Chaos at Home.

The situation in the great cities of England may be realized to some extent from the items which we publish from the Daily Mail of Friday week, when the strike of transport workers was but partial. "Mob law reigns in London. The strikers are supreme. In all directions yesterday they stopped traffic and interrupted supplies. The capital finds itself in the position of a blockaded city, within which civil war—though fortunately of a mild type—is in full swing. There is a disquieting shortage of all manner of supplies. Meat has risen greatly in price. Fruit is scarce. Ice is becoming unobtainable. Petrol is hard to be obtained. In the docks and the railway stations vast quantities of produce are accumulating, but they cannot be unloaded or distributed. The strikers have given the order, and their will prevails."

"So grave is the outlook, so extreme the danger to London's food, that troops are being held ready at Aldershot, Hounslow, Shorncliffe, Colchester, Dover, and elsewhere; 100 rounds of ball cartridge per man have been issued. Army Service wagons are waiting at Hounslow."

"An order was issued at Aldershot at 10.30 that all the troops were to go to bed, but they were to sleep in their clothes."

"Mr. Tillet stated yesterday to a Daily Mail representative that if the strike continues for another week there will probably be no newspapers, and you may not be able even to buy a notebook," he added.

Ten thousand tons of paper are now lying at the wharves and in ships between Wapping and Blackfriars; and at Marylebone Station, the point of arrival for the Grimsby Mills, paper is accumulating at the rate of 500 tons a week.

London's daily and weekly newspapers require between 4,500 and 5,000 tons a week. One firm, who bring their paper by water to wharves in the City, where they receive 2,000 tons a week, have been endeavouring to bring supplies by rail to the Bricklayers' Arms Station. Their carmen were threatened by strikers but succeeded in getting portions of the consignment through."

"Owing to some 20,000 tons of ice being detained at the docks, factories, and cold storage departments the supply in London yesterday was almost entirely cut off."

"At Covent Garden 500 or 600 porters were standing idle. There was no foreign fruit for sale. It has been impossible to remove 50,000 packages of French and Spanish goods which arrived on Wednesday. Forty-four thousand cases of foreign fruit, valued at £14,000, are lying in ships in the river rotting. One firm has been obliged to drop into the sea about 5,000 bunches of bananas."

Cable News.

LONDON, Aug. 18.
Fifty thousand troops arrived during the day and encamped at various points where they were able to protect the various lines of communication. Scarcely any railway lines entering London gave a complete service, even the underground tube system was affected to some extent. The Great Western Railway and the Great Central Railway were the two services that were most seriously affected. The conditions in the provinces are somewhat more serious than in the metropolis. The West of England is completely cut off from London. Some disorder was reported at Birmingham to-day, while at Stockport business is at a standstill as the teamsters are still out on strike. At Liverpool chaos is complete. Railway companies have been compelled to discontinue selling tickets throughout Wales, where there is almost a total stoppage of traffic, and no train could get through to Fishguard. As the day progressed, more serious reports came in. The strikers took possession of the railway line at Glanville, a seaport of Wales, and succeeded in repulsing the police, who attempted to drive them off. At several out of way places at Wales the signal boxes were burned and other acts committed. The threat to call a general strike of teamsters throughout the country is not likely to be enforced, as the men appear satisfied with the settlement recently reached.

TO EXPLORE CROCKER LAND.
Copenhagen, Denmark, August 12.—The captain of the Greenland steamer Godthaab, which has returned from North Star Bay, says he met Captain Bartlett, the commander of Peary's ship, the Roosevelt, on his way to Etah to get Eskimos and dogs for a great expedition next year to the most northerly polar district, Crocker Land, which was discovered by Peary in 1906.

The expedition will be led by Prof. MacMillan and Geo. Borup, who went with Peary on his last polar trip. It will proceed to Cape Columbia on the steamer.

Crocker Land was seen but not reached by Peary on his journey westward from Cape Columbia. It is north-west from Grant Land and almost due north from Cape Hubbard the most westerly point attained by explorers on that coast.

Capt. Jensen III.

We gather from reliable information that Capt. Jensen, who has been in the habit of going to the Labrador to purchase fish for some years past, is now very ill and finds it necessary to return to Europe, but he has made arrangements with Mr. Badoel on the Labrador, and his agents here that the business will be conducted on entirely the same lines as in former years, and the payments will be made in the usual manner.

We very much sympathize with Capt. Jensen, and hope that the voyage across will tend to improve his health.

J. J. Mackay asked for a better supply of water at Wool Factory, Alexander Street. The Council is having pipes come by to-day's Allan boat.

The Inspector General sent in Detective Byrne's report on the alleged damage caused by trees and protection boxes on the Promenade by Joy and Lester's men. As the case is "all ballooned up" the Council decided to give it to their Solicitor.

Items of Interest.

The largest known bird's egg is that of the extinct megapornis of Madagascar, of which the museum of New York has a specimen. It has a capacity of two gallons, measures 26in. round the middle, and the shell is 7/8 in. thick. The largest egg of a living bird is that of the ostrich, which is equal to about thirty-six hens' eggs.

The Italians in London are sufficient in number to form a large town. There are so many as 14,000, about 2,000 of whom are ice-cream vendors and 1,000 organ-grinders. The other 11,000 are chiefly engaged as plaster bust sellers, artists' models, cooks, valets, teachers, artists, restaurant and hotel keepers and so on.

Herr Kieker, a German inventor, took a three-mile walk over Starnberg Lake, near Munich, using "water shoes" of his own construction. Despite the wind and the rough weather, he covered the distance in an hour and a half. The "water shoes" are cylindrical form and are 6ft. long. They are constructed of brass frames and sailcloth.

A remarkable meeting took place at Sturt town, in the Wellington district, between a man named Flowers, and his son, who had never seen each other, though the son is forty years of age. Mr. Flowers, sen., left America for Australia forty years ago; his wife remained behind, intending to follow later, but she died in giving birth to a son, who was cared for by an aunt.

Liverpool's skyscraper, the Royal Liver building, which has just been opened, is of seventeen storeys, 200ft. high, and weighs 80,000 tons. It has a clock bigger than Big Ben; each dial is 25ft. in diameter, the minute-hand 14ft. long, and at one point 3ft. wide. The clock never needs winding, but is propelled by electricity, being connected with Greenwich by Post Office wire. Special mechanism prevents the hands being interfered with by wind, snow, or rain.

Fire alarm boxes fitted with loud-speaking telephones are now installed in the suburban district of Kiel, Germany, and they are placed at various points along the streets. This appears to be the first time in which loud-speaking telephones have been applied to fire-alarm use. The telephones are mounted in an iron box, and upon opening the cover an electric contact is made which rings up the nearest Fire Department Station. Owing to the use of such telephones the voice is always heard clearly, in spite of the street noises.

A Parisian inventor has devised a craft for getting over the water, which is so light and compact that it can be folded up and packed into a box no bigger than an ordinary suitcase. The case part unfolds and joins together to form the main frame work or hull of the boat, which is the catamaran order. The two cigar-shaped floats are made of waterproof canvas. When packed up they occupy little space, and when in use they are blown up with a bicycle pump. The framework is fastened between them by means of ribs and straps, and when you have fixed a three-jointed, double-bladed paddle together and put a folding seat in place you are all ready to set out on your marine travels.
