A letter just received in this city, dated St. Michael's, Alaska, September 14, contains some interesting news, as follows:
"We left Seattle August 18 on the Humboldt, ticketed through to Dawson, which point we were billed to reach September 10, but we are still here building our steamer which is to take us up the Yukon. We expect to leave here on Saturday, and to make 100 miles per day. I hardly think we will reach Dawson this winter, but we feel quite sure of reaching Mynutte Creek, which is 1,000 during which this harvest must be miles from the mouth of the Yukon. There have been some very rich strikes made there in the last three or four weeks. We learn this from parties coming out. One ledge yields more \$2,000 to the ton, and quite a number of placer claims pay as high as \$7 to the placer claims pay as high as \$7 to the pan. There are about 1,500 people there now, so it must be quite a town.


