\$5000 IN BOGUS \$1 BILLS,

A TORONTO COUNTERFEITING GANG UNDER ARREST.

A Sale of \$100 in Counterfeit Bills for \$30 Led to the First Capture-Plates for \$1 and \$2 Bills Found-\$4900 of the Queer Still Afloat.

A counterfeiting swindle of unusual pro-A counterfeiting swindle of unusual pro-portions and extent was yesterday unearth-ed by Detectives Davis, Porter and Dun-can. As a result of their work, David Cooper, barber, 142 York-street; W. Ja-Kramer, engraver, 17 Jordan-street; Johns Crawford, 834 College-street, and Thomas Smith, 257 Sackville-street, are under ar-rest at police headquarters, charged with forgery and uttering forged bank bills. For some time past the authorities were of the opinion that from some source in the city counterfeit §1 and §2 bills of a rather inferior quality were being struck off and circulated. One or two of the bills came under their notice, and every effort was made to trace them to their originators, and they were believed to be the work of an gang.

made to trace them to their originators, and they were believed to be the work of a gang. Three days ago Detectives Davis and Ports ter struck what looked like a promising clue. Both officers were detailed to the case. Yesterday they learned of a Queen-street west merchant having been approach-ed by a Guan who offered for sale \$100 hm \$1 bills. The merchant consented to assist the officers in their detection of the swin-dle, and entered into an agreement to pur-chase \$100 worth of the queer for \$30. Sold \$100 ha Bogus Bills for \$30. An appointment was made, in which the counterfeiter, who afterwards proved to be Cooper, agreed to dekyer the bills to the merchant at his store yesterday afternoon. Detectives Porter and Duncan concealed themselves in the store, and when Cooper had handed over the bills and taken the \$30 in good coin of the realm in exchange, they stepped out and arrested him. Coop-er protested that he was innocent of any intention of fraud, and claimed to be dis-posing of them for a met, who was at that time waiting for him in his storp at 142 York-street. Detective Porter marched Cooper off to headquarters, while Duncan went to the address given, where he found and arrested Smith, who was also taken to beadquarters. Each Accuses the Other. quite so much. To prate of one's loy-alty is unfortunately a colonial weak-ness. Mr. Hall Caine has shown deep insight when he looks beneath the surface, and discovers the reason of our loyalty to be that we are a self-governing people. In this province, we are scarcely more than a hundred years old, and have but little history of our own; yet before Canadian his-tory began, our forefathers, as well as his, had made the history of England glorious for ten centuries. Shake-speare is ours, and Milton is ours, and the Sovereign of England is ours, be-cause she is the Queen of this Do-minion, too. She is the symbol of the power and the rights and the liberties of the Canadian people. We use her name in administering jus-tice, in all executive acts of Govern-ment, and in the making of our laws. No wonder, then, that we are content-ed and loyal. Would it not be a pity to put a strain on that loyalty by an attempt to take away any of our self-govering nowers ?

"Gentlemen, the attitude of authors towards your Act of 1889 is very easily stated—we object to your claim to manufacture our books, whether we will or not, because the right of the author which ought to be sharted with the reader only would be divided with the printer also, who ought to be no party to the copyright contract. On grounds of natural law there is only one party to copyright, the author. The laws of nations have agreed to allow a second party to come in, the reader, who is granted limited rights on stringent terms. 
