have led a free and easy life, and little restriction, if any, was placed upon their movements.

Books, it was said, were brought from the Public Library by friends read by patients, then returned, to be put into circulation in other parts of the town.

## Parks Board

The Ontario Government, through the Minister of Education, has given another 200 feet of land off the O.L.B. grounds to be added to Dufferin Park, but a condition is named in the gift this time which will prevent the park being used for anything but playground purposes. In other words, it must be open at all times for the boys. Mr. E. L. Gould, chairman of the board, was particularly pleased with the announcement, which was made by Mr. W. S. Brewster, M.P.P., and it was the general opinion of the board that the land should be accepted on the conditions named. In fact, Mr. E. L. Gould, the present chairman, fought strenuously against the proposal to hand over any part of Dufferin Park for bowling purposes when the idea was first launched.

Mr. Brewster's letter announced in reference to the application of the board for 200 feet extra ground at the O.L.B. Dufferin Park that the Government would make the grant providing the ground was kept

open for the boys. He had seen the Minister of Education, Hon. Dr. Syme, who agreed to have the land leased in trust to the Parks Board only on condition that it be open for the boys. The extra space of ground will be 204x200 feet in dimensions.

Chief Brant Memorial. The grant of land on Gilkison street or the memorial to Chief Joseph Brant was accepted by the commissioners under terms stipulated by the Board of Works, that the land be returned if not used for memorial purposes.

S. O. E. Request. The Sons of England wrote Secretary Hawkins stating that the afternoon of May 24 for their proposed gala day would not be adequate. The society desired the whole of the day at the park, but the board had granted use thereof to the ball club for the morning, which, it was pointed out, was an annual fixture between Brantford and Hamilton.

Asks for Increase. Mr. J. C. Waller, the efficient superintendent of the board, asked to have his salary increased to \$900 per year. His request was referred to the finance committee. It was the general opinion of the board that Mr. Waller was entitled to the amount asked for. He has been up to the present engaged on a different salary basis, receiving only \$600 from the board and having to do extra work outside.

Whose Fence Broke? Mr. R. S. Brooks, who lives next to the Bell homestead at Tutela, asked to have the fence fixed up, as he did not desire to have his cattle trespass upon the Bell property. There was some question among the members of the board as to whose fence it was. Apparently the good part belonged to Mr. Brooks and the bad part to the board.

Good-bye, Crystal Palace! Supt. Waller reported that the Good Friday windstorm took off the roof from the south wing of Crystal Palace, Agricultural Park. The damage will probably mean that the entire building will be pulled down.

A Request. The Alexandra Athletic Club, through Jack Sloan, asked for the construction of a cinder track around the ball park at Agricultural Park. The club also asked for the use of the large track at the park every Monday evening during the summer. The grounds committee will settle the question.

Members Present. The members present were E. L. Gould (chairman), William Glover, Geo. S. Matthews, Secretary Hawkins and Superintendent Waller.

A good story has been going around the clubs concerning ex-President Roosevelt's schoolboy days. He was rather a duffer at reciting then, and once it fell to his lot to break-up time to "speak a piece."

"At midnight, in his guarded tent, The Turk lay dreaming of the hour When Greece, her knees in supplication, Should tremble at his power."

Young Roosevelt got as far as "When Greece, her knees," and stuck fast for the context.

"The Luck of the Peacock"

The idea that peacock's feathers are unlucky is based on superstition according to E. Grogan. The story goes that the tail represents the Evil Eye. Argus was left by Osiris, King of Egypt, in charge of Isis the Queen during the King's absence. Argus with one hundred spies (eyes) became over-powerful and usurped the crown. Mercury came to the rescue and decapitated the monster. Juno then transformed the headless Argus into a peacock, and put matters right by setting his eyes in his tail. Condemning the peacock as unlucky is quite modern. It would seem that we of the present day skip right back to mythology for this superstition.

If in the Middle Ages they had been considered evil peacocks would never have been permitted to appear upon the gorgeous robes possessed by Church dignitaries of the highest order. Pope Paschal early in the ninth century owned wonderfully embellished robes, many being covered with precious stones. The most exceptional and beautiful of all was an amber garment embroidered with peacocks. Pope Leo IV had a drape on which was pictured a man noised upon a peacock. The altar of Pope Stefano V. was adorned with four splendid cloths embellished with these proud birds. Time after time they appear wrought into religious designs. The feathers themselves were woven into a mantle sent by Pope Paul III to King Pepin.

It is not conceivable that the peacock could have been of evil omen when it took the form of a Royal Coronation gift. The Queen of Henry III received from her sister, the Queen of France, a quaint and valuable silver peacock of no mean size. Its tail was set with many a sapphire and precious stones. The pretty bird had its use, for it formed a reservoir for "sweet waters" which came from its beak into a chased silver basin.

No other feathered fowl has ever received the homage obtained by the peacock. When dressed for table it was considered "the nutriment of lovers" and the "viand of worthies"

At solemn banquets for princes, great pomp was accorded our peacock. See the golden dish borne aloft by a lady of high degree, a train of ladies of rank in her company and music in the rear. The hero of the tournament carves, and every soul must taste, if but a morsel. Then he rises to take the oath, and with arms extended over the bird he proclaims his vocation: "daring deed, or maybe a protestation of love."

These words prefaced the vow, and the peacock shares highest honors. Surely no evil was dreamed of in connection with his hundred eyes. In the early Victorian era peacock's feathers were to be seen decorating the mantle pieces of nearly every farmhouse. The care with which these plumes were guarded by the majority of people of all classes proved that superstition concerning good luck was attributed to the bird. Perhaps the "Vow of the Peacock" still lingered and left a dim memory. The present generation is almost too matter-of-fact to indulge much in ideas of superstition, but for all that we forget the Peopes, and the princes, the knights and dames of old and appeal to Argus: "The peacock is unlucky," we say.

These ties are drawn softly under the rolling collar and knotted in tur-in-hand style, the long ends passing under buttoned slashes in the front of the blouse and then falling free to the waistline.

OUR GOOD RECEIPTS. Creamed Carrots. Creamed carrots will be found especially tasty if they are served in green pepper shells. Cut the peppers in half lengthwise; remove the seeds and fill with the carrots. Sprinkle with crumbs and brown in the oven.

Scalloped Cabbage. One-half a large cabbage, chopped fine. Put on to boil in salted water until tender; drain. Butter a deep dish and put in a layer of cabbage; then cover with bread crumbs, put bits of butter over the top, a little pepper, then another layer of cabbage and so on until you have the dish nearly full, then pour over one cup of hot milk and bake three quarters of an hour in a hot oven.

Never Fail Gems. Rub together one egg, one heaping spoonful sugar, one heaping tablespoonful sugarfin one heaping tablespoonful of corn meal; one level teaspoonful of salt. Then add one cupful sweet milk; two cupfuls sifted flour, one teaspoonful soda; two teaspoonfuls cream of tartar. Beat, drop in gem pans and bake in moderate oven. This amount makes 12 gems. They may be eaten by anyone without fear of the meal causing heartburn.

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ENGINEER'S GRAND

Ontario Government mends Storage 000 Will be S to Complete Great Interest.

Brantfordites will read with interest the report of the engineer of the Ontario Legislature this week, dealing with the possibility of local flow characteristics of the Grand River works. The report was from Adam Beck, from whom the Government will make a grant of additional inquiries in connection with the work carried out thus far.

Through the progressive obliteration of physical influences governing natural control, the flood flows of Grand River have for some years past been gradually increasing in volume and destructiveness.

Consequent upon this steady increase in flood discharge, the water flow has been steadily decreasing, so that in addition to a large annual loss by flood damage, there has been a material loss through shrinkage in power capacity. The realization that these conditions would tend to become worse year by year led to the investigation of the Provincial Government in the matter of the Grand River works.

Investigation for the purpose of visiting, if possible, a feasible remedy to serve the joint purpose of ameliorating flood conditions and of increasing the power capacity of the stream under conditions of minimum flow.

During the Fall of 1912 a reconnaissance survey was made of Grand River watershed covering

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
