## CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

ontario.
Considering that there has been little spring weather to sumulate outdoor operations, the movement of lumber during the past week has been sausfactory. The oullook for expont business is promising, but it cannot be satd that the local trade is opening up very hopefully if we take as a criterion the building permits issued in the larger cities of Ontario. These show a falling off in comparison These show a falling of in comparison
with the same period of last year. The with the same period of last year. The
cause of this is found in the increased cost cause of this is found in the increased cost
of lumber and other building materials. This beang the case, it is satisfactory to learn that lumber prices are not only maintaining their streneth, but that in some instances slight advances have been made. In the Ottawa valley pine sidings are now quoted at from $\$ 35$ to $\$ 43$, and good strips from $\$ 27$ to $\$ 30$. Shipping good strips from $\$ 27$ to 50 Shipping
eull stock has also advanced about one dollar per thousand. The quotation for dollar per thousand. The quotation for
box culls is $\$ 12$ to $\$ 14$, while mill culls are quoted from $\$ 12.50$ to $\$ 16$. It is a strange concidence that the price of mill culls should be higher than that of box culls. There has been an exceptional demand in the Ottawa valley for both these srades, but particularly the former, and mill culls are being used by the box manufacturets where box culls were formerly employed. It is said that three inch mill culls which formerly brought about $\$ 7$ per thousand are now being purchased, for delivery during the coming season, at $\$ 10$. It is not expected, however, that these prices will rule throughout the entire season. Prices of dry lath are held as firmly as ever, although the quotation for lath to be cut this season is from $\$ 2$ to $\$ 2.50$ at the mill. But even this price is greatly in excess of the average quotation of last year. No changes have been made in bardwood quotations. Hemlock is selling moderately at satisfactory prices.
oURBEC AND NEW HKUNSWICK.
There is sull an abundance of snow in the castern provinces to permut of logging operations, and it seems likely that most of the logs cut will ieach the stieams. Altogether, the outlook for the season's sawing operations is more favorable than it was one month ago. More than the usual quantity of lumber will be shipped to the United States, as it is understood that boston dealers have already contracted for considerable stock. The demand for cedar shingles has fallen off lately. This has had an influence upon prices sener ally. Freight rates are a trifle easier. The rate from St. John to west coast of Ensland is 50 shillings, Rosario \$1I to \$iz, Buenos Ayres Sio to \$11, and Barbados $\$ 6$ to $\$ 6.50$. Coastwise freights have declined to $\$ 3$ to New York and $\$ 2.25$ to Boston.

## manitoba and britisit colvmbia.

Manufacturers and dealers report a nood enquiry for lumber, sales thus far being in advance of the business of last scason. The movenient of sashes, doors, etc., is very active for this season of the
year. A number of important buildings are projected in Winnipes, and in the rural municipalites the outlook is favorable. In British Columbia the lumber business is fairly active. The mining in. dustry is recovering and a good season is expected.

## unithi states.

There has been an increased movement of lumber during the past week, but as yet the spring demand has not presented itself. The teeling in the trade, however, is that there will be a considerable move The manufacuring demand for lumber is still holding out, and heavy construction material is moving moderately. It is not material is moving moderately, It is not expected that pucesgenerally will advance,
although on doors and mill work and white pine shop lumber it is predicted that there will be an advance within 30 days. Buffalo and Tonawanda dealers report a fair trade. The coarse stock has been nearly cleaned out of the market, and enquiries are beconung more numerous each day. Good lumber in all thicknesses is moving actively. Spruce is in nesses is moving actively. Spruce is in
a strong position, and the cut of the coma strong position, and the cut of the com-
ing season will no doubt be restricted by the unfavorable weather of the past winter. Hardwoods remain unchanged.

## forbign.

No important change in the British market can be recorded. Buying is still quiet, while prices are maintainıng their full strength. The reports of wood brokers give practically the same quotations as one month ago, although it can truly be said that pine and spruce, selling from the yards, is a litle higher. For broad first quality Quebec pine deals as lagh as $£ 28$ per standard has been paid, and indicauons point to even higher values. In Norway and Sweden the winter has not been tavorable for logging, fewer logs than usual have been taken out, and a restricted cut of lumber this year is expected. So it seems that nearly all the wood producing countries will be short in expott stock, as the home consumption is naturally catered to first. Prices of Baltic woods are so high that it isassisting the sale of spruce. A large quantuy is reported to have been sold for dehvery 10 a port on the norih east coast of England at an average of $£ 8$ ros. Auction sale prices have also kept up well. The Hawkesbury winter cut of pine, ex " Ramillies," sold at a tecent sale, brought $£ 25$ per standard, second quality $1815 s$, and the fourths broad $\mathcal{L} 155$. It is said, however, that the stock was by no means a good sample of the production, otherwise higher values would have ruled. Red pine, mostly odd sizes, realized $f, 11$ ss for $2 \times 9$, . 9 15s for $3 \times 7$, £ 10 for $2 \times 10$, and 25 for $2 \times 7$ unas. sorted. Square timber is moving moderately. George E. Jackson, of Buffalo, has sold 35,00 feet of pine for the new elevator to be built at Quebec by Chapman \& Co., of Buffalo. The order was filled from the Ottawa valley.
It is announced that the greatest norway pine producing point in the United States, Ashland and vicinity, will turn out probably 35 per cent. less than its norinal probat of pine, though increasing its ag. output of pine, though increasing its ag-
gregate lumber output by probably 25 per cent.
The tender of the McArthur Bros. Co., of Quebec, has been ngan accepted by the Admiralty authonties of Lundon, Eng., for timber. Foy, Morgan \& Co. are the brokers, and H. C. Watcot, of 17 Gracechurch street, E. C., is agent for the shippers.
The Michigan Hardwood Lumber Association, at a meeting held at Tiaverse City on March 8:h, decided upon the following prices for hemlock lumber: Short plece stuff, $\$ 10.50$; plece stuff 18 and 20 feet long, $\$ 11.50$; boards $\$ 12 ; 6$ and 8 feet merchantable, $\$ 8$; culls, short $\$ 6$, long $\$ 6.50$; boards $\$ 6$; hemlock bark, $\$ 6.75$ f. o. b. rail or vessel.
D. E. Sprague, of Winnipeg, has presented a clam to the city councal for $\$ 696.50$, being a chaige of $\$ 2$ on $3+8,015$ feer ot lumber delivered in excess of contract. The charge is based on the advance in puce of lumber since the contract was entered into, the prise at that time being $\$ 10$, as against $\$ 21$ at present.

## CONDITIONS in australia.

The nunthly timber report of Traser \& Co., Melbourac, thus reviews the Australian

supply from which we obtain our requirements. supply from which we ohtain our requiremente. on hand for many parts of the world, and as tonnage is not very plentiful at the presemt time, it is quite likely that we shall see higher rather than lower rates ruling during the greater portion of the presemt year. Up to now, our marke has not responded in regard o values as well as might have beenanticipated, for, although in some classes of impor lation better rates have been manifested, prices for other and more important descripions have remained stationary, while even slighty lower figures have been aceepted timn when we issued our last repont on the thth wht. We
are, however, of the opinion that the nex few months will show some improvement in yalues generaily, for there is no indication of a decline in shipping costs in the near flute, while it is quite possible higher prices will be required, and is will be lound necessary to bring local rates more in touch wath the increased laiddown prices as soon as these are shown. This year has obened very quietly in the timber trade, and though there is now more activity than in January, still buying is not at all on a large scale, which is no doubt explained by the high prices ruling, buyers seeming to be afraid to commit themselves too far. However, this fear seems to be weanng off, and buyers are now more inclined to aceept the fact that high prices are gong to be the rule this year. Deliveries from the yards are fairly satisfactory, and there is every evidence of the market being in a healthy condi. dence of the market being in a healthy condi. up contracts for neat season's delivery, and a fair amount of business has been done a: high prices, it is reported. This is the review of the Glasgow market offered by Messrs. Edmiston \& Mitchells, who say regarding prices:

Eins-A number of sales are reported at prices ranging from about as gd to 2 s tod for 45 and 50 feet average. The quantity in slock is not large and is very firmly held.
Birch-A few sales have been made during the past month at prices ranging from ts 7 d for 15 -inch up to 25 for $17 / \frac{1}{2}$-inch. The stock of Quebec timber on hand is now reduced to a very small compass. The demand is fair. sales mer fort birch there sed per cuvic foot on a hasis of 15 -inch, and the stock is now considerably reduced. Planks have been done at from $£ 55 \leqslant 10 \not \subset 9$ "ex quay."
Asn-The stock on hand is unusally low for this time of year, and, consequently there are no sales of imporiance to record. Value of $14 \%$-inch is about is 11 d to 25 , and 15 -inch $2 s$ to to 25 Id . There is a moderate demand only:
Deals-A satisfactory business has been done during the month, and deliveries from the various stores have been constiderable.

## the barbados market.

Of the Barbados lumber market Messrs. S. P. Musson, Son \& Co., in their circular of March 3rd, say :
We have had the "Mercedese" from Bellivean Cove, N. S., with 165 M . ft. spruce, which we placed at $\$ 20.50$ for shipping, $\$ 18.55$ for plank and $\$ 15$ for second quadity. The market is bare and next receipt will probably fetch similar rate. We continue our valuation of $\$ 23$ or thereabouts for first arrival of white pine. Shingles-A lot of $=75 \mathrm{M}$. laying cedar, ex "Tiber," has been sold mainly for export at $\$ 2.20$ to $\$ 2.25$. In pitch pine there has been three arrivals; two ordered cargoes, and we have had the "Wm. F. Campbell," from Wilmington, N. C., with ${ }^{150}$ M. ft., and have placed same at $\$ 26$, \$20 and \$18 for ist, end and 3 rd quality, respectively.
Since compiling the above, the "Gabricile" has arrived from Portiand, to our address, with $7,43^{8}$ bdls. shooks.
the ottawa valley.
(Cortespondence of the Canaba l.jumervian.) The lumber business in Ottawa at present is almost at a standstill. Scarcely anj shipping is being done, hat extensive operations in this drection will be resumed before the end of the month. Shippers have been notified that navigation will open on the lludson on the 26 th inst, and the large stock that has been wimered over in Ottawa will then be rushed by rail and water to New York, N1bany and other points for distribution by the American owners.
Operations on the limits are being carried forward satisfactorily, and the mill men have recovered most of the ground lost by the unfavorable weather of the early winter months. A feature of the work on the limits this season is the fact that some of the small mill owners are cuting hardwoods instead of pine as here-

demand for hardwoods coming from the A.serican buyers.

Although the supply of pine logs will lee a faity good one, the cut at the mills promises lis be consideably below the average. This is particularly tue in the case of deals, which in lormer seasons have been cut in large quanlities for the English market. The explanation of this change of front is seen in the nereased and higher prices ruling in the American market for board lumber, and more particularly the common grades. The mill onners, taking advantarge of this, are bidding or the trade, believing that it is going to be anything but a short lived one. However, hough prices have advanced materially, lumhermenstate that as wages and the cost of supples have aided in increasing the cost of manufacture, their profit will not be as great as would appear at first sight.
Almost all the Ottawa mill owners have sold their coming summer's cut. A conservatwe figure given by a leading lumberman shows the advance on last season's contract price to range from 16 to 20 per cent. IV.C.
