

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

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#### ECLIPSES.

In the year 1848 there will be four Eclipses of the Sun, two of the Moon, and a Transit of Mercury.

I.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, March 5th, visible at Montreal, as follows:—

Begins,......7h. 40m.)

Greatest Phase, 8h. 21m. > Mean time in the Morning Ends......9h. 1m.)

Duration of visibility, 1 hour 21 minutes. Magnitude of the Eclipse (Sun's diameter = 1) 0.26 on the southern limb.

II.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, March 19th, invisible at Montreal.

Conjunction in Right Ascension...4h, 22m.) Moon rises at time of last contact Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1) 1.601

on the northern limb.

III.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, April 3, invisible at Montreal. The mean time of conjunction in Right Ascension will be at 5h. 15m. evening. This Eclipse will be seen only from the Southern Ocean.

IV.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, August 28th, invisible at Montreal. Conjunction in Right Ascension at

3h, 14m., mean time in the evening.

V.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, September 12th and 13th, visible at Montreal, as follows:—

First contact with the Dark Shadow,...11 37.0 mean

time in the evening of the 12th.

on the southern limb.

VI.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, September 27th, invisible at Montreal. Mean time of conjunction in Right Ascension, 3 hours 38 minutes, in the morning. This Eclipse will be chiefly visible from the northern parts of Europe and Asia.

2—The scale of weight for charging postage is the same as that by which letters to and from the

United Kingdom are charged, viz:-

Ditto ditto 2 oz.......4 Rates
Ditto ditto 3 oz.......6 Rates

And so on, adding two rates for every additional ounce. After the first ounce, fractional parts are not noticed; thus, if a letter exceed 1 ounce, it becomes liable to four rates, and if it exceed 2 oz. six rates

With exception of these last, (which are not limited as to weight,) a newspaper to pass under the foregoing regulations, must not exceed 2 oz., otherwise it will be liable to pamphlet postage, i.e.

one penny per ounce.

British Newspapers can be re-posted in Canada, subject to one half penny postage.

Supplements charged as distinct newspapers.

# Votes and Proceedings in Parliament,

If sent to the United Kingdom by packet, or to any part of British North America or British West Indies, one penny for every four ounces.

If intended to be sent to the United Kingdom by

private ship,—double the above rates.

No packet or cover containing votes or Legislative proceedings, permitted to be sent through the Post, if exceeding six pounds weight.

# Pamphlets and other Publications,

If printed in the United Kingdom, British North America, or British West Indies, may be sent to any place in British North America, the United States, or British West Indies, at the reduced inland rate of one penny per ounce, in addition to sea postage, provided they do not exceed 16 ounces If printed and mailed in the United States, they are liable on delivery in this Province to the same rate, of one penny per ounce; but it reposted in Canada, they are charged with full letter postage.

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Newspapers, Pamphlets, Publications and Parliamentary Proceedings, must be sent without covers, or with covers open at the ends. If this is not done, or if there be any marks or writing on them besides the address, full letter postage will be charged.

#### VALUE OF COINS.

The values assigned to the several coins by the Currency Act are not arbitrary, but are proportioned, (except in the case of British silver) to the quantity of pure gold or silver in each. The £ currency was and is equal to 4 dollars of account; and a note for 100 dollars, either in Upper or Lower Canada, is now, as it has always been, payable by £25 cy., in any coins equivalent by law to that sum. By the Currency Act the Provincial dollar of account is made equal in value to that of the United States.

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The coins current by the Act are:—

British gold coins at the rate of £1 4s. 4d. cv. to £1 sterling. American Eagles, coined before 1st July, 1834, at £2 13s. 4d. cy.—Do. coined between 1st July, 1834, and 1st January, 1841, at £2 10s.—and at the same rates for Half Eagles, &c.

Two-wheeled Vehicle, for hire, 15s.—Do. Four wheeled do. do., 20s.—Each Stage Coach, Omnibus or Waggon, drawn by one or two horses, 40s.—Do. do. do. drawn by four or more horses, 60s.

Each Cart or Sleigh, drawn by one horse, conveying any kind of building materials into the City from the Banlieu, shall pay an annual duty of 5s. to the Clerk of Bonsecours Market, for enregistration and number: for each vehicle, under similar circumstances, drawn by two horses, 10s.; for each Waggon or other four-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two horses, 20s.

Brick-makers, Builders, or any person carting building materials in this City, shall pay an annual duty for registration, as follows:—For each two-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by one horse, 15s.—For each do. do. drawn by two horses, 20s.—For each Waggon or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two or more horses, 20s.

All Bakers, Brewers and Distillers, and their Agents, shall pay an Annual Duty for registration, as follows:—

For each Baker's two-wheeled vehicle, and corres-

For each Baker's Waggon, & corresponding sleigh, 60s For each Brewer's or Distiller's two or four-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding sleigh, 60s.

Also, the Annual Assessment on all working horses employed in the said Business, at the rate of 12s 6d each.

The certificates of registry to be in force till the 1st of May, then next ensuing, without reference to the period of the year at which they shall have been granted.

All dealers in or vendors of Fire-wood, Logs or Timber, shall pay annually for registration as follows:—

For each two-wheeled vehicle, and corresponding sleigh, drawn by one horse, 20s.

For ditto, drawn by two horses, 30s.

For each Waggor, or corresponding sleigh, drawn by two or more horses, 35s.

#### BY-LAW OF THE CITY COUNCIL,

TO REGULATE THE

DUTIES OF MASTERS AND APPRENTICES AND HIRED AND INDENTED SERVANTS.

Passed 7th October, 1847.

Section L.—Repeals all former Regulations of Police

respecting Apprentices and hired Servants.

II.—That any and all Apprentices or Servants, of either sex, or Journeymen bound by act of indenture or written contract or agreement, and all Servants of either sex, or Journeymen verbally engaged before one

or more witnesses for one month, or for any longer or shorter period, who shall be guilty of ill behaviour, re. fractory conduct, idleness, or of descrting from their service or duties, or of absenting themselves, by day or night, without leave, from their said service, or from the house or residence of their employers; or who shall refuse or neglect to perform their just duties, or to obey the lawful commands which shall be given them by their Masters or Mistresses, or who shall be guilty of any fault or misdemeanour in the service of their said Mas. ters or Mistresses, or of any unlawful act that may affect the interest or disturb the domestic arrangements of their said Masters or Mistresses; or who shall be guilty of dissipating their Masters or Mistresses property or effects—shall be liable, upon conviction before the Mayor's Court of the said City of Montreal, or before any two Justices of the Peace for the said City of Montreal, to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds currency, and to an imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, for each and every offence.

III.—That every Domestic Servant, Journeyman, or Labourer, engaged for a fixed period, by the month or for a longer space of time, and not by the piece or job, who shall intend to guit the service in which he or she shall be during that time engaged, shall give, or cause to be given, notice of such intention, at least fifteen days before the expiration of such agreement. And if any of the said persons quit the service without giving such notice, (although the time thereof be expired.) he or she shall be considered as having deserted from the said service, and be punished accordingly; and every Master, Mistress or Employer, shall give to his or her Servant, Journeymen, or Labourers, like notice of his or her intention no longer to keep or employ them, after the expiration of their time of service: provided always, that every Domestic Servant, Journeyman, and Labourg engaged for a time, may be discharged by his or he Master, Mistress, or Employer, at or before the expiration of his or her engagement, without notice, upon full payment of the wages which he or she would have

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received for all the time of his or her service; if the time shall be expired, the person so discharged without notice, shall be entitled to wages for the full time included between the day when such notice should have been given, and the day of his or her discharge as aforesaid.

IV.—That any and every Domestic Servant, Journeyman, or Labourer, engaged as aforesaid, by the month, or longer space of time, or by the piece or job, who shall desert or abandon the service or job, for which he, she, or they shall have been engaged, before the time agreed upon, shall for each and every offence, be liable to a fine or penalty not exceeding five pounds currency, and to an imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

V.—That any and all persons, designedly harbouring or concealing any Apprentice or Servant, engaged by written act or agreement, who shall have abandoned the service of his or her Master or Mistresses, or instigating or engaging any Apprentice or Servant, to abandon such service, shall be liable to a fine or penalty not exceeding five pounds currency, and to an imprisonment not exceeding thirty days for each and every offence.

VI.—That any Apprentice, Domestic Servant, or Journeyman, bound or engaged as aforesaid, having any just cause of complaint against his or her Master, Misress or Employer, for any misusage, defect or insufficiency of wholesome provisions or food, or for cruelty brill treatment of any kind, may cause such Master or Mistress to be summoned and to appear before the said Mayor's Court, or before any two Justices of the Peace, or the said City of Montreal, to answer the complaint be preferred against him, her, or them, by said Apprentice, Domestic, Servant, or Journeyman: and any and every Master or Mistress, convicted upon such complaint of any offence aforesaid, towards his, her, or heir Apprentice, Domestic, Servant, or Journeyman. hall, upon each and every conviction, be liable to a enalty not exceeding five pounds currency, or to an mprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

VII.—That upon complaint by any Master, Mistress, or Employer, against his, her, or their Apprentice, Servant or Journeyman, or by any Apprentice, Servant or Journeyman, against his, her, or their Master, Mistress or Employer, of continued misconduct or misusage, and of repeated violations of the ordinary and established duties of the parties, towards each other, the said Mayor's Court, or any two Justices of the Peace, of the said City of Montreal, at a special sitting, upon due proof of the facts, may annul the contract or agreement, whether written or verbal, by which such Master, Mistress or Employer, and such Apprentice, Servant or Journeyman, may be bound to each other.

In every case of a chimney taking fire, the occupant of the house is subject to the above penalty.

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

