Dr. Norman Macleod of St. Anne de Bellevue is developing the idea of the "illness power of the spirit of God." The Rev. C. W. Sykes is leading a class on "The Will and Man's Work." The inspiration of prayer, licensing of where decisions must be made and made are the dominant things.

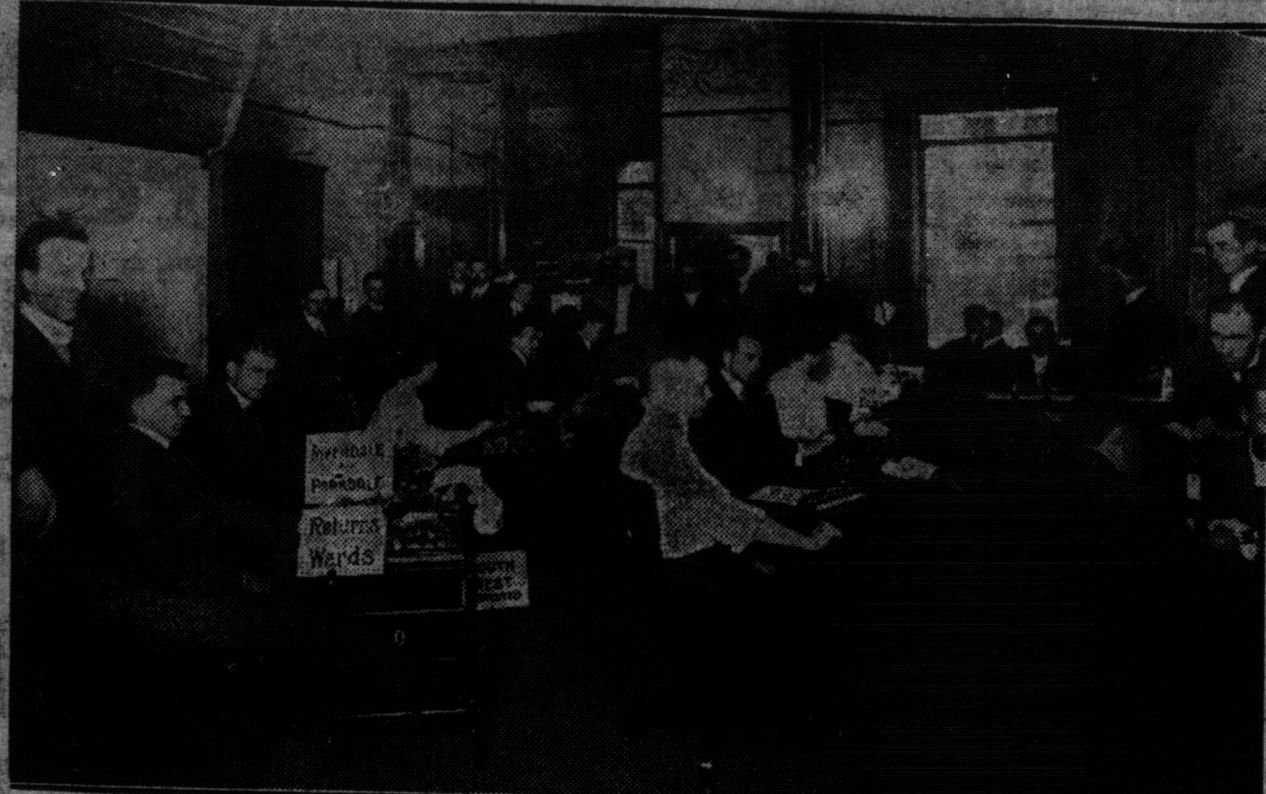

Canadian Press Despatch. BERLIN, June 30.—An astonishing commentary upon the conditions in the German theatrical world has been furnished by a label suit at Munich. Ernest Schrumpf, director of the Munich Folk's Theatre brought action against the publisher of a magazine devoted to stage affairs, who had accused Schrumpf of mistreatment of his employees. The testimony at the trial disclosed conditions which moved the presiding judge to declare that "we have experienced a great deal in this court room, but never before such testimony as this process has brought to light. The poorest workmen are better off than these actors. Workingmen would not endure such treatment."

Menu for Sir Ernest Shackleton's Expedition Not Enticing

RATIONS WEIGH LIGHT

New Day of Nineteen Hours to Be Established on March

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, June 30.—All the provisions for Sir Ernest Shackleton's trip across the polar continent are to be packed in suitcases...

1-3 a.m.—Preparations for the start and breakfast, consisting of three ounces of lard per man, two ounces of sugar, one ounce of dried milk, wheat protein and oats.

Explanation of Foods. Sir Ernest estimates that the lard and sugar supply heat; the protein builds up muscle; the nuts are the most nourishing food in the world; and the oats, mixed with other things, provide the bulk necessary to keep the organs from becoming atrophied.

As the party intends to cut right across the continent, a march of 1800 miles, they will have to carry all their food with them, and cannot, like previous expeditions, whose objective was the pole, depend upon food depots on the return march.

For protection while sleeping, a sleeping hood, something after the fashion of an automobile hood, is to be used. This weighs 27 pounds and accommodates six men, whereas an old tent weighed 30 pounds and accommodated three.

THE RIGHT KIND OF PRAYERS.

ELECTIONS AND MORE ELECTIONS.

We have been far more successful than have been the people of the United States in keeping separate and distinct our federal, provincial and municipal elections. This has not been so much due to any difference in the systems of election as to the good sense and determination of the Canadian people.

Our neighbors find it difficult to prevent national issues crowding out of consideration those subjects which should most keenly interest the people in the state elections. This coming November, elections will be held in all the states and at the same time U. S. senators and congressmen are to be chosen.

It is in our western provinces there is not the same provincial autonomy as there is in Ontario. Party government was first introduced in British Columbia by Sir Richard McBride, and it was really personal government and still.

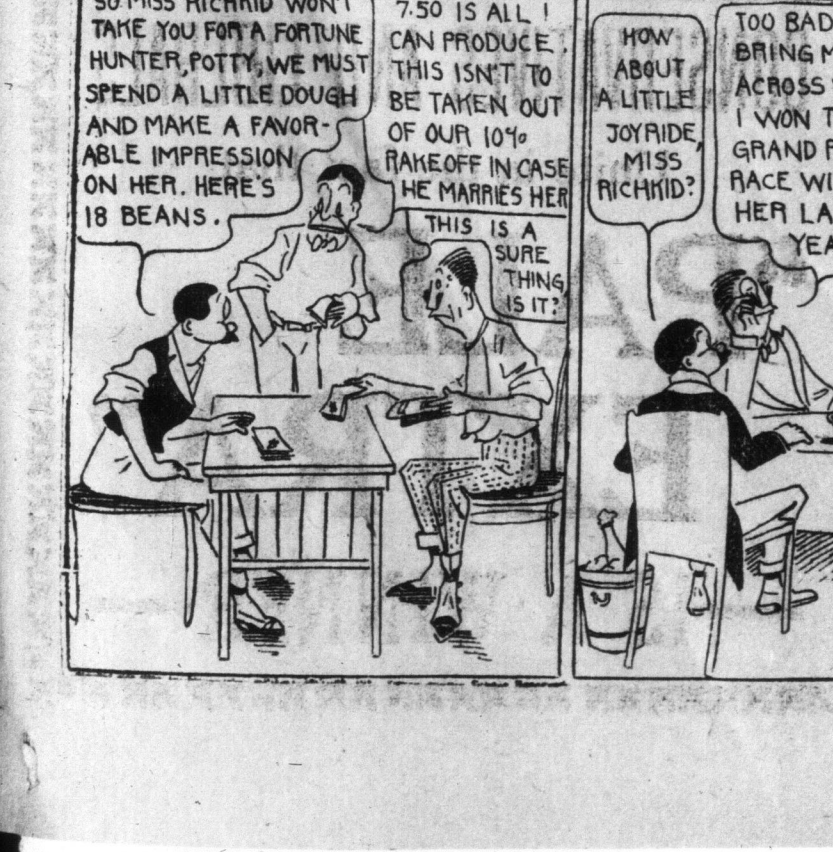

WHEAT RALLIES ON ALARMING REPORTS

Too Much Moisture is the Fear - Decrease in World's Supply.

CHICAGO, June 30.—Uneasiness over continued complaints of too much moisture in the spring crop has rallied the wheat market today, after prices had fallen to the lowest level this season.

It was said that if hot weather came before the surplus water in the fields ran off the consequence would be alarming. There were reports that in semi-submerged areas of the country a special instance named was the district near Fergus Falls, Minn., to Arkansas, a distance of fully 100 miles.

Rain southwest had a depressing influence on corn values. Later, however, the market recovered somewhat, having been affected by renewed attention to drought and damage south of the Ohio River and elsewhere.

WHEAT RALLIES ON ALARMING REPORTS

CHICAGO, June 30.—Uneasiness over continued complaints of too much moisture in the spring crop has rallied the wheat market today, after prices had fallen to the lowest level this season.

It was said that if hot weather came before the surplus water in the fields ran off the consequence would be alarming. There were reports that in semi-submerged areas of the country a special instance named was the district near Fergus Falls, Minn., to Arkansas, a distance of fully 100 miles.
