**UNIONVILLE FAIR.**  
 A Grand Exhibit - Fair Weather and a Great Gathering of Farmers.  
 The annual fall fair of the Brockville Electoral District Agricultural Society was held at Unionville on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday last. The president and directors had labored faithfully to have everything in readiness for the reception of the exhibitors and the entertainment of the patrons, and the marked appreciation which their efforts received must be very gratifying to them, as they are very anxious to give a better and more interesting and comfortable show to the exhibitors and patrons.  
 The main building was very pleasantly decorated with flowers and everything working harmoniously.  
 The apartment of the main building devoted to the display of ladies' work and art was never more richly supplied. The first to claim attention to the left on entering was the fine oil paintings, sketches, plaques, etc., that adorned the wall and shelves. The taste and skill displayed in the production of some of these were indeed very creditable to the amateur artists whose work they were. The leading contributors in this line were Mrs. Byron Loverin, Miss Etta Bassier, Miss Bertha Loverin and Mrs. Wm. Mott. Adjoining the paintings was a fine display of pictures from the studio of the late photographer, Mr. G. G. Murray & Son, Brockville. Wherever one turned in this room the eyes were bewildered with the rich coloring and beauty of the fancy articles exhibited.  
 A closer inspection revealed the fact that interspersed with crocheting, embroidering, braiding, tating, etc., there were many useful articles showing that skill with the needle is by no means a neglected art, with the fair patrons of Unionville. The pyramid of flowers in the centre of the building was constantly surrounded by a throng of admirers. It was full to the very top, many

rare plants being among the number. The ladies who contributed this fine collection were: In Cornell, Richard Kerr, W. G. Oida.  
 The grain, roots and vegetables were marvellous in size and quality, attesting to the favorable character of the year for farming and gardening. This department was, of course, chiefly of interest to those directly connected with agriculture, and here all day there took place a constant interchange of thought and opinion on the merits and demerits of the samples of new articles shown.  
 The bakers of fine bread sent a large exhibit, and this with the fruit and canned goods made their apartment a very pleasant, spending room. The fruit was fully up to the average, both in quality and quantity.  
 The various sections in the class of domestic manufactures were all filled and some very fine work was shown. Among the chief exhibitors were: Abel Scott, Wm. Pennock, Richard Arnold, Mort Witte, S. Y. Brown, and E. J. Sniffell.  
 Mr. F. W. Lord, of Brockville, made an exceptionally fine exhibit of farm and garden furnishings. The elegant parlor suite and bedroom suite were universally admired and judging from the many favorable comments made regarding them, we think that the result of his enterprise in placing his goods before the public will be a general increase and extension of his already large business.  
 Mr. Fred Blanchard, of the Brockville Business College, occupied a position in the main building and gave a practical exhibition of the working of a type-writing, many visitors carrying away with them pretty little souvenirs in the form of cards having their names neatly printed thereon.  
 The building devoted to the display of the product of the dairy and apiculture was well filled, the liberal society and numerous special prizes bringing out a large exhibit. The display of working bees attracted most attention.  
 The carriage hall was a point of chief interest to many, being filled with carriages and cutters built and trimmed in the latest and best styles. Messrs. Cole had been Row's Carriage and H. Boyd, Brockville, were the chief exhibitors. The former are old members of the Unionville Fair and the excellence of their manufactures is well known. A sectional which Mr. Cole exhibited with commendable pride to all interested was a family buggy, so constructed that it could be easily and quickly transformed from a simple covered carriage into a domesticated one by another arrangement, a comfortable seat could be added for children. The rig was most complete and was much admired by visitors. Cole Bros. also exhibited lumber, sleigh, wagon, etc.

There was the largest exhibit (87) of swine that has been the fair for years, among which were, of course, many fine animals. Messrs. W. H. and C. H. McNish exhibited 14 Berkshire and Yorkshire.  
 Nearly every cage in the large poultry house was filled, there being 212 fine birds on exhibition. Geo. Forth, John Bedlow and R. E. Foster were the principal prize winners.  
 There was a magnificent showing of cattle, in all, 108 head. Elgin Row, Brockville, showed 8 Jerseys; Thos. Davison, Spring Valley, 15 Holsteins; Sidney Easton, Lynn, 18 Ayrshires; while Wm. Nathan, Lynn, showed an entirely new class, a herd of 9 Galloways, some of which were imported stock.  
 The speeding in the ring and the show of harness kept a large number of interested spectators constantly surrounding the track. The show of horses was very fine. For carriage team, in which there was keen competition, Rufus Laoc took first prize and Wm. Edgerton second.

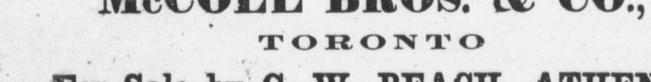

Gilroy's Holstein cows has an individual record of 3,400 lbs. of milk for two months, commencing July 6, 1891. Her milk when tested by the Professor showed up good, having 4 per cent of butter fat. This is a good record, and should cause our farmers to investigate the capabilities of their cows.

One of our leading merchants wishes us to try to impress upon the farmers the necessity of taking more pains in preparing their butter for market. One evening this week he ordered some "girl-edges" sent up to the house. The clerks had taken it in from one of the best farmers in this section. He spread a large piece of bread with the delicious looking compound. One bite was all he could take of it in its buttery state. Being of an economical turn, and not wishing to lose the large slice of bread, he tempered the flavor of the butter with a generous slice of black seed onion, which he candidly avers was preferable to the butter. It is to be hoped please look a little closer after the cream pails and see that the milk is thoroughly worked from the butter before bringing it to market.
