STEAMBOAT EXPLOSION.

THE RIVERDALE BLOWN UP AT NEW YORK YESTERDAY.

A Terrible Scene—Several Lives Lost and Many Persons Injured—The Cause Unknown—How Passengers were Rescued.

New York, Aug. 28.—It is reported that the steamer Riverdale has burst her boiler and sunk, over fifty lives being lost. The Riverdale belongs to Smith's line, which plies between New York and Havana, touching at Palisades, Yonkers, Dobbs Ferry, Tarrytown, Nyack, and Sing Sing.

Second dispatch: The Riverdale started at the Hudson on a trip to Riverdale at 3 o'clock with fifty passengers which she took aboard at Harrison street. When opposite Eleventh street the boilers exploded.

Third dispatch: Most of the passengers were residents of town along the Hudson and several New York people stopping at the Riverdale.

Fourth dispatch: From the best accounts obtained it seems that the explosion was caused by the boiler.
