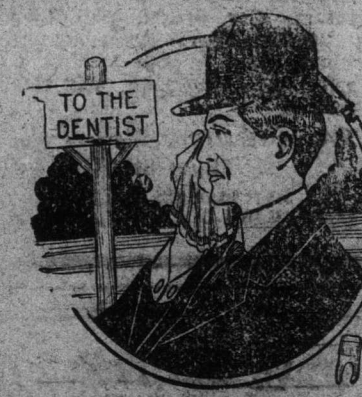

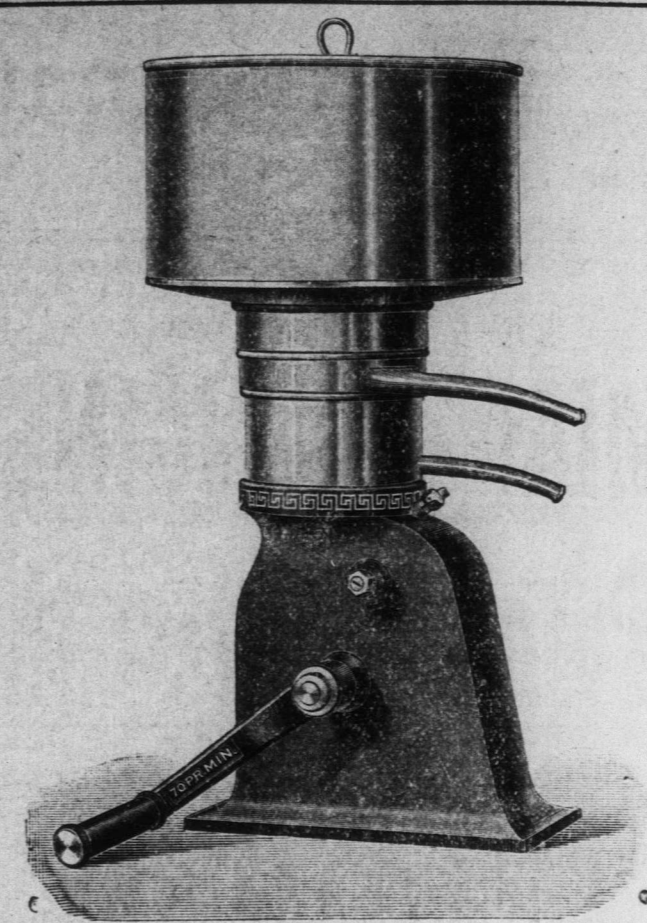

NOVEMBER 19.

New Moon—17th.

Days Past 322 To Come—42  
**ST. ELIZABETH OF HUNGARY.**  
 The daughter of Andrew II. of Hungary and wife of Louis IV. Landgrave of Thuringia. Becoming a widow, she forsook the pomp of courts, and lived in retirement and poverty, dying at 24, and afterwards being canonized.

**CHARLES I.** born 1600. Succeeded his father James I. in 1625 and from the first was in more or less conflict with Parliament. His monetary demands and unjust taxation led to the Civil War.

**PRESIDENT GARFIELD** born 1831. Among the famous men who have worked their way to the post of President of the United States. Garfield holds very high rank. Left fatherless when but a child, from his earliest days he had to work hard to help to support his family. He became President in 1880.

**FRANZ SCHUBERT** died 1828, aged 31. Austrian musical composer. He was entirely self-taught and began to compose at an early age. Even when his reputation had become established he was sometimes constrained to sell the copyright of his songs for tenpence apiece, and never being able to secure a paid appointment, he seldom managed to procure more than the bare necessities of life. He is best known by his instrumental music and art songs, of which he was the first great exponent, and wrote some six hundred and fifty.

**FERDINAND DE LESSEPS** born 1805. French diplomat who inaugurated the Suez Canal in 1854 and in 1881 commenced the Panama Canal on insufficient funds. In 1892 the management was charged with fraud, and De Lesseps was condemned to five years' imprisonment, but was too ill to undergo the sentence. He died in 1894.

**WOLFE TONE** died 1798, aged 35. Irish politician and lawyer who several times planned a French invasion of Ireland. He died in prison awaiting execution for treason.

"A World Empire"

On the Ruins of the British Empire.

Mr. Joseph Choate, at one time American Ambassador to the Court of St. James, London, has written an introduction to Prof. Cramb's book on "German and England," in which the author who died before the commencement of hostilities forecasts the coming struggle between Britain and Germany. Mr. Choate admirably sums up the book, which has special interest now that the fight is on.

"The real cause, as shown by Professor Cramb, is the intense hatred of Germany for England, and her lofty ambition to establish a world empire upon the ruins of the British Empire."

"This is an American view, and a view given expression to before war had broken out. It should give Britons pause and make them think, and spur them on to 'Hold their Own.'"

While Britain has been going on quietly, "Prussia, under the lead of the Hohenzollerns, has become the master of Germany, and, simultaneously with the humiliation of France in 1870, established the German Empire, which, however, still remains an inland Empire. But all the while she has been building up, quietly and steadily, her naval and military power, so as to be ready when the hour should strike, and has succeeded in creating, in her army, a military machine of boundless numbers and of almost invincible power, to cope with and to crush, if possible, the combined forces of all the other nations of Europe." The main obstacle is the British Empire, of which England is the heart.

It is a life and death struggle between two mighty powers.

"In the last twenty years there appears to have grown up in the German mind certain ideas about England, which have no foundation in truth and which are now being tested, with a startling surprise to Germany, that the British Empire is ready to fall to pieces of its own weight and of its own age; that England, having tasted the sweets of empire is destined to give way and Germany to have its turn; that the individual Englishman is degenerate and effeminate, softened by luxury and indulgence, and is no longer a fighter."

"The actual conflict has gone far enough," Mr. Choate thinks, "to disabuse Germany of some of its ideas about England. Instead of her empire being ready to fall to pieces by the dropping off of her colonies, armies are marching to her aid from all her dominions before the sea, apparently ready to fight for her life with as ardent patriotism as the regular British soldier; and instead of any finching or holding back on the part of the individual Englishman, they are all, to a man, rushing to the support of the colors, or are already in the terrible conflict on the Aisne and Marne with a courage worthy of the field of Agincourt." That reputation gained on the Marne and the Aisne and at Mons and Charleroi has been further sustained in Belgium and between Arras and the Oise. But the British forces engaged are too small to help the French to gain a decisive victory in the West. It is true there is an army of a million, and soon to be two million in the making, and the most renowned maker of armies engaged in the task, but an army in the

ASK TURKS FOR EXPLANATION.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The United States Government has directed Ambassador Morgan (born at Constantinople) to ask the Ottoman Government for an explanation of the firing by the Turkish land forces at the launch from the American cruiser Tennessee. Secretary Daniels, with the approval of President Wilson, simultaneously cabled the Commanders of the Tennessee and the North Carolina also in the Mediterranean, to take no action which might embarrass the American Government, and to await instructions from Washington concerning the general situation.

FOOD FOR BELGIAN DESTITUTE.

LONDON, To-day. The Parliamentary Under Secretary of Foreign Affairs stated in the Commons that the Government had contributed \$500,000 to the Belgian Government for the purchase of food stuffs for the destitute inhabitants of that country.

1 P.M.

BRILLIANT SORTIE SUCCEEDS.

PARIS, To-day. A brilliant attack by the British troops and French sailors caused the Germans to evacuate Schoorbakke, Belgium, which is partly surrounded by water from broken dykes. Because of the flood only two roads were open to the town and one of these the British approached in two armoured automobiles. It was a night attack and the Germans in town immediately turned their attention to them. Meanwhile the bluejackets who had made rafts on flat bottomed boats crossed the water and took the Germans in the rear forcing them to flee by the one road still open. The Germans abandoned many guns, ammunition and stores, and their dead and wounded.

Schooner Strikes Rock

WHILE ENTERING NARROWS.

The schr. Josephine, Capt. James Johnson, of Petty Harbor, struck Cahill's Rock while entering the Narrows last night, and was considerably damaged. The vessel had on board a cargo of 520 quintals of codfish consigned to the Monroe Export Co. It was blowing a strong breeze when she struck, the schooner coming along under reefed canvas. After the impact the vessel made water rapidly and it was only with great difficulty that she kept 'free' while making port. A large quantity of the fish was landed at Devey's wharf, before the water could get to it, the remainder, about 200 quintals is practically spoiled. The extent of the damages is not yet known, but it is thought that the keel is completely gone.

About an hour after the ship left, Capt. Meikle was apprised that he had on board no less than six boys, who were secreted in remote parts of the ship when discovered. The Nascope returned to port, landed the stowaways and proceeded to sea.

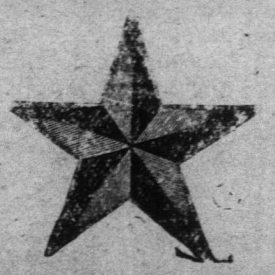

### On the Habit of Irritability.

If you were naming the seven deadly sins which one would you put first? If deadly means deadly to the happiness of others, the habit of irritability would head my list.

A woman wants me to help her out. Her husband is a good provider, thoroughly temperate, absolutely honest, and the most irritable man the Lord ever made. Peace flies up the chimney the minute he enters the door. He finds fault with someone or something almost every moment of the time he is in the house. And even when he is not actually making himself disagreeable, his housemates are under nervous tension for fear he is about to break out. His children will not stay in an otherwise pleasant home because he makes the atmosphere so unpleasant. A little corroborative note from the eldest daughter makes it plain that the mother herself is not to blame for these conditions, but is being worn out in the effort to act as a buffer between the father's irritability and the children's resentment.

Will I write something, they both beg, that will bring the father to his senses and make him realize that he is making hatred grow where love and good cheer might be.

Letter friends, I'd rather be able to write something that would wake up people like that than a wonderful poem or a great novel. For when I think of the misery and grief that seem to have to be in this world, and then think of the tremendous added

weight of wretchedness that the people who indulge in the habit of irritability thrust upon their housemates, I burn with an indignation that is almost physically painful.

"Lord keep me from the self-indulgence of irritability." That is a prayer that everyone of use who is tempted (and who is not?) ought to say night and morning and twenty times in between if it is necessary.

I believe that as many homes are made wretched by the men and women, especially men, who indulge in irritability, as by those who indulge in strong drink.

Some of these people are well meaning and in their way love those whom they make miserable. After having vented their irritability they come around and become pleasant and complacent enough, and they think that makes the score clean. Save the mark! As if by being pleasant for an hour or two at the end of the day they could bring back all the precious hours that were saddened and spoiled by their irritability.

If there is any system of future punishment I believe that the man who has murdered a home will be held as culpable as he who has murdered a man. We have no right to take life, but have we any more right to take away the peace and happiness that make life worth living?

Of course no one becomes one of these happiness killers in a day. They are the product of years of yielding to the indulgence of irritability. Day after day the habit grows until the relief of temper venting becomes as much a necessity as any other drug. And as great a crime.

### POULTRY SHOW.

OPENED BY H. E. THE GOVERNOR.

The annual Poultry Exhibition, the third and probably the best of its kind yet held, under the auspices of the Nfld. Poultry Association, was formally opened by His Excellency Sir W. E. Davidson, at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the Prince's Rink. Among those present were Lady Davidson and children, Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, Sir W. H. and Lady Horwood, His Lordship Bishop Jones, Hon. George Knowling, Hon. W. C. and Mrs. Job, Hon. J. R. Bennett, Rev. Mr. White-marshal, Hon. S. D. Blandford, Captain Ed. Dawe, Hon. M. P. Cahlin, Hon. J. Harris, W. G. and Mrs. Gosling, Mr. H. W. and Mrs. LeMessurier, Mr. R. G. and Mrs. Reid and Mr. J. L. Slat-tery.

At the appointed hour His Excellency arrived at the Rink. He was met by Mr. G. W. Gushue and Mr. J. Calver, the President and Secretary respectively. The Governor made a brief speech in which he pointed out the possibilities of Agriculture, emphasizing the great value and advantages of poultry raising. He was a firm believer in the development of our smaller industries because, he said, they were the backbone of every country. His Excellency remarked that he had just had a brief conversation with Professor Henry, the Judge, who informed him that the show was a first rate one, the class of birds, he continued, were excellent and on the whole the exhibits were such as we should feel proud of as they would do credit to more pretentious towns. His Excellency hoped that the example set and the interest taken in poultry raising here would be followed by people in other sections of the country and then expressed the great pleasure it gave him to declare the exhibition open. His Excellency's remarks were received with much enthusiasm. The remainder of the afternoon was spent by the Governor and Lady Davidson in inspecting the poultry and they were greatly pleased with the various exhibits. An evidence of Lady Davidson's warm desire to stimulate interest in poultry raising is the fact that she offered a special prize for the best exhibit in Orpington Buff class. A feature of the show is the splendid selection of White and Brown eggs displayed in the centre of the building. There are more exhibits and more classes of birds represented than in previous years. During the afternoon and night, a large concourse of people visited the Rink, but the attendance should be even larger, as it is partly in aid of the Patriotic Fund. ### Big Fish Shipment.

The S.S. Nascope, Capt. Melkie sailed at 8 a.m. to-day for Naples and Piræus, taking a cargo of 33,600 quintals of codfish which is the largest shipment yet sent from Newfoundland. The cargo equals 3,763,200 pounds net, or 1,690 tons of prime codfish, valued at about \$250,000. The introduction of steam in the fish carrying trade has already proved a great boon to shippers who send fish to the European markets. The sailing vessels still continue in the West Indian and Brazilian trade, but very few cargoes are now being shipped to the Mediterranean in sailing craft, and their passing seems only a question of a short time. Mr. John Clapp took passage in her.

## 'Audacious' Reported Sunk Off Irish Coast. Severe Weather Up North.

New York, Nov. 14.—Rumors of disaster to the British super-dreadnought Audacious which have persisted ever since the White Star liner Olympic, diverted from her course, arrived at Lough Swilly on October 29, are apparently confirmed in mail advices received by The Associated Press from a point in Ireland.

After a career of less than two years, the Audacious, of the King George V. class—third in tonnage and armament of His Majesty's warships—lies at the bottom of the ocean off the north coast of Ireland. She was hit by a torpedo or disabled by a mine just before 9 o'clock on the morning of October 27.

With the possible exception of one or two men the whole crew of 800 officers and men was rescued by small boats from the Olympic.

The rescue was made in a rough sea through brilliant and daring seamanship on the part of the White Star crew.

The Audacious met her fate 25 miles off the Irish coast, which the Olympic was skirting. The liner sailed from New York for Glasgow on October 21. She had been warned that there were German mines off Tory Island, and fear of these mines was the official explanation when she unexpectedly put into Lough Swilly.

The Olympic's passengers saw the flash of the explosion and watched the mighty warrior sink. Then their ship turned her prow toward Lough Swilly. Small craft cleared the route to make sure it was free of mines.

From October 27th to Nov. 2nd the Olympic lay at Lough Swilly, during which time no one but naval officers were allowed to board her. An immediate investigation of the loss of the battleship was begun.

Vice-Admiral Sir John R. Jellicoe, commander of the Home Fleet, visited the scene of the disaster on November 1.

There is no official confirmation of this news by the British Admiralty.

(As it is more than three weeks since the disaster is reported to have occurred and there is still no official confirmation, no credence should be given to the report. Further, as the Audacious is one of the finest battleships, her place would be in a squadron in the North Sea, ready at all times, to take her place in the line of a big dreadnought engagement. It is most improbable that she would be in the waters off the North of Ireland, nor is it more likely that Sir John R. Jellicoe, would be away from the North Sea, where his duty would call him to be ready for such an engagement.—Ed.)

By the Prospero we learn that the weather is universally severe, and Captain Kean tells us that it is the worst he ever experienced at this particular time of the season. For the past fortnight or more all along the coast from Seldom to Battle Harbor there has been nothing but snow storms, with an intensely cold atmosphere. At every port of call of the Prospero the hills were thickly covered with snow. In the region of Battle Harbor the snow was to a depth of eight feet. This looks as if there is going to be a severe winter up north.

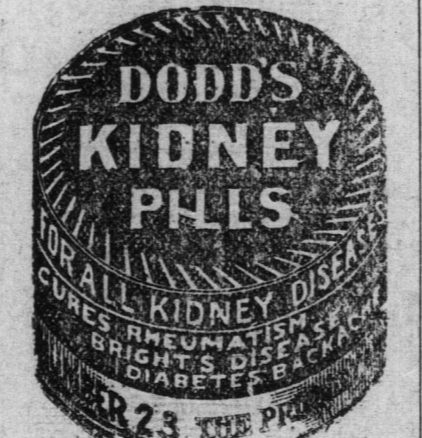
### New Performers for Rossley's.

For practically the whole voyage boisterous weather was encountered and the ship received a bad drubbing, though every port of call going to and returning from Battle Harbor was visited, and mails, freight and passengers landed. The Prospero also went to Slesz Harbor, five miles north of Battle Harbor, and landed a winter's provisions there for those engaged at pit-propping. On last Tuesday week while off the Grey Islands a fierce blizzard was experienced. Coming south, storm succeeded storm, and the ship had to harbor repeatedly. The Prospero brought a large freight but only a few passengers.



### Legend of Drake's Drum

According to the legend, Drake's drum is to sound again, "when England was in danger," but the suggestion of a correspondent of The Fall Mail Gazette that it should be beaten at some of the recruiting stations will certainly not be adopted. **War News.**

**Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.**

**BRILLIANT COUNTER ATTACK.**

LONDON, Nov. 18. The Governor, Newfoundland: Following from Press Bureau: The Third Division, yesterday, was heavily attacked, first by artillery, then by infantry. Two battalions were shelled out of their trenches, but recovered them by brilliant counter attacks, driving the disordered enemy back five hundred yards. A brigade of the second division was also attacked during the day, the enemy being repulsed with heavy loss. The French Government report marked progress at several points during the last two days. The Prince of Wales has been appointed an aide-de-camp to Sir John French, and has proceeded to Headquarters.

**GERMAN FRONT SMASHED.**

PARIS, Nov. 18. French and British troops to-day smashed the Kaiser's battlefield near Arras, capturing positions of great strength, from which Germans had been launching raids against the canal routes to the French sea coast. All the highways and canals north in the Armentieres and Arras region are now held by the Allies. The Germans to-day sent heavy reinforcements to the Dixmude region, where they are battling desperately to drive the French and British from the canal dykes.

**ENEMY'S ATTACKS BEING REPULSED.**

PARIS, Nov. 18. The following official statement was given out in Paris this afternoon: Yesterday, Nov. 17, passed much as did the day before. There were numerous artillery exchanges, and some isolated attacks on the part of the enemy's infantry, all of which were repulsed. From the North Sea the Ypres front was subjected to fairly active bombardment, particularly at Nieuport and to the east and south of Ypres near Bixchoote. Zouaves, charging with the bayonet, brilliantly took possession of a forest which had been disputed between the enemy and ourselves for three days. To the south of Ypres an offensive movement on the part of the enemy's infantry was repulsed by our troops. The English army also maintained the front. From Arras to the Oise, there is nothing new to report. In the region of Croismare, our artillery on several occasions secured advantage over the batteries of the enemy. The bombardment of Rheims has continued; from Rheims to the Argonne there is nothing new to report. In the region of St. Mihiel, in spite of counter attacks by the Germans, we have retained in our possession the western part of the village of Chauvoneura in Alsace. Landwehr battalions sent into the region of Salins

**VIOLENT CANNONADING.**

PARIS, Nov. 18.-(Official.) To-day has been marked with a violent and almost uninterrupted cannonade on our front. In the north, in the region of St. Mihiel the Germans have blown up the west part of Chauvincourt, which they had mined. There is nothing to report from other parts on the front.

**GERMAN OFFICIAL.**

BERLIN, Nov. 18.-(Official.) Fighting in West Flanders continues. The situation, on the whole, is unchanged. In the forest of Argonne our attacks continue successfully. French sorties, south of Verdun, were repulsed. An attack was made against our forces, which had moved forward on the western bank of the river Meuse, near St. Mihiel, and although it was originally successful for the enemy, it broke down completely later on. Our attack to the southeast of Clirey compelled the French to surrender some of their positions. Chateau Chatellen was stormed and taken by our troops.

**NAVAL CASUALTIES.**

LONDON, Nov. 18. The First Lord of the Admiralty stated in the Commons to-day, in reply to a question, that the total British naval casualties to date were: Officers killed, 222; wounded, 37; missing, 5; men killed, 3,455; wounded, 428; missing, one. This list, he said, did not include the missing officers and men in the Royal Naval Division at Antwerp and on the British cruiser Good Hope, sunk off the coast of Chili, which totalled 1,000 and 875 respectively.

**WILL ACT ON INSTRUCTIONS.**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18. Secretary Daniels, late to-day, called the commanders of the cruisers Tennessee and North Carolina to act only on instructions from Washington, and to take no steps which might be calculated to embarrass the U. S. Government.

**PRaise FOR JAPANESE.**

NEW YORK, Nov. 18. The East and West News Bureau to-day made public the following cable from Tokio: Captain Meyer Waldock, formerly Governor of Tsing Tau which was brought yesterday to Fukuoka, where there is a station for keeping prisoners. Fukuoka is a port in Kishika, the southernmost island of Japan. After expressing gratitude for the honor conferred upon him by the Japanese Emperor in allowing him to wear his sword, he said what led Germany to fortify Tsing Tau was, aside from providing itself against attack of China, the presumption

tion that some day Tsing Tau might face an enemy, England, France or Russia. We never dreamed, he said, that we should ever fight with Japan. There is nothing but praise for the marksmanship of Japanese gunners of heavy artillery, shrewdness of scouts, skill shown in entrenchments of Japanese troops, although there is much room for improvement in the marksmanship of the Japanese infantry. Their hurricane-like assault is unequalled by the infantry of other nations.

**AWAITING INTERNMENT.**

ASCOT, England, Nov. 19. Covered with the Union Jack and with his khaki hat and sword upon it, the coffin containing the body of Field Marshal Lord Roberts of Kandahar, now lies in a small room in his modest residence here, in which the great soldier was wont to conduct family prayers and in which there is a small altar and crucifix. The coffin arrived from Fikstone by special train yesterday afternoon. The ceremony which followed was of most simple description. The coffin was borne by employees of the late Field Marshal's estate, to his house, where a brief service, attended by Lord Roberts and daughters and a few privileged friends, was conducted by the Rector of Ascot.

### Why German Officer is Servicing Life Term.

London, Nov. 12.—The Chronicle today describes the nature of the offense of Lieutenant Mors, a German officer, who recently was imprisoned for life, for espionage.

Mors was despatched to Egypt, five years ago, and succeeded in being appointed a Lieutenant in the Egyptian gendarmes. His real mission, according to the Chronicle, was to foment a local rebellion, among the various Nationalist princes, and to get them to agree to assist him. When war broke out he was recalled to Germany and was sent back to Egypt, in a fortnight, as medically unfit for military service, but actually to blow up a steamship in the Suez Canal and to block the passage of reinforcements from India and Australia.

Major General Sir John Maxwell, commander of the British forces in Egypt, heard of the plot and had Mors arrested. In his possession were splendid maps of the Suez Canal and instructions how to sink vessels there.

Two dynamite bombs were found in his lodgings. At his trial, according to the Chronicle, Mors confessed that he received \$5,000 for the work. He gave a list of his associates and they have been arrested.

### Dark Days.

The man who's fond of jolly peace is sad and out of humor, for he can nowa-days find release from war and warlike rumor. When he has chewed his middy greens, he settles down to reading, but finds that all the magazines are full of nations bleeding. And every book he comes across but rends his heart asunder, describing death and total loss, and scenes of blood and thunder. On Sunday to the church he goes, far more depressed than skittish, to hear the pastor analyze the Germans and the British. He drifts into the butchers' store, to buy some potted gauds, and there the dealer talks of gore, and roasts the French commanders. He seeks a refuge at the club, but leaves again despairing, for there he finds a noisy dub describing Russian daring. In vain he tries to find a gent who'll talk of income taxes; the people's energy is spent discussing battle-axes. And even at home, where he would rest, he's worried by his daughter: "Dad, please explain," she makes request, "the cause of all this slaughter." And so it goes, by day and night, his worries chafe and fret him; he'd fain forget that famous fight, but people will not let him.

### Germany's Real Object.

All previous German explanations to the effect that Germany was forced into the war to resist the "Slav menace" may now be disowned. England would have been justified in going to war, even without the excuse of the violation of Belgian neutrality, for undoubtedly she had a strong suspicion of Germany's real "object" from the beginning.
