Which lives and cannot pass away.

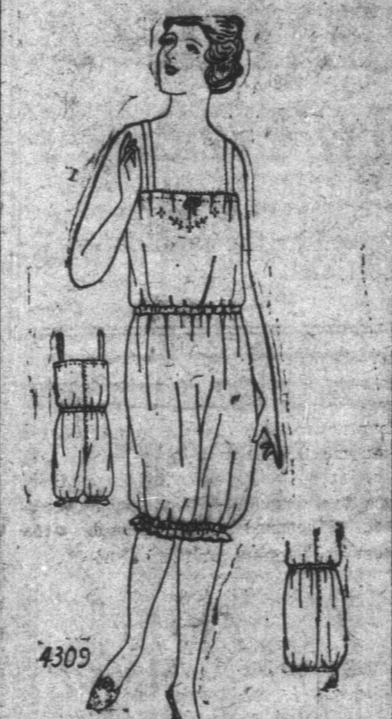
He shall hear with him to the last

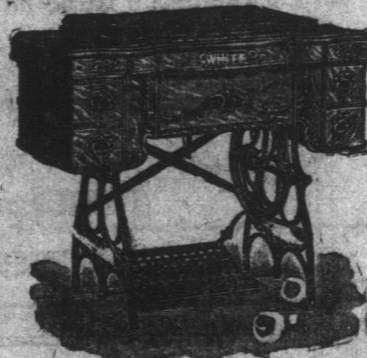

EARLY CABLES.

GLACE BAY COMMUNISTS PARADE

SYDNEY, May 1.

Twenty-five hundred persons, headed by standard bearers carrying a thirty foot red flag bearing the insignia and motto of Communism, walked to-day in Cape Breton's first organized May Day parade of workers at Glace Bay. Although enough miners remained on duty to produce about thirty per cent. of the normal output of coal and the majority of steel workers remained at their posts, a large body of workers rallied to the call for a May Day demonstration, and defied the drizzling rain that stopped just as the parade commenced at one o'clock this afternoon. Elaborate preparations were made by local and provincial police to guard against any disorder, but no untoward actions had been reported at a late hour this afternoon. The parade was notable in that a large number of women participated. Many banners were carried bearing the slogans of societies active in Russia and with their legends printed in Russian.

MINERS THREATEN.

SYDNEY, May 2.

Drastic action was promised unless Alex Howatt was admitted to Canada within the next twenty-four hours, in a resolution unanimously adopted by the Cape Breton miners and steel workers present at the May Day demonstration at Alexander Rink, Glace Bay, to-day. The resolution adopted by the meeting expressed unalterable hostility to capitalism, to John L. Lewis and Samuel Gompers on the ground that these men had become reactionaries and agents of bossism. Mayor D. W. Morrison of Glace Bay, created something of a sensation when he said he did not believe in the revolution in the popular sense of the word; he believed the legitimate aims of the worker could be gained through the machinery of the constitution. The International and Red Flag were sung. Dan Livingstone, President of the miners, made a plea for revolution and the rights of workers, "peaceable if we may, forcibly if we must." J. B. McLachlan, Miners' Secretary, said constitutional methods got the workers nowhere. Tom Bell, of the Maritime Labor Herald, spoke as an out and out exponent of revolution on the Soviet model. There was much dispute to-night as to the success or want of it of Cape Breton's first organized May Day celebration. Features of the parade were Russian banners and the Red flag.

LABOR LEADER AGAINST RADICALISM.

SPRINGHILL, N.S., May 1.

Van A. Bittner, International representative of the United Mine Workers of America, threw down the gauntlet to the so-called red radicals in his May Day speeches here, and repudiated any suggestion of affiliation, either sentimental or constitutional, of the mine workers with the destructive elements who threatened the liberation of labor by force. No long-haired Russian will ever tell me how to conduct myself, declared the speaker. He pointed out that District 26, was the only one, in the entire organization that had not obtained the 1921 wages and declared he would rather earn five dollars under the "Miner Workers' control than two-fifty under affiliation with the Red International.

FREDERICTON'S SITUATION.

FREDERICTON, N.B., May 1.

With the river still rising conditions at Fredericton are being watched with apprehension. At nine this morning the water was a little less than a foot below the high level of eighty seven and the city engineer said another foot would mean the cutting off of the town water supply pumping system. Chaotic conditions in many scattered districts make it hard to get information of a definite nature and the exact extent of the damage is still unknown. All C.N.R. bridges are said to be holding their positions but are in a precarious state. Fredericton is still isolated from outside points except by telegraph and telephone. The steel highway bridge at Marysville was shifted out of alignment last night by eight feet and foot passengers are crossing at their own risk. It is expected momentarily to give way entirely.

ONE LIFE LOST.

ST. JOHN, N.B., May 1.

The first loss of life as a result of the floods of the last few days was reported this morning from Musquash when Charles Spinney, one of three farmers who were forced to abandon their homes, and who returned to try and release his live stock, was carried away in the flood. The body was later recovered. The earthen dam forming the eastern wing of the west branch head dam of the N.B. Electric Power Commission went out during the night, resulting in one turbine being out of commission but leaving enough power to supply immediate needs. Three buildings were carried away or moved from foundations. The Canadian Pacific Railway was unable to-day to give any assurance when the schedule would be resumed. The flood took out the C.P.R. bridge and highway bridge across West Musquash and badly damaged more than a mile of the C.P.R. track on Musquash Marsh.

We take the above from a message written by Sir Robert to the city press early last year. We regret we cannot comply with the wishes of many friends of the old Liberal chieftain to republish same, but clip some paragraphs which in the main convey the sentiments of Sir Robert at the time of writing and which in our opinion would read the same to-day with the same spirit as it was read for the first time last year.
"In my boyhood days, as one walked down Water Street, about the beginning of the New Year, great wooden shutters were to be seen in front of the mercantile houses, and the entrance doors were padlocked, and outside them was affixed the notice "Stock Taking"—a silent intimation to the public that something serious was being conducted within that required the undivided attention of the proprietors.
I deem it not inexpedient at this time to urge its application to our political, our public affairs. If I understand the signs of the times aright they are ominous. The country's eyes ought to be opened to the writing on the wall, and no light which can be thrown upon them should be neglected nor should any evidence be ignored, much less suppressed.
It is necessary, I submit, without delay to a "Stock Taking" the preparation of a correct sheet so that we may know our country is solvent, or not. It is the prudent thing to do. I ask the readers of this paper to look back over past history, more profitable than theoretical glance will convince them that the little Colony of a quarter of a million inhabitants has been spending a vast sum of money in a most harassing; that it has attained to trappings that are as gaudy as the facts and figures which face, in the light of the positively wrong. 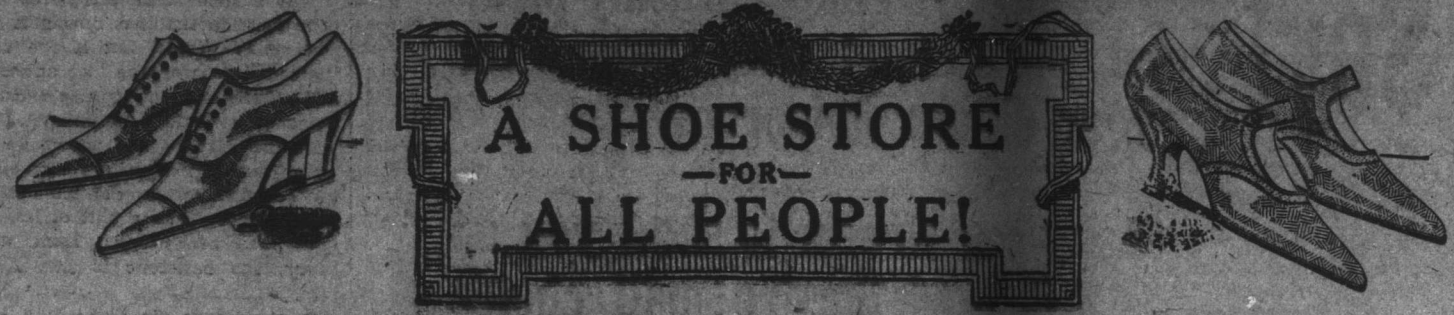

Martyr to Science Given Unique Honor.

Charles Valliant, celebrated doctor of La-Riboussiere hospital in Paris, with both sleeves hanging empty, but standing erect and undaunted by misfortune, has received an honor unique in history.

For the loss of both arms in the use of X-ray during the last twenty years, he was awarded the Croix de la Legion of Honor, a rare honor for a civilian other than the head of the State or a diplomat; the Carnegie

Hero Medal and the Gold Medal of the City of Paris.

General Aye Dubell, Grand Chancellor of the Legion of Honor, has awarded Dr. Valliant the Croix de la Legion of Honor.

Myron T. Herrick, United States Ambassador in Paris, conferred the Carnegie Medal.

The City of Paris medal, which is another rarely conferred honor, was presented by the president of the municipal council.

Dr. Valliant who has worked almost without respite for 25 years at La-Riboussiere Hospital, and who was one of the first French doctors to apply

himself exclusively to the use of X-rays, but lost the little finger of his right hand in 1915.

He was warned at that time that if he did not cease using the rays at once he would lose his whole hand. But he stuck to his work, and since then has undergone thirteen operations, losing finger after finger then his whole right hand, then the fingers of the left hand, and then the right arm to the shoulder, and finally the left to the elbow. The remainder of the left arm is sure to go later on. Then the cancer, produced by the use of the X-rays, will find a direct road to the heart.

Hailstones and Snowflakes.

Why it should hail instead of snow is a question that has no doubt puzzled many people, but if the uninitiated could examine a snowflake and a hailstone side by side a clue to the answer could be found.

In the case of the snowflake the water has turned into a number of tiny crystals, while the hailstone is nothing more than a ball of ice. The snow has been formed from water vapor, the hailstone is just frozen rain.

In the upper air there is a huge quantity of water vapor floating about. It is in the form of a colorless gas, and so long as the air does not become colder the water will stay as a vapor.

Air at a certain temperature can hold a certain amount of water in it in the form of water vapor. If the air becomes warmer it can hold more vapor, and if it becomes colder it cannot hold so much.

So, if the air, holding all the vapor it can, suddenly becomes colder, some of the water vapor in it has to be squeezed out in the form of drops of water. These fall to earth as rain.

If, when these drops of water have been squeezed out, there is a sudden rush of wind upwards, the raindrops will be blown up with it into the higher regions, where it is colder and the drops are frozen and form hailstones, which, directly the upward wind stops, fall to the ground.

Snowflakes form in a different way. If the air charged with water vapor falls to a temperature below zero, the water vapor will be squeezed out, not as water, but as ice, because the air is below freezing point. Ice that forms straight from vapor becomes tiny water crystals.

These crystals as they fall stick together and form snowflakes.

"King's Counsel."

The title of King's (or Queen's) Counsel originally meant exactly what it said, Counsel or adviser to the Sovereign, and Sir Francis Bacon, the first holder of the rank, in 1604 was appointed by the Crown in person, receiving forty pounds a year as a fee to retain his services.

Nowadays, however, the rank is honorary, and the Letters Patent by which the barrister is summoned to take his place within the bar as "learned in the law" are really granted on the instigation of the Lord Chancellor, and though in theory the Sovereign can oppose the appointment, the right has not been exercised for many years.

The appointment is for life, though it can be revealed in case of any scandal. The King's Counsel takes precedence in any court over the "junior," and invariably "leads" in a case. He may not appear at all without a junior counsel.

In times he is Counsel for the Crown, and to defend against the Crown he needs a license, which is, however, always given as a matter of form.

When a barrister thinks he has obtained sufficient seniority and credit in his profession, he usually applies, if he thinks his practice will benefit, to "take silk," in other words to become a K.C., whose gown is made of silk instead of the "stuff" of the junior.

His application is submitted to the Lord Chancellor, and almost invariably granted.

Atlantic Sea Lanes Are Choked With Ice.

Floating fields of ice, some of them two hundred and fifty square miles in size, with scores of icebergs, are menacing trans-Atlantic navigation, according to the report made in New York by Captain Peter Van Den Housel, of the Nieu Amsterdam, which arrived from Rotterdam and docked at Hoboken.

The captain warned all navigation to use the utmost caution. He called particular attention to the condition of the sea between longitude 42 and 50. In that section he passed many huge bergs and the fields of ice spread seemingly beyond the horizon. It was just such conditions that confronted the Titanic on its fatal voyage. He said he had wireless reports that in longitude 50 to 60 the same conditions existed.

Three days ago the captain received an S.O.S. call from the steamer West Helg, in trouble about 1,500 miles from New York. The liner was put about to race 300 miles to her assistance when a wireless was received from the lanoko, which was near the disabled ship.

Italy's House to Deal on Pact With Canada.

Word comes from Rome that the Italian Cabinet has decided to submit a bill to Parliament dealing with the adoption of the trade between Italy and Canada, which was signed in London last January.

The treaty between Canada and Italy was negotiated by Hon. W. S. Fielding, Canadian Minister of Finance, and Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and was tabled in the House of Com-

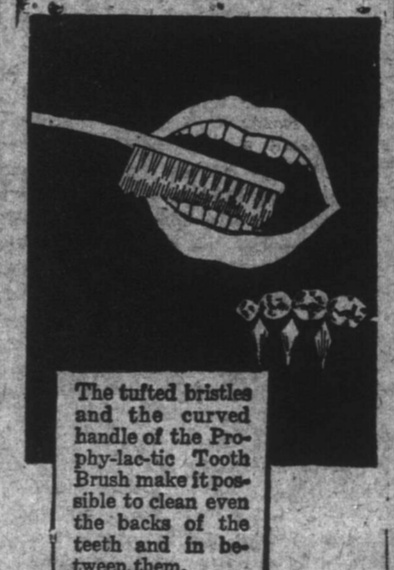

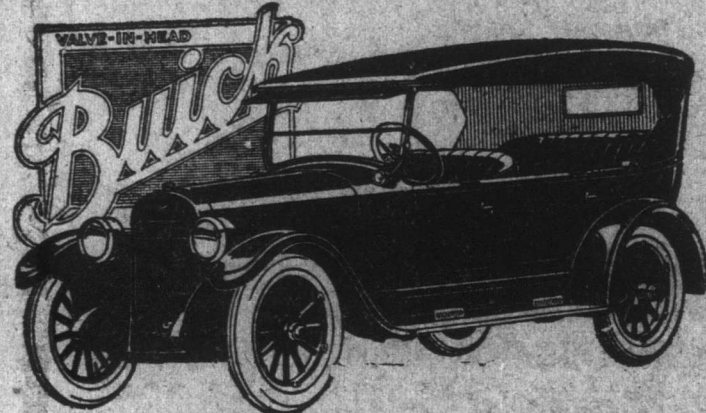

The Bells of Poland.

One of the strangest caravans ever seen has recently made its way from Russia into Poland. It consisted of 20 large waggons containing 1270 church bells, all of which had been taken from Poland by the Russian troops during the wars of the last few years and were now returned to their former owners by order of the Russian Government.

Their arrival in Warsaw was the occasion of great rejoicing, for many of the bells were of considerable historic interest, dating back to the fifteenth, sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, and it is a matter of much satisfaction that, in view of all the destruction that has occurred in recent years, these historic treasures should have escaped the mauling factory and not been melted down for brass.

Instead of booming out death and destruction, as they might have done, they will once again be able to ring out merry peals of joy and hope.

The Slavonic people, amongst whom both the Poles and the Russians are included, are the greatest bell-lovers in the world. Small village churches all over Poland and Poland possess bells that would do honor to an English Cathedral. As a country of bells, however, Russia easily ranks first, and some of the biggest bells in the world are found there.

The hanging of a bell in a town or village church has always been a great ceremony among the Slavs, and no doubt there will be scenes of great solemnity and rejoicing all over Poland when the 1270 returned bells are once again placed in position in their church towers.

Shoeblock to Cabinet Minister.

Mr. James J. Davis, Secretary of Labor in President Harding's Cabinet, gives some interesting personal details in a New York paper. He says: "When I was a boy in Sharon, Pennsylvania, I looked in a pool in the brook and discovered a lot of fish. I broke some branches of a tree, and with this I brushed the fish out of the pool."

"I sold them to a teamster for ten cents. With this I bought shoe blacking and a shoe brush and spent my Saturday blacking boots for travellers at the depot and the hotel."

Alluding to the fact that he is a Welshman, he said:

Bare Brick Walls 55 Centuries Old.

MOON GOD'S HAREM AT UR, BUILT 3600 B. C.

Brick walls believed to have been erected 55 centuries before the Christian era have been discovered among the ruins recently unearthed at Ur, the Chaldean city, according to a Baghdad dispatch to the London Times.

The correspondent quotes C. L. Woolley, leader of the archaeological expedition, as saying that the ruins comprise the temple of the moon god and his consort, part of which were brought to light in 1918.

The discoveries in that year, however, uncovered the bachelor quarters of the god, while the ruins now found are believed to have been his "harem."

The excavators also discovered in the inner room of the temple jewelry of the period of Nebuchadnezzar, who rebuilt the shrine in the sixth century, B.C., carefully preserving the original plan.

Many alabaster vases and inscribed door sockets have been found. One of the latter bears the inscription "Bursin."

Insulin Beaten by New Diabetes Cure.

DR. COLLIP DISCOVERS VALUABLE PROPERTIES IN VEGETABLES.

EDMONTON, April 17.—(Canadian Press)—That a cure for diabetes lies latent in green onion tops, barley roots sprouted again, green when leaves, bean tops, lettuce and various forms of yeast, has been demonstrated through a long series of experiments by Dr. James B. Collip, head of the Department of Bio-chemistry at the University of Alberta, and co-discoverer of the insulin treatment of diabetes with Drs. F. G. Banting, J. R. McLeod, and C. H. Best, at the University of Toronto, more than a year ago. The new discovery, it is stated, will supplant insulin. It will mean the final victory over diabetes.

Dr. Collip has discovered in these forms of plant life a new hormone, the extract which counteracts diabetes. This hormone acts somewhat similarly to insulin, although it is obtained from entirely different sources. Collip calls it "glucokinin."

The discovery is scientifically important as proving the presence of hormones in all sugar producing plants. Practically, it widens indefinitely the sources from which extracts containing insulin's properties may be obtained.

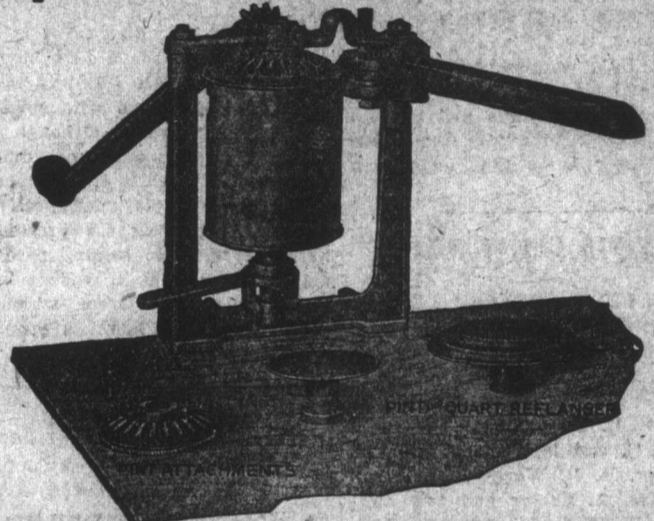
