\$75 DAMAGES FOR SLANDER.

Motion to Commit Rev. Dr. Sutherland for Contempt Dismissed—Yesterday's Legal Crisis From Quebec Mail.

Mr. Justice MacMahon has given judgment in the case of Stokes v. Simpson, an action for \$500 damages for slander, which he tried at the last Chatham Assizes without a jury. The plaintiff is the agent of the Canadian Press Company at Mer- lin in county of Kent and says that the defendant's husband and wife spoke slanders of him because the husband, Isaac E. Simpson did not receive an express parcel containing \$500. The learned judge finds that there was no privilege, as the slander was uttered to a person having no interest in the matter, and awards the plaintiff \$75 damages and full costs of suit. Mr. Matthew Wilson, Q.C. of Chatham, acted for plaintiff, Mr. Pegley, Q.C. of Chatham, and Mr. Gosnell, Q.C. of Mer- lin for defendants.

In Judge's Chambers on Friday there were looked after by Dr. Hoskin and Mr. F. W. Harcourt. The Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo Railway Company is under the direction of Mr. D'Arcy Tate or Hamilton, their solicitor, to pay upwards of \$50,000 into court as compensation to different persons for land taken for their roadway. In Robinson v. Wilson, which is an action against the Methodist Church and others to recover certain property which the plaintiff says the church obtained contrary to the mortmain statutes, Mr. R. G. Smythe moved for an order to commit the Rev. Dr. Sutherland, because he failed to attend for examination before a special examiner. Mr. W. E. Middleton appeared for the doctor and objected that the defendant Wilson, having died before the issue of the appointment to examine, the action had become abated and should have been revived before any judgment issued. Mr. Justice Meredith, who presided, upheld the objection and dismissed the motion with costs.

At the non-jury sittings Mr. Wallace Nesbitt for the plaintiffs asked for judgment in Hans Bros. v. White v. McKay. The plaintiffs claim to be sole proprietors of the lozenge "Frog in the Throat." The plaintiffs obtained a trade mark and charge that the defendant Wilson, having died before the issue of the appointment to examine, the action had become abated and should have been revived before any judgment issued. Mr. Justice Meredith, who presided, upheld the objection and dismissed the motion with costs.

The court then rose until Monday, Oct. 28, at 10 a.m., when Mr. Justice MacMahon will preside. The following are the peremptory list: Rose v. McLean, McCausland v. Hill, Webber v. Dixon, Plumb v. Imperial Loan Co., Anderson v. Wilson, Garfield v. Har- ris.

TESTING LOCOMOTIVE COAL. The Grand Trunk, Conducting a Series of Valuable Experiments.

An interesting experiment to test the coal which the G.T.R. company derives from various mines in Canada and the United States was begun yesterday on the line between Little York and Belleville. The engine being used in the test was specially constructed for the purpose in the G.T.R. shops at Montreal and is in charge of a selected officer. It carries 100 pounds of steam instead of the usual 150 pounds, and is expected to draw 26 cars, three more than the usual number, over the round trip of 216 miles, at a smaller expenditure of fuel than the 8 tons now burned away.
