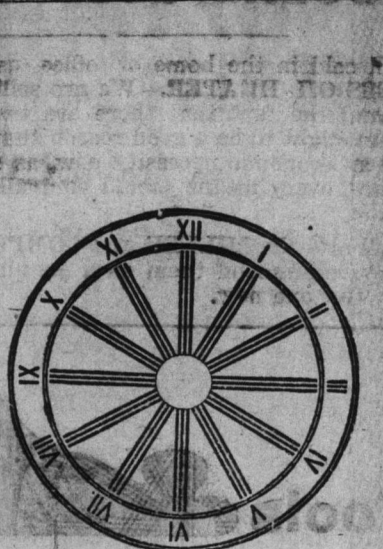

"You would have chosen to break your arm?" said Norah, scarcely knowing what she said, but trying to speak banteringly and make light of his words.

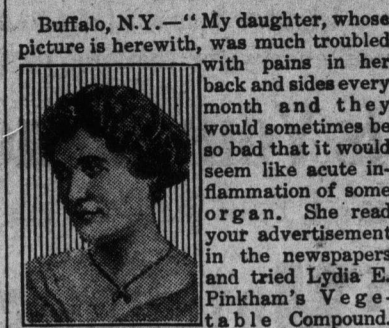
"No, I should have chosen to be of some slight service to you," he answered in a low voice. "Do you know what it is that makes me happy?"

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

#### RETREAT OF BULGARIANS.

BUCHAREST, Nov. 9. The Bulgarians are retreating along the whole front of the province of Dobruja, according to a semi-official statement issued here to-day. As the Bulgarians withdraw, the statement says, they are burning Roumanian villages. The Germans' claim of prisoners captured from the Roumanians between October 1st and 24th, the statement adds, is exaggerated. In comparison it is claimed the exact figures of Austro-Germans taken by the Roumanians in the same period were 5,322. The Roumanians also captured 24 cannon, eighty-eight machine guns, as well as much booty.

#### ADVANCING ON TRIESTE.

LONDON, Nov. 9. The special correspondent of the Times at Italian army headquarters telegraphs as follows: Friday's operations in the drive on Trieste, though less spectacular than those of the previous two days, were of tactical importance because of the occupation of the lower hills. Between the Wipac and the northern rampart of the Carso plateau the advance of the 11th Corps was extended to cover a front of more than three miles, and the position of Faltheyb was strengthened against counter attacks. In losing Faltheyb the Austrians suffered a serious blow. An Austrian colonel taken prisoner in the September offensive said nothing mattered as long as Faltheyb was held. Its loss was certainly serious as the point dominates Ostagnavizza on the Carso and its network of roads, and the main road from Ranzano to the Carso positions. Possibilities even more important than the actual achievements suggest themselves at this intensely interesting movement. Meanwhile, however, the weather has broken and the rain is falling heavily.

#### NOTHING IMPORTANT ON SOMME FRONT.

PARIS, Nov. 9. No action of importance occurred on the Somme front to-day, says the war office. The bombardment by the Germans was violent in the Douaumont-Vaux sector on the Verdun front.

#### OPERATIONS IN NORTHERN FRANCE.

LONDON, Nov. 9. Concerning military operations on the battle front in Northern France the British official issued this evening, says: This morning we discharged gas east of Armentieres and bombarded the enemy's trench. Elsewhere there was nothing to report.

#### HOLLWEG'S ANNOUNCEMENT.

BERLIN, Nov. 9. Chancellor Von Bethmann Hollweg announced to-day that after the ending of the war Germany would cooperate in an endeavour to find practical means for procuring a lasting peace by means of an international league. Referring to the question of an international league for the preservation of peace, he said: "We never concealed our doubts whether peace would be guaranteed permanently by international organizations, such as arbitration courts. I shall not discuss the theoretical aspects of the problem in this place, but from the standpoints of matters of fact we now, and in places must define our position with regard to this question. If at and after the end of the war the world will only become fully conscious of the horrifying destruction of life and property, through the whole of humanity there will ring out a cry for peaceful arrangements and understandings, which as far as in human power, will avoid such a monstrous catastrophe. This cry will be so powerful and so justified that it must lead to some result."

#### FLYER MISSING.

LONDON, Nov. 9. Baron Lucas, of Cradwell, a member of the Royal Flying Corps, formerly Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for War, has either been captured by the Germans or killed on the French battlefield, according to the Evening Star. Lord Lucas was reconnoitering over the German lines in France in an aeroplane, the newspaper says, and was obliged to descend behind the German lines owing to a gale.

#### KILLED IN BATTLE.

BERLIN, Nov. 9. Prince Henry of Bavaria, nephew of King Louis, and commander of a battalion of the King's Own Infantry, has been killed in battle. The Prince's mother has gone to the front to bring back the body of her only child.

#### Your Boys and Girls.

As a rule babies are fed too often after the first year, and too great a variety of food, and with too little milk. The secret of successful feeding throughout childhood is to keep largely to a milk diet. By the beginning of the second year a child should be allowed other food than milk, and fed with a spoon.

#### The child should, at this period, be receiving five feedings a day or from eight to ten ounces of milk or some modification of milk, that is feeding at six and ten a.m. and one, five and nine p.m.

This is the time that many mothers think they must give the child something to chew because it has some teeth. The six incisor teeth, however, which the child usually has at this

#### age, are not chewing teeth and it is not until six to nine months later that a child is supplied with teeth intended to grind food into small particles.

**Wanted--A Correspondent.**

Gallipoli - Beaumont Hamel - Eaucourt l'Abbaye? It is a pity we are compelled thus to surmise the exact scene of the third great episode in the now brilliant career of the Newfoundland Regiment. From all accounts that we have received it must have been somewhere in the neighbourhood of the village of Eaucourt l'Abbaye, or Fiers, and no doubt we shall know definite facts very soon. But the matter, small as it is, suggests strongly a need that has time and again been felt in the past and will continue to be felt more insistently as time goes on. It is that of a correspondent or of one who, if he does not deserve that title in its full sense, may be enabled to follow, on the field and at the time, the doings of our men, connect and arrange them and give to us and to the world a worthy record of their great deeds.

For there can be no doubt that their deeds have been great, far greater than most of us imagine. Out of justice to themselves and our posterity they should be known in all the fulness of detail possible. It is not enough to collect long columns of disconnected fragments from survivors, who have had more to think about at the time than the compilation of history. It may perhaps be possible to tell the whole story some day of the quiet heroism and endurance at Gallipoli and the efficient service that won for the little remnant of the Regiment the high honor of holding last of all the lines at Anzac Cove; but we doubt it. From the actors themselves it is hard to learn much, for they are a modest lot, and time blunts and effaces memories once vivid. And what shall be said of the more glorious and more tragic Beaumont Hamel? Even if we can piece together the fragmentary narratives that have reached us or been brought back, not one title of the heroic tale is told. And what is true of all the parts is also true of the whole, and a complete, consistent and consecutive account of the part played by the Regiment has yet to be written.

News is now reaching us of the last engagement our men have figured in,

which suggests that it was equally creditable with Beaumont Hamel and far more successful and interesting. We give below an extract from a Newfoundland (who wishes to remain anonymous) serving with the Royal Engineers, who was able to witness some of the work of the Newfoundland Regiment. His brief reference is the first intimation we have had of one feat (and there were probably several) which should send a thrill of pride through the country. Successful in attaining their own objective, but finding the battalion on their left driven back, they extended their line, a sufficiently creditable performance, and what is more, "They held on!"

It will be a great pity indeed if all these things do not receive the treatment they merit. We cannot know too much about the Regiment. Would it be impossible to assign one or two of their number, capable of the task, to the duty of making a record of all that is done, of giving at least the bare chronicle of the Regiment's achievements and sending home now and then something, on a small scale, like the despatches of Philip Gibbs and Beach Thomas which have carried to Britons everywhere matter for pride and source of their grief and affliction? Not merely would this greatly stimulate recruiting and fill an immediate need, but the material so collected would be of inestimable value to the historian after the war. For it will be disgraceful indeed if no historian there be, through lack of such material, sits idly and in all their fullness to hand down to generations to come the story of our soldiers and their gallant deeds.

The extract to which we have referred is as follows:—

"Since coming out here as an R. E. we have been in the very thick of things. We have been in the whole of the second part of this huge strafe, and take it from me this has eclipsed all other shows. I watched the Guards take Guiney and then Les Boulets; believe me it was a great sight. They were on our left and it went like clock work. You could see the skirmishing line advancing and clearing as they went. Then the supports moving up in small columns of fours and passing through the Barrage. It was with them as if on parade. They are magnificent, our Guards. Some time ago was offered a full Lieutenantcy in the Coldstreams but the cash to keep up with them was not forthcoming. The honor, however, was something I never expected to have paid me when I became a soldier."

"A few days ago I met by accident our Boys. They had just finished a show on our left. They did marvelously well. They reached their objective, but the battalion on their left was driven in. They then extended

to the left and held as much as they could of the others' place. What is more they held on. They have made a great reputation and must now live up to it.

"Poor old Jack Mitchell has finished his work, and did so in a great piece of work. He was a splendid soldier, a great Company C.O., but such is this bloody business. I wrote his mother and hope she has received it ere this."

**Citizens' Committee**

Drop Income Tax as it is understood the Government Will Apply Same to the Whole Country.

Mr. A. Soper, Chairman of the Citizens' Committee, presided at the meeting held in the Board of Trade Rooms last night.

The sub-committee appointed to consider the system of the income tax reported back to the committee as a whole and in view of the fact that it was the intention of the Government to institute a like measure for the country at large, it was decided to drop the matter lest the local tax should clash with the other.

Section 411 wherein it is stated that property owners and not tenants shall be liable to the Council for taxes to be fixed and established and imposed by the Council of so much per cent of the annual rental value of the said building, including therewith the rental value of the land on which the building is erected. The question then arose on how to overcome the difficulty of preventing landlords from raising their rents. In relation thereto a motion was put to the Chair that at the next night of meeting a section relative to the formation of a Board of Development between the landlord and tenant would be proposed.

The meeting adjourned at 10.30 o'clock.

Mr. Burt was severely cut about the head and hands and badly shaken up.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

**STEAMER SUNK.**  
LONDON, Nov. 9. The steamer Suffolk Coast, of Liverpool, 780 tons gross, has been sunk; crew saved.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 9.**  
The New York Tribune this morning publishes the following messages from Paris: Following the precedent set by the British Government, the French Government has deprived William Randolph Hearst and the International News Service of the use of the cable services between Paris and America. The order applies to all news channels under Hearst's control. The order was issued yesterday and today all the Hearst employees in Paris received notice to look for other positions.

**INSURANCE GOING UP.**  
NEW YORK, Nov. 9. Marie underwriters to-day advanced to 5 p.c. the war risk rate on American vessels in Mediterranean waters. This increase, resulting from submarine activity against one or more American ships, places the United States vessels on an equal war risk basis with other neutral craft in the Mediterranean zone. The rate on United States vessels there was formerly 2½ to 3 per cent.

**THE ARABIA'S PASSENGERS.**  
LONDON, Nov. 9. Of 437 passengers on the P. & O. Line steamer Arabia sunk in the Mediterranean by a submarine on Monday 198 landed at Malta and 84 at Port Said. This was announced in the official statement given out here to-day, which adds that although bad weather prevailed, all the passengers and crew were transferred to boats in twenty minutes.

**THE U. S. ELECTION.**  
LONG BEACH, Nov. 9. Messages received by Secretary Taft this evening convinced him that Wilson had carried New Hampshire and California, which on the basis of the States previously tabulated would give the President enough electoral votes. The New Hampshire message was from Senator Hallis who said that on the recent Wilson made no comment preferring to await the full count.

**New York, Nov. 9.**—If the result of the incomplete returns of Tuesday's balloting is accepted as final in all but five States, at noon to-day the electoral vote would give Wilson 251 and Hughes 243. The five doubtful States with their electoral votes are: California, 13; Minnesota, 12; New Mexico, 3; North Dakota, 5; New Hampshire, 4.

**Chicago, Nov. 9.**—Fred B. Lynch, Democratic National Committeeman from Minnesota, at noon to-day telephoned the Manager of the Western Democratic Headquarters that Minnesota had probably been carried for Hughes but that he had not given up hope.

**Helena, Montana, Nov. 9.**—Wilson carried Montana by approximately 20,000 plurality. Montana has adopted prohibition.

**New York, Nov. 9.**—The Senate will remain under Democratic control by a reduced majority of 10 or 12, dependent on the outcome in New Mexico, where Jones, Democrat, is maintaining a slight lead over Hubbell, nominated by the Republicans to succeed Catron. At this hour the Senate stands: Democratic, 53; Republicans, 42; one undecided.

**New York, Nov. 9.**—Chairman McCormack of the Democratic National Committee, announced late this afternoon that he had sent telegrams to all the Democratic States Chairmen in the country telling them to engage bands and buy red fire to celebrate to-night the election of Wilson.

**That Fine Humility.**

RUTH CAMERON

There are cer-  
tain qualities in  
men and women,  
manifestation of  
which sends  
queer, fine thrills  
through one.  
One is physical  
courage; another  
is the moral cour-  
age of one's con-  
victions; and an-  
other (and to me  
perhaps the great-  
est of all) is that  
splendid square-  
ness that hon-  
ors superiority even in rival.  
When two great tennis players  
shake hands after the tournament that  
has left one of them defeated, and the  
one who has lost looks the other in  
the eye, and says "The best man won,"  
I can feel a thrill so poignant that it  
is actually physical.  
One can even get this thrill by  
reading of great men who have held  
this high humility.

Can You Imagine Anything More  
Sportsmanlike?

Take, for instance, the case of Tur-  
genyev, the Russian writer. "Turgenev  
was famous all over the world when  
Tolstoy was practically unknown. Yet  
Turgenev himself considered Tolstoy  
his superior; and tried to make others  
realize it by sending Tolstoy's works  
to men of letters everywhere. When  
he lay dying he wrote to Tolstoy: "I  
write to tell you how happy I am to  
have been your contemporary."  
And yet even then he himself was  
still regarded as the greatest Russian  
writer!

I wonder if I have told you my  
favorite story of Thackeray. A young  
writer justified himself in some idio-  
matic expression that had been criti-  
cized by saying that Scott also used it.  
Whereupon Thackeray (who to me, at  
least, is infinitely greater than Scott)

replied, "It does not behoove either of  
us to compare ourselves with that  
great and good man."

And Scott Was Just As Humble.

Nor was Scott, himself, deficient in  
this fine humility. Far from it. He  
was a humble admirer of Jane Aus-  
ten's works and said that he could do  
"the big bow-wow strain himself" but  
could never produce such delicate  
and wonderfully accurate pictures as  
she.

Edwin Booth once said that a  
Christian was one who rejoiced in the  
superiority of a rival; and Professor  
Felps, to whom I am indebted for the  
quotation, comments, "If this be true,  
how few are they who will enter into  
the Kingdom of God."

Russia's Naval Surprise Packet.  
So far as naval power is concerned,  
there was no beligerent caught in  
such a state of unpreparedness as  
Russia, and the evolution of her pre-  
sent fighting fleet is little short of  
a marvel of organization and hard work.  
The struggle with Japan demon-  
strated to the full the inefficiency of  
the then Russian Navy, and the loss  
of many capital ships placed our ally  
in the position of the weakest power  
on the waters. The Duma—that great  
democratic and far-seeing parliament  
steadfastly refused to vote credit  
for naval purposes unless the old bat-  
tleships were cast aside.

**Ships Not Ready.**

The appointment of an Admiral to  
the portfolio of the Ministry of Marine  
fitted in with the Duma's plan for im-  
proving the Navy, and so well did he  
perform his work during the first year  
of office, that when he asked for  
£122,000,000 for a five-year ship-  
building programme, they granted it  
without a murmur of protest at the  
enormity of the sum.

War, however, came before the  
ships of the new programme were  
ready, and the experts at home looked  
for a swooping of the German High  
Seas Fleet upon the Baltic. But,  
gratefully to the surprise of the experts,  
Germany held back. The German  
operations, a Russian scouting squad-  
ron met a number of German cruisers  
simultaneously occupied, and immediately  
engaged them. The "little scrap" re-  
sulted in the loss of the Magdeburg,  
which was driven ashore in flames and  
wrecked, after the Russian guns had  
wasted the very life out of her.

The Germans profited by the lesson  
of this action, and for a full year were  
content to leave the domination of the  
Baltic to the Russians, trying their  
best to harass the ships by means of  
U-boats. When, however, the German  
Army was held up at Riga in the sum-

mer of 1915, a naval expedition was  
sent out to attack the town from the  
sea, and to clear the way for the sol-  
diers.

The expedition met with disaster  
straight away. The Albatross, a  
specially-designed minelayer, was sent  
ahead to lay her deadly eggs across  
the path an interfering Russian squad-  
ron might be likely to take, but be-  
fore she could reach her objective she  
was caught and sunk.

Since the war commenced Russia  
has completed four super-Dread-  
noughts—the Petropavlovski, Sevasto-  
pol, Gangut and Politava. Each of these  
ships can steam twenty-four knots  
under forced draught, and mounts 12  
12-inch guns, capable of being fired  
on either broadside. In addition to  
these she has either finished, or is  
completing, four of the most powerful  
battle-cruisers in the world. They  
were laid down at the end of 1912, and  
while capable of steaming at nearly  
thirty knots per hour, can bring a bat-  
tling weight of nine 14-inch guns to  
bear on a foe, besides smaller guns  
for dealing with torpedo attacks.

Destroyers have been added to the  
Russian Navy since the outbreak of  
war, and as these are all new-pattern  
boats, their steaming powers and ar-  
mament leave nothing to be desired.

With this brand-new, well-trained  
and determined Navy to face them, the  
Germans will think well before they  
again attack the Russian coast.

All these Russian ships are ready  
for fighting, besides others in the  
Black Sea, where three Dreadnoughts  
have been completed, each carrying a  
dozen 12-inch guns. They have  
proved their mettle against the Turk-  
ish ships, and their task has been ren-  
dered, all the easier by our com-  
mandeering, early in the war, two bat-  
tleships being built for Turkey in  
British yards.

The Russian Navy has more than  
surpassed all that could be expected  
of it, and has acquitted itself hand-  
somely.—Pearson's Weekly.

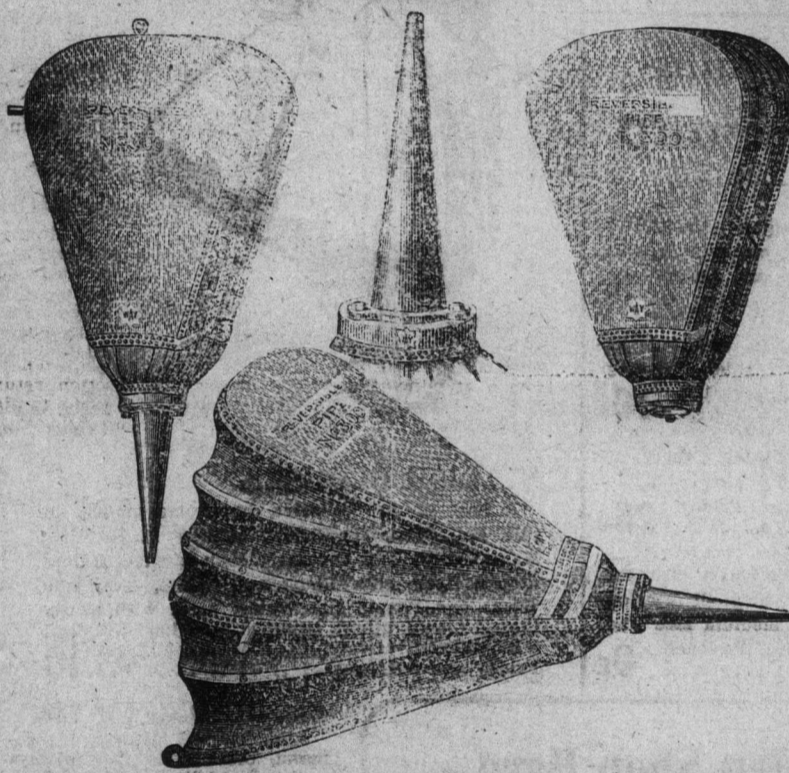

Given a Big Reception Yesterday on Retiring on Sick Furlough.



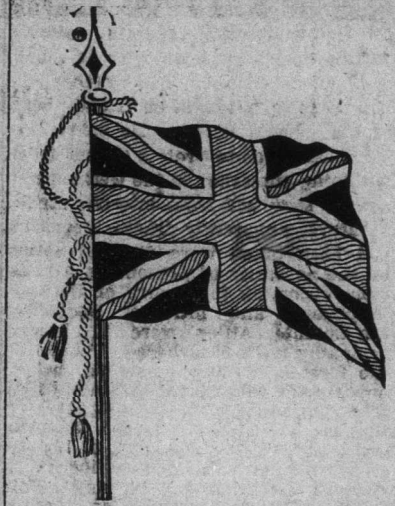
The cross-country express pulled in at the railway station at four o'clock yesterday afternoon and the rolling of drums, the blaring of bugles and the vociferous cheering from the vast crowd of citizens who assembled on the platform to welcome Major Macpherson, the gallant officer who had won honor for himself and Newfoundland, included in the number were: Lady Davidson, the Premier and Lady Morris, Sir Joseph and Lady Outerbridge, the Ladies' Reception Committee of the Patriotic Association, Mayor Goeling, R. G. Rendell, D. M. Baird, Dr. Fraser, Major Montgomerie with a guard of volunteers and bugle band. As Mrs. Macpherson, who accompanied her husband from England, stepped from the train, she was presented by Lady Davidson with a magnificent bouquet of beautiful flowers consisting chiefly of chrysanthemums and lilies. After the usual hand-shakes and hearty welcome from their numerous friends, the party proceeded to the front of the station, where the Premier in extending an official welcome to Major Macpherson, said: "On behalf of the Ladies' Reception Committee and the country at large we assemble here this afternoon to welcome you home and also to thank you for your services in the great war in which we are now engaged. Through the medium of the press and by private correspondence we were from time to time enabled to follow your career and we are glad to know your work was appreciated by the Army and those in authority who are best fitted to judge. Every person in our country should know that a great responsibility rests upon us, and should we in one moment slacken in our duty towards the Empire, it will be so much the worse should there come a day of reckoning. You have done your part and the welcome we extend to you today is a mark of appreciation of the valuable services you have rendered. We are also pleased to welcome Mrs. Macpherson who as Secretary of the Ladies' Patriotic Association, has, like her gallant husband, nobly done her part." Surgeon-Major Macpherson, in a brief speech thanked the Premier and the Ladies of the Reception Committee from the bottom of his heart, but soldier-like refrained from telling of his own experiences. He considered whatever services he had rendered the Empire was to him a great privilege and joy, and after his furlough had expired he hoped to be able to take up his work with as much vigor as when he left off. The last time he had heard the Premier address the boys it was at Pleasantville, when the first commissions in the Regiment were given. Sir Edward said to him, "I never realized till this moment they cannot all come back." In very touching words he spoke of the irreparable loss the Regiment had suffered in the death of Capt. A. O'Brien, who was not only a great favorite with his own soldiers but was also held in the highest esteem by the officers and men of other regiments. He referred to Captain Donnelly's unassuming quiet way, who in speaking of his experiences at Caribou Hill referred to it as a school boy would speak of a snow-ball match between two schools. Lieut. Cecil Clift was worshipped by his men, who say of him, "if we all had advanced as fast and straight as he did, we would be here now to tell the tale." Of Lieut. Stan Emsley, he said he was the organizing man of the regiment and at all times took a deep interest in the men under his care. With Lieut. Norris he was not so intimately acquainted, but he was told by those best fitted to know that like a true soldier he fought and died with his face to the foe. In the early days of the war, said the Major, the badge of the Midland Regiment was not known to many and barely recognized on the streets of London, but to-day a far different view of it is taken, and since the immortal charge of July 1st the badge is looked up to and honored by the millions of the world's greatest metropolis. Speaking of the boys in hospital he said they are a cheerful lot and the N.S.B. spirit which has become proverbial is everywhere in evidence. The organization of the whole medical service is a miracle of despatch and efficiency, not by any means an unfeeling machine but one which gives each individual careful and personal attention. On behalf of Mrs. Macpherson and himself he again expressed his gratitude for the right royal welcome the people of old St. John's had offered him. Major and Mrs. Macpherson were then taken in Mr. Harold Macpherson's motor car to Government House where they were heartily received by His Excellency and Lady Davidson.

Will Weaver and Nurses Parsons and Bradshaw, all N.S.B.s. After spending several months in the Greek country he was sent to Egypt and from there he

boarded a transport bound for England with a load of mules, arriving there about the end of September.

### Another Big Recruiting Meeting.

Headed by the T. A. Band, the Naval Reservists and Volunteers left the Court House at 7:40 last night and marched to the Seaman's Institute. From there they returned and marched west to Steer's Cove. Leaving there they returned to the Square in front of the Court House where some thousands of people assembled. Lieut. H. He strongly impressed on the minds of the young men standing around to go over to the recruiting camp on the opposite side of the street and put down their names, get in training and be ready to fill up the gaps made vacant by the men that had fallen. The next speaker was Mr. W. R. Howley, K.C., who like many others has to remain at home and do his best as best he can to help along the great cause. Water Pressure in City the Best Yet—Tends to Reduce Fire Insurance Rates Considerably.

Mayor Goeling presided at last night's weekly session of the Municipal Board. Councillor Brownrigg was absent through illness. In reply to Council's letter re tax of \$500 paid by contractor for the McDonald the Council gave their final answer that the contractors can seek redress at the courts. Permission was asked by Messrs. Clift and Pines to build house in Macklin Place for Wm. Ruxon. Referred to Engineer's report. Also C. Couch's complaint of a broken sewer in his yard on Gower Street. W. Taylor, South Side, complained of a pile of stones in front of his door. They belong to a city contractor who will be asked to remove them. The Engineer was instructed to enquire into R. T. McGrath's request for J. Grills to repair house Water Street West and also to install water and sewerage. Permission was granted Thomas Snelgrove, Battery Road, to build a porch on his residence. C. J. Fox, on behalf of the S. P. A., complained of the impassable condition of Long's Hill for animal traffic. Being attended to. Plans of proposed stable for Isnor Wilensky were referred to the Health Officer. The City Engineer's report was then read showing that several breaks had occurred in the water main during the week, but the work of repairs in each case was finished promptly and effectively. The report also stated that an automobile had collided with and carried away a hydrant on Garrison Hill. The hydrant, which was totally destroyed, was valued at \$60.00 and the motor car owner will be asked to make good that amount to the Council. 
