

When Jacob the one half of a world didn't know how the other half lived I think he spoke a bigger truth than he knew.

For there are in a n y other classes of people who know as little each, how the other lives, as do the rich and poor.

Once upon a time a woman whose life had been spent gaining a perpetual sacrifice of energy and time, and intellectual interests, and friendship with her husband and children and health and nervous energy before the altar of the house immaculate and the routine all important, put rather too large a quantity of the last two ingredients into the sacrificial fire, and as a consequence had a nervous breakdown, and was ordered by the doctor to give up housekeeping for at least a year.

Being a family physician, the doctor took the liberty of suggesting that a friend of his, who had a large home in a pleasant suburb, would be willing to lodge this woman and her family. I have since felt sure that this wise doctor was giving a prescription in that advice, and was thinking of Jacob. Ris' philosophy, even if he didn't know it himself.

For the doctor's friend was "the other half of the world" to this woman. She was one of those wives to whom housekeeping is not the whole

business of life. She kept her home reasonably clean and she always served wholesome meals to her children, but she possessed her possessions instead of being possessed by them, and she fitted the routine to her life instead of her life to the routine. She was very fond of music and sometimes after breakfast she would play Beethoven's Second Symphony before doing the dishes. Her husband was a newspaper man, and she kept in touch with the news even if she didn't read the paper every day. On Saturday morning, when her oldest boy was to be in an important football game, she left the cooking until afternoon that she might witness that game.

Of course she sometimes erred on the side of neglecting her housework for things that she liked better, but surely no more than the first woman erred on the side of neglecting other important things because she liked housework better.

It was such a tremendous experience for the visitor. She had vaguely known that such women existed, but she had never come into such close contact with the "other half." At first, of course, she was horrified; then she saw how much happiness the "other half" got out of life, and she actually began to wonder; and the wonder grew so strong and went so deep that it really changed her outlook of life, and she went back to her home a wiser as well as a healthier woman.

What a lot of us there are who would be benefited by finding out how the other half lives.

## Opening of the Great Liverpool Dock.

The opening of the New Gladstone Dock at Seaforth by the King and Queen recently marks the successful completion of the first stage of a scheme of dock extension at Liverpool which has been under consideration since 1906, although the actual work of constructing the dock was not taken in hand until September, 1910. The necessity for increasing the area and depth of the dock accommodation at Liverpool has, been forced upon the Mersey docks and harbor board by the rapid and continuous growth in the length and tonnage of Atlantic liners. How rapid has been the growth in recent years may be judged from the following figures: In 1893 the Campania was launched, and for a period of six years was the largest and quickest boat on the Liverpool-New York service, her length being 622 feet, her speed 22 knots per hour, and her registered tonnage 12,500. In 1899 the Oceanic (17,000) was launched, and at once obsoleted the Campania of her premier position; and then in quick succession came the Celtic (21,000 tons) the Baltic (24,000 tons), the Lusitania (32,000 tons), the Olympic (45,000 tons), and, finally, the Imperator (50,000 tons), which has just been completed and put into service by the Hamburg-America Company. Even the Campania would look small if brought alongside the Imperator or either of the other 50,000 ton boats now in the builders' hands.

The original scheme of the Mersey docks and harbor board provided for the construction of a new half-tide dock, and of two loading and berthing docks, on the unused but enclosed land at the north or Seaforth end of the dock estate. The water area of these new docks when completed will be 40 acres, and there will be berthing accommodation for loading and unloading four 1,000 feet boats at one and the same time. The docks were to be named the Gladstone docks, in recognition of the great services to the port and com-

merce of Liverpool rendered by Sir Robert Gladstone, a former chairman of the board, and the extensions were estimated to cost £3,250,000. Owing to various causes upon which it is unnecessary to touch here, the development of this original scheme of dock extensions was delayed and is only now being taken in hand. In order, however, to be ready for the new 900 feet boats when they arrived in the Mersey, the directors of the Mersey docks and harbor board decided in 1910 to add to the original scheme by constructing a combined loading and graving dock at Seaforth capable of receiving and docking for repairs the largest liners yet planned or contemplated.

The first necessary work was to exclude the sea from the scene of the engineering operations, and from early in September to December 31, 1910, a force of between 1,000 and 1,500 men was continuously engaged, working day and night shifts, in building a clay and rubble embankment round the site of the new dock. This work was completed early in January, 1911. The work of excavating down to the solid rock and of filling in the concrete foundations was then proceeded with rapidly, and the following figures show the magnitude of the engineering operations that have been carried out on this site during the past two and a half years:

Average number of men employed, 1,000.  
Total weight of cement used, 25,000 tons.  
Total wages paid, £225,000.  
Aggregate of sand and rock excavated from the dock site, 380,000 cubic yards.  
Aggregate of material removed from river bed, and entrance channel by dredging, 1,185,000 cubic yards.  
The removal of one and a half million cubic yards of sand and rock within a period of thirty months from a sandy foreshore would have been impossible 25 years ago, and the successful completion of such a task proves the immense value and importance of the steam excavator and steam dredger in modern engineering work.

have been unmanageable and unsafe for closing a dock entrance 120 feet wide, or for holding up 7,000,000 cubic feet (200,000 tons) of water, apart altogether from the difficulty of providing space for them in the funnel-shaped entrance channel. The caisson form of closing was, therefore, the only one practicable under the circumstances. The caisson is constructed of steel girders and plates on the plan of a pontoon, its dimensions being 120 feet in length by 50 feet in height, by 25 feet in width, and its weight is 1,200 tons. Since it is almost balanced in the water by the enclosed air, the power required to move it in and out of the caisson-chamber on the right hand side of the dock will be chiefly used in overcoming the resistance of the water. Two 750 horse power electrically driven motors are provided for this purpose, and the power will be transmitted to the caisson by wire cables working in sheaves attached to the opposite wall of the dock entrance.

Since it will be necessary to empty the dock entirely in 2½ hours, the pumping plant is of considerable size and capacity, and comprises five units of 1000 h.p. each. The pumps are of the centrifugal type and have discharge pipes 54 inches in diameter. Each pump is to be direct driven by a vertical four-cylinder two-cycle Diesel oil engine, running under normal conditions at 180 revolutions per minute. The engines are being built by Carols Freres of Ghent, and are the only portion of the dock plant which is of foreign make.

On the north side of the dock a single-storey shed 500 feet long and 100 feet wide has been erected, and four 30 cwt. cranes of the movable type have also been provided. On the south side of the dock two similar cranes, one of 40 tons and one of five tons load capacity, will be installed.

Those fish are put up in separate boxes, in ice and shipped to the Boston market, where they meet with ready sale.

## Health.



Health is a priceless possession which a man never appreciates until he looks into the cold, un-sympathetic countenance of a fees clinic. People who are in perfect health can stand off the family doctor with the utmost unconcern and refuse to return his wife's calls, but the man who is subject to intermittent attacks of slumping health has to pay on the first of each month or suffer in painful and bilious silence. There are two kinds of health— inherited and acquired. The individual who inherits a good, stout brand of life-defying health can take every conceivable form of risk with perfect safety. He can plunge into a porcelain bath tub immediately after partaking of cucumbers and sweet milk, and the only distress he will experience will be caused by the harsh beard of the crash towel. While everybody around him is engaged in a hand-to-nose tussle with the hay fever and can't meet a rag weed without an indignant sneeze, he can work in the hay mow for a straight week and emerge without a clog in his respiratory tract. He can fall from a two-story corn crib and light on a resilient shoulder-blade, bouncing off without fracturing anything but his suspenders. He bears a charmed life.

Most people, however, have to acquire what health they have by avoiding excess of any kind, such as

shifting union suits in the spring, mixing dil pickles with ice cream, sitting in a draft after mowing the lawn, dancing on the forehead of a stepladder which overhangs the cellar stairway, etc. After a man has acquired a durable grade of health by these precautions, he would soon think of slapping his wife's mother as to imperil all by sleeping without a nightcap and woolen stockings.

As there is not enough health in this country to go around, countless thousands of citizens who have broken down as the result of over feeding are obliged to look for it in the patent medicine bottle. Others refuse to eat anything that has not been carefully pre-digested by the breakfast food trust and live on one sallow imitation of a square meal a day. This kind of health will remain in a tame and subdued condition for several days at a time, and then, without the least warning, send the owner into the nearest drug store on a gallop.

## Memorial Service at Clarendville.

Although a feeling of sadness pervaded the whole settlement a sense of satisfaction and thankfulness came upon me for the privilege of being able to attend the Memorial Service of the late Mr. Alfred Strong, held at Clarendville on Sunday evening. As previously noted in your paper, Mr. Strong came to his end by drowning, just a week ago Monday. I knew the deceased for a half century or nearly and could say nothing of him but what was mainly and commendable. He belonged to a family of typical Newfoundland fishermen-laborers who nobly responded to the calls of industry and fought the battle of life with a determination and perseverance worthy of imitation, at the same time giving due prominence to the higher claims which demand our attention.

Nobody can tell exactly how Mr. Strong came to his end further than that he was seen in the water and when last seen was standing breast-high in the water and calling for help, but in a moment he sank from view. Every possible effort was made for the recovery of the body but all failed and the heartbroken family will sit in sadness and loneliness for many days to come.

A very large congregation assembled at the Memorial Service, in Clarendville Church where the Pastor, Rev. Mr. Winsor, improved the occasion by a suitable discourse from James 4: 14, dealing with the problems and mysteries and brevity of life and emphasizing the importance of making preparation for the "holom" event which may come at any moment.

It is somewhat remarkable that the father and a brother of the deceased came to their end by a drowning accident many years ago.

I feel sure that the Evening Telegram and other city publications will unite their sympathies on behalf of this sadly stricken and sorrowing family.—R. P.

## Magnificent Success.

### Annual Derby Day Passed

#### With Pleasure.

Thousands Through the Course -- Top Much Wind Makes it Dangerous for Boats -- Exciting Races -- Regatta Delighted.

As we presumed not long since in connection with the Regatta-meetings his year's races would be one of the good old-time ones. The pretty landscape of Quidi Vidí yesterday presented a most animated appearance. To the south was a sloping landscape dotted with tents from which flags gaily flew. In fact the whole verdant valley of famed Quidi Vidí looked prettier than ever. Happy families sat on the southern banks with baskets filled and a kindly repetition of the horror of 1884 which of in tents and the aspect of the lake-side reminded one of the regattas of 30 years ago. Many felt nervous owing to the high wind which prevailed all day. They were fearful of a repetition of the horror of 1884 when three fine young Torbay men were drowned. A peculiar thing in connection with this is that Thomas Toucher, the veteran coxswain, steered the boat that day. It was the Terra Nova, but he did not steer her in the fatal race; she was afterwards the successful Myrtle.

The rain storm of Tuesday kept many people from going in the country and this increased the throng assembled at the course. From early morning carriages, autos and all kinds of vehicles sped along Quidi Vidíwards and in connection with our Regatta there are peculiar types. The lead comes from the suburbs; he is a good fellow, must enjoy himself and this is his day. The six-ton lassie comes from many a rural retreat and dances with her best to her heart's content. In fact it is fast becoming the fete day of Newfoundland. It was certainly the best attended races since the 90's, and the independence of the people was shown in the fact that "Jack" was as good as his Master, and his master allowed that he after all was only "a mere man" and fraternized with "Jack." The result was a kindly feeling and though some of the boys became a little touched during the evening all went well.

Now for a description of the Regatta: as we said before it was an old time race but it was a pity that more fishermen did not row. A more orderly crowd of people could not be found. Police were present but there was very little necessity for them. Anticriminals handled the work of the police department admirably in the absence of Inspector General Sullivan. Not a single incident of any little squabbling which did break out amongst excited men were quickly suppressed by the Superintendent and his men.

His Excellency the Governor, Mrs. Davidson and suite were present during the day and certainly enjoyed the Regatta. The Chief Justice Sir Wm. H. Horwood and Lady Horwood were also there as was also the Premier and Lady Morris and many other notables.

A nice feature of the Regatta was the excellent rendition of music by the T. A. Band. It was under the direction of Bandmaster Wm. Pope and it certainly did them credit. #### AMATEUR.



But Phil Brown knows his men and though they had a bad position, as one C. L. B. boy said, "out on the Atlantic," the day was so stormy, he kept them well in hand. The C. C. C. rowed the Guard, the C. L. B. the Peter, the K. E. B. the Mary, the Shamrock being now out of commission; and the Highlanders, the Nellie R. The most ardent Cadet supporters had no idea that the race would conclude their favour. The boats made a nice start and all got away in excellent order. The K. E. B. lads made a splendid effort at first but fell behind with the Highlanders, and from the start it was recognized that the race was to be between the Cadets and Church Lads. On reaching the buoy it was seen that the Peter was well ahead and the choicest position on the lake was hers. The C. C. Some Runner.

Have you ever heard of Ernest Menden? Sixty years ago his renown spread all over Europe. His exploits made the pedestrian feats of the present day look insignificant.

He was a man who first came under notice by running from Paris to Moscow—a distance of 1,700 miles in 12 days and 18 hours. In 1836 he ran through Central Asia from Calcutta to Constantinople—bearing dispatches for the East India Company. The distance was 5,615 miles, and he accomplished this in 59 days—two-thirds of the time taken by the swiftest caravan. A favorite employment for him was as the messenger extraordinary of sovereigns. He ran from equator to equator, bearing letters and dispatches of the highest importance, and always beating mounted couriers matched against him. He never walked. Invariably he took the direct route to his destination, climbing mountains, swimming rivers and guiding himself through forests in a way known only to himself. His food was a small quantity of raspberry syrup.

**Engine Derailed.**

**Engineer's Promptness Prevents Disaster.**  
 Trinity, Aug. 6.—Engine 116 came to grief about ten o'clock last night and is now lying wheels uppermost about three miles north of Placentia Junction. The disaster was due to leaving an open switch on the Y. Engineer Patrick promptly applied emergency brake, which instantly responded. The tender was derailed, but fortunately the coupling snapped, thus saving the mail and passenger cars. As the engine toppled over, fireman Turner made a forlorn-hope leap from the west window and escaped without a scratch. Patrick's escape was nothing but a miracle. He crawled from beneath the wreck, succeeding in wrenching his foot free from a jamb. He was bruised and slightly scalded. Dr. Scott of Grand Falls, a passenger, rendered prompt aid. Patrick's conduct merits admiration. His escape from what appeared almost certain death left him cool and level-headed and not till everything possible had been done to prevent an explosion and put matters right would he consent to examination by the doctor. To-day he is little the worse physically and has won general praise for his coolness, pluck and devotion to duty. To engineers such as Patrick, the travelling public owe much. With commendable promptitude gangs of repairers were rushed to the scene, the track was rebuilt and at eight this morning the train re-started. The overturned engine remains a grim monument of some one's criminal carelessness and of extraordinary escape.—Daily News.

**Not Suitable Husbands**

Western Canadian Farmers Get Jolt From Dr. Parkin.  
 Those who are anxious for the welfare of the surplus of educated women in Britain will have their eyes on Canada. The Bishop of London recently declared that there would be a nation of a hundred million on one side of the Rockies. It was for the women who were the world's idealists, to make this new nation the kingdom of God. Recently an offer was made to the Girls' School settlement in London of two houses at Edmonton, Alta. in which former pupils might establish themselves. Miss Hodge, principal of the settlement, told the Canadian Associated Press that there seemed "misapprehension" among western Canadians concerning the object of those willing to found a settlement. There was absolutely no spirit of condescension, but of real service. They realized that the church in Canada was unable to afford paid workers. Settlement workers would be willing to serve in any way they desired. However, the Edmonton settlement scheme had been abandoned and it was now proposed to make an attempt further west. Dr. Parkin, formerly of Upper Canada College, Toronto, speaking to the press on the emigration of educated women, but without any reference to the foregoing, deprecated the idea which he believed was rather prevalent here, that women might very well get married soon after their arrival. The educated woman would find the style of man of the prairie also some of the pictures of prairie farms shown here as being typical of western life. "You might as well take the view of the suburban back yards here and say it represented England," he said.

**LONDON, August 6.**  
 If Germany bids above the present navy law, then our policy will be two keels to one, was a striking statement of Lord Ashby, of St. Ledgers, during a House of Lords debate on the shipbuilding policy of the Government. The debate was initiated by Lord Selborne, who indicated the Government was deliberately facing a shortage on the sixty per cent margin, which was agreed as necessary, and which they themselves had laid down. In 1915 Germany would have 77 Dreadnoughts in the North Sea while we should only have a total of 39 exclusive of those not built by British taxpayers. He said nothing about Canadian ships. That was a matter for the people of Canada. Lord Ashby, of St. Ledgers, who is Winston Churchill's cousin, said: "If Canadian ships are not forthcoming, then the whole shipbuilding programme will have to be reconsidered." The Telegraph in its editorial comment on the debate says: Are we to have mere shadows of a fleet in the Mediterranean and squadrons which are not under Imperial control in the outer seas? The Mother Country will next year probably be faced with estimates amounting to nearly forty million pounds. It is probable the suffragettes will storm the International Congress of Medicine when it opens, as the militant women say their treatment by doctors while in English prisons should be exposed to the world. Yesterday Mrs. Mansell, who presided at a big meeting said a prison doctor told Mrs. Richardson now out on license "You will be in this jail for the next fourteen days. We are going to make a mental wreck of you, ruin your nervous system, then send you to Brixton. The speaker said it was evidently a scheme of the Home Office to try to drive the militants insane and thus break up the movement." Mrs. Pankhurst, who was wan and pale, sat on the platform, attended by nurses. She said, "Yes, while I was in Holloway jail they sent an alchemist to see me and look me over." Then the meeting decided to make an appeal to the doctors convened at the congress.

**LONDON, To-Day.**  
 The second Balkan Peace Conference, having concluded a peace basis compromise which is unsatisfactory to all the States concerned, except possibly Roumania, the question is being asked how soon it will be before a third Balkan war will break out. Bulgaria has obtained under agreement arrived at a considerable portion of Northern Macedonia, much more than the allies were at first inclined to give her and also about sixty miles of the Aegean seaboard, which will enable her to build her projected railway from Philippopolis to Aegean. Bulgaria, however, deeply regrets being deprived of Mavala port on Kavala Bay, which goes to Greece under the agreement. She is also confronted with the task of expelling the Turks from Adrianople, it being clear that the Powers will do nothing in this direction. Bulgaria will seek to introduce in a peace protocol, to be signed at Bucharest, a reservation practically appealing to the European Powers for a subsequent revision of the peace treaty. The details of the new frontier line are still unknown, but apparently the disputed country between the northerly courses of Vardar and the Struma rivers goes to Serbia, including Orcheopolje, Velos, Istip, Kochana, while Demetrisgar, Seres, Drama and Kavala fall to Greece.

**LONDON, To-Day.**  
 It became known that the Duchess of Connaught, wife of the Governor General of Canada, was seized with a sudden illness at Cowes last Thursday, which caused much anxiety. The Duchess was much better yesterday, and it is expected she will completely recover from the indisposition in a few days.

**PEKING, To-Day.**  
 Mr. Sun Yat Sen, former President of the Republic of China, now one of the leaders of the Southern revolution, has fled the country on board a Japanese steamer, bound for Formosa Island, belonging to Japan in the China Sea.

**LONG BEACH, N.Y., Aug. 5.**  
 S. O. Goodpel, a millionaire real estate broker of New York, and an unknown chaffeur, were killed by their auto being struck by an electric train.

### Cable News.

ST. PETERSBURG, August 5.  
Two Russian aviators were killed today, owing to the breaking of a wing of their aeroplane.

LONDON, August 5.  
The Daily Express is authority for the statement that the Duke and Duchess of Connaught will sail for Canada, Oct. 17th.

ATHABASCA, LANDING, August 5.  
Fire swept through Strathcona St. last night, destroying two banks and thirty business houses. Loss, half a million.

LONDON, August 5.  
Sir Edward Carson, addressing a meeting of Unionists at Portrush, said it might be true the Government would issue a warrant for his arrest; but they would never execute it. He offered to attend anywhere for its execution.

LONDON, August 5.  
The Times' Bucharest correspondent says he believes that the Balkan Peace Conference will allocate Kavala to Greece, but as Russia, Austria, Britain and Italy insist the disposal of Aegean Sea port should be decided by the Powers, it is not unlikely it will be given to Bulgaria.

PARIS, August 5.  
The chief physician of the Villa Juif Insane Asylum announces that injections of Oxygen made by him have cured in a few days two cases of an acute type of sudden madness. He believes the treatment can always be efficacious in madness resulting from physical or mental exhaustion.

BERLIN, August 5.  
The Dispatch says a special cruiser squadron will be detailed to look after German interests abroad. Several smaller cruisers will be ordered and second class cruisers will be placed in the service. Later other cruisers will be built, and after 1917 will be formed into a flying squadron. This programme goes into effect next spring.

LONDON, August 5.  
Although the Mother Country has refused to participate in the Panama Pacific Exhibition, Australia intends to be represented. A guarantee of \$100,000 has been made by the Australian Government, and New South Wales, Queensland and Victoria will jointly participate. It is the general belief a good market for Australian products can be opened.

LONDON, August 5.  
After a hearing lasting thirteen days, the counter claim brought by Lord Decies to the High Courts against the London builders, with respect to the reconstruction of Sifton Park, concluded today in favor of Decies. Twenty-eight dollars was awarded for overcharges, and the builders must pay Decies' counter claim amounting to between \$50,000 and \$65,000.

LONDON, August 5.  
Premier Asquith presided at the opening of the annual conference of the National Association for Prevention of Tuberculosis. Dr. McKenzie, physician of Brompton hospital, in making a general tuberculosis treatment, said it must not be maintained the cure has been successful. Antagonistic germs of the body, he said, militated against it. The treatment, he said, was still on trial, though it must be established results are far from brilliant and unconvincing.

LONDON, August 5.  
The Morning Post and Chronicle editorially urge the British Government to reconsider its decision not to participate in the Panama Pacific Exposition. The Daily Mail says Foreign Secretary Grey's reason for non-participation is eminently practical. "It is useless to show our goods to American customers," says the editorial, "when an enormous tariff wall has been erected for the sole purpose of preventing him from buying them."

BOSTON, August 6.  
Three thousand Knights of Columbus assembled at solemn High Mass in the Cathedral of the Holy Cross yesterday, and were called upon by Rt. Rev. Joseph G. Anderson, auxiliary Bishop of Boston, to seek with all right-minded persons the solution of social problems through evolution, not revolution. The Bishop read a cablegram from Cardinal Merry Del Val conveying the felicitations of Pope Pius. Mayor Fitzgerald and State Secretary Watson welcomed the Knights.

LONDON, August 6.  
Viscount Morley presided last night at a banquet given by the British Government to some six hundred leading delegates of the International Medical Congress which convened at Albert Hall to-day. During the Congress there will be the greatest concentration of medical wisdom in London the world has ever seen together in one place. Doctors from all countries of the world, including the greatest specialists in all departments of medicine and surgery, are attending the meetings. It is estimated the attendance will number ten thousand. Latest discoveries and researches in every branch of the art of healing will be discussed.

BERLIN, August 6.  
Light sentences were imposed on the officers and men of the German Army Corps, who have been under trial by court martial for several days, on the charge of betraying military secrets, acceptance of bribes, insubordination. They were all found guilty. Lieut. Tillan was sentenced to two months imprisonment, Lieut. Schellenberg and forty-three days. The first two join their comrades, but Hoge remains in the army. The others implicated received sentences ranging from six months to three weeks. The evidence showed the prisoners disclosed to Krupp's representative information in reference to Government contracts.

BUCHAREST, August 5.  
Peace delegates of Roumania, Servia, Greece, Montenegro and Bulgaria agreed to three days' extension of armistice.

LONDON, August 5.  
The residence of the late Sir George Newnes, at Linton, North Devonshire, was destroyed by fire. Suffragettes.

COWES, August 5.  
The new schr. yacht Marguerite, designed by Nicholson of Gosport, who is to build the challenger for the America Cup, won the big schooner race.

LONDON, August 5.  
The beginning of the August bank holiday season has been marked by tragedy, eighteen persons being drowned and three killed by motor bus overturning.

TORONTO, August 5.  
One Toronto undertaker buried 29 children last week, eight others burying a total of 49 in the same time. Death in every case was due to cholera infantum.

QUEBEC, August 5.  
Mrs. Paquet, five of her children and an unknown woman lost their lives in a fire which destroyed the Paquet house. The father and one child were rescued.

LONDON, August 5.  
The Standard and Chronicle editorially repudiated the idea that the Panama Canal Tolls had anything to do with Britain's decision not to participate in the Panama Exposition at San Francisco.

LONDON, August 5.  
Two submarines engaged in naval manoeuvres, are missing. The Admiralty believes their failure to report is due to ignorance of commanders that manoeuvres came to an end suddenly on Saturday.

GLASGOW, August 5.  
Twenty-two miners perished in a fire in Naves Valley pit of Cadder Colliery near here. Only one man escaped alive out of the shift of miners in the pit at the time of the fire. Three of the men were brothers, sons of a widow.

VANCOUVER, August 6.  
The fishermen's strike on the Fraser River, went to pieces this morning when, despite the efforts of the officers of the Jap Union and representatives of the I.W.O. to hold out the rank and file of the Orientals got in their boats and departed to fish. Whites and Indians followed. There is a tremendous run of fish.

VANCOUVER, August 5.  
An unusual number of fatalities marked the weekend. Miss Hollingsworth was drowned at an up-coast battery resort. Gerald Barge, C.P.R. telegrapher, was drowned at Silverdale Creek. William Samuels, carpenter, was killed by falling off a building. Winnard Soucie, aged 10, was crushed by an elevator at Main Hotel; Arthur Clarke, aged 11, was drowned at Crescent Beach.

LONDON, August 6.  
C. N. Armstrong, Montreal, Conservative candidate for Colne Valley, declares he would not object to Ireland having the same kind of Home Rule as Canada has, there would have to be such a system applicable to Scotland and Wales as the House of Commons had too much on hand already to attend to trifling local matters. He added, "there is too much blind party following at Westminster and he wants to represent those who are opposed as well as those voting for him."

VANCOUVER, August 5.  
Four thousand salmon fishermen have gone on strike on the Fraser River, because on Saturday the canneries announced that the price of fish would be materially reduced. The Whites and Japs have joined in the strike and have called out the Indian women who work in the canneries. Greek fishermen are the only ones remaining at work, and some of those have been attacked by pickets and thrown overboard. One cannery has one hundred thousand fish left on its hands.

The Citadel Corps held its annual Sunday School picnic yesterday at Lester's Field. There was a very large attendance and the different refreshment booths were liberally patronized. Both the junior and senior bands were present, and their playing added greatly to the pleasure of the assembled hundreds. During the afternoon an open air service was conducted by Adjutant Hargrove, and perhaps one of the strangest sights, and without doubt one of the most beautiful, was when a man pushing his way through the crowd knelt at the drum in the centre of the ring formed by the bandsmen. At 9 o'clock the "all out" signal was given and tired and happy the great crowd quietly dispersed, thus bringing to a close another of those events which go towards brightening the lives of both young and old.

Special to Evening Telegram. GENEVA, To-Day. Before Britain and Germany decided not to send exhibits to the Panama Exposition, Switzerland had come to the same determination. The bigger Swiss watchmaking and embroidering firms, who have a large trade with the States, notified the Government that their patents were not sufficiently protected by the States. We can have any of our designs copied and openly sold in the States, said one of them, and have no redress. I have lost two such cases already and do not want any more.

LONDON, August 6. The International Medical Congress opened by Prince Arthur of Connaught, as representative of King George in the great Albert Hall, this morning in the presence of an audience of ten thousand, composed of doctors and their families from every part of the world. Prince Arthur of Connaught, together with Sir Edward Grey, was seated on the platform with the congress. Sir Thomas Barlow, President of the Royal College of Physicians, physician extraordinary to King George and Honorary L.D. of Harvard, Montreal and Toronto, welcomed the delegates. He spoke of the marvellous advancement made by medical science. The credentials of every member of the audience was rigorously scrutinized before an entry could be obtained to Albert-Hall. This measure of precaution was taken in order to keep out suffragettes, several of whom attempted to enter. A large force of police guarded the building, while women carrying bill boards bearing words, "What do doctors think of women orature?" paraded outside the hall.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 6. Several new knotty problems have come up in the hearing of the sealers commission before Justice Audet, Exchequer Court. The judge pointed out only \$200,000 had been turned over by the States Government in compensation for loss of industry and that the first commission was to distribute that money. Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, K.C., counsel for the Victoria Sealing Company addressed the court on a claim of \$1,614,000 the total claims of all concerned. Counsel wants to know where the extra money will come from, supposing the Commission recommended settlements aggregating more than \$200,000. No one is able to reply.

**Sprinting Round the Globe**

A New York evening paper has started a reporter round the world in an attempt to break the present record of 89 days, 19 hours, and 43 minutes, made two years ago. He expects to knock nearly four days off that record.

The time it takes to ring the earth keeps getting rapidly smaller. The first of the present day records was made by the famous writer, George Griffiths, in 1901, in 64½ days. In the same year a Paris newspaper boy cut two days off the record.

In 1907 Colonel Burney-Campbell brought the time down to 40 odd days, the Trans-Siberian Railway (from St. Petersburg to the Pacific) being open by them. He was nearly seventy when he made this record sprint round the globe.

The most tragic event in the history of globe-sprinting was when a retired English naval officer set off in 1906 on an attempt to put up new figures. He was known to have reached Yokohama, in Japan, but was never seen or heard of again. His reserved berth on the liner across the Pacific remained unclaimed.
