Why German Officer is Serving Life Term.

London, Nov. 12.-The Chronicle today describes the nature of the offense of Lieutenant Mors, a German officer, who recently was imprisoned

for life, for espionage. Mors was despatched to Egypt, five years ago, and succeeded in being appointed a lieutenant in the Egyptian gendarmes. His real mission, according to the Chronicle, was to foment a local rebellion, among the various Nationalist princes, and to war broke out he was recalled to Germany and was sent back to Egypt in a fortnight, as medically unfit for military service, but actually to blow up a steamship in the Suez Canal and to block the passage of reinforcements from India and Australia.

Major General Sir John Maxwell commander of the British forces in Egypt, heard of the plot and had Mors arrested. In his possession were splendid maps of the Suez Canal and instructions how to sink vessels there Two dynamite bombs were found in his lodgings. 
