## ECLIPSES.

In the year 1848 there will be four Eclipses of the Sun, two of the Moon, and a Transit of Mercury.

I.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, March 5th, visible at Montreal, as follows:—

Begins,.....7h. 40m.)	} Mean time in the Morning
Greatest Phase, 8h. 21m.)	
Ends.....9h. 1m.)	

Duration of visibility, 1 hour 21 minutes. Magnitude of the Eclipse (Sun's diameter = 1) 0.26 on the southern limb.

II.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, March 19th, invisible at Montreal.

Conjunction in Right Ascension...4h. 22m.)	} Mean
Moon rises at time of last contact with dark shadow,..... 6h. 12m.)	

Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1) 1.601 on the northern limb.

III.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, April 3, invisible at Montreal. The mean time of conjunction in Right Ascension will be at 5h. 15m. evening. This Eclipse will be seen only from the Southern Ocean.

IV.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, August 28th, invisible at Montreal. Conjunction in Right Ascension at 3h. 14m., mean time in the evening.

V.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, September 12th and 13th, visible at Montreal, as follows:—

First contact with the Dark Shadow,...11 37.0 mean time in the evening of the 12th.

1st total immersion of the shadow, 0 35.3	} Mean time in morning of the 13th.
Middle of the Eclipse..... 1 24.7	
Last total immersion in the shadow, 2 14.1	
Last contact with the shadow,..... 3 12.4	

Duration of visibility 3 hours 35 minutes 24 seconds.  
 Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1) 1.702 on the southern limb.

VI.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, September 27th, invisible at Montreal. Mean time of conjunction in Right Ascension, 3 hours 38 minutes, in the morning. This Eclipse will be chiefly visible from the northern parts of Europe and Asia.

### Regulations and Rates.

1—All letters sent by post in Canada and other Provinces of British North America, are charged by weight

2—The scale of weight for charging postage is the same as that by which letters to and from the United Kingdom are charged, viz :—

For a Letter not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.....	1 Rate
Ditto ditto 1 oz.....	2 Rates
Ditto ditto 2 oz.....	4 Rates
Ditto ditto 3 oz.....	6 Rates

And so on, adding two rates for every additional ounce. After the first ounce, fractional parts are not noticed; thus, if a letter exceed 1 ounce, it becomes liable to four rates, and if it exceed 2 oz. six rates

4—Letters to and from the United Kingdom are subject to an uniform charge of 1s 4d currency, per half ounce; and on letters, *via the United States*, the provincial charge is an uniform rate of  $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. from any part of Canada to the frontier line, and  $2\frac{1}{2}$ d for every additional half ounce. This charge must be pre-paid, as also the American postage to the Atlantic port,—Boston or New York.

### Newspapers.

Colonial Newspapers, not exceeding 2 ounces, to or from any part of the British North American Provinces, pay one half penny, pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender.

If sent to any British Colony beyond sea, (not intended to pass through the United Kingdom), or to any foreign country, except the United States, one halfpenny, to be pre-paid.

If sent to any part of the United States—one penny—to be pre-paid.

Newspapers from the United States pay, on delivery, 1d Provincial, in addition to the United States postage.

Colonial Newspapers sent to the United Kingdom, or to any British Colony by way of England, and British newspapers from the United Kingdom to any part of Canada, are subject to a duty of one penny, each, to be paid on delivery.

With exception of these last, (which are not limited as to weight,) a newspaper to pass under the foregoing regulations, must not exceed 2 oz., otherwise it will be liable to pamphlet postage, i.e. one penny per ounce.

British Newspapers can be re-posted in Canada, subject to one half penny postage.

Supplements charged as distinct newspapers.

### Votes and Proceedings in Parliament,

If sent to the United Kingdom by packet, or to any part of British North America or British West Indies, one penny for every four ounces.

If intended to be sent to the United Kingdom by private ship,—double the above rates.

No packet or cover containing votes or Legislative proceedings, permitted to be sent through the Post, if exceeding six pounds weight.

### Pamphlets and other Publications,

If printed in the United Kingdom, British North America, or British West Indies, may be sent to any place in British North America, the United States, or British West Indies, at the reduced inland rate of one penny per ounce, in addition to sea postage, provided they do not exceed 16 ounces

If printed and mailed in the United States, they are liable on delivery in this Province to the same rate, of one penny per ounce; but if reposted in Canada, they are charged with full letter postage.

Newspapers, Pamphlets, Publications and Parliamentary Proceedings, must be sent without covers, or with covers open at the ends. If this is not done, or if there be any marks or writing on them besides the address, full letter postage will be charged.

Philosophical Apparatus, &c., imported for the use by any public Lecturer for the purpose of gain, and to be re-exported, shall be allowed to be entered under Bond of two good and sufficient persons for their exportation within the specified time.

Arms or Clothing which any contractor or contractors, Commissary, or Commissaries, shall import or bring into the Province for the use of Her Majesty's Army and Navy, or for the use of the Indian Nations in this Province: provided the duty otherwise payable would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

[The Native Produce and Manufactures of all or any such of the other British North American Colonies as shall admit the Native Produce and Manufactures of Canada free of duty, shall be entitled to exemption from duties under this Act, with the exception of Spirituous Liquors.]

## ALSO.

Salt, Salted or cured Meats, Flour, Biscuits, Molasses, Cordage, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Leather, Leatherware, Fishermen's Clothing, and Hosiery, Fishing Craft, Utensils and Instruments imported into the District of Gaspé from the United Kingdom or the Channel Islands or neighbouring Colonies for the use of the Fisheries carried on therein, subject to such regulations as the Principal Officer of Customs at the Port of Quebec shall make, and which he is hereby empowered to establish for the purpose of ascertaining that such articles are *bonâ fide* intended to be applied to the use of such Fisheries.

The following articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of Fifty pounds, together with forfeiture of the Parcel or Package of Goods in which the same shall be found :

**RULE**—*To convert Dollars at 5s. 1d. into Dollars at 5s.: Multiply by 61 and divide by 60;—and to convert Dollars at 5s. into Dollars at 5s. 1d.: Multiply by 60 and divide by 61.*

**VALUE OF COINS.**

The values assigned to the several coins by the Currency Act are not arbitrary, but are proportioned, (except in the case of British silver) to the quantity of pure gold or silver in each. The £ currency was and is equal to 4 dollars of account; and a note for 100 dollars, either in Upper or Lower Canada, is now, as it has always been, payable by £25 cy., in any coins equivalent by law to that sum. By the Currency Act the Provincial dollar of account is made equal in value to that of the United States.

The coins current by the Act are:—

British gold coins at the rate of £1 4s. 4d. cy. to £1 sterling. American Eagles, coined before 1st July, 1834, at £2 13s. 4d. cy.—Do. coined between 1st July, 1834, and 1st January, 1841, at £2 10s.—and at the same rates for Half Eagles, &c.

The above are a legal tender *by tale* if within 2 grains of full weight, deducting one half-penny currency for each half of a grain wanting.

British gold and American gold coined before 1834, at 94s. 10d. cy. per oz. Troy,—

American gold coined between 1834 and 1841 at 93s. cy. per oz. Troy,—

The Dollars of Spain, United States, Peru, Chili, Central America, States of South America, and of Mexico, coined before 1841, at 5s. 1d. cy., and half dollars at 2s. 6½d. cy.; Quarters at 1s. 3d.; Eighths at 7½d. and Sixteenths at 3½d, if legal weight,—the parts less than halves being a tender at the said rates *by tale* to the amount of £2 10s. in one payment, until they have lost one twenty-fifth of their weight, and not afterwards.

French 5 franc silver pieces, coined before 26th April, 1842, at 4s. 8d. each.

Copper Coins of the United Kingdom, (or any to be coined by Her Majesty, of not less than five sixths the weight of such coin) at their nominal rates.

The least legal weight of a sovereign is 5 dwts. 2½ grains—of an Eagle, coined before 1834, 11 dwts. 6 grs. —after 1834, 10 dwts 18 grains—of a Dollar, 17 dwts. 4 grains,—of a 5 franc piece, 16 dwts.

Close Carriage, or corresponding Winter vehicle, 60s. Four-wheeled Half covered Carriage, or do, 40s.—Double Dennett, &c. or do, 30s.—Gig, Caleche, or Spring Cart, or do, 20s.—Waggon or Vehicle not above specified, or winter vehicle, adapted for draught of two or more horses, 30s.

Dogs, 7s. 6d. each. [Sheltering, or permitting to resort, is keeping a dog.]

Theatres—an Annual Duty of £15 (above the assessment) on the proprietor.

Proprietor of Caravan of Wild Beasts, to obtain permission from His Worship the Mayor, and pay 10% therefor, and five dollars for each subsequent day that the same is open.

Proprietor or Proprietors of each Steam Ferry Boat plying from Laprairie—an Annual Duty of 100% cy.

Do. from Longueuil—an Annual Duty of 25% cy.

Banks or Bank Agencies,—Annual Duty of 50% cy.

Fire Insurance Companies or Agencies, do. 50% cy.

Brokers or Money Changers,—Annual Duty of 15%.

Distillers, or Agents of Distillers,—20 per cent. on the Rental of Business Premises.

Brewers, or Agents of Brewers,—15 per cent. on the Rental of Business Premises,

Ball Allies, Skittle Grounds, Nine-Pin Alleys,—an Annual Duty of 5%.

Brick Yards,—an Annual Duty of 5%.

Lumber Yards, having a Steam-mill connected therewith,—7% 10s per 100% on Rental.

Inspectors of Ashes, Lumber and Produce,—7% 10s. per 100% on Rental.

Lumber Merchants, Dealers in Wood, Merchant Tailors, Boot & Shoe Makers, Stone Cutters, Tinsmiths, Carpenters and Joiners Painters, Blacksmiths, Gun Makers or Gun Smiths, Confectioners, Coffee-house Keepers, Cabinet Makers, Upholsterers, Undertakers,

Dyers, Founderers; Ginger Beer, Root Beer or Spruce Beer Brewers; Soda Water Makers, Hair Dressers or Barbers, Ink or Blacking Manufacturers, Gold Smiths, Silver Smiths, Gold and Foil Beaters, Oil Cloth Manufacturers, Soap and Candle Manufacturers, Oil Manufacturers, Book-Binders, Cutlers, Gilders and Frame Makers, Pump and Block Makers, Wire Workers, Brush Makers, Chair Makers, Tobacconists, Coach and Carriage Makers, Comb Makers, Furriers, Hatters, Musical Instrument Makers, Nail Manufacturers, Millers, Organ Builders, Saddlers and Harness Makers, Tanners, and generally on all persons carrying on trade or manufactories within the City at the rate of 7l. 10s. per 100l. on rental.

### To be Collected by the Clerk of Bonsecours Market.

Each Carter, Cabman, &c. shall pay an Annual Duty to the Clerk of Bonsecours Market, for Enregistration and Number, as follows:—For every Cart, 15s.—Do. Caleche, 15s.—Do. Cab, whether two or four wheeled, 20s.—Do. Coach, drawn by two horses, 30s.—Do. Omnibus, 40s.—Certificate to every Master Carter, 1s.—Do. Driver, 6d.

The Clerk of Bonsecours Market also collects all Assessments leviable on all Horses and Vehicles for which Certificates of Registry are applied for, viz.:—On each Working Horse, for Assessment, annually, 12s. 6d.—Do. Two-wheeled Vehicle, for hire, 15s.—Do. Four wheeled do. do., 20s.—Each Stage Coach, Omnibus or Waggon, drawn by one or two horses, 40s.—Do. do. do. drawn by four or more horses, 60s.

Each Cart or Sleigh, drawn by one horse, conveying any kind of building materials into the City from the Banlieu, shall pay an annual duty of 5s. to the Clerk of Bonsecours Market, for enregistration and number: for each vehicle, under similar circumstances, drawn by two horses, 10s.; for each Waggon or other four-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two horses, 20s.



Brick-makers, Builders, or any person carting building materials in this City, shall pay an annual duty for registration, as follows:—For each two-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by one horse, 15s.—For each do. do. drawn by two horses, 20s.—For each Waggon or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two or more horses, 20s.

All Bakers, Brewers and Distillers, and their Agents, shall pay an Annual Duty for registration, as follows:—

For each Baker's two-wheeled vehicle, and corresponding sleigh, 40s.

For each Baker's Waggon, & corresponding sleigh, 60s

For each Brewer's or Distiller's two or four-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding sleigh, 60s.

Also, the Annual Assessment on all working horses employed in the said Business, at the rate of 12s 6d each.

The certificates of registry to be in force till the 1st of May, then next ensuing, without reference to the period of the year at which they shall have been granted.

All dealers in or vendors of Fire-wood, Logs or Timber, shall pay annually for registration as follows:—

For each two-wheeled vehicle, and corresponding sleigh, drawn by one horse, 20s.

For ditto, drawn by two horses, 30s.

For each Waggon, or corresponding sleigh, drawn by two or more horses, 35s.

## BY-LAW OF THE CITY COUNCIL,

TO REGULATE THE

### DUTIES OF MASTERS AND APPRENTICES AND HIRED AND INDENTED SERVANTS.

*Passed 7th October, 1847.*

*Section I.*—Repeals all former Regulations of Police respecting Apprentices and hired Servants.

*II.*—That any and all Apprentices or Servants, of either sex, or Journeymen bound by act of indenture or written contract or agreement, and all Servants of either sex, or Journeymen verbally engaged before one



or more witnesses for one month, or for any longer or shorter period, who shall be guilty of ill behaviour, refractory conduct, idleness, or of deserting from their service or duties, or of absenting themselves, by day or night, without leave, from their said service, or from the house or residence of their employers; or who shall refuse or neglect to perform their just duties, or to obey the lawful commands which shall be given them by their Masters or Mistresses, or who shall be guilty of any fault or misdemeanour in the service of their said Masters or Mistresses, or of any unlawful act that may affect the interest or disturb the domestic arrangements of their said Masters or Mistresses; or who shall be guilty of dissipating their Masters or Mistresses property or effects—shall be liable, upon conviction before the Mayor's Court of the said City of Montreal, or before any two Justices of the Peace for the said City of Montreal, to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds currency, and to an imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, for each and every offence.

III.—That every Domestic Servant, Journeyman, or Labourer, engaged for a fixed period, by the month or for a longer space of time, and not by the piece or job, who shall intend to quit the service in which he or she shall be during that time engaged, shall give, or cause to be given, notice of such intention, at least fifteen days before the expiration of such agreement. And if any of the said persons quit the service without giving such notice, (although the time thereof be expired,) he or she shall be considered as having deserted from the said service, and be punished accordingly; and every Master, Mistress or Employer, shall give to his or her Servants, Journeymen, or Labourers, like notice of his or her intention no longer to keep or employ them, after the expiration of their time of service: provided always, that every Domestic Servant, Journeyman, and Labourer, engaged for a time, may be discharged by his or her Master, Mistress, or Employer, at or before the expiration of his or her engagement, without notice, upon full payment of the wages which he or she would have

received for all the time of his or her service; if the time shall be expired, the person so discharged without notice, shall be entitled to wages for the full time included between the day when such notice should have been given, and the day of his or her discharge as aforesaid.

IV.—That any and every Domestic Servant, Journeyman, or Labourer, engaged as aforesaid, by the month, or longer space of time, or by the piece or job, who shall desert or abandon the service or job, for which he, she, or they shall have been engaged, before the time agreed upon, shall for each and every offence, be liable to a fine or penalty not exceeding five pounds currency, and to an imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

V.—That any and all persons, designedly harbouring or concealing any Apprentice or Servant, engaged by written act or agreement, who shall have abandoned the service of his or her Master or Mistresses, or instigating or engaging any Apprentice or Servant, to abandon such service, shall be liable to a fine or penalty not exceeding five pounds currency, and to an imprisonment not exceeding thirty days for each and every offence.

VI.—That any Apprentice, Domestic Servant, or Journeyman, bound or engaged as aforesaid, having any just cause of complaint against his or her Master, Mistress or Employer, for any misuse, defect or insufficiency of wholesome provisions or food, or for cruelty or ill treatment of any kind, may cause such Master or Mistress to be summoned and to appear before the said Mayor's Court, or before any two Justices of the Peace, for the said City of Montreal, to answer the complaint to be preferred against him, her, or them, by said Apprentice, Domestic, Servant, or Journeyman: and any and every Master or Mistress, convicted upon such complaint of any offence aforesaid, towards his, her, or their Apprentice, Domestic, Servant, or Journeyman, shall, upon each and every conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds currency, or to an imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

VII.—That upon complaint by any Master, Mistress, or Employer, against his, her, or their Apprentice, Servant or Journeyman, or by any Apprentice, Servant or Journeyman, against his, her, or their Master, Mistress or Employer, of continued misconduct or misusage, and of repeated violations of the ordinary and established duties of the parties, towards each other, the said Mayor's Court, or any two Justices of the Peace, of the said City of Montreal, at a special sitting, upon due proof of the facts, may annul the contract or agreement, whether written or verbal, by which such Master, Mistress or Employer, and such Apprentice, Servant or Journeyman, may be bound to each other.

The Tariff of Rates which Licensed Sweeps within the City of Montreal are allowed to charge is as follows:

Each chimney in use is required to be swept by licensed sweeps at least three times in the year,—once between 1st May and 1st November, and twice at intervals of at least two months apart, between 1st November and 1st May,—under a penalty of 25s. to 50s. In every case of a chimney taking fire, the occupant of the house is subject to the above penalty.
