This is apparent in nine out of erery ten rocal pieces republished in this country. ## Proor-Reading.

None but an authol can appreciate the importance of correct proof-reading: and may's the writer who has bad occasiva to regret the eypographical bluader that distorted or made rague bia otherwise meritoriouy effussori. It 18 doubtful if a writer lives, or over did live, who has not had such experience. No matter how careful the professional proof reader may be, be is bound to orerlook errors in his proof-sbeets. It may not bo in a misspelled word, which is the lesst olyectionable mastako that occurs. for the sense is gecerally preserred: nor way it bea misplaced cap or lower caso lether, zor ceen a "urong ron:.' for say and all of these will be ansanily detected by any proof resder. The great difficulty comes when a wrong word is introduced, either by the incorrest reading of cops bs the ispe-setuer, or hy the omiesion or addition of a letter, thus : the word band. by leat. ing out the $b$. becomes and. a properly npelled word. and band with the $d$ omaited mates ban: while band with tbe $n$ wanting coureys a bad ides of the suihor's intentiod. Now. rew proofresdera would note an error of this latier description, as not one in a bundred reads tis proof to get the sease of the matler before him, but merely runs orer the ooluma mechanically, and parses orer the mistake because it is $=$ righily apelled word. Of oouree some copy is bard to read. het as a rale any manuscript is liablo to meet with the same trouble. This is proved by the numerous prornking mastakes shat are mel with in cheap reproductions of foreign music, the price at which it in sofit reodenng the camminaticn of the proofa a matter of impossibilits. Even with the best Lalent in America 10 revine our proofshcets, we occasionally hare to make $n$ correction. Hormerer, our publications, both oopyright and repriots, are noted for their perfection

## Foreign versum Amorican Munic.

It will be a bright day for musical progress in Amerion when farr and adequato recoguition is meted out to the meritorious composers of our country by certain so-called musical periodicals of the United States. With unerring regularity are the works of forengn writers lauded to the okies, while with the same cortainty are all nativo productions, regardless of merft, sneered at, ridiculed and denounced ay crude attempts-and by whom? F'requently by a porson whose chef and only intorest lies to his weekly stipend. That these adverse criticisms are often made in the face of astorm of national appreoiation is too well. known to need any comment. In literature the case 18 entirely different. and instead of throwing cold water on dawning genius, most publishers givo encouragement whero sppears the alightest evidence of merit. And by what standard are these self-constituted arbitrators io be judgod? By whom are they tested? It is the cise of two westeru men who were about to bet; the question srose as to who should hold the stakes, but when that individual was found, the more momentous quegtion arose as to who was to bold the stakeholder. The whole system is wroug, and eriaces an anti-Anerican spint. It is a pity we have no National Muasc Cummittee to whom appeal could be made, and where decision on mooted musical merit would, in case of worth, offset unfair comments, the object of which seems to be the suppression of innical progress on this exide of the Atlantic

## Munic Prom Engraved Plates.

Thore is a vast difference between printing music from engraved plates and printing it from type. If you hare ever ernmiaed any music-and there are fer persons who hare not-you have noticed how rery black, clear aad well defined some of the music appeared: in fact, that the characters seemed to stand out from the paper in bold relief, and that the paper was heary and rendily stood on the music-rack wathout bending wath its own weight. Well, that was music printed from engrated plates. by the same process that steel ongrarings are printed. The other music that you observed, perhaps in a cheap music book, was printed in a grayish brown color, with bere and there a note or lino omited; the paper was thin and flimsy, entirely lacking the elegance and neatoess so apparent in the engrared rook: that was music printed from type, a method identical with that employed in priating a nerspaper. Now, the cost of producing plate-music. on account of tis being printed by band, is many times greatar than the cost of printing from type, get almost any muaician or teacher will readily pay the difforence, as plate music, on account of its clearness. is easier to play or sing from, and therefore less burtful to the eyes. Nes:ly all the sheet music, and many of the books contained in our calalogue, are priated from finols engrared plates, only the highest grade paper belag used. "ith music, as with evergthing else, the best is always the cheapes:'

## Patil and Jenny Lind.

"Patti's risit will always remain amemorable opisode in the bistors of music in this country. Jenoy Liad. many gears ago. created a great furore, but the muncal educcion of the Armerican people hat not then reathed the present state. An 'Echo Rong' or a hravara aria, executed with pyrotechac brillianey and orammented with giddy feats of voeshism bitherto considered impossible. was onough to arouse the wildest enthusiasm. It is do longer so. howerer Oberrant crntica and even mang artiats themselses find that the standard of musical taste is quite as high here as ta the old centres of nusic in Europe. The profound and universal dolight to Which the Ameisaus peopie in every city of the Unon which Patti has risited, hare been surred by her unpretentious and yet matchless art, best shows bow lofty a standard the musical judguent of this country bas attained. And we are not certain but that her rofined and subdued acting has had a great share in her success, accomplinhed against so many adrerse circun atances. Ia Traviala it was remarked that many of latis arcenes Fere worthy of the most finiahed actress. Fex great siagers hare had a more ririd sense of the dramatic propraeties of opera. That srififcial straining for extraragant tragical effect which bas beconc a kind of cast-iron tradition in opera, completely melts amay before the sound instinct of Patils soft and mellowed art. We believe that we interpret the feelinge of the American people correctiy when we refuse to bid Adel:ua lasti good-bge, hoping that herenfter the land of her girhish trumphs nhall aharo raore equally with the reet of the world the glories of her

For, beliere me, should Adam allow himself to be tempted by this particular Eve, the public would most assuredls undertake, with surprising spontaneity, the part of the serpent-at least as far as hissing is concerned' Disastrous precedent warns us against a reviral of so sinister a combination: wherefore I hastea to return your remarkable produc'ion, with erery assurance of my perfect coneideration. Adam."

## Madame Materna.

On being interviewed by a reporter as to her opinion of a concert in which she took part during the New York Music Festival, ebe anid:
"I can give you no betler idea of my opinion of the oonoert than by saging that rhen 1 was listening to it I said to myself, 'I wish Wagner himself were here to-day, that he might hear his music rendored so perfectly.' It was magnificent-grand So far as the orobestra was concerned, norling coull have been tiner. I hare sung parts of the "Sihelungen" concerts before. In Berhn and Vienna Wagaer rehearsed the orchestra most carefully, and that under such supervision the instrumentahste were nelr perfection is, of course, no matter for surprise. But tiat they should here wathout Wagnir so faithfully reproduce the effects which I hare myself beard Wagner studiously teach has musicians anmzes me The "Walkuerenritt" was simply perfect. It must bave surprised the people that l carried the notes of muste so identified with myself, and which 1 have so repeatodly sung. Do you know why I did this? Sinply to curb maself. I hope I succeeded, for I detest to be carried away by my dramatio fervor and make involuntary gestures upon the concert platiform The orchestra 80 inspired me that I could scarcely restran myself How I whould delight in showing the public -which has become so dear because it has been so kind to me at the concerts-what I can really do beat!"
"And is there no likelibood of that wash being realized!"
"I have had offers from Mr. Mapleson and othersoffers which my ountracts in Vienna alone prevent me from acceptiug. I hope, however, that I sball bo sble to arrange to come here to siag ou the operatic stage of New York in the spring of 1884 ."
"Will the Vienna opera allow you to absent yourself for such $z$ leagth of time?
"I bave four months' leare of absence annually. and bope that I may be granted a prolongation of this privilege sufficient to fill a seasou bere."

But in the whole firedays' ancumulation of atuff, we do not find ono composition by an American composer The musicians of this country aro ignored completely! Why abould they be, in a grest festival which is saipposed to be a representative musical eotortainment" Would it not be graceful and appropriate to put in a composition by some one of the several men who have been sirugging with marked abilty and originality agninst the storm of cierman music which has been blowing over the country ever since Thomas got bold of the elements? Is a musical festival oaly interesting hiatorically, bat Spontini and Cumarosa and Botticini and Bozzini and Trichinew sbculd have a place in it? Thomas, it is well known, does not believe in the development of A merican muste by the encouragement of American composers: He holds consistently to the doctrine that the best way to encourage musio in America is to ignore those who try to mate it, and secure as much glory as posoible for those who only mark the time of foreign compositions."
