soil is extremely fertile, requiring little cultivation. But on account of its porous nature it demands a plentiful supply of water. Since its character makes artificial irrigation almost impossible, seasons of indif-ferent rainfall, such as the past has been, mean fahine. China is not, as many Canadians might suppose, densely packed with people. The greatest congestion—a congestion which forces folk to live in rafts on the water—occurs along the seaboard, the rivers and canals. In Southern China the density of population and the intensity of cul-tivation is such that a single peasart farmer will frequently make a living off one-sixth of an acre. In the worth, however, the farms are larger, running to from three to ten acres and more in parts. In marked con-trast to the densely populated areas are large tracts of fertile land sparse-ly populated owing to lack of trans-portation. Incredibly rich in minerals is China. Her coal deposits are the largest in the world. Vast seams of the finest anthracite and soft coal underly large areas. It was esti-mated some years back that the coal

of the finest anthracite and soft coal underly large areas. It was esti-mated some years back that the coal deposits of the province of Shansi alone would supply the whole world at the present rate of consumption for thousands of years. Yet the Chinese have scarcity scratched these supplies and coal any distance from most of the few existing mines is quite dear. Clever and very indus-trious, the Chinese have yet, through lack of enterprise, failed to develop the abundant natural resources which would free their country from the dire effects of famine and revothe dire effects of famine and revo-lutionize life in that country.

Which Is the Best Elephant? The most distinguishing point of difference between the Indian ele-phant and the African elephant, is the size and shape of the ear. The ear of the African elephant is much the larger. The African elephant it-self is larger than the Indian, but it is not commonly seen in marks or self is larger than the Indian, but it is not commonly seen in parks or shows. Jumbo, an Abyssinian, meas-ured 11 feet and was the largest elephant ever shown in captivity, but a wild African elephant of 11 feet 6 ½ inches is on record. The tusks of elephants, the chief source of ivory, are the incisor teeth. A single tusk of an East African bull elephant has been known to weigh 235 pounds; but the average tusk of the old wild bull elephants of to-day is said to be not more than, 40 pounds. The tusks of females are smaller and more slender. The record length is believ-ed to be 5 feet 10 inches, the weight of one specimen being only 28 pounds.





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
