#### Prince Edward Island.

Hon Messrs. Haythorne and Laird nad an audience with His Excellency the Governor-General, at Ottawa, on Monday, in reference to the Island of Prince Edward being admitted into the Union. In a few days some urther light may be thrown on the question. The issue is purely one o material business arrangement; the question upon which the negotiations ere before broken off will be the leading one now to be discussed. The land tenure of the Island is in an unsatisfactory state, the whole of the lands being held in large blocks the lands being held in large blocks by non-residents, who, through their unpracticable policy, make the condition of the holders, and their relation to the country, in effect not unlike the state of things created by the seignorial tenure of Lower Canada. About \$800,000, it is estimated, will be required to extinguish this objectionable tenure, after legislation to compel the proprietors to come to reasonable terms has been passed. The other point upon which an understanding must be arrived at is fursing the properties of the Island being wholly isolated from the Esland being wholly isolated from the extensive public works of the Dominion. No certipublic attention must be thoroughly · ployments and purposes. No certiicate for a license to retail intoxicating liquors of any kind in any tavern, alehouse, beer-house, place of publicentertainment or shop shall be granted to any applicant for such license corporated village, town or city within the Province of Ontario: and any for granting such certificate, passed or to be passed by any such two years. whatsoever. Any member of a Municipal Council voting for or issuing a Gines-At Gueleh, on the lath inst, the wif certificate may be imprisoned in the conference of Mr. P. If. Gibbs. Ontario Bank, of son. If any one becomes intoxicated the form liquor furnished him, where liquor is sold or disposed of, and whilst so intoxicated sustain injury, he may bring an action against those furnishing the intoxicating draught; and in case of death his representatives may bring an action against the person from whom he received the liquor. Any person, injured by one intoxicated shall not only have an action at law against the person doing the mischief but also against the vendor of the liquor. Relatives of a dunkard have the power to site thouse who supply him with liquor and may recover a sum of not more than \$5.00. Registered druggists may, by prescription from a duly licensed physician, sell intoxicating liquor for medical purposes only; the date of sade, name of the physician giving the prescription, name of the party purchasing such liquor, shall be entered in a book specially kept for the purpose: a weekly report of such transactions, under affidavit, duly signed and sworn to, must be sent to the Treasurer of the Province. Municipal Counciis shall appoint a detective officer at their first sitting in January off each year for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the act. The name of the informant giving information to the detective officer, shall be kept strictly secret by him. The County Attorney within the county in which the offence may have been committed shall attend to the prosecution of all cases committed to him by such detective officer or any other complainer. The act if senctioned, will go moto force on and after the first day of January next. When this bill comes up for its second reading the strength of the prohibitionists in the House will. no doubt, be fully tested. 


