## CHARGES MADE PREMIER SAYS ALL'S OVER

Responding to Bourassa's Enquiry, Sir Wilfrid Declares Fowler Left Nothing to Investigate

AND MR. BORDEN SAYS SAME Prime Minister and Other Members of the House Also Antagonistic to Enforcing G.T.R. Charter.

Ottawa, March 8.—(Special.)—Canadians far away from the capital will have some difficulty in figuring in their minds the scene in the commons this afternoon. With it went the last vestige of self respect that the popular chamber is supposed to have possessed of. It declared by its action, or want of action, that the reputation of the house, the reputation of the government, the reputation of ministers, were each and all of them of no concern to any one in it.

The feature evident was the treatment of the house of the Fowler charges involving the "wine, women and graft" connections of ministers of the crown.

Incidental was the conduct of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in regard to the enforcement of the charter rights of the people along the Grand Trunk to be given a penny-a-mile service. By his indifference Sir Wilfrid showed his contempt for public rights and his friendship for Chas. M. Hayes in defiance of the sacred trust of a great railway franchise and an immense national subsidy in the early days of the Great West.

With these two as major and minor events, two young gentlemen of the opposition found no difficulty in fitting themselves as a bound into the pop gun class and two other deputies from the west showed how proficient they were in the use of the barbed-ironed-rod act, for they used their own words.

Messrs. Smith and DeBaryshe also showed the Grand Trunk, the house and to the farmers that sent them to it. The member for South York was the object of the joint ridicule.

The man who came out of the afternoon with credit was Henri Bourassa, who had thrown charges at him, to make them good. True, Mr. Carvell was away, but he should have been there. Mr. Bennett was there and the premier that not only had Mr. Fowler not withdrawn his charges of "wine, women and graft," but that Bennett repeated them in substance as against at least one minister.

Mr. Bourassa recalled the statement made some days ago by the first minister. He then had said that the session could not close until the charges made by Mr. Fowler, either being withdrawn or thoroughly investigated. He had stipulated for delay until the report of the insurance commission could be received.

## A HUSH SCANDAL LEAGUE.

Several days ago, Mr. Fowler, the member for King's, N.B., in the house of commons at Ottawa, declared that if there were any more reflections by members on his private character and his purchase of Northwest lands, he would tell what he knew about the real reason for Hon. Mr. Hyman's absence from the country, and that he would expose the connection of certain members of the government and of certain supporters of the government with "wine, women and graft."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier a few days later had his attention called to this serious charge. He told Mr. Bourassa, and he told the public, that he would, before the session closed, investigate the insinuations made by Mr. Fowler. Mr. Borden, leader of the opposition, also made a statement. The Globe newspaper declared that the Fowler "bluff" must be "called."

Yesterday the matter came up in the house, a third time. Mr. Bourassa said the insurance report was now down, and asked Sir Wilfrid Laurier to investigate the Fowler charges and clear the reputation of the government and of parliament. To the surprise of every one, Sir Wilfrid replied that there were no charges made by Mr. Fowler that he could or would investigate, and that there were no charges made in the insurance report.

After him, Mr. Borden declared that the charges, which he had said he would insist on being investigated, were any charges which might be made against members on his side of the house in connection with insurance.

We are, therefore, lead to believe that, as Sir Wilfrid says no such charges have been made, Mr. Borden is finished, and that Mr. Bourassa or any one else, who was under the impression that Mr. Borden would insist on the investigation of the Fowler charges, was under misapprehension.

Before Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke, Mr. Bennett of East Simcoe stood up and told the house that the other day charges had been made in a public meeting near Ottawa that involved the reputation of a minister, and that these charges were of a most disgraceful character. Mr. Bennett also said that the charges made by Mr. Fowler against the ministers had not been withdrawn, and he said another thing, that all Canada was now concerned; that not only was the reputation of ministers involved, and the reputation of the house and government involved, but that the fair name of the country was involved. The house has now, the statement of Mr. Fowler and of Mr. Borden, and no move is made.

What Mr. Bennett says is true. The country is concerned, and the country will not be satisfied with the statements of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and of Mr. Borden.

If Sir Wilfrid will not challenge Mr. Fowler, if none of their colleagues will get up and defend the character of the ministers implicated, then the opposition must insist on its being done, or, like Sir Wilfrid, must pass before public criticism.

The investigation is to be side-tracked if it is possible. The public see this, and they believe that behind it immoral and discredited men on both sides of the house have made a deal between themselves for a saw-off, and that those who should insist on an investigation of the charges are not equal to the pressure behind them, or not equal to the task in front of them.

But the end is not yet.

## THAW'S TURNING AGAINST EVELYN

Howard Nesbit Alleges Family Seeks to Separate His Sister From Her Husband if the Jury Sets Him Free.

New York, March 8.—Many rumors were current to-day of a serious estrangement between Harry K. Thaw's family and his wife, and of the reported desire of the former to bring about a separation of the young couple in the event of a verdict acquitting Thaw.

Howard Nesbit, brother of Mrs. Harry Thaw, is quoted as saying: "The Countess of Yarmouth has said she will not return to England until her brother and my sister have been separated."

## TALK KILLS THE SUFFRAGE BILL

Mysterious Illnesses Keep So-Called Supporters Away and the House Dodges Decisive Vote by Long Debate.

London, March 8.—Mysterious illnesses having kept many so-called supporters of the "woman's enfranchisement bill" from their seats in the house of commons to-day, the opponents of the measure held the floor practically throughout the long-expected debate until 5 o'clock, thus practically killing the bill for the present session.

There were sixteen motions hostile to the bill placed on the table, and a petition signed by 31,000 women was presented just before the opening of the debate, protesting against the granting of the franchise to women on the ground that it would destroy their influence in their own sphere.

The suffragists were not daunted and to-night they held an enthusiastic meeting at Exeter Hall. Resolutions concerning the attitude of the government and of parliament, and expressing the determination to carry on the agitation were adopted.

After Mr. Dickinson, Liberal, who introduced the measure, made his opening speech at the beginning of the second reading, the premier announced the government would leave the question of the unrestricted decision of the house.

## BITTEN BY A RAT IN BED \$90,000 DAMAGES ASKED

Yale Professor's Daughter Wants \$25,000 and Family the Rest for "Rudeness on Ship."

New York, Mar. 8.—Libel in the sum of \$90,000 was filed in the United States District Court against the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique, the steamship La Gascogne, its officers and crew by John Wurts, a professor in the Yale Law School, in the sum of \$18,000 for mental and physical anguish on his own part and \$25,000 each for his wife and daughters, Eleanor and Laura.

The libel alleges that on the trip from Havre to this port between Sept. 15 and 24, Prof. Wurts and his family were exposed to the rudest sort of treatment and ill food.

It alleges that, on information that there were no first cabin accommodations, he, with his wife and daughters, were booked in the second cabin; but that within two hours of leaving port they found they were overruled by 1400 steerage passengers.

## ALBERTA PUTS TAX ON ALL SORTS OF CORPORATIONS

Premier's Bill, Which Has Passed All Committee Stages, Leaves No Interest Untouched.

Edmonton, Alta., March 8.—The Alberta legislature has passed extemporaneously Premier Rutherford's bill providing for the taxation of practically all conceivable public utility and financial concerns.

Street railways will pay \$200 per annum and \$10 per mile for everything over 20 miles.

Telephone companies pay 50 cents per instrument in cities of 10,000 and 75 cents in cities under.

## SOCIALISTS SNUB KING IN BRITISH COLUMBIA HOUSE

Refuse to Rise While Representative of His Majesty is Present, on Grounds of "Mummary."

Victoria, B.C., March 8.—(Special.)—The first session of the session of British Columbia's new parliament, which opened yesterday, has been provided by the members of the Socialist party, who deliberately, after consultation, declined to rise in accordance with the custom during the presence of Lieut.-Gov. Dunsuir, as the representative of King Edward.

Leader Hawthornthwaite subsequently defended the course of his party as consistent with the declaration during the campaign, that they recognized no flag but the red banner of Socialism.

He said they had remained seated because they did not propose longer to participate in "the mere mummeries of parliament."

This is Mr. Fairchild's third marriage; his second wife having died just last fall. His last wedding was solemnized in Kenilworth, Ont., last Sunday.

## BIG DAKOTA RANCH TENANTED BY TWO COWS

Bar X Company Shareholders Decide to Have an Independent Audit of Books to See Where Money's Gone.

OVER \$100,000 WAS INVESTED Some Present at Yesterday's Meeting Alleged That Certain Directors Contributed Their Names Only to Co. Funds.

After an existence of four years, the Bar X Cattle Company, better known as the Canadian-Dakota Cattle Company, is practically defunct. The reasons for the demise are so uncertain that at the annual meeting of shareholders yesterday the following resolution was adopted:

"That A. C. Neff, chartered accountant of Toronto, be appointed to investigate the accounts, books and papers of the Bar X Cattle Company from its inception, and report as soon as possible to an adjourned meeting of the board, to meet at the call for the directors up and after the report is received."

The motion was presented by Messrs. Stock and Nelson.

Another motion, by Messrs. Haine and Snel, requiring the directors to turn over to the accountant all books and papers, was likewise adopted.

John Dryden, president of the company, was in the chair. Shareholders were present from all parts of the province. What they said was calculated to add to the peace of mind of the directors, for recriminations were many. Mismanagement was alleged by many.

Cattle Died.

The company was organized in 1903 to stock a tract of 70,000 acres of Indian lands in Dakota, leased from the United States government. It is charged that the cost of fencing this property was responsible for much of the loss, and Canadian cattle shipped out were found to be unsuited to withstand the climate and perished by the thousands.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS HAMILTON'S SUPPLY OF SUNDAY PAPERS SHUT OFF

Express Companies Notify News Agents They Will Stop Traffic Beginning To-Day. Hamilton, March 8.—(Special.)—Commencing to-morrow, Hamilton's supply of American Sunday papers, which have been sold openly and delivered on Sunday, will be shut off.

The express companies have notified the newspaper agents that no papers will be carried by them. Last Sunday the express companies brought papers into the city, but the newsboys who handled them got into trouble with the authorities.

At the meeting of the markets committee this evening Ald. Gardner entered an emphatic protest against the condition of the cells at No. 5 police station. He said they were not fit to keep a boy in. Chairman Nicholson undertook to see that conditions were remedied.

The civic fuel committee had a session this evening. Hints about the investigation were thrown out. Some of the members favored going ahead and closing a contract for the year with the wholesale company that has been supplying the city for the last two years, while others thought no action should be taken until the investigating committee finished its work. No definite action was taken.

Westworth Teachers Meet. The Westworth Teachers' Association opened its annual meeting to-day. Some interesting papers in the Dewey v. Hamilton and Dundas Railway and Findley v. Cataract Power Co. were argued before Justice Riddell. Judgment was reserved.

Gambling Cases Taken Up. The minister of justice has taken up promptly the cases of the three men who were fined two months on the charge of keeping gambling establishments, and has requested Police Magistrate to make a report on the case. His worship will report that the prisoners were induced to plead guilty on the understanding that they were to escape with a fine. He had no part in this understanding and knew nothing of it until after the sentences were passed.

A. B. Ayleworth has notified Mayor Stewart that he cannot see his way clear yet to free the three prisoners from the connection with the street car riots. The minister has promised that he will keep the cases before him and will not allow them to go to the attorney-general's department.

The attorney-general's department has authorized summonses charging Louis and Rudolph Birk with selling opium on Sunday, and they will appear in police court Saturday morning.

Fishery Inspector Kerr says there is so much illegal spearing on the bay that the privilege will be revoked by the government next winter. He has appointed Dr. James-Stratton to inspect the bay and to report on the matter. He has received instructions to take steps next spring to destroy the carp in the bay.

ORONHYATEKHA AT REST LAST HONORS ARE DONE

Pathetic Scenes in the Funeral Rites in Mohawk Reservation and at Deseronto.

Deseronto, March 8.—(Special.)—Today witnessed the last of the services in obsequies of the great Chief Oronhyatekha. For nearly the length of a continent the casket, and remains had traveled, receiving at every stopping place such tokens of grief and esteem as are usually reserved for kings.

It was in his own old home, "The Pines," at Deseronto, that grief took on its deepest form. In the presence of the now twice-orphaned children from the Foresters' Home who he had for so long been a second father, many a strong man who had withstanding endurance to the shock of grief at the more imposing services and pageantry in Toronto, was touched into displaying emotion.

The body of death was sorrow which was common to all hearts. It was at a time like this we could rejoice at the assurance of the Christian faith.

Dean Davis offered up a very eloquent prayer, asking that the who died might speak, and that the enduring consolation be his and his people's. Sorrow was common to all hearts. It was at a time like this we could rejoice at the assurance of the Christian faith.

After Dean Davis' prayer of consolation was ended, Supreme Orator Rev. J. McCaughan, Rev. J. D. Clark, V.S.C.R., and Victor Morin, P.S.C.R., conducted a special service under the Foresters' impressive ritual.

The body was taken from "The Pines" to All Saints' Church, close by on Dr. Oronhyatekha's estate. Rev. Dr. Oronhyatekha, pastor of All Saints' church, conducted the service in the church, assisted by Dean Davis. The lesson was from 2nd Cor., xv. "Now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the first fruits of them that sleep."

The building was festooned with purple hangings and the light from each deep window revealed to the dimly lit mass of flowers which filled them. The surprised clergy and the little choir filled the little church with the chance, and the little church was packed with the dusky sons and daughters of Oronhyatekha's tribe, who sang a favorite hymn of the chief, "Nearer My God to Thee."

The pastor said he had no need to speak of Oronhyatekha's liberality and personality to any of those present for they all had known him, and the parish had lost its chief and friend.

Drive to Cemetery. After the simple Anglican burial service was over the casket was removed to the hearse for a seven-mile drive to Deseronto Cemetery. Owing to the enormous weight of the casket, eight powerful Indians from the reserve, most of them related to the deceased, took the places of the original bearers. Their heavy bearskin coats accentuated their brawny outlines as they carried the weight of the casket.

Carrriages conveyed the chief mourners, viz. Dr. Acland Oronhyatekha (son) and his wife; Mrs. Percy Johnston, a sister; Miss Elizabeth Hill, Miss Lydia Hill and Mrs. Alex. Loft, sisters-in-law; Miss Gertrude Oronhyatekha, adopted daughter; Miss Emma Loft, niece; and Miss Doris Hansen of Christiania, Norway, sister of Mrs. Acland Oronhyatekha. Following these were carrriages containing the clergy, prominent members of the L.F.C. and local residents, and also the children.

CHANGE IN BASEBALL LAWS

National Agreement Altered at Request of Pacific Coast League.

Cincinnati, March 8.—Announcement of three changes in the national agreement with the Pacific Coast League, which is in effect today, has been made by the National Association.

First—Add to section 1, article vi, the following sentence: "No club operating under the national agreement shall at any time negotiate for the purchase or lease of the property of another club without first securing the consent of such club."

Second—Strike out the following sentence: "The National Association shall have the right to select players from the Pacific Coast League who shall be from Nov. 15 to Dec. 1, of each year."

Third—Change section 1, article viii, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 1—All contracts between clubs and players in the major leagues shall be in form prescribed by the national commission. All contracts between clubs and players in the National Association shall be in form prescribed by that association."

Fourth—Add to section 1, article viii, the following sentence: "The National Association shall have the right to select players from the Pacific Coast League who shall be from Nov. 15 to Dec. 1, of each year."





### McDOUGAL AND THE STATUTE

WILL HE HAVE TO RESIGN?

Member for Ottawa Makes Protest in Legislature, But is Silent as to Partnership.

Is it possible that proceedings shall be taken to unseat D. J. McDougal, one of the members of the local house, for corrupt practices?

The question arises out of the situation described in yesterday's World, when Mr. McDougal, in the private bills committee, strongly supported the Ottawa City Bill, in which his partner, G. F. Henderson, was interested on behalf of "his clients," the Ottawa Electric Light Company. The statute is precise in regard to the matter. No barrister or solicitor, the partner of a member of the house, shall accept or receive, either directly or indirectly, any fee, compensation or reward for drafting, advising upon, promoting, or opposing any bill, resolution, matter or thing submitted or intended to be submitted to the consideration of the said assembly or of a committee thereof.

Any person wilfully violating the provisions of the act shall be subject to a penalty of \$500 over and above the amount or value of the fee, compensation or reward accepted or received by him, to be paid with full costs of action to anyone who will sue therefor, one-half to be paid to the person so suing, and the other half to the crown.

Mr. McDougal has been careful not to touch the question of partnership in his public utterances on the committee proceedings. It is to be presumed that his partner, Mr. Henderson, is not coming to Toronto to do business for his wealthy clients, but to do the thing. If, as a co-partner of Mr. McDougal, he is receiving fee or reward, Mr. McDougal either is, or is not, "knowingly accepting, or receiving, either directly or indirectly," a share of the fee. Any violation of this section, says section 10, following, shall be deemed a corrupt practice, and an election petition may be filed within six months. Should a violation be made by the judge trying the petition, the seat of the member becomes vacated, and a writ shall issue for a new election, as if he were naturally dead, as the language of the act picturesquely phrases it.

### Padding Public Accounts

Ottawa, March 8.—In the public accounts committee today H. B. Ames, M.P., of Montreal, examined J. M. Courtney, C.M.G., ex-deputy minister of finance, in regard to the steps taken by the Dominion government to satisfy itself regarding the cost of the western division of the G.T.P., who bonds the country had undertaken to guarantee. He, however, was not able to shed much light on the matter.

A letter from Mr. Shannon, accountant of the railway department, was put in. It declared that the accounts of the G.T.P. included sums aggregating \$162,000, which, in his judgment, were not properly chargeable thereto. In other words, it was said to contain items that the department would not pay.

Windsor's Privilege.

The private bills committee of the legislature yesterday granted Windsor "exceptional power" to grant bonuses to manufacturers by a three-fourths vote of the council and without a vote of ratepayers. The bonus is to be limited to ten years exemption from taxation, together with free municipal light and water and a grant or lease of land. At least twenty-five adults should be employed.

After listening to Mayor Wigle and others of the Windsor Board, Chairman Lucas admitted the circumstances were also exceptional. For one thing, about 2000 Windsor residents worked in Detroit, and hence it was difficult to get the statutory two-thirds vote. For another thing, ten per cent of the voters have approved giving the council the power.

### General Booth Comes To-Day At Eighty, on World Tour

Civic Reception to Be Tendered Aged Commander of Salvation Army This Afternoon—His Life and Work.

When General Booth alights from his private car at the Union Station this morning he will be received by Commissioner Coombs and a number of other officers of the Salvation Army, but the ceremonies attendant upon the arrival of the veteran leader will be simple. Capt. Douglas Young, aide-de-camp for the lieutenant-governor, will be in waiting, and the distinguished visitor will be conveyed in carriage to government house, where General Booth will be a guest during his stay in Toronto.

General Booth will reach Toronto at 11.15, coming from New York by Lehigh Valley and Grand Trunk Railways. General Manager Hays has arranged for a special train for the general during his tour in Canada.

The civic reception, for which invitation cards have been sent out, will begin at 4.15 p.m., with the presentation by the mayor of an address of welcome in the council chamber, which will be decorated with palms and lilacs for the occasion. The general will reply, and will afterwards, standing by the side of the south end, receive the invited guests.

Members of the army will assemble in the Temple at 8.30 p.m. and will sing in a body to the city hall to attend the ceremonies.

Among the prominent officers who had arrived last night were: Brigadier Smeton of British Columbia; Brigadier Burdell, Saskatchewan and Alberta; Brigadier Turner, Maritime Provinces; Brig. Col. Hargrave, Montreal; Col. Ross, Newfoundland; Col. Sharp, Western Ontario, and Major Creighton, western immigration agent.

Perhaps no man in our own or any age has received such a full measure of recognition and honor as General Booth, the commander-in-chief of the Salvation Army. From the time of the triumphs of the Caesars and the spectacular omissions of the middle ages, the circumstances of the world have been such that the highest public honors were generally reserved for the victorious and the successful.

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### EDWARD VII. ADDRESSES AMIR AS "YOUR MAJESTY"

Ruler of Afghanistan Returns Home From India With Autos and the Bridge Whist Craze.

Calcutta, March 8.—After more than a two months' visit to India, the Amir of Afghanistan, Habibullah Khan, has returned from his tour of inspection, and has started for Kabul. His majesty unmistakably enjoyed every day of his stay in India.

He was addressed for the first time officially as "your majesty" in a telegram of welcome from King Edward when he entered India, which is regarded as significant.

While no proposals of a political or military character have been made on either side, and no modification of the British Afghan relations as established by the Treaty of Kabul in 1905, was suggested, the Amir, during his stay in India, was a keen student of the situation.

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### WEAK AND WORN OUT. NORTHWEST PASSAGE OF NO VALUE TO COMMERCE

Amundsen, the Norwegian Explorer, Declares His Discovery of Use Only to Science.

Paris, March 8.—Amundsen, the daring Norwegian explorer, who accomplished the first north-west passage in his 47-ton Gjoa, spending nineteen months of his three years' voyage making observations in the vicinity of the magnetic pole, has been lionized in Paris.

President Fallieres decorated the explorer a Commander of the Legion of Honor. Amundsen has delivered lectures before the various scientific societies and given a paper on his experiences for the benefit of France's forty "immortals" at the residence of Prince Roland Bonaparte, who recently was elected to the institute.

Amundsen expects to take three years to work out the scientific results of the observations he made night and day for nineteen months near the magnetic pole. While he knows that his observations prove that the magnetic pole is not stationary, until his figures and notes are carefully studied, it will be impossible to say whether its oscillations are regular.

The route north of the American continent, which he discovered, he says, is only practicable for scientific explorations.

LIBS. AND PUBLIC OWNERSHIP. Public ownership is the one topic that is attracting general attention throughout the city. Last night it was the subject of a most interesting debate at the Laurier Club. The president, in introducing the motion, "To what extent is it advisable for municipalities to own public utilities?" said that outside the United States there were 220,765 miles of railways owned and operated by governments as against 81,946 miles in the hands of private companies. This, he thought, was a clear indication that public ownership had made rapid strides, which would tend to the public good, as it would deliver the people from the selfishness of wealthy corporations and effectively curb their greed. He claimed that the Liberal party had always been foremost in advocating reforms, and he felt certain that if this question was taken up in the proper spirit, good and true men would be found to represent the people who would operate all public utilities for the public good, and banish the system

of greed and graft that had unfortunately prevailed so long in political circles. Nearly everyone present expressed views on the subject, the majority being unanimously of opinion that all national monopolies must be controlled by the people. The club will discuss the subject again later in the session.

TRUE MEANING OF RESULT OF LONDON ELECTIONS

Englishman Points Out What Progressives Have Done for Working Classes.

Editor World: Enemies of public ownership are making merry over the London elections. They delight in telling us that at the hub of the empire the system has been tried, weighed in the balance, and found wanting; that the men who for the past 18 years have governed that great city are "wasters" whom the people have rejected and driven from power with never a chance of their returning.

True facts when only half told are frequently more damaging than deliberate falsehoods. Now what has happened in London? The reports that have reached this country tell only one side of the story—they come from a tainted source. True, there has been a great change in the personnel of the London county council, but the people have devoted the best part of their lives to the public service, to the bettering of the conditions of the masses, to making that fine old city a clean and wholesome place; to remedying gross abuses, fighting great monopolists, and in effecting a qualitative improvement, so that the burden should not fall so heavily upon the poor—many of these men have retired to their seats. Why has the change been made? Is it because Londoners have grown tired of beautifying and improving their city? Is it because the late council waged war against slums and slum owners? Is it because they have given efficient water supply and an improved sewerage service? Have their cheap transportation facilities broken down? Is it that every man, woman and child in that great metropolis has a good home with plenty of food, clothing and warmth? Is it that every man, woman and child is needing nothing more? Emphatically no.

Yet these men who have labored hard for years to break the power of tyrannical extortion and oppression, to improve the conditions of the people and provide them with sanitary healthy homes, have received a temporary setback to their good work. Why is this?

Enemies of public ownership, friends of monopoly, have been busy in other directions. The great majority of the people of this country have a faint conception of the conditions of life in that great city, where six and a half millions of people are crowded on some 700 square miles of land, where the average man has avaricious capitalists, monopolists, great landowners and the favored few of so-called nobles, who are engaged in a constant struggle to dispossess the people of their own sweet will and pleasure, with no other objects in view than to enrich themselves. It is from the fact that there are over three millions of people there, who have to live, clothe and pay rent out of an income of less than \$100 per week per head. To these poor people every additional penny of tax is a serious burden. The principle of public ownership of public utilities, as proposed by the late council improved London in every way. They have provided a more efficient and cheaper means of transportation, they have reduced the cost of water supply, they have provided a magnificent sewerage system and in every other direction. The enormous expense it cost to install. It must be remembered that a few great landowners possess and control every inch of land in London, and they oppose every improvement that may be suggested. They go further, they cause the public to be taxed. Should the public opinion be too strong they give a tardy consent, but only on the condition of receiving a heavy cash payment.

Whist this is very unfortunate for Londoners it provides this country with a splendid object lesson. To-day Canada has the opportunity of preventing such a state of things occurring here. Public ownership of the great public utilities must be obtained at all costs. Corporations and a few individuals must not be allowed to amass great wealth at the public expense, and the people must control and if the setback London has received awakens Canadians to a true sense of the dangers that await them if they part with the control of all public utilities, it will be one of the greatest boons London has ever conferred on this country. C. R. Morden of Regina, Sask., who is in Toronto, spoke of the outlook for the west in an interview with The World yesterday as follows:

The west is a moving country. I have seen great development in the last two years both in rural and urban places. It is wonderful, the improvements in Regina in the last seven months. I think there are several reasons why the west is being rapidly developed. Again, it is the last west, and the people are convinced of that. BUYING POWER LIGHT IN THE MINING ISSUES

Cobalt Stocks Continue Nervous With Other Securities, But Trading Grows Smaller.

World Office, Friday Evening, March 8. Trading in the Cobalt stocks fell off to a considerable extent to-day, but the liquidation was still of sufficient volume to depress prices below those of yesterday. The timidity of investors in all securities caused by the avalanche in the mining stocks, and nervousness on the part of the market, are the factors which are causing the present state of the market. It is noteworthy that the liquidation is gradually growing less and only as soon as this is exhausted can any improvement in prices be looked for. The buying power was unaccountably weaker to-day. Three cars of ore have been shipped from this mine, and this and the recent dividend are important factors in to-day's prices. The only explanation is further forced selling on a weak market. Some small reactions occurred in other issues, but the market on the whole was little worse than yesterday. At the close the lack of new buying power was the only prominent feature. The present offerings are not large and a light real demand for these shares would prove an important factor in prices.

Silver and Gold Market. Harlan & Co. announce that there has been a merger of the Silbert Consolidated and Gold Forty Companies, whose properties are in the Larder Lakes district. By their acquisition of the Gold Forty they have, says Mr. Harlan, secured one of the very best prospects in the Larder Lakes district. Adams of McGill University pointed out that the mineral output of the Dominion had already reached two-thirds the amount of the agricultural exports of Canada, and argued not only in all human probability increase, but it was quite within the bounds of possibility that still greater riches might be discovered, the existence of which we are at present ignorant of.

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LANDS FOR THE SETTLER.

A pamphlet has been issued by the department of lands, forests and mines, containing valuable information re sale and location of public lands.

Two hundred acres is the limit of the area before an individual can obtain 160 acres only, the quantity as a free grant, and if the land selected exceeds 160 acres each, the lands will be sold.

In certain townships, however, situated in the districts of Nipissing, Algoma and Thunder Bay, and which are subdivided into sections and quarter sections, or into lots containing 160 or 320 acres each, the lands, whether they be a single man over 18, or the head of a family with children, is entitled to a section of 160 acres as the free section of a half, or as the case may be, and he may purchase an additional acre, each, at the rate of 50 cents per acre.

In the district of Rainy River the male or sole female head of a family with children under 18 is entitled to 160 acres, or a quarter section, as a free grant, or may purchase an adjoining quarter section of 80 acres, as a free grant, payable in three equal annual instalments, the first instalment being paid at once, and the balance in two equal annual instalments, and a male applicant is entitled to 120 acres or a half quarter section together with an adjoining quarter of a section, or a free grant, and may purchase an adjoining quarter section of 80 acres at the same price and upon the same terms.

Yesterday morning Grand Trunk Express No. 4, leaving Toronto at 9 a.m. for Montreal, came to grief while passing Oshawa, thru the flange on one of the drive wheels breaking. ### JURY PLACES BLAME FOR MONTREAL SCHOOL FIRE

Report to Coroner Finds Fault With Drill, Lack of Fire Escapes, But Doesn't Allege Crime.

Montreal, March 8.—(Special.)—The following finding was reached to-day by the coroner's jury in the Prefontaine school fatality:

- (1) That the children who lost their lives were asphyxiated as the result of Mr. Hand having left certain doors open, thus having allowed smoke to reach and pass thru the halls of the building.
- (2) That the fire drill, of which the school had boasted, had been omitted, besides which the Protestant school commissioners should have ordered more frequent practice.
- (3) That Miss Maxwell, the teacher who lost her life, waited too long in notifying the children of the upper stories of their danger.
- (4) That the fire apparatus, namely, exterior fire escapes, were missing from the building.

None of the grounds given above constitute a crime. The Protestant school commissioners cannot therefore be held criminally responsible.

We suggest that in each school a marshal or caretaker shall be employed, who shall watch for such exigencies.

### DRAFT NEW MINING BILL FOR SUBMISSION NEXT YEAR

#### Hon. Mr. Cochrane Promises Support—Proposition Mining Men Would Favor More.

The committee appointed by the Canadian Mining Institute to interview Hon. Mr. Cochrane, minister of mines, concerning the bill for the taxation of mines in this province, conferred with him yesterday. There were present at this interview also Premier Whitney and Provincial Secretary Hanna.

Many paragraphs and features of the bill together with the principles of the measure were discussed, especially the objections, which were submitted in a series of resolutions adopted by a full meeting of the Institute on Thursday afternoon, and which were immediately transmitted to Mr. Cochrane.

While the committee adhered firmly to the resolutions passed by the Institute, yet upon the personal assurance of the minister that he would modify certain clauses to meet objections which were stated, and upon his statement that some such measure for revenue would have to be enacted at this session, and his further assurance that as minister of mines he was willing to meet the views of the mining men if the same could be made ready within one year, the committee decided to submit the bill in the hands of Mr. Cochrane for this year.

They pledged themselves to submit to him within twelve months the draft of a new bill which would be more acceptable to the mining interests of Ontario. This action was in consequence of the personal confidence which the mining men have in Mr. Cochrane.
