After speaking of its value as a manure for wheat, and particularly for gross, he says .- I have also used the dust on loamy and intervale hand with the potato crop. During the series of years in which the rot almost ruined the potato crop, I scarcely los any potatoes from that cause, and I supposed it was owing to the coal dust I used.
