



Overseers are requested to make a careful study of the Poor Law; a horses. copy of which is annexed hereto. The Provisions of The Poor Law are quite Dec. 1st, as follows:complex, and it is very necessary that Overseers should familiarize themselves therewith.

When an application is made for relief, the Overseer should at once ascertain the residence of the applicant. If chargeable to the Municipality, the party should be removed to the Alms House, in all cases where it is at all practicable. Outside help is limited by the vote of the Council to 50 cents per week; except in extraordinary cases. 


