"The bank continued to advance noney to the mining company in large amounts until December, 1908," said Mr. Corley, "when the shareholders of the Keeley-Jowsey-Wood Mines agreed to sell its assets, subject to its liabilities, the liability of the bank then being about \$150,000 to the Keeley Mines, Limited on the condition that the Limited, on the condition that the stock in the latter, which amounted to two and a half million dollars, was to be issued, one-fifth to Travers, onefifth to Nesbitt, one-fifth to George Wishart, and one-fifth to the Farmers' Bank, and the balance to remain in the treasury. This transaction was put thru, and the Keeley-Jowsey-Wood Mines was wound up, Fitzgibbon, the chief accountant of the bank, being the liquidator.

"No authority appears on the books of the bank authorizing any advance to the Keeley Mines, Limited. The Keeley Mines, however, assumed the liability of \$150,000 of the Keeley-Jowsey-Wood Mines, and from that time forward the bank loaned to the com-pany another \$471,000, so that at this date the mining company is indebted to the bank in \$621,900 for actual cash





The question arose over a motion to reduce an appropriation of \$17,000 for a postoffice at Marieville, Que., which the members of the opposition denounced as granting large public buildings to small places in the Quebec Province in the hope of affecting votes, while larger and more important places thruout the Dominion were suffering from the ned of increas-ed facilities for postoffice and cus-toms purposes. The amount expended so far is \$32,000, and the \$17,000 auditional is asked from the house. Marievide has only 800 inhabitants. The vote in question stoow 43 to 34.

It is interesting to note that while appropriations of \$15,000 for a postef-fice in Arthabaska was under discus-sion, Arthur Gilbert, the Nationalist member, remained silent.

Forest Reserves.

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

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

Unequal Competition. "United States enterprises are de-veloped to the highest state in point of capacity, specialized to products and magnitude of operations. Canadian enterprises, because of their restrict-ed markets, are not yet so developed. and it would be obviously impossible for them to withstand the competition that would inevitably follow reductions in the present Canadian tariff.

"The United States may be ready for reciprocity; Canada is not. The United States already enjoys an envi-able position in the matter of international trade. Dutiable products coming from that country into Canada are admitted under an average duty of less than 25 per cent. whereas they them-selves, in order to encourage and protect their own industries, have imposed an average duty of 43 per cent., the result being the present all too successful exploitation of the Canadian market by the United States people, as evidenced by Canadian trade

Would Kill Branch Establishments. After referring to the effect reciprocity would have in checking the inflow of European capital to Canada, the memorial goes on to say:
"Moderate as is the existing Cana-

dian tariff, it has already induced a large number of U. S. manufacturers to establish branch factories in this country. Reciprocity would kill this movement, which is as yet only in its infancy; it would be obviously imprac ticable for a manufacturer to equip factories on this side to cater to a market of \$100,000,000 people, when 90 per cent. of that market might be cut off at any time by the termination of the treaty. Depletion of Canada's raw mater-ials in forest, field, mine and fisheries, is another of the baneful effects anticipated from reciprocity.
