ENDORSED TELEPHONE BILL

Civic Legislation Committee Approves Unanimously of the Principle and Will Support It.

CLERKS WILL GO BACK TO WORK... Assessment Commissioner Fleming on the Board of Control Carpenters' Reduction in Estimates.

The Legislation and Reception Committee of the City Council met yesterday afternoon and unanimously adopted the following resolution, which was introduced by Ald. Urquhart.

"That we approve of the principle of the bill introduced in the House of Commons by Mr. W. F. Maclean for regulating telephone companies, and that we request the members of the House of Commons representing the West and Centre Toronto to support said bill, and to assist Mr. Maclean in every way possible in obtaining said legislation, and that we petition the Senate and House of Commons of Canada to pass said legislation."

At the request of Ald. Lynd, Ald. Urquhart explained the bill, which was a general act to regulate telephone companies. It would provide that if we established a telephone company in Toronto, that company should use the long distance lines of the Bell Telephone Company at a rate to be fixed by the Governor-General in Council, and it would also provide for a regulation of rates.

After the Exhibition Board. Ald. Urquhart introduced another resolution to make the Exhibition Board carry out its agreement to reduce the representation of the Electoral District of Toronto on the Board of Directors of the Industrial Exhibition, having agreed to a joint conference with the Fair and Exhibition Committee that legislation should be applied for reducing the representation of the Electoral District of Toronto on the Exhibition Board.

Resolution of Censure. After the working of the department had been discussed at some length and the Commissioner and his clerks had provided all figures asked, Ald. McMurich moved "that while we disapprove of the action of the Assessment Commissioner in dismissing the clerks, we do not think it is of the utmost importance that the work performed by the clerks be discontinued."


